Pinner's set to reopen Saturday



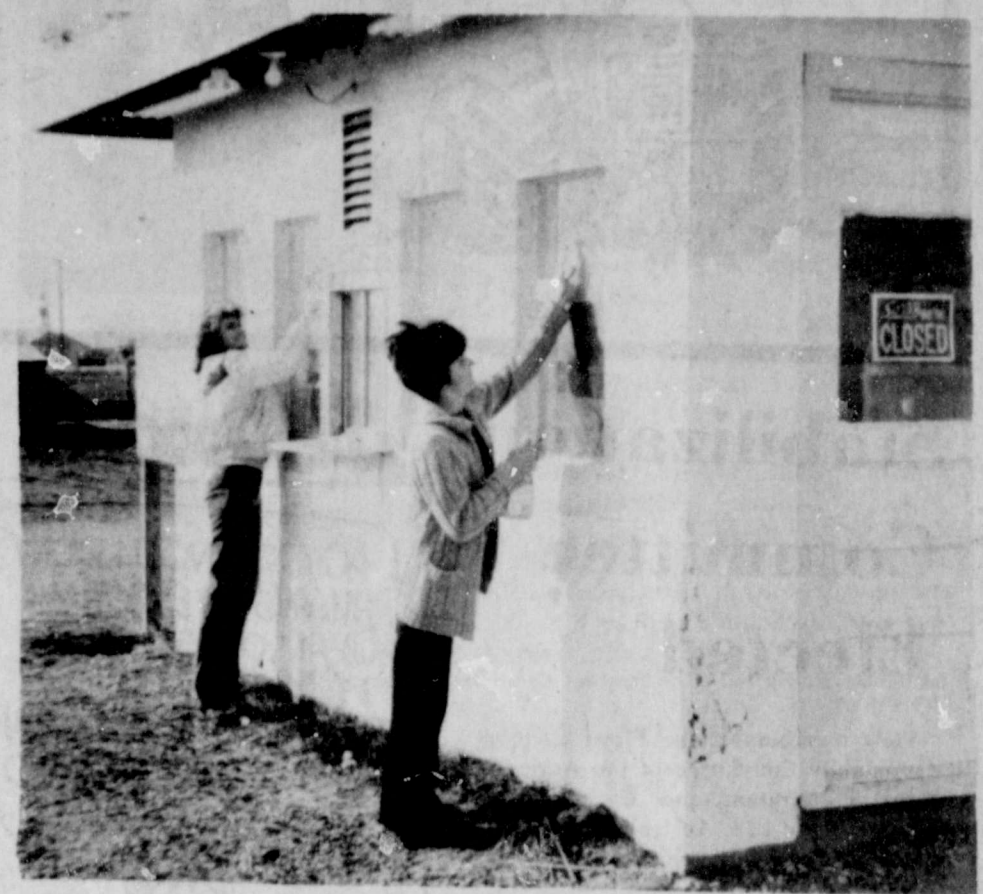
Cecil and Annie Pinner:

Lockney man dies in traffic accident

A Lockney man was killed in a two car collision New Year's Eve at Edinburg, Texas which also killed another person.

The victims were identified as Ricardo Hernandez, 31, of Lockney and Mrs. Irma Garza Olivarez, 25, of Edinburg.

Edinburg police say Hernandez' car collided with another vehicle driven by Juan Olivarez of Edinburg at an intersection in Edinburg. Mrs. Olivarez

was a passenger in the car driven by her husband.

Juan Olivarez and a passenger in Hernandez' car, Jose Hilario De Santos, of Edinburg, were taken to an Edinburg hospital. Both were reported in extremely serious condition.

Hernandez had been working in McAllen, Texas recently.

Floydada man seeks success in Hollywood

Hollywood and all the glamour of acting seems half a world away from West Texas, but Dana Scott Galloway, a Floydada native, is making his bid for a piece of fame.

"It's not easy to break into movies or television," said Galloway while in Floydada for the holidays visiting his parents, Al and Sally Galloway. "90% of professional actors are out of work."

There are certainly easier ways to make a living, but Galloway does it because he loves acting and because it has become such a part of his life.

Galloway and his wife, who is also an actor, began acting at Texas Tech while they were in college. They also both waited tables at the Hayloft Dinner Theater in Lubbock where they got their first small professional acting parts in the light comedies that the Hayloft liked to feature.

The couple also got their first big break through the Hayloft Dinner Theater. Under the direction of Larry Randolph they put together a production of "The Mousetrap," a mystery based on a story by Agatha Christy. The play really clicked and the audience loved it. The Galloways ended up taking the show on the road to theaters in Oklahoma City, Tulsa, Memphis, and other cities around the country.

The success of "The Mousetrap" led to other acting jobs and to making commercials in Dallas. The Galloways

were able to join the acting unions, Equity and American Federation of Television and Radio Actors.

In February of last year Dana Scott and Rebecca Galloway moved to Hollywood to try to break into television and motion pictures. "We thought that we had enough experience as actors to have a good chance," said Galloway, "we're not just a couple of kids with stars in their eyes. We can both act and we know how to go about getting acting jobs."

One way to get acting offers is to do a showcase presentation, which Rebecca Galloway did in December with Eric Braeden, star of the daytime television series "The Young and the Restless." The showcase was the play "Death Takes a Holiday" which was produced in a tiny 99 seat theater for an audience of producers, directors, and agents.

"It's only a matter of time until we get parts in television or motion pictures," says Galloway. Their goal is not to be movie stars, although that would be nice, but just to work steadily as actors.

The couple would like to become sufficiently well known in acting circles so that they could move to a small town in California and only go into Los Angeles for the acting jobs. "We really miss living in a small town where you know everyone and the people are friendly," but now we have to live where the acting jobs are," Galloway

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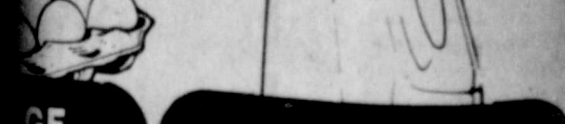

Health officials seek Brucellosis information

(AUSTIN) — Commissioners of the Texas Animal Health Commission are requesting additional input from cowmen in implementing the Texas brucellosis program.

"We plan to have 15 area committees throughout the state made up of cattlemen to advise us in relation to the state's brucellosis program. We know we must have the cooperation of livestock producers, and we want their advise and counsel," John Armstrong, Kingsville, chairman, TAHC, said.

Names of livestock producers that would be considered for membership on the area committees are wanted. They can come through agricultural organiza-

Egg production may drop in '81

Total egg production for 1981 may decrease, as producers continue adjusting output to achieve a positive net return. Broiler and turkey production will expand in 1981 in response to higher prices and less competition from other meats. Poultry prices should be up sharply from this year's second-quarter lows, but record feed costs may hold profits near break-even levels at least through the first half of the year.

Egg production in 1980 will about equal a year earlier, the increase having occurred in the first quarter. Output in the fourth quarter may be near a year earlier, and indications point to a 1-percent decline in the first half of 1981. The table egg flock is below year-earlier levels and, until well into 1981, fewer replacement pullets will be

available. Because a high percentage of the flock has already been force-molted, producers are expected to increase culling if egg prices do not keep up with rising costs.

Egg prices were down sharply in the second quarter but have since increased — mainly in response to production cuts from a year earlier. Cartoned New York large eggs in July-September averaged 70 cents a dozen, 5 cents above last year. Prices have increased this fall and will continue strong in early 1981 before declining seasonally in the spring. Prices may average in the high 70-cent range in the first quarter but then decline to the mid-70's in the spring. In the second half of 1981, if production is held at this year's level, prices can be expected to average 78 to 82 cents a dozen.

Output of federally inspected broiler meat for 1980 will total a little over 11 billion pounds, ready-to-cook weight, up 2 percent from last year. Output should continue expanding in 1981, perhaps around 6 percent. Production costs will be higher than in 1980, but strong red meat prices will likely keep broiler production profitable, particularly in the second half of the year.

Broiler prices have declined from the high summer levels but remain above last year. The nine-city wholesale price for the fourth quarter may be about 9 cents more than last year's average of 42 cents a pound. Prices may average in the low 50-cent range in the first quarter of 1981 and then rise slightly as demand increases seasonally next spring and summer.

Federal agency plans \$21 million payment

More than \$21 million will be paid to New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas farmers on this year's low crop yields, the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation announced recently.

"This was one of the worst years in history for U.S. farmers. In this Region, farmers were faced with everything from hot, dry weather to hurricanes. Every crop we insure and almost every area of the Region was hit by some disaster. Claims have been filed on over 33 percent of our insurance units. With the cost-price squeeze farmers are

facing today, the FCIC indemnity many receive is going to be the only way they can continue operating," explained Ben A. Jordan, Jr., College Station Regional Director.

Texas farmers will receive more than \$18 million of FCIC indemnities while some \$2.4 million will go to Oklahoma farmers and over \$400 thousand will go to farmers in New Mexico.

The most heavily damaged crops include cotton, wheat, grain sorghum and peanuts, but substantial payments will also be made on citrus, corn, rice and soybeans.

The government-sponsored program is designed to cover the investment a farmer makes in raising a crop. Since the voluntary program was started in 1938, more than 90 cents of every dollar of premium paid has been returned to farmers in indemnities.

(D) The proposed activities are not eligible for CDBG program assistance.

Soon, many more supermarkets may pick up the potential for checking you out with computers.

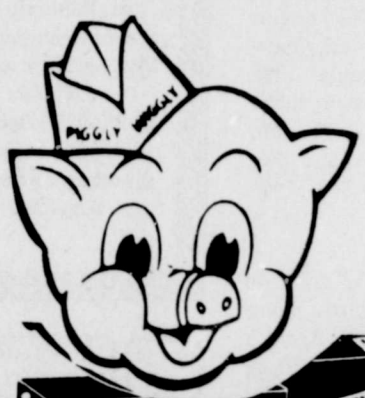

Social security fraud conviction

Ray Purcell, Manager of the Plainview Social Security office announced another conviction for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and Social Security benefit fraud. high productivity of our employees, we were able to delay the increase an additional six months."

The cost of jet fuel for Southwest's 23 Boeing 737-200 jets has now climbed 30% to an average of 91 cents per gallon from the January 1980 level of 70 cents per gallon. For the past year, Southwest has been employing fuel conservation measures by using a slightly slower enroute cruise speed which in 1980 saved approximately 4,200,000 gallons of fuel and \$3,500,000.

U.S. District Judge Barefoot Sanders has issued a preliminary injunction allowing the United States Postal Service to detain incoming mail addressed to American Service Directory, American Service, and American Commercial Publications, at four separate Dallas addresses, pending the outcome of a Postal Service attempt to obtain a mail stop order for mail addressed to the companies.

The Postal Service claims that the three Dallas firms have misrepresented work-at-home projects in advertisements soliciting home workers for envelope stuffing jobs. Classified advertisements placed by the companies in publications throughout the United States claimed that persons could make up to \$2500 per month addressing and stuffing envelopes at home. Other advertisements read, "Home addressers wanted, \$500 per week possible, no experience required."

If successful in obtaining the mail stop order, the Postal Service will return to sender all mail received addressed to the firms relating to the work-at-home offers.

Flu season peeks in Jan

If you're suffering from a fever, coughing, sore throat, runny nose, and generally just ache all over, guess what you have? January marks the beginning of the peak influenza season, so brace yourself to ward off or weather the attack says the Texas Medical Association (TMA).

Anyone can come down with the flu, especially if it is widespread in a community. It is more likely to be serious for those with chronic diseases, the aged or women who are pregnant.

The flu usually takes one to three days to develop. When it does come out into the open, you may notice chills, fever, headache, backache, muscular pains and a loss of appetite. Your temperature may go up quickly during and first day of symptoms, and will gradually drop over a few days. Fever usually lasts for about three days, but it may go on for as long as seven.

As your fever drops, you may notice more stuffiness in your nose and the cough may continue. There might also be a pus in the discharges from your nose and throat. From that point on, however, you'll begin healing quickly.

While most patients recover completely within a week, many continue to feel unusually tired for some time. The standard remedies of getting plenty of rest, drinking fluids and taking

aspirin still hold true says the TMA. Hot chicken soup coupled with tender loving care couldn't hurt either.

In most cases, the flu leaves no permanent after effects, but occasionally,

people do develop other illnesses. The most common complication is pneumonia. Other sicknesses that piggy-back the flu are persistent cough or bronchitis, sinus trouble and ear infections.

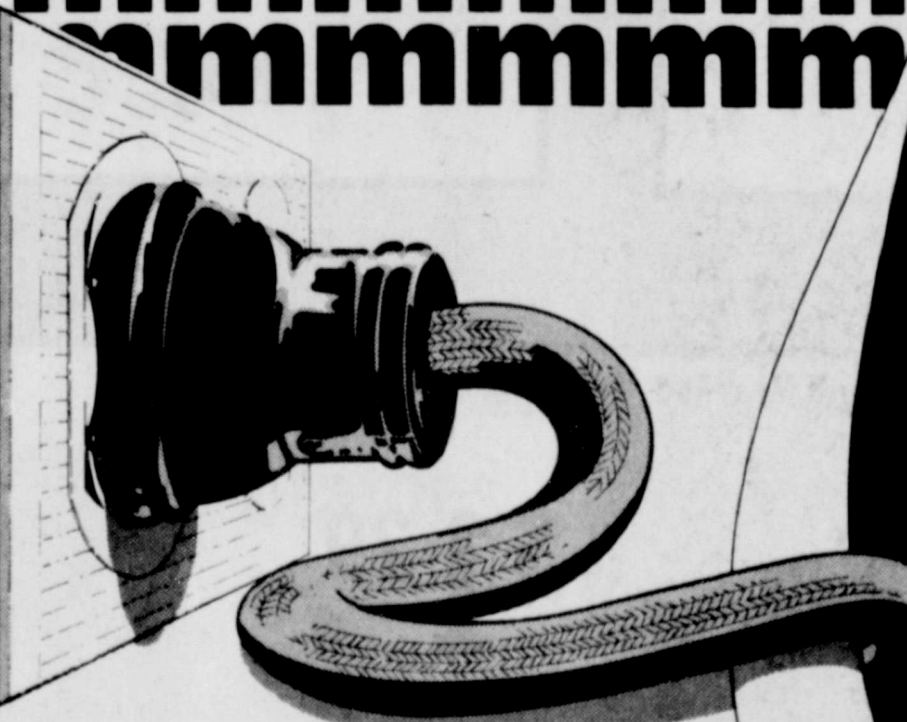
Social security fraud convicted

Ray Purcell, Manager of Plainview Social Security Office announced another conviction for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and Social Security benefit fraud. ponsible to the public to insure that those who attempt to cheat on Social Security programs will be held accountable for their actions and that the Administration is continuing and stepping up its efforts to eliminate fraudulent and improper benefit payments.
