Energas officials said the decision to file for new rates was made after a study by an independent consulting firm revealed that revenues from the West Texas City Plant System in 1980 were \$22,4 million less than the cost of service. The new rates are expected to increase Energas revenues about \$18.5 million, they said.

"It has been three years since the last rate increase was requested in West Texas City Plant System rates," Charles Vaughan, Energas president, said. "During that time, the consumer price index has increased about 40 percent and our costs for material, labor and taxes have increased proportionally. These increases coupled with certain inadequacies in our purchased gas adjustment clause have produced a serious deficiency in earnings from the

Vaughan said that, while the new rates cannot change the imbalance between revenues and costs that occurred in recent years, they can restore the

balance somewhat for the future. "To provide the service our customers expect, Energas must be able to make commitments for gas supplies well into the future. To do that, the company obviously must have revenues that approximate its present costs," he

To the West Texas system customers affected by the change, the new rates will mean an average increase of about 18.5 percent. For an average residential customer on the system, using 107 thousand cubic feet per year, the typical monthly bill would increase \$5.61, from \$30.32 to \$35.93.

After receiving notification of the rate change, the governing bodies of the 63 cities and towns on the system may take no action at all, in which case the rate change becomes effective September 4,

If the cities decide to act on the request, they are required by law to study the filing made by the Company and set rates accordingly. However, when the 1978 change was proposed. the cities formed a committee to study the request and to recommend what action be taken. Energas officials said it is possible that a similar procedure may be followed on the current rate request.



Your fruit tree normally will begin to bear fruit soon after it has become old enough to be som freely. Nevertheless. the health of your tree and its environment, its fruiting habits, and the cultural practices you use, can influence its ability to produce fruit. Adequate controlled through application of spray pollination is also essential to fruit

If just one of these conditions is unfavorable, yields may be reduced. Perhaps the tree will not bear fruit at all. As a grower, you can exercise some control over most of the factors contributing to fruit production.

Bearing Age

When you purchase nursery-grown fruit trees, their tops will probably be from 1 to 2 years old. The length of time from planting to fruit bearing varies with the type of fruit. Trees that grow at a moderate rate generally bear fruit sooner than those that grow either too quickly or too slowly.



MEDITERRANEAN FRUIT FLY The Mediterranean fruit fly situation in California currently is receiving a great deal of national attention. Concern over the Medfly is being brought about because of its potential impact on American agriculture. This Entomology Note is being issued to bring audieces of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service up-to-date on the Mediterranean fruit fly situation, as it applies to Texas.

Quarantine The Texas Department of Agriculture on March 1 and July 15, 1981, promulgated a quarantine on certain fruit, soil and products from California moving into Texas which may be infested with the Mediterranean fruit fly. The latest quarantine was imposed after an extensive outbreak of the Medfly occurred in California and the apparent spread of the pest within that state, even with a federal quarantine in force. In both instances, a judge has ruled that Texas could not impose a quarantine, because federal law preempts state law. The federal quarantine for the Medfly in the California covers Santa Clara, Alameda and San Mateo counties. Texas imposed a quarantine because it was concerned that the USDA quarantine action in California and the California eradication program was not adequate to protect agri-

culture outside California. The Texas Department of Agriculture in cooperation with the USDA is conducting a trapping program for the Mediterranean fruit fly at major points of entry into Texas along interstate highways. This includes: major airports and points along the Texas Gulf Coast and the Texas-Mexico border. Currently, there are about 2,000 "Medfly" traps in place.

Host Plants

The Mediterranean fruit fly, Ceratitis capitata (Wied.), is an important pest because of a wide host range and the difficulty of controlling it once it enters a host. There are at least 250. and possibly, as many as 400 reported hosts. Some of the plants in Texas which could serve as hosts to Medfly include all types of citrus, pears, per-

simmons, peaches, plums, avocado, sweet bell peppers, watermelon, cantaloupes, cucumbers, squash, pumpkin, egg plant, tomatoes, beans, and prickley pear. The Texas quarantine included: almond, apple, apricot, avocado, calamondin orange, cherries, citrus citron, date, fig. grape, grapefruit, guava, Japanese persimmon, kumquat, lemon, lime, loquat, mandirin orange, mock orange, mountain apple, natal plum, nectarine, olive, opuntia cactus, peach, pear, pepper, pineapple guava, pummelo, pomiform guajava, plum prune, quince, rose apple, sour apple, spanish cherry, strawberry guava, surinam cherry, sweet orange, tomato, white sapote, and yellow oleander.

The Mediterranean fruit fly is a recorded resident of Hawaii, Central and South America, most of AFrica, Western Europe, and Australia. It has been in the United States eight times since 1929, and where following control measures each time was eradicated. One of the eradicated infestations was in 1966 at Brownsville, Texas.

Life Cycle

Mediterranean fruit fly eggs are laid just below the surface of host fruit skin, where from one to ten eggs are placed through each puncture. Each female can lay up to 40 eggs per day and may lay as many as 1000 eggs during her lifetime. Other fruit flies or Mediterranean flies may also oviposit at the same location.

Eggs are approximately 1 mm long, smooth, shiny white, round, and tapered toward each end. After hatch, larvae are about 1 mm long and prior to pupation, resemble a tube with one end tapered and the other blunt. Pupae are tan to dark brown, cylindrical, about 4 mm long and resemble a swollen grain of wheat. Adults are yellow, have distinctive wing markings, and are about two-thirds the size of the average house fly. The most distinctive charac-

Ranching roundup in Del Rio

Century III Leaders to award *200,000-plus in scholarships

More than 200 college scholarships, ranging from \$500 to \$10,000 each, will be awarded this fall to high school seniors across the United States in the Century

Applications, which must be filed by October 16, 1981, are available through local school principal's offices. The scholarship awards will total more than \$200,000.

Sponsored by the National Association of Secondary School Principals, which represents more than 35,000 secondary school administrators, the Century III Leaders program seeks to stimulate creative thinking among those young people who will be solving the problems of tomorrow.

The scholarship selection process begins at the local high school level. There, students are judged on their leadership abilities, community involvement and awareness of current events.

Advancing to the state level, each school winner then prepares a brief projection which outlines not only a particular need or challenge America is likely to face in its third Century but also how that problem should be solved. In each state (plus the District of Columbia) two

finalists are awarded \$1,500 scholarships and two alternates are given \$500 scholar-

These 102 finalists receive all-expense-paid trips to Colonial Williamsburg, Virginia, to attend the national Century III Leaders conference. During this conference, one student is selected for the top award of a \$10,000 scholarship while nine others get \$500 each, in addition to the \$1,500 won at the state level

All state finalists and alternates become members of the Century III Leaders Alumni Program. In addition to receiving a newsletter, alumni may apply for grants of up to \$5,000 (beginning in their senior year of college) for post-graduate study or to support research in a public service agency. As many as six grants are awarded each year.

Funding for the Century III Leaders program is provided by Shell Oil Company, which has supported the program since 1976 when it was called "Bicentennial Seniors." The Century III Leaders program is an outgrowth of that project.







One of the strengths of the social security system has been its ability to change over the years to meet society's changing needs. When the Social Security Act became law in 1935, the country was in the midst of a depression. The population of the United States was 125 million, about 100 million less than it is today. Out of a labor force of 53 million people, almost 11 million were unemployed.

The very magnitude of the problem precluded any of the remedies that private charitable organizations had been providing until that time. Some kind of income replacement on a massive scale clearly was needed.

It was against this background, and with the recognition that individuals are subject to economic conditions over which they have no control and for which they cannot adequately prepare. that the Federal Government began

taking an increasingly active role. The Social Security Act from the very beginning was intended as a piece of legislation that would evolve with the times. President Roosevelt referred to it as the "cornerstone in a structure which is being built but is by no means complete." So it should not be surpris-

Production of beef with less trimmable fat, while maintaining desirable eating quality, is one of the main thrusts of the cattlemen. Quality, they believe, includes tenderness, juiciness and flavor. The NCA maintains that their proposal would discourage overfeeding in an attempt to get more cattle into the choice grade and would encourage production of beef with a higher lean-to-fat ratio.
