Why starve libraries?

Why should Texans be starving their public libra-

This question is being asked by Books for Texans, an organization formed by Texas Library Association, Friends of Texas Libraries, Texans for Libraries, and the Trustees Roundtable of the Texas Library Association.

Leaders in Books for Texans are convinced that Texans will do something about the starvation diet for their libraries when they know the facts and reflect on just how important libraries are to citizens of Texas.

Texas now ranks 39th in the U.S. in state library support with 16 cents per capita. Largest per capita state aid is paid by West Virginia at \$3.61, followed by Georgia at \$2.47. Even states poorer than Texas pay significantly more in aid to their libraries. Alabama's state aid is 42 cents per capita; Arkansas 63 cents and Mississippi 53 cents.


As long ago as 1978, the Texas Conference of Libraries and Information convened in Austin to study library problems, recommended state support of \$1.00 per capita and urged the Texas Library and Archives Commission and the Texas Library Association to go to work to seek \$1.00 per capita funding "at the earliest possible date."

Wendell Mayes, Jr., Austin, and Wayne C. Sellers, Palestine, chairman and secretary of Books for Texans, have noted that an appropriation of \$1.00 per capita which can do so much for libraries is minuscule when compared to the total state

We can think of no appropriation which can do so much for so little," they said, pointing out that in 1979 Texas public libraries circulated 43 million items to the public, answered 71/2 million reference questions, hosted 3 million persons at



Less time in the feedlot for leaner beef and lower costs is the outlook for the future according to a number of cattle experts. Haste could be the cause of many accidents and broken equipment

Life is so full of things to do, that often just getting essentials done is all we can manage. The extra chores around the farm -- grading the road or building waterways -- require an extra push to fit into a work schedule.

But, careless haste in using a tractor blade can lead to accidents or broken equipment, according to Howard Hadler, Division Engineer with Kewanee Machinery Division.

"Patience is definitely a virtue when operating this piece of equipment," Hadler states. "Tractor blades are designed to push or pull things -- not hit them. Often, farmers hurry and attempt to move a big load all at once rather than taking two or three passes to push smaller loads."

Obstacles hidden under a pile of dirt or manure can also cause problems for the tractor blade operator.

"The farmer knows the obstruction is there. He sees it all the time," Hadler said. "But he may forget about it if it's covered for a few weeks. Or, he may misjudge its location."

Sudden jolts from hitting objects could unseat the tractor operator. Consequently, Hadler cautions farmers to always use seat belts.

"If you don't have them on your tractor, get them," he states. "Also use the blade so you can maintain a firm, level footing for the tractor. Stay away from ditches. If you have an offset capability, adjust it so you're working to the side. Or, turn the blade so you're pushing instead of pulling the load."

Tractor blades are low maintenance pieces of equipment, according to Hadler, but should be checked out

frequently for cracks or broken welds. 'While it doesn't happen often, a blade may be cracked or a weld start to break as a result of some jolt during operation. Checking for and repairing these small cracks will avoid a major failure during

a busy work season," Hadler said. "Farmers should also avoid trying to do more than the blade is capable of doing. It is possible to take on a load so big as to damage the tractor," Hadler says. "so, don't force it."

Most tractor blades are purchased for one specific purpose such as road grading, but Hadler suggests farmers also take time to consider the other uses the blade may have. He outlines factors buyers may want to consider.

Match blade size to tractor size. Too it's difficult to sense from the tractor the

amount of force being put on the blade. Too large a blade is a waste of money since it can't be used fully and is unwieldy for the tractor.

Where will the blade be used? If it will be used to clear feedlots or buildings or for grading or leveling around farm buildings, the farmer should know the width of gates or doors through which he will want to move the

How will the blade be used? For light farm construction such as building waterways or ditching, he may want to select a blade that will tilt so it can be offset and used at an angle.

"Sure you may want to get a blade today to clear a feedlot, but the smart farmer will get the most from his money small a blade could get torn up because by thinking of other tasks for which the blade can be used." Hadler says.

Quality soybean seed short this year

COLLEGE STATION — Unfavorable weather conditions during the 1980 harvest period adversely affected the quality of soybean seed.

"The weather caused a shortage in high quality seed. However, producers should be able to increase stands in 1981 by using a seed protectant fungicide." says Dr. Walter Walla, plant pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Walla recommends using a seed protectant fungicide with planting seed with a germination below 80 percent. Since such a fungicide is harmful to nodulating bacteria, plant seed in fields where soybeans were grown previously. Soybean seed protectant fungicides include captan, captan plus PCNB, chloroneb, thiadiazole plus PCNB, and carboxin plus thiram.

Walla explains that several factors are involved in determining seed quality. These are seed size, percent germination and seedling vigor.

'The producer is primarily concerned with percent germination, which is reported on the seed bag tag," notes Walla. "Germination is affected by mechanical injury, physiological factors and disease-causing organisms."

Mechanical injury, Walla says, will either cause seed not to germinate or will result in weakened or deformed seedlings. Such injury can occur when soybeans are harvested with less than 10 percent moisture or when unloading the crop from a height that can cause seed to crack.

Physiological factors such as rapid drying or high heat will injure the seed embryo and have the same effect as mechanical injury

Disease-causing organisms, mainly fungi, are carried inside and outside planting seed and cause seedling problems, notes Walla. Diseases can reduce both yield and quality during the growing season, so seed from infected fields should not be planted, he

DEL RIO — Many critical problems facing ranch owners, ranch managers and working cowboys of arid regions of North America will be discussed and analyzed during the International Rancher's Roundup (IRR) at the Del Rio Convention Center August 10-14.

Organized by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Rancher's Roundup is designed to give participants ideas for making individual ranching decisions much easier and more profitable. It will also provide an opportunity for ideal exchanges among ranchers of similar areas beset with common problems.

Heading the week-long meeting will be some of the ranching industry's best known speakers from arid lands of the southwestern U.S., Mexico and several other countries. These authorities will present the latest and most practical and timely information available.

International agricultural trade, Mexican-American agricultural interdependence, market development and plans for market expansion will all be studied.

Plans are being finalized through U.S. Cong. Tom Loeffler's office to have a Chinese trade delegation participate in the conference, a move to strengthen U.S.-Chinese agricultural trade relations. The Chinese ranching industry will be a major topic of discussion along with a demonstration of veterinary

A large contingency of key Mexican ranchers is also expected to attend. The program will include concurrent

quarter horses, beef cattle, sheep and goats, range and wildlife. Ranch business management will also be ad-

A sub-surface mineral management and mineral lease agreement session will be conducted by experts in these fields. The increasing incentives and need for domestic energy production and its value to landowners makes this session especially important.

A general theme, "Nutrition: The Key of Production to Profit," has been incorporated into the livestock, range and wildlife sessions. Land managers will learn key factors involved in integrating the production of quality range lands, their harvest of quality animals and progressive product mar-

Government owned grain threatens area producers

(LUBBOCK) — If the United States Government shipped two and a half million head of fat cattle into the High Plains, paying all freight and other shipping costs, interest, holding and maintenance charges and then sold them in competition with local feeders -High Plains cattle feeders would be

High Plains grain farmers claim they are experiencing just that kind of competition with Commodity Creditowned corn which the U.S. Government shipped into West Texas, paying interest and storage, and has sold at discounted prices in competition with locally-grown grain. Area grain farmers, led by Grain Sorghum Producers Association (GSPA), have requested U.S.D.A. and area congressmen to help develop plans for disposing of the corn outside of the High Plains area.

Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) shipped 52 million bushels of corn into West Texas storage facilities last fall and winter. Most of the corn came from Minnesota, Illinois, Indiana, and other northern corn belt states. Much of it was corn which had been sold to Russia prior to the embargo and was purchased by CCC from the grain export companies. The government paid transportation, relocation and storage costs to relocate the grain in Texas. CCC has already sold nearly one million bushels

to local buyers. So far, the corn sold was grain that arrived in West Texas as 'sample grade." It was sold at a substantial price discount because it was considered "not storable."

GSPA contends that the very presence of the corn has lowered the cash market in the High Plains by 60 cents per hundred pounds since December These figures are documented by comparing the price of cash corn in Chicago to that in the High Plains each month since the corn shipments began.

National Grain Sorghum Producers Association, Texas Corn Growers Association, and other concerned producers have protested the CCC sales. In April, Congressman Jack Hightower (D-TX) called a meeting of the High Plains congressional delegation and U.S.D.A. administrators to review the situation. Following that meeting, U.S.D.A. officials assured GSPA that "everything possible" would be done to relieve the pressure upon HighPlains grain prices.

U.S.D.A. has pledged that no further sales will be made until after May 15. In the meantime, they are studying the possibility of offering the corn to Mexico or other export countries. No decision has been made and the threat of further disturbance in the High Plains grain prices will exist until the grain is shipped to export markets.

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Knutson notes that under the Block proposals, the farmer-held reserve and the related price support loan program would become the only tools for price and income protection for cotton and grain producers.

"It is doubtful that the farmer-held reserve can provide either an economically or politically acceptable level of price and income protection for agriculture." emphasizes Knutson. "The chances of the reserve not providing adequate price and income protection is enhanced by proposed limitations on the size of the reserve.

"The bottom line is an increased chance that the Congress and the President will be unable to get together on an acceptable farm policy package in 1981," says Knutson. "This being the case, the Congress and the Administration would find it necessary to simply extend the 1977 farm act for another year. Then the farm policy debate would start over again in 1982.
