The couple says that Floyd County is the best place to live in the world. "I like the country and I have the finest friends and neighbors I could ever hope

Floyd County has changed some since the Roses married. Lockney had only plank buildings and plank sidewalks. There weren't any roads to their farm. They just drove across the fields.

C.H. and Mary Ida have vivid memories of very active and full lives in the area around Lockney.

"Our family, friends, and our church, those are the things that matter," says At the ages of almost 93 and 91 years

they are still active members of the First United Methodist Church. They are the parents of Delbur C. Rose of Plainview and Mrs. C.L. Record

# Clark publishes Sports Firsts

The book of "Sports Firsts" written by Lockney Beacon editor Patrick Clark was released today in New York City.

The hard-cover book, published by Facts on File Inc., will be available in area book stores in the next few weeks. It will retail for \$14.95.

The 288-page book covers hundreds of firsts in sports history ranging from the first Major League baseball game to the origins of the Frisbee.

"I thought I was a pretty knowledgable sports fan until I started working on this book," Clark said. "I was amazed at some of the things I learned.

"For instance, I was really surprised to find out that Abnder Doubleday wasn't the founder of baseball, that the real founder was a little-known man named Alexander Cartwright," Clark

"I was surprised to learn, too, that Jackie Robinson wasn't the first Black to play Major League baseball. There were Blacks playing Major League baseball before the turn of the century; but they were squeezed out," Clark

From first word to last, Clark said, it took nearly two years to write the book.

"In the beginning, it was pretty easy to write," Clark said, "But after I had covered the half-dozen or so so-called major sports like baseball, football, hockey and so on, it got a lot more difficult. I was fortunate to discover a museum in Southern California that serves as kind of a hall of fame for the

more minor sports such as swimming, wrestling and volleyball. It has one of


the largest sports libraries in the country and I spent a lot of hours there going over their books and records."

The book is Clark's first solo effort. He was contributing editor on a book about Presidents Nixon and Ford published last year by Facts on File and Harcourt, Brace and Jovanovich of New



"We're coming along real good," Mayor J.D. Copeland said as the first week of the bounty program came to an

"The response has been good so far," Copeland said, "and we're pleased with the results."

Copeland said, however, there has been no change made in the rules of the bounty program.

Copeland said that from now on the bounty will be paid only on full-grown dogs and cats.

Copeland said that during the first week of the program some eager opportunists had shown up with some un-weaned baby kittens and asked for

That, Mayor Copeland said, is not the idea behind the bounty program. Nearly all the strays brought in so far have been brought in by enterprising youngsters trying to make a few dollars,

according to city secretary Erma Lee Duckworth. Under the program, stray dogs and cats can be taken to the city pens at veterinarian Paul Glasson's. The person bringing in the stray is then given a

receipt which can be taken to city hall for payment of the bounty. The bounty program was adopted after a similar program in Abernathy proved very successful in remedying that town's problems with stray anim-

Mayor Copeland said the Lockney bounty program will continue indefinitely for the time being.

# **Social Security News**

The records of 25,000 SSI disability recipients, who were converted from State welfare disability rolls, are being reviewed to see if they continue to meet the criteria for disability.

In addition, an increasing number of social security disability beneficiaries are also having their records reviewed. The purpose of the review - or

continuing disability investigation - is to improve program management. Previously, disabled SSI recipients who were on State welfare rolls prior to January 1974, when the SSI program went into effect, had been excluded


Continuing Disability Investigation involves a review of pertinent records to determine whether a recipient has recovered sufficiently so that he or she should no longer be considered disabled.

Priority is being given to SSI recipients since there is reason to believe that some of them no longer meet the medical criteria for disability or blindness. In the case of converted SSI recipients, the State's disability criteria at the time they were found to be disabled continue to apply.

Ordinarily, a Continuing Disability Investigation is conducted whenever earnings are posted to a person's social security record, when he or she reports medical improvement or returns to work, when a medical reexamination is scheduled, or when new evidence indicates that the person is no longer disabled.

Any person who disagrees with the determination has the right of appeal. In fact, the forms sent out by social security advise people what to do if they do not agree with a decision. An appeal can be filed at any local social



We are moving forward full speed with a plan to relieve the problem of over-crowding in the Texas prison

Through a new conditional parole program utilizing existing halfway houses and a temporary tent encampment within the perimeter of prison security areas, we will be able to get 3,000 inmates who now sleep on Department of Corrections floors into more-comfortable

Our plan is responsive to the order of Federal District Judge William Wayne Justice to eliminate triplecelling of inmates by August.

Attorney General Mark White is seeking a stay of Judge Justice's far-reaching decision with regard to the Texas prison system, many aspects of which we strongly disagree with. We do agree, however, that over-crowd-

ing must be eliminated promptly.

Hopefully, 750 inmates will be paroled to halfway houses by June 1 and another 750 before July 1. Meanwhile, I have recommended \$16 million be appropriated for intensively-supervised halfway houses during the next biennium.

Board of Pardons and Paroles contracts with halfway houses and individual parolee contracts will be drawn tightly to insure protection of law-abiding citizens, restitution to victims of crimes and minimum cost to tax-

A supplemental grant of \$1.25 million from the Governor's Office of General Counsel and Criminal Justice to the Board of Pardons and Paroles permits immediate placement of conditional parolees in halfway houses. Inmates will receive the highest degree of supervision to assure protection of the public. Initial conditional parolees have been identified and are being processed to halfway houses with advice of local judges, prosecutors and sheriffs.

Meanwhile, we are obtaining military tents from the Texas National Guard to house another 1500 low risk inmates temporarily within prison unit security areas. July 1 is our goal for this relocation. The tents, which have been used by our loyal servicemen in the field, will certainly be a preferred alternative to triple-celling of inmates during a brief, five-months period.

The Legislature already has approved my emergency request for a \$35 million appropriation to construct additional permanent housing for inmates. When this construction is completed November 1, inmates who have spent the summer and early fall in the tent encampments will be transferred to the new quarters.

Texas Department of Corrections is studying possible purchase of the Harris County Rehabilitation Center or building new facilities on state land to expand work furlough programs under my \$18 million appropriations request. We have also increased funding for adult probation programs.

The TDC construction program for the 1982-83 biennium will provide 10,800 additional permanent bed spaces by August 31, 1983. I am encouraged, based on my meeting with U.S.

Attorney General William French Smith, that the Reagan Administration is re-examining its position in the lawsuit involving the Texas prison system. I am increasingly hopeful of a stay on appeal of the Ruiz v. Estelle suit. We are, indeed, in a crisis situation, however-one

which could cost the state billions of dollars.

I am confident the programs I have set out will eliminate the problem of inmates sleeping on floors by July 1, without need for wholesale release to homes via an inadequately-supervised work furlough arrangement.

All of this has been undertaken in good faith and with integrity to alleviate the situation in our prisons. I believe that Judge Justice will be pleased with our



In a Buy-and-Sell Agreement involving life insurance purchased on the lives of partners or stockholders to fund an agreement to purchase that portion of the business, are the proceeds taxable as included in the insured's estate?

If proceeds of the agreement policy are not payable to the insured's estate, and the insured has no incidents of ownership in the policies or his life, the proceeds are not includable in the gross estate and, therefore, not taxable. The value of his partnership interest or the corporate stock which he holds is includable in his estate, however, and is subject to Federal estate taxes. Incidents of ownership would be precluded by a provision in the agreement prohibiting the insured from surrendering or borrowing on the policy or changing the beneficiary.



#### GSPA-TGSPB moves office to Abernathy

The offices of Grain Sorghum Producers Association (GSPA) and Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board (TGSPB) will be relocated in Abernathy, on June 1. Announcement of the move was made this week by Elbert Harp who is Executive Diretor of both organiza-

Grain Sorghum Producers Association, founded in 1955, is the only national organization of sorghum producers. It has approximately three thousand members with state organizations in Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Texas. Its president is Mabry Foreman, a farmer and rancher who lives in Felt, Oklahoma.

GSPA is dedicated to its original goal to strengthen the economy of grain sorghum production through research, market development and legislation. Since its inception, GSPA has been the voice of the grain sorghum industry where legislative representation is

Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board was established by a referendum of grain sorghum producers in 1969. It represents a 29-county area of the Texas High Plains. It is supported by a voluntary assessment of 5 cents per ton collected by the elevator. Checkoff

programs are in effect on other commodities in most agricultural states. A mandatory assessment supports the Kansas Sorghum Commission.

Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board supports research to improve sorghum quality and to prove its value as a feed grain. The main thrust of TGSPB's effort has been directed to development and expansion of markets for grain sorghum. Through U.S. Feed Grains Council, TGSPB has introduced sorghum to worldwide markets which now consume 40 percent of the U.S. sor-

TGSPB funds may not be used for legislative representation. It operates under the Texas Commodity Referendum Law, supervised by the Texas Secretary of Agriculture. Its financial records are audited by state auditors. Larry Witten of Olton is Chairman of the TGSPB farmer-elected Board of Direc-

The new GSPA-TGSPB office is located in Abernathy (sixteen miles north of Lubbock), just off the new Interstate Highway 27. The mailing address if Box R. Abernathy, Texas 79311 and the telephone number is (806) 298-2543.

"By moving our offices to the new

location in Abernathy," Harp said, "we will be able to reduce our operating expenses and concentrate the funds of both organizations where they will most effectively serve sorghum farmers."

### **Cotton dust** research under way

Solons hear NCC president: National Cotton Council President Frank M. Mitchener recently told the South Carolina General Assembly the cotton industry is making an all-out drive to solve the cotton dust problem.

Landscape & Gardening BY KEN LANGLEY



Good watering practices usually mean a good harvest.

HOW TO TELL WHEN TO WATER -A REAL MYSTERY

It's safe to say that successful gardening in this area generally depends upon a good source of water. Although gardens can be grown "dry land," your chance of success with vegetable gardening is greatly increased if a water faucet is nearby.

To many of us one of the most enjoyable aspects of home gardening is watering. It can be quite enjoyable to see garden vegetables respond to a "drink" during the heat of mid-sum mer. Despite the fact that watering can be a great deal of fun, it is often associated with many problems. Many of the things which can plague us each year, such as bitter fruit, sunscald, disease problems, poor fertility, poor quality, poor yields and a dozen other things, can be related to poor and improper watering.

Many of us enjoy watering our garden after a hard day's work or just as a form of relaxation. So it is not at all unusual that many gardens get watered two, three or more time a week. Unfortunately, in most cases this is one of the worst things you can do since it can result in poor root development.

Light, frequent waterings have a tendency to cause a concentration of roots in the top inch or two of the soil. This type of "limited" root system does not pose any real serious problem early in the season when plants are young and sufficient moisture is generally available. However, as the season progresses and moisture becomes less and less available, you may be forced to water the garden several times a week just to keep plants from wilting severely. This practice results in insufficient nutrient uptake, poor growth and disease problems.

Water the garden not by looking at plants but rather by examining your soi. Look at the soil surface. If it appears dry, then scratch to a depth of 1 to 2 inches to determine if moisture is present. If soil is relatively dry beneath

the surface, then watering is necessary. If sufficient moisture is available, wait a couple of days before applying additional water. Another point to consider is your garden soil. Obviously a sandy soil that drains well will require more frequent watering than a heavy soil which holds water.

How much water to apply is another mystery that confronts us. The amount of water to apply must be determined for each and every garden in the county. Apply enough water until you feel your garden is well watered. Then, take a sharpshooter or shovel and dig down and see if the soil is wet to a depth of at least 6 inches. If the soil is wet at that depth, you've watered enough. If it's relatively dry, then water some more. After doing this a couple of times, experience will tell you when you have watered enough

How you water the garden is important, but adequate watering at the right time and in the right amount is more important than the method used. Most gardeners prefer the furrow or flood system as a means of applying water. Others prefer to use a sprinkler.

There are advantages and disadvantages to each method. The primary advantage of flood or furrow watering is that individual rows can be watered while this is not generally possible with a sprinkler. The main advantage with a sprinkler is that large areas of your garden can be watered without moving the hose from row to row or from area to area. One disadvantage of the sprinkler system is that wet foliage can lead to disease problems. If you prefer to use a sprinkler, then water in the morning to allow foliage to dry off before cooler evening temperatures set in.

Another method gaining in popularity is drip or trickle irrigation. This system is an effective and efficient means of watering your vegetable plants but it's initial cost is high.

Proper use of water in the garden will be reflected in the amount of produce that you take from the garden to the
