Lockney's final application for \$812,000 in federal Community Development Block Grant funds is headed for the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development following the completion of two public hearings.

Several dozen people turned out for the two hearings at City Hall to quiz city officials and consultant C. Clayton Yeager on the plans for the grant

The final application, which must be

submitted by May 1, is viewed by officials as largely a formality. There appears little doubt that since the city's preliminary application for the money has already been approved by HUD that the final application will also be okayed.

The \$812,000 is considered a relatively small amount by Block Grant

Although the \$812,000 will be received over the next two years, it will take three or four years for the work to

Word of the final approval is expected by August 1 and the first funds should be received within a few weeks after final approval is announced.

Once final approval is received, the city council will appoint a citizens advisory committee to oversee the Block

Grant program. The funds will be spent for improvements in the northeast part of town

Rain, hail batter Floyd County

Heavy rains, high winds and hail showed a hook formation in the thunswept through Floyd County causing derstorm activity. flash flooding and damaging some wheat and onion beds.

Lockney was apparently the hardest hit area in the county. Five inches of rain fell in Lockney with a span of several hours with one inch of rain coming down in a 20-minute period.

The heavy rainfall flooded Lockney streets and a Lockney School bus returning children home after school became stranded on a rural dirt road.

A four-wheel-drive vehicle from the Lockney Fire Department was called out to remove the children from the bus but it took over an hour to complete the rescue effort. No one was hurt, how-

Nearly 70 people on retreat at the Plains Baptist Assembly camp in Rio Blanco Canyon 11 miles south of Floydada were prevented from leaving also, for several hours Saturday when the flooding White River sent water over a bridge outside the campground.

The heavy rain was accompanied by marble-to-golf ball sized hail which damaged wheat and some onion beds, particularly in the Sandhill area.

The hail caused some damage to roofs in Floydada. The problem was compounded because many roofs still had not been repaired following a severe hail storm March 17.

Highway 70 between Lockney and Aiken was so covered by hail that one motorist described it, "like driving on

One cleaningfluid procedure is to saturate a folded white cloth or paper towel with the solution, then place it over the label or tape for a few minutes, and when the adhesive softens, rub the label with another cloth or

Water-Soluable Glue. Any label that was attached by moistening the adhesive with water requires a very simple procedure for removal: simply soak it in water, if possible. One way to soak the label without soaking the product is to saturate a sponge or several lavers of paper towels with warm water and place it over the label. This method works effectively on water-soluble glue, but if used mistakenly on pressure-sensitive adhesives, it can make them more difficult to remove.

Appliques. Appliques are decal-like products sometimes placed on the bottom of a bathtub or shower for more slip-resistant surfaces. Through use, appliques show signs of wear or discoloration, and then it's necessary to remove them. Often the applique and all its adhesive can be pulled up easily. More often, the top layer of the applique will separate, leaving a thin film of adhesive on the tub or shower surface. To remove the film, get a grip on the edge with your fingernail, or get underneath it with a sharp-edge scraper. If the adhesive tears, try another edge, working toward the center until all traces of the applique are removed. If the film is too thin to scrape or peel off, try working a generous amount of commercial prewash spot remover underneath the film to work on the adhesive. Allow the solution to soak through the adhesive for about 30 mintues, then scrape up the reside. Take special preventions with fiberglass-reinforced plastic tub and shower units. Manufacturers of these do not recommend the use of strong solvents, abrasives and other preparations which can cause serious damage to the smo-

oth protective finish. Purple Price Marks. To remove purple price marks, use a cloth or paper towel dampened in a solution of half chlorine bleach and half water. This method will remove these marks that sometimes are transferred to kitchen counter tops and other similar surfaces.



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

the construction and major modification or renovation of county jails; rules for regular inspections of county jails and reports from local government officials on the condition of each county jail; and rules of procedures and practices before the Commission," Slater said.







Pasadena, California. Official nomination forms have been mailed to more than 24,000 high school band directors throughout the U.S., Virgin Islands and





Around The County By Jett Major FLOYD COUNTY EXTENSION AGENT

The long overdue rainfall that everyone in this area has been waiting for finally arrived in most parts of the county last Friday. It did not fall quite as slow as many of us would like to have seen it fall, but what did stay in the fields will certainly give the wheat a boost and will help build up the subsoil moisture needed for planting, especially on the dryland acreage.

The Irick and Aiken communities received the heaviest rainfall with over 41/2-6 inches being reported. Lockney, Sandhill and Sterley all received 21/2-31/2 of rainfall. High winds and some hail accompanied the rainfall which fell so hard and fast that run-off was a serious problem all across the county. Many producers were well on their way to completing much of their corn planting when the heavy rains hit and washed away furrows in low areas of the field and floated seed out in other areas. Some replanting will no doubt have to be done. Some of the more mature wheat stands suffered some hail damage, but the rainfall did more good than harm to all of the wheat which was

Lower rainfall amounts were reported in the northwest and northeast corners of the county with about 1 to 2 inches falling in these areas. The southeast part of the county received no rainfall. Rainfall in the west and southwest part of the county ranged from 2 to 31/2 inches. A threat of blowing sand existed following this hard rain, but the weekend weather helped alleviate this threat by providing the area with the calmest winds it has seen in over

With the arrival of warm soil temperatures and adequate subsoil moisture, many cotton farmers will be gearing up to plant cotton as soon as the fields dry up from the last rainfall. I urge those considering planting their cotton before May to monitor weather forecasts closely and remember that Floyd County is still due one last freeze. It is up to the producer to gamble on whether or not that cold spell will come this year, but with the cost of cottonseed and fuel as high as it is today, it might be wise to gear up to go fishing instead of planting

A look into the future for cattle raisers, discouraging

(COLLEGE STATION)-Major keys for survival of the cattle business in the decade ahead will be flexibility, discipline and cost control, a nationally recognized livestock market analyst said

Taking a tough look at the cattle industry, Bill Helming of Overland Park, Kansas, said from the middle of 1982-and particularly from the early part of 1983 through 1986-the cost of production as it relates to owning and raising a cow and calf will exceed the value received.

Helming is president of Livestock Business Advisory Services, Inc., an independent market outlook, research and risk management consulting firm that serves virtually all phases of livestock production as well as many agri-business firms.

Helming was lead-off speaker for the Beef Cattle Short Course of the 1981 Texas Animal Agriculture Conference at Texas A&M University.

"Flexibility means that producers must know where they are in the cattle cycle. They should be flexible about using more forage and less grain and should think of themselves as a vital part of the food industry-a part that can adjust to consumer trends," Helm-

The agricultural economist defined discipline as "having a constant plan of one to three years, and being able to take advantage of volatility in the marketplace.' Cost-control, or equity preservation,

relates to the individual cow-calf operator figuring every way he can hold the line on costs. "Producers can seek ways to use less

energy, try to reduce capital costs and fight inflation at every turn." Helming

Beef today is neither cost nor price competitive with other sources of protein, and consumers are more restrained in their demand for beef, he

"At best, 1981 and '82 will have a flat, sluggish inflationary economy, which will see little improvement for beef," he said.

Costs of producing beef, however, will continue to accelerate sharply higher, he predicted. Helming challenged livestock produ-

cers to "become more effective risk managers - rather than risk takers-as they produce a protein source of food. In the next several years, more major industry adjustments will still be necessary, according to Helming. The price between feeder and fed cattle must narrow, and the new grading system will make adjustments necessary in that area. Grain, which will increase in price faster than beef, will hasten a change in feeding practices. Cattle will be fed grain 100 days or less in the near future,

Consumers, Helming said, are very price conscious. "About 50 percent of the beef consumed in the U.S. today is in ground beef form and is moderately

he predicted.

By 1990, from four to six beef processing firms will be processing about 90 percent of the beef produced in the U.S., Helming said.

Livestock owners need to move ahead vigorously to maintain a positive image and achieve greater cost production efficiency, the economist added.

"Those who choose not to become better managers will find the cattle business in the next 10 years to be very disappointing financially, not much fun-if any-and indeed discouraging," Helming concluded.

Little damage cause increasing greenbu population

Greenbugs are increasing rapidly in many area wheat fields. Some fields have already been damaged by these pests. In many cases wheat is making good growth and although greenbug populations are increasing they are causing little damage. Beneficial insect activity is increasing rapidly in many fields also.

Field inspection is the only way to make sure control measures are needed. The number of greenbugs present coupled with the amount of damage they are causing and the number of predators and parasites are important factors to consider at this point in the growing season. Information in the following table may serve as a guide in determining the need for treatment.

USDA to make no 1980 crop corn; sorghum deficiency payments

The U.S. Department of Agriculture will make no deficiency payments on the 1980 crops of corn and sorghum, according to Edward Hews, acting administrator of USDA's Agricultural

Stabilization and Conservation Service. Under current legislation, deficiency payments are made to producers when the average market price received by farmers during the first five months of the marketing year October through February is less than the established

The national weighted average price received by farmers during the October 1980 through February 1981 period was \$3.11 per bushel for corn and \$3.04 per bushel for sorghum. Since these prices are above the 1980 target price of \$2.35 per bushel for corn and \$2.50 per bushel for sorghum, no deficiency payments are required, Hews said.
