We don't see many of the larger, faster business planes here simply because their owners won't land them on our short dirt runway. They land instead at Hereford, then drive over. They buy their aviation fuel at Hereford, pay their fuel taxes at Hereford, buy most of their meals at Hereford, and have their planes' mechanical touch-ups done at Hereford.

And we don't see as many home-based planes here as we would if we had more hangars and a better runway. At least four plane owners in the county have said they would move their planes from Hereford, Hart and Plainview to Dimmitt if the runway were paved and hangar space were available.







- Dimmitt is a growing community its population has doubled in the last decade. Its airport requirements have grown, too

 the number of planes based here is TEN TIMES GREATER than a decade ago!
- 2. When Dimmitt Airport was built in 1957 by the Jaycees, three planes were initially hangared there. Today the airport is the home of 31 planes. Of these, 80 percent are business and industrial aircraft and 20 percent are pleasure craft. More planes bigger and faster planes need to use our airport now, but can't because of our short dirt runway and lack of night landing facilities.
- 3. If Friday's bond election passes and the airport is put under city ownership, it will immediately begin providing the city with income equal to the property taxes paid by 20 new families. Its income would offset the bond payments, and in the long run, the airport would be paid for by those who use it.
- There are more registered airplanes in West Texas than in any other part of this five-state region. Modern transportation has had to overcome distance.
- Modern industries and businesses demand quick, competent transportation and modern airport facilities. If Dimmitt does NOT provide these facilities, our community will have two strikes against it in trying to secure new industrial branches.
- 6. An improved, enlarged airport will be an all-weather, day-ornight safeguard to ALL OF US in times of emergency, illness or accident. Air ambulances, medical supplies, and emergency materials of all types will be hours or days closer.
- 7. Our airport site is near the city, near a major highway, and near choice industrial and business sites – making it a valuable key in the city's future growth.

- 8. Both the site of the airport and the modernization plan adhere to strict FAA requirements, including approach p aths, distance from residential areas, runway length, drainage, distance from obstructions and towers, and accessibility.
- 9. If the bond issue passes, the new Dimmitt Municipal Airport will be operated under FAA rules and regulations, and the strictest standards of safety and protection would be adhered to.
- 10. A modernized airport would provide Dimmitt with the best (and only) commercial transportation link with the rest of the nation. It will be adequate for 95 percent of today's aircraft, and will immediately connect Dimmitt with every other airport in the US.
