Southwestern Public Service Company will invest more than \$552 million in new equipment and materials during the next five years, according to Berl can remember when I was young Springer, president and chief operating

> New coal-fired generating facilities to be installed during the 5-year period will increase the capability of Southwestern's system by more than a million kilowatts, bringing the total SPS generating capability to more than 4-million

Tolk Station, located 12 miles east of Muleshoe, is the site for the new generating facilities, and is currently under construction. The station will have two 543,000 kilowatt units and will be Southwestern's largest plant. The first unit, now about one-quarter complete, is scheduled to go on the line in 1982 while the second unit will be ready in 1985. This will be the second coal-fired plant for SPS. The first, Harrington Station, near Amarillo, was completed this past summer.

Coal for Harrington and Tolk Stations comes from Atlantic Richfield mines near Gillette, Wyo., and is delivered to

the plants by 110-car unit trains. In reviewing 1980, Springer said, "Our peak load reached an all-time high last summer of 2,651,000 kilowatts. We

tion of Tolk Station will more than take care of that increase."

'The cost of fuel now represents nearly 70% of our total operating expenses as compared to only 47% in 1975. The management of fuel problems continues to require a major effort in the operation of the company," Springer continued. "Supplier price increases, escalator clauses, minimum use requirements, gas pipeline capacity limitations and increasing supplier scheduling difficulties have all contributed to a rapidly increasing cost of fuel."

Springer added that Southwestern Public Service Company is continuing its efforts in the research of energy alternatives including solar and wind energy. SPS and the General Electric Company have completed a feasibility study for repowering one of South-

western's power plants with 60 megawatts of solar energy, while a site north of Amarillo has been selected for a potential wind generator.

"All of us at Southwestern Public Service Company have great confidence in the future of the Southwest in spite of the economic problems we are facing at this time. Our area continues to grow and new industries continue to show great interest. We anticipate that about 120,000 kilowatts of new industrial and commercial load will be added to our system in 1981."

"We have always planned for the future in order to meet our customers' needs. We are still planning--and we intend to see that our customers continue to have the kind of dependable electric service they have had in the past--even better," Springer concluded.

Trash pickup too expensive for Lockney

Instituting a pick-up service and ending trash burning in Lockney would be too expensive for the city to initiate, according to top local officials.

City Councilman Thurman Davis told the council at its regular monthly meeting that to provide trash pickup for Lockney's two-thousand-plus residents would cost the same as in a city of 10,000 people.

Davis outlined the expenditures that would be needed to establish trash pick-up: -salary for a bulldozer operator at

the city landfill. -\$70,000 for a truck to pick up the

trash. -Two dumpsters, per alley, per block, at a cost of \$200 for each dumpster. The number of dumpsters that might be needed hasn't been

determined. The city already owns 19 acres between the current landfill and the railroad tracks that could be used for trash disposal if a pick-up service was

At present the federal government requires cities with populations down to 5,000 people to provide trash pick-up. Davis says it's just a matter of time before the federal government lowers

the population requirement to include cities the size of Lockney.

Davis said that while the smoke and smell from the burning trash may at times be irritating to some people, there

is the more serious problem of fires. "We've had some fires caused by trash burning," Davis said, "but that's mostly because some people don't use common sense. You just don't burn trash when the wind is blowing 90-miles

Mayor Claude Brown said that to start a municipal trash pickup service at this time would require a bond issue, which would mean a tax increase, plus a monthly service charge. That, Brown said, would impose an additional hardship on people living on fixed incomes.

Brown said he agrees with Davis that it is just a matter of time before the federal government requires towns the size of Lockney to end burning and begin trash pickup, but Brown said he "hopes it's not too soon," because of the expense involved.

Brown said that in some cities where dumpsters are used and the trash is picked up, there are problems with flies and rodents and alleys are no cleaner than they are in Lockney.

Today's Lifestyles

VERSATILE VELOUR

Versatile velour knits can range from elegant to sporty, depending on the selection of pattern style. Velours make excellent jogging suits yet become the perfect evening dress for a special occasion. Although velour knits are. sometimes a bit "tricky" to sew, a few basic principles of working with knits will reduce frustration when sew-When selecting velour,

check the label for fiber content and recommended care. Ask for a care label to sew into the finished garment. When selecting a pattern, notice the suggested fabrics on the envelope and in the pattern book. Select styles that are "fuss free." with few pieces, no top stitching of fussy details. Aviod buttonholes and zippers, if possible. Since velour knits vary in degress of stretch, compare the stretch of the fabric to the stretch gauge on the pattern envelope. The fabric stretch should fit with the stretch built

into the pattern. Before sewing, preshrink the fabric by washing it as you would the final garment or have it dry cleaned. This helps "relax" the fabric and remove chemical residue which can cause skipped stitches when sewing. Also gather all the necessary equipment for making a velour knit garment. These

--long staple polyester thread or cotton covered polyester thread

Include:

-- ball point or all-purpose needle, size 11 (or 70-75) -- a roller or even-feed presser foot to assist in making pucker-free seams

-- sharp shears -- pattern weight or long.

thin, ball-point pins. Use the "with nap" directions on the instruction sheet for layout. All pattern pieces should go the same direction, either with the nap or against . When cut with the nap.

the fabric will look smooth and shiny. The surface will look darker and rougher when cut against the nap. Decide which appearance you like best, and cut all pieces going that direction. Consider using pattern weights instead of pins to hold the pattern in place. Pins often get lost in the pile. Use sharp shears to cut out pattern pieces. Transfer markings with chalk or use tailor's tacks.

Set the machine correctly for velour fabrics. Experiment with a double thickness swatch of fabric before tackling the "real thing." In general, set the machine for 10-12 stitches per inch (or per 2.5 cm). This corresponds to a number three on most machines. Slightly reduce thread tension and decrease presser foot pressure. If fabric slips when stitching after the above adjustments, use an even feed presser foot or stitch with a layer of tissue paper between feed dog and fabric. Also, be sure to pin the fabric carefully on the seam line to control the fabric at the seam when

Stitch with a straight stitch or narrow zig zag in direction of nap. To finish seams, press to one side and make a second row of straight or zig zag stitches. Trim excess allowance to prevent rolling. If using fusible interfacing, test the results on a fabric scrap. The fusing process may crush the pile, so a sew-in interfacing may work better.

Nylon or polyester zippers which are lightweight, strong and flexible are recommended for stretch velours. Before hemming a garment, let it hang for 24 hours in case stretching occurs. Then level and hem the garment stretch inch from edge and catch stitch. Velour is hard to topstitch on, but if carefully done, hems can be double



The Lockney Lady Horns dropped their last non-conference game of the season, losing 56-52 to Dimmitt at Dimmitt.


Dimmitt won the game at the foul line, going to the free throw mark 17 times while Lockney went to the foul line just seven times.






Widows, widowers due tax benefit

A taxpayer who became a widow or widower in 1978 or 1979 may be entitled to a special tax benefit. The benefit allows the taxpayer to use the "Married Filing Jointly" Tax Table or a Tax Rate Schedule in computing the tax liability, a tax rate significantly lower than those in the "Single" category.

To qualify for the benefit, the taxpayer (1) must have been entitled to file a joint return with the deceased spouse for the year of death, even if one was not actually filed: (2) must have a child or


stepchild who qualified as a dependent; and (3) must have furnished over half the cost of maintaining a home which was the principal residence for the dependent child or stepchild for the

Taxpayers who take advantage of this benefit should file Form 1040, check Block 5 under Filing Status. "Qualifying widow(er) with dependent child," and figure the tax using the "Married Filing Jointly" tax table or tax rate schedule.



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



Employers must provide each employee with a completed Wage and Tax Statement, Form W-2, for 1980 by February 2, 1981, the Internal Revenue Service says.

If the Wage and Tax Statements are not issued on time, employers may be penalizing employees who will have to wait until February or later to file their tax returns, possibly missing out on the faster refunds available to early filers.

For additional information on the proper distribution and handling of Wage and Tax Statements, employers may get a free copy of IRS Publication 15.



> Time seeding so that developing seedlings will have the best growing conditions. Warm season plants grow in the summer and will make their best and most vigorous growth if seeded in late winter or early spring. A late summer or fall seeding date for cool season plants may be best because young seedlings may not be able to tolerate hot, dry summers.

To get a newly seeded area established, protect it from grazing through at least one growing season, depending on growing conditions. During periods of harsh growing conditions, two or three years of deferment may be necessary to allow seedlings to establish.

Welch notes that weed control measures such as mowing, shredding or use of herbicides may be necessary during the first growing season to allow seeded species to become established.


