### District measuring depth

The High Plains Water District has begun its annual program of measuring the depth to water levels in more than 900 observation wells scattered throughout the fifteen county District

Floyd County irrigators may see a ue and white Water District vehicle in the vicinity of their property in the coming weeks while Dan Seale of the district staff measures the 97 wells in the district's observation network in Floyd County.

Since most of the wells to be measured are operational irrigation wells, the month of January was chosen

to begin observations in order to allow for a dormant period and well recovery from the cone of depression developed during the pumping season.

Wells will be measured to find the depth to "static" water level. After measuring, each well will receive a red

Data gained from this program is used for decline rate projections, determining the amount of water left in storage, and very importantly, as a basis for the income-tax depletion allowance claims on landowner's tax

## Officials feuding over County tax records

What began as a routine request for the abstract books from the county assessors office by the newly formed Floyd County Appraisal District has caused more furor than did the reevaluation.

The appraisal district, going on the verbal assumption that they were acting in behalf of the seven taxing entities, have been working on the appraisals assessments and preparing the tax rolls for 1981. In order to do this they say that they need access to the county abstract books.

County tax assessor, Jonelle Fawver has been reluctant to let the abstract books out of her office they say.

The county tax office and the district appraisal office are across the hall from each other in the county courthouse.

At the last regular county court meeting, January 12, the commissioners asked Fawver if she would be willing to let the appraisal district employees take the books across the hall to their offices to work on them.

Fawver said that she didn't mind if they used the books in the day time, but that they had to be back in her office at night. She said that she used the books to look up information. She was asked if the

books were currently posted. She replied that they were. Commissioners consulted with County Attorney Kenneth Bain to find out whether or not the court had authority to order the abstract books taken out of the county tax assessors office. Also where their responsibility in the matter lay.

Evidently more came up on the subject because the county commissioners met in special session Friday, January 23. This reporter had no prior knowledge of the meeting and was not in attendance.

County Judge Choise Smith said in an interview Monday that the meeting was called for one purpose only and that was to discuss who would be making the county tax roll for the 1981 taxes. There was no action taken at the meeting.

"It is just a misunderstanding between the county and the appraisal district," he said. "It is my understanding that the abstract books will stay in the county tax office and that the county will be making their own tax roll.'

He added that Jonelle Fawver would "bring the books up to date."

Judge Smith said that the appraisal district thought that they would be making the tax roll, but that to "be official they would have to come back to each of the

At 9 a.m. Tuesday, January 27, the county appraisal district board met in special session at their office in the county courthouse.

Present at that meeting were board members; Travis Jones, Adrian Helms, Tom Duvall, and Jack Lackey. Chief Appraiser, Sheila Faulkenberry was in attendance. Ben Ayres was invited to the meeting where his personal and sometimes professional opinion was sought on most of the questions discussed by the board.

This reporter was also present. Travis Jones, president, began the meeting by appraising Ayers of the situation

facing the board. He said that the county had elected to come into the appraisal district a year before it would be mandatory by the state to do so.

He said that the county "by implication or verbally had indicated that the (district) tax appraiser would also do the tax assessment for 1981 and prepare the

Jones told Ayers that a meeting had been held in which each of the taxing entities were asked to bring a quorm of membership or alternates.

"The reason for the meeting was so that the entities could "tell us what direction they wanted us to head.

"The implication of the meeting was that we would go ahead with the appraisal and preparation of the assessment," Jones said. "There was no vote taken, no

"It was a voice opinion." Duvall said. Lackey, who is a county commissioner and because of that position serves on the

appraisal board, said that at that time the commissioners said that "We'll back you Helms said that, "the board was not trying to push anyone or take any authority

from anyone. We were just trying to do what was our job...to do what the entities

### Testing planned for Lockneyschooldistrict Third, fifth, and ninth grade students school officials improve their services,'

from the Lockney Independent School District will participate in the second Texas Assessment of basic skills test program scheduled for February. The assessment plan, first of its kind

in this state, is scheduled once each year under requirements set by the Texas Legislature during its 1979 regular session.

The Lockney ISD students will be among 700,000 expected to take the reading, writing composition, and mathematics tests during the February 2-20 statewide testing period. Each of the tests will require a maximum of 40

to 60 minutes to complete. The Lockney ISD will report its district and campus aggregate scores to the public at a May or June meeting of the board of trustees, according to W.H. Hallmark, superintendent.

"However, individual student scores will be reported only to the student, parents or guardian, and the school personnel directly involved," Hallmark

"This testing program is designed to help the student and the school improve achievement," Hallmark points out. "For this reason, results will be reported in a manner that will help everyone become more effective."

"Third grade students were added to the annual testing sequence for the first time this year. The three tests will make up an annual assessment effort designed to help both state and local Hallmark says. Overall student performance, both by

campus and by district, will be reported each year to the public by the local board of trustees.

CTB/McGraw-Hill of Monterey, California will help administer the 1981 test program and develop and field test new items for the 1981-82 series under contract to the State Board of Educa tion. The California firm will also operate a computerized inventory of all test booklets to assure strict security at

"Eac test question will relate to a specific objective or skill students are expected to learn by the time they complete the particular grade," Hallmark points out.

"We use the term 'criterion-referenced' simply because it is a short way of saying the answer to each question must lead back to a specific objective," Hallmark explains.

Ninth grade students who do not make a satisfactory "exit level" score may re-take the test each year they remain in high school. However, they will not be required to take it more than once. Later attempts to improve scores and evaluate any remedial programs will be voluntary.

The annual test program will be administered by specially-trained personnel in each school district under the guidelines and supervision of the Texas

## Lockney starts program for gifted students

No, it is not a new store in Lockney but a new program at Lockney Junior

High School. "T.G.&Y." stands for talented, gifted, and young and that is just who attends special classes under the direction of LaDora Aufill who works with approximately 14 students for at least

## Insurance valuable protection

With a new government subsidy that pays up to 30 percent of the cost of carrying crop insurance, the best buy in farming today may be the few dollars an acre (tax deductible) that it costs to insure all the other dollars invested in producing a crop.

This advice comes from Ben A. Jordan, Jr., regional director of the recently expanded Federal Crop Insurance Corporation.

Jordan suggests that there are no fewer than five sound reasons farmers should consider insurance this year, even if they have never protected their crop investments in the past.

First, the new policies offer more protection. Policyholders can insure up to 75 percent of average yields, which in most cases should fully cover the investment in the insured crop plus the cost of the insurance. They can also select, from several choices, the amount they want to be paid for each bushel or pound their crop falls short of the guaranteed production.

Second, the new federal subsidy can reduce the per acre cost of carrying all-risk insurance by as much as 30 percent. The combination of the subsidy and the tax deduction allowed for insurance premiums means the aftertax cost is only a small fraction of the protection provided.

Third, rising production costs mean the dollars and cents risks of crop production this Spring will be sharply higher than a year ago. In the event of crop losses, such as many farmers experienced in 1980, the financial consequences could be disastrous. Many farmers who have felt they could afford to farm without some amount of insurance in the past are now wisely

program, which some farmers have further livestock losses. 1981 rather than participate in the disaster payment will be eligible for the 30 percent discount plus, if they do not incur a crop loss, an additional 5 percent premium discount in 1982.

Fifth, farmers who insure their crop investment will have an advantage, Jordan predicts, in competing for credit in this Spring's tight money market. The cash flow guaranteed by the policy assures a source of funds for timely loan repayment even in the event of a total crop loss. Moreover, at the option of the policyholder, FCIC policies can be pledged as loan collateral.

## Poisonous plants are abundant

(COLLEGE STATION) 1981 looks like bonus year for poisonous range

'Due to last year's dry summer followed by a wet fall, all conditions point to generally a bonus year for poison plants in Texas," says Dr. Allan McGinty of Fort Stockton, area range specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System

looked to as a solution for insurance, "Ranchers should be familiar with and be able to identify common poison who elect to carry FCIC insurance in ous plants that occur in their pastures. They should also be familiar with symptoms of poisoning in livestock,' points out McGinty.

> As soon as animals begin to show signs of poisoning, they should be moved immediately to pastures free from poisonous plants and treated by a veterinarian.

> If no pasture is available that is free from poison plants, ranchers may need to control weeds with chemical or mechanical methods. Caution should be used following chemical control methods since some poisonous plants become more palatable to grazing animals following herbicide use.

"Most problems with poisonous plants occur during winter and early spring when desirable warm-season forage plants are dormant and cool-season toxic plants are lush and green,"

explains the specialist. "During these periods, livestock will easily switch to poisonous plants to attempt to obtain a higher nutritional plane for their die and to obtain some green vegetative

"Proper supplemental feeding that meets the nutritional requirements of grazing animals and provides green plant material in the form of pelleted

alfalfa can significantly reduce poisonous plant problems during this time," contends McGinty.

In general, solid range management techniques offer the best prevention of livestock losses due to poisonous plants, he emphasizes. Use of a planned

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grazing system that allows for periodic rest of pastures during the growing season can increase the quantity and vigor of desirable forages. This enables such plants to be more competitive with less desirable poisonous plants, reducing their availability to grazing animals.

Grazing systems that concentrate a large number of livestock in a single area may have extra benefits in that the amount of poisonous plant material available to a single animal is reduced. McGinty advises ranchers to be

extremely cautious when importing cattle from other areas of the state or country to a range containing poisonous plants unfamiliar to these animals. Such animals will more easily consume toxic plants compared to animals raised in that same area.

## Conference set for Lubbock Feb. 17-1

(LUBBOCK) - Challenges facing cotton producers in the 1980s will be examined here February 17-19 during the five-state Western Cotton Production Conference.

The challenges will range from political policies and marketing opportunities to production techniques, financing and textile trends, Dr. James R. Supak, area cotton specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said. Supak is program chairman for the annual conference.

The program will draw cotton producers and industry representatives from California, Arizona, New Mexico, Texas and Oklahoma. It is co-sponsored by the Southwest Five-State Cotton Growers Assn. and the Cooperative Extension Services of Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and California. General chairman is Joe D. Unfred of New Home, president of the Plains Cotton Growers.

The conference at the Hilton Inn will open at 8:25 a.m. February 17 with an analysis of the world outlook for cotton by Dr. Arlie Bowling, senior economist with the National Cotton Council, Memphis.


