## Nursing Home Costs

Everyone talks about the high cost of health care these days. Let's take a look at the "high cost" of nursing homes.

Consider that a motel room now averages about \$35 to \$40 per day. What do you get for this price? A lovely room with two beds usually. If you stay there for more than one night, they will clean your room daily. For an extra charge, you can get your meals brought to you. (If that particular place provides that service.) You might even get some entertainment if you can pay for it!

In Floyd County you can get a private room in a nursing home for about \$30 per day. What do you get for this cost? Well, you get a room that is not quite as nice as the local motel. You have your room cleaned by the housekeeping staff each day. And, if you happen to make a mess during the day that needs to be cleaned up, they will even come back to your room at no extra cost!

Nursing Assistants are on duty 24 hours a day to help you with your dressing and bathing, if you need that service. You also have a licensed nurse on duty at least 16 hours per day.

A registered dietician is on staff to be sure that your meals are always nutritious. They also prepare well balanced menus. They even will help you with that special diet that the doctor has been trying to get you to stay on! In the kitchen is also a Certified Food Service Supervisor that has gone to school to be certified by the State of Texas.

Entertainment? Well, they have hired a person that does just that! Activity Directors are there to do primarily nothing more than just keep you some type of entertainment going on all day long. (Sometimes even in the evening hours!)

Also each nursing home will have a whole army of consultants that are required by the State of Texas, to visit at certain intervals. They have Registered Nurse Consultants, Consultants for the Activity Director, Consultants for the Dietary Department, and even a Registered Pharmacist to check the administration of all medications.

They will even have a person that is State Approved to make sure that all staff are properly trained.

Oh, something that I nearly forgot, they will even do your laundry for no extra charge. They pick up and return it to your room and properly put it away. (While you are probably at the Activities.)

If you happen to be one of those lucky folks that can get state approval, you will get all of your non-prescription medications paid for by the nursing home!

Feel bad this morning? Don't worry about it, just tell the Nurses and they will bring your breakfast to you in bed! You don't even have to get up to answer the door when they get there. And just think about it — they call nursing homes "high priced."

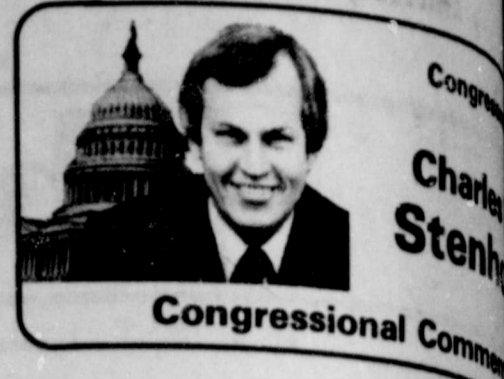
The widow, Marina Oswald Porter, used to staunchly insist that the body was, of course, her deceased husband's and, for a long time, refused to go along with exhumation requests. Now she says she is not so sure, and the body ought to be disinterred in order to put an end to the speculation.

If there were some kind of guarantee that the controversy surrounding the deaths of the President and his alleged assassin might be resolved then it might be worthwhile to have a look in the grave. But the truth of the matter is that nothing will be resolved.

Suppose the body they were to dig up was the same man we saw Jack Ruby shoot. That would still not put down those who insist that the man who went to Russia and latter returned was in fact Oswald. Without supporting the position, I would remind you that one of the theories is that Oswald went to Russia and was replaced by a Russian agent look-alike. Divergent themes off this theory place the time of the replacement both before and after his marriage, the latter making more sense.

Those people fond of conspiracy hunting will not be deterred by anything found in a grave, they will simply invent new theories. If Oswald is really buried in that grave, this will not stop the theories. If he is not there, we will be no closer to a solution to the assassination than we are now.

To everything there is a season, and the season for this whole episode, especially as a piece of "news," is long since past.

**IMMIGRATION** — Some heated battles are expected during hearings on the White House's comprehensive immigration and refugee policy during hearings expected in Congress in late September. Most controversial provisions deal with granting amnesty to illegal aliens already in the country, as well as plans to set up an experimental "guest worker" program; create penalties for employers who knowingly hire illegal aliens; and enforce existing statutes more strictly.

Because Texas shares such a large border with Mexico, these proposals will be of special interest to the state and its economy, especially those aimed at stemming the flow of nearly 500,000 undocumented aliens per year into the country.

**CLEAR AIR ACT** — The Act comes up for renewal September 30, but could be extended in its present form until an agreement on proposed changes can be reached. The White House is seeking to ease the standards, especially those controlling emissions from cars and coal-fired plants.

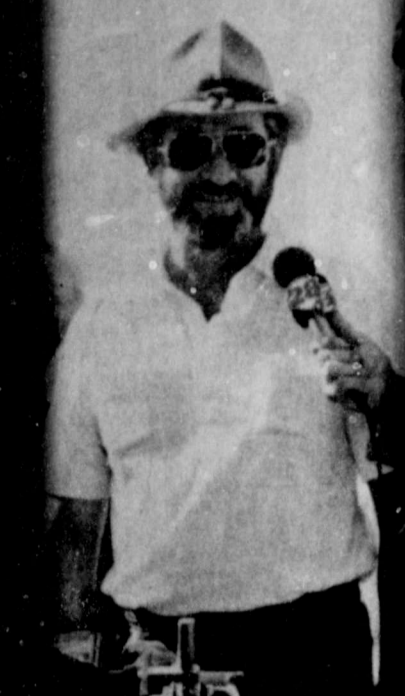

**WASHINGTON, D.C.** — With primary attention directed toward the economic recovery program, which will be continuing, other major issues to be addressed by Congress this year have been overlooked to some degree.

**IMMIGRATION** — Some heated battles are expected during hearings on the White House's comprehensive immigration and refugee policy during hearings expected in Congress in late September. Most controversial provisions deal with granting amnesty to illegal aliens already in the country, as well as plans to set up an experimental "guest worker" program; create penalties for employers who knowingly hire illegal aliens; and enforce existing statutes more strictly.

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**CLEAR AIR ACT** — The Act comes up for renewal September 30, but could be extended in its present form until an agreement on proposed changes can be reached. The White House is seeking to ease the standards, especially those controlling emissions from cars and coal-fired plants.

**CRIMINAL JUSTICE** — Both the House and Senate are considering legislation at reducing crime and improving the criminal justice system. The House will consider that would reauthorize funding for state and local enforcement agencies and their fight against crime. I expect this bill to come out of the House floor by the end of September.

The Administration has been considering strengthening existing legislation, but has yet to announce specific plans to Congress.

**AWACS SALE** — A negative vote by the House or the Senate on the proposed sale of Airborne Warning and Control Systems (AWACS) strategic planes to Saudi Arabia. President feels the sale will help slow Soviet troops in the Middle East, while members feel the sale will endanger Israel's national security.

**MX MISSILE** — In discussions point to the White House proposing a scaled-down version of the MX missile, about 100 missiles in two counties in Nevada. The had been some discussions considering portions of Texas and New Mexico sites, but plans for a secondary site have been dropped.

## Deer season promises better quality this year

The upcoming deer season promises to be everything that last year's wasn't.

Good forage and better than normal weather conditions should result in better quality deer than a year ago and more of them, according to a Texas Agricultural Extension Service wildlife specialist based in Uvalde.

Hunters can even expect better antlered deer from the improved nutrition which is a major contributing factor to their condition.

"Last year's drought effectively reduced the deer numbers in overpopulated areas," explains Dr. Dwight Guynn.

"This year there is more food for each animal which translates into good antler growth for bucks and higher fawn crops for does."

Higher fawn crops generally mean the deer herds are immediately beginning a population increase. Hence,

Guynn stresses that landowners and hunters can work toward a larger female harvest this year in order to keep down the increasing deer population where desired.

"Failure to harvest more does in the past seasons led to overpopulated conditions in many parts of the state that resulted in large die-offs similar to what happened when the drought hit last year," Guynn says.

Guynn reminds landowners that deer census techniques and spotlight counts can be used to better determine deer populations and evaluate proper harvest levels. More can be learned about these techniques along with aging methods, harvest record systems and harvest recommendations through local county Extension agents or Texas Department of Parks and Wildlife officials.

Deer season opens in most Texas counties at sunrise on November 14.

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## Today's Lifestyles

In visiting with parents of teen-agers today, I am not at all surprised to find that one of their greatest fears is the possibility that their teenagers might get involved with drugs. Their fears are not unfounded. Facing decisions about drugs seems inevitable for a startling number of today's teens, but watchful parents can recognize signs of drug use and help their teens deal with the situation.

In order to help, parents must understand that adolescence is one of the most difficult periods of growing up, and, in today's stressful society, teenagers often find themselves encountering many pressures.

One of the biggest pressures is the extreme fear of not "fitting in" with their peers. It is extremely important to a teen to be accepted. Because of this, a teen often will succumb to the pressures of peers, even if it is against his or her better judgement.

Careful parents may be able to detect a drug problem

early and prevent their child from getting into even more serious situations.

Some signs to watch for are these:

- 1) Loss of interest in school and even expression of the wish to drop out
- 2) Dropping grades
- 3) A change in style of dress or appearance and loss of interest in looks
- 4) Loss of outside interests
- 5) Dropping of extracurricular activities, such as sports, to "hang out" with a different crowd
- 6) Differences in moods — the child may become withdrawn, defensive and often depressed
- 7) Glassy-eyed appearance and/or disorientation
- 8) Excessive fatigue and the need for abnormal amounts of sleep
- 9) Lying about where they're going or where they've been
- 10) Selling family valuable or even stealing to support a drug habit
- 11) Blackouts

These signs may not necessarily mean drug use, but they do indicate some type of problem.

It's important to discuss these things with the child in an open, honest and understanding atmosphere, and it's important to seek help if the situation seems to indicate a need for it.

## Gun laws fail to curb rising crime

A National Rifle Association analysis of the latest crime statistics published by the FBI reveals that those major metropolitan areas with strict gun laws lead the nation in their rates of violent crime.

Among cities whose populations exceed 500,000, Boston was listed as America's most violent town last year. The 1980 statistics are con-

tained in the FBI's Uniform Crime Reports released on September 10, 1981.

Boston is followed by New York City, Baltimore, Washington, D.C. and Cleveland, all of which have extremely rigid gun laws.

Massachusetts, in 1975, adopted the Bartley-Fox Act, establishing a mandatory jail term for the unlicensed

carrying of a firearm. In 1974, the year before Bartley-Fox took effect, Boston ranked fifth in overall violent crime. It now ranks first.

New York City, which passed Bartley-Fox type legislation in 1980, has become America's second most violent city since the law passed, jumping from fourth place in 1979. New York City leads the nation in armed robbery with 1,429.2 per 100,000 population, more than 100 thousand last year.

Baltimore, with stringent gun licensing and registration requirements, saw a 19 percent increase in its rate of robbery last year over 1980.

And Washington, D.C., where the private ownership of handguns was banned in 1977, moved from eighth place in overall violent crime before the handgun ban to fourth place in 1980.

Since the District of Columbia enacted its handgun ban its murder rate has risen 17 percent, according to the FBI's data. In near-by Virginia, where there are relatively few restrictions on gun ownership other than those imposed by Federal law, the murder rate dropped 9 percent.

The UCR statistics show that, overall, the United States' murder rate has fluctuated in recent years. It fell from 9.8 per 100,000 in 1974 to 8.8 in 1976 and 1977. Then it rose to 9.7 in 1979 and rose again to 10.2 in 1980.

Firearm involvement in murder, however, has declined during those years, down from 67.9 percent in 1974 to 62.4 percent for 1980.

Registration will be at the first class meeting and the cost of \$8.00 will be payable at registration.

Instruction of the course will be by Mr. Tom Siekmann, Program Coordinator of the Nichols Health Fitness Center. He will cover six areas of interest: Introduction to the Five Dimensions of High Level Wellness, Self-Responsibility, Nutritional Awareness, Stress Management, Physical Fitness, and Environmental Sensitivity.



# Farm News

## Considerations for potential club calf producers

COLLEGE STATION — More commercial cattlemen are investigating the club calf market each year. This is not surprising, for at least 10,000 show steers are fed annually in Texas, a few of which command very high prices.

Considerations important to the club calf producer include most of those which the purchaser must also heed, says Dr. Stephen Hammack.

Hammack, of Stephenville, an area beef cattle specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, says these include age, breed, color, type or body conformation, and price.

Regarding age, Hammack emphasizes that in order to show a calf at a major livestock show, the calf must have its temporary teeth. The first pair of temporary teeth are generally shed at around 19 to 21 months of age but this may vary considerably.

"The oldest steers may not always be the best steers, but some degree of maturity generally allows maximum expression of skeletal size, muscling

and some degree of fattening," Hammack says.

So, because most of the major livestock shows in Texas are held from January to March, steers born in late spring to mid-summer are often the most competitive, he continues.

It is well-known that calves born at this time usually weigh less (thus returning fewer dollars when sold commercially) at weaning.

Hammack notes that anyone contemplating changing their breeding program to a spring-summer calving period should carefully consider this disadvantage beforehand.

Breed is another important factor. Some shows have as many as 14 different breed and breed-cross classes. "An important point here is that, at most shows, determination of breed is based on visual evidence of breed characteristics, a subjective evaluation," he says.

Genetic background is also important for another reason in small county

shows, where separate breed classes may not exist, or in competing for overall grand champion at larger shows.

In these cases, where all breeds compete against each other, steers with 3/8 to 3/4 of one of the large, heavier muscled, "exotic" breeds are usually most competitive.

Hair color can be an important factor in showing placing. Solid black is probably the most frequently seen color on a grand champion.

Other popular colors are solid red, or red with a small amount of white markings. Other colors can be competitive but are just not as common as those mentioned.

Type or body conformation is important because most judges look for a balance of skeletal size, muscling, finish and a general blending of body parts, Hammack says.

In a tough show where several steers may be extremely close in these basic factors, such fine points as head and neck carriage, amount of brisket and sheath, extreme straightness of legs, and overall "style" and showiness are important," he adds.

Hammack says the easiest way to get started in club calf production is through the use of artificial insemination. "Good calves are possible through natural service, but it can be a problem to find and buy the right sires," he continues.

The production of club calves might be a profitable sideline or even a principle enterprise, Hammack says, but it does have special requirements and attention to detail is necessary. Many who attempt to enter this market are disappointed because they fail to realize the problems as well as the opportunities.

A reputation must also be established before meaningful price bonuses are realized, he adds.

## Landscape & Gardening

**CLIMATE - FALL GARDENING**

What is the climate situation and how will it affect the fall gardening?

The situation is about the reverse of the pattern of climate in the Spring. The days are shorter and the nights are cooler. There tends to be higher humidity than in Spring time. There will be little or no wind. All the time during the fall the air is quite calm. The temperature drops in the mornings and there will be dew. All through the fall the Plains typically has bright days and good growing weather. The plants tend to grow slower because of this weather.

The plants that bear fruit like the tomatoes, peppers, egg plants and squash will grow slower especially at the time they have the fruit on the plant. But with a little bit of advance planting, the plants can grow into the fruit maturity along in mid September or early October.

The other thing that happens because of this weather is we have to watch out for certain diseases like powdery mildew. Powdery Mildew tends to develop and attack the plant better when there is warm weather and cool nights with a little bit of dew in the mornings. The Powdery Mildew doesn't get much start in most cucumber varieties, but be careful with winter squash, summer squash, melons, and cantalopes through this time of the year. Spraying will prevent infection of the Powdery Mildew. The fungicide to use is either Benlate or Carothane.

This kind of weather will bring out a higher quality in the leafy crops; the lettuce, spinach, broccoli, cabbage, and cauliflower. Those vegetables in which the leaves are used will attain a higher flavor and will be able to enjoy them over a longer period of time, because they mature more slowly in this kind of weather.

There are some problems that you need to be aware of in this type of weather, but it also is a good condition for a fall garden. It's a time of year when there is very little windstress on the plants and you don't have to worry about protecting plants from hail. Vegetables and all kinds of plants do very well here in the fall. The leaves aren't bothered by wind or hail. The insects have done about all their damage. Aphids are much less active in the fall when it's cooler. Spider mites do not like cool weather at all. It's a very enjoyable time to have a garden and to enjoy the fruits of your labor.

## Brucellosis vaccination of eligible heifers urged

Vaccination of eligible heifers should be a top priority for cattlemen in their efforts to control brucellosis. Dr. Martin Brillhart, Lubbock, area 2 veterinarian, Texas Animal Health Commission, recommends.

This is one of 15 areas of the Texas Animal Health Commission throughout the state. It includes these counties: Andrews, Bailey, Borden, Cochran, Crosby, Dawson, Fisher, Floyd, Gaines, Garza, Glasscock, Hale, Hockley, Howard, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Martin, Midland, Mitchell, Nolan, Scurry, Terry and Yoakum.

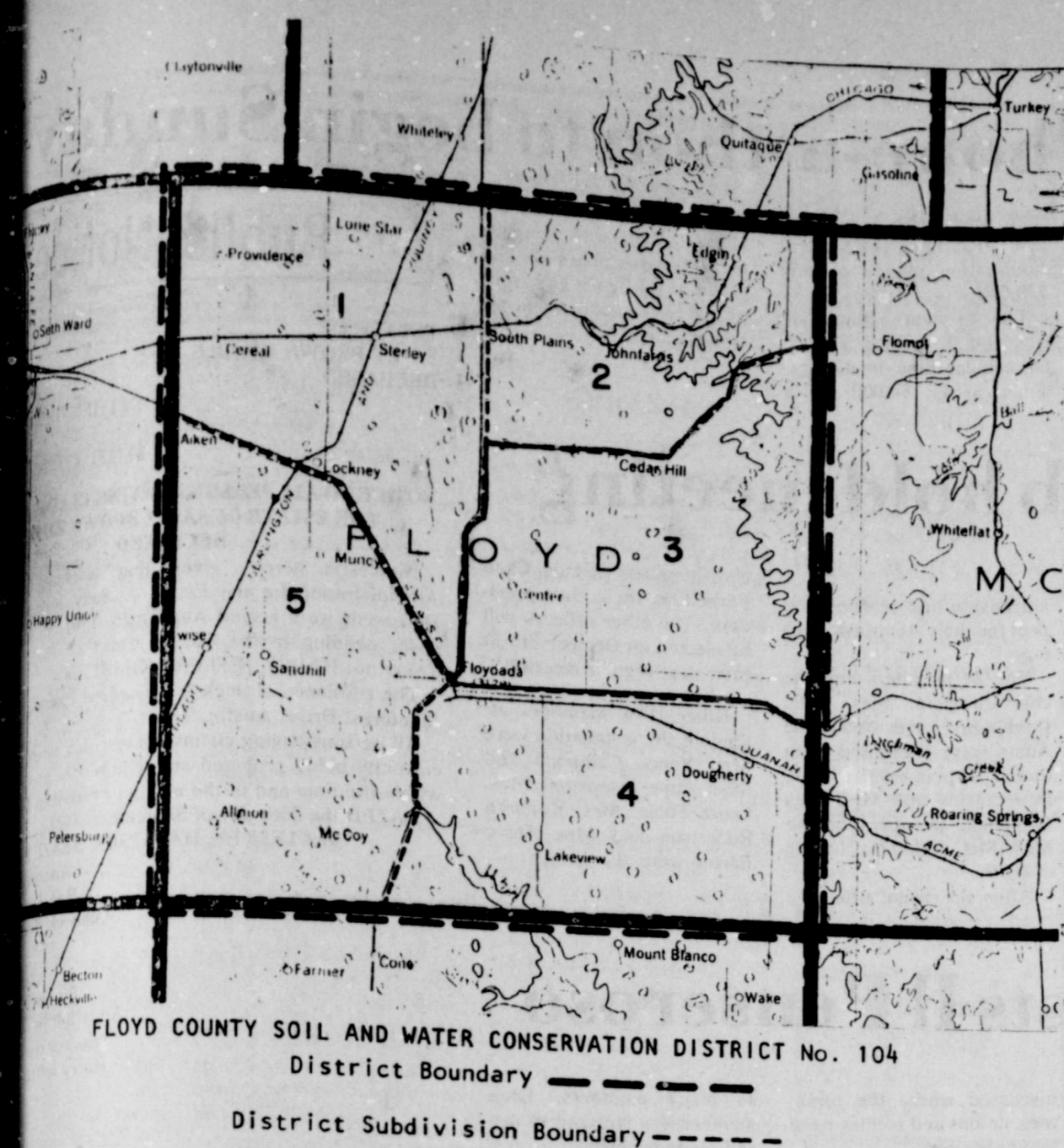
These are among advantages for cattlemen who vaccinate their cattle. Dr. Brillhart said.

1. A vaccinated heifer will bring a higher price at market;
2. Vaccination will bring about control of brucellosis, leading to eradication;
3. Vaccination reduces the probability that an infected cow will abort her calf.

The vaccine is free. Complete information may be obtained from your veterinarian, county agent, or the area TAHC office.

Vaccination is a key element of the Texas brucellosis program, although it is not the single answer. One of the goals of the Texas brucellosis plan is to have 70 percent of the eligible heifers in Texas vaccinated with the reduced dosage of Strain 19 vaccine. Use of the reduced dose virtually eliminates the titer problem (false reaction to bru-

## Firearm safety taught to Floyd County 4-Hers

The hunting season offers youth who have participated in the 4-H Shooting Sports program an opportunity to practice their skills, says Ken Langley, County agent with Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

With thousands of people enjoying hunting with friends and relatives, young, safe hunters can take the lead in avoiding accidents, he says.

Ken Langley reminds hunters that most accidents occur in and around private homes and vehicles. He urges youth and adults to review the following 10 commandments of gun safety and apply them at all times in all locations.

- Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun.
- Watch that muzzle! Carry your gun safely. Keep the safety on until ready to shoot.
- Unload guns when not in use, take down or have actions open. Guns should be carried in cases to shooting areas.
- Be sure that barrel is clear of obstructions and that you have only the proper-sized ammunition for the gun you carry.
- Be sure of the target before you pull the trigger. Know identifying features of the game you hunt.
- Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot. Avoid all horseplay.
- Never climb a tree or fence or jump a ditch with a loaded gun. Never pull a gun toward you by the muzzle.
- Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or water. At target practice, be sure your backstop is adequate.
- Store guns and ammunition separately, beyond reach of children.
- Avoid alcoholic beverages before or during shooting.

The Texas 4-H Shooting Sports program is conducted through the county Extension office with the help of volunteer leaders, notes Ken Langley. If you would like to participate, contact the county Extension Office on the Courthouse Square or call 983-2806 for more information.

## Windbreak tree orders accepted

Applications are now being accepted for windbreak seedlings from the Texas Forest Service.

These seedlings are grown from seed collected in West Texas and eastern New Mexico.

Conifer species available this year include Arizona cypress, Eastern red cedar, Austrian pine, and Ponderosa pine. These containerized seedlings cost \$1 each and are sold only in multiples of 30.

Hardwood species include bur oak, Shumard oak, Russian olive, native plum, mulberry, honey locust, and green ash. These bare root seedlings cost \$20 per hundred (minimum order) and are sold only in multiples of 50.

Seedlings ordered now will be ready for pickup and planting in March 1982. Trees sold by the Texas Forest Service may not be used for landscaping or ornamental purposes.



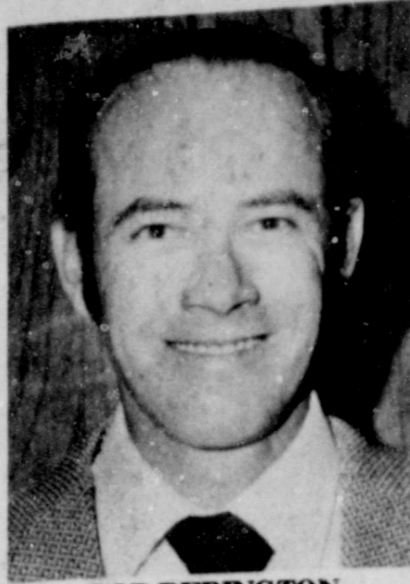
A native of Weatherford, Texas, McKeown attended Weatherford Junior College and Sam Houston State University.

## County Spotlight

Bill Beedy, 77, came to Floyd County in 1914 from Donley County when he was 10 years old. Bill met and married Winnie Wilson Beedy in Floyd County, where she was born. Bill's father was a farmer in Donley County, coming to the county in 1886, when the Fort Worth and Denver Railroad completed its line through Clarendon and eventually reached Amarillo. The five Beedy children, two girls and three boys, were raised on the farm. Bill worked for his father on the farm until he married Winnie in 1929. "My father died in 1929, shortly after we were married," Bill said. We started farming in the South Plains Community, about 12 miles north of Floydada and had a few head of cattle. We lived there for seven years and bought a section of land five miles east of South Plains where we raised our family, consisting of ourselves and three boys. The Beedy's son, Bradford is in the furniture business in Spearman; Charles is on a ranch in Randall County; and Eugene "Button" Beedy, lives in Floydada on farms and ranches near Floydada. The Beedy's have six grandsons, one daughter and six great grandchildren. Floyd County was nearly all grass in 1914," Bill said. "We came up Flomot Cap and opened a gate or two and didn't see a fence for 15 miles, until about three miles from Floydada. My mother, sister and daddy were in a covered wagon and I was driving stock. My daddy bought a place one mile south of Floydada," he said. Bill said the present court house in Floydada was built in 1912. "It burned down and was added on. The fire was in the county clerk's office. There were three houses up in Floydada in 1914. There wasn't much cultivated land in the county in 1914," he recalled. Bill finished high school in 1922 in Floydada. "That building (the old high school building) is gone now. There is a housing project located there now," Bill said. "I think education has changed a lot, from his time to today. 'I think we need to get closer back to the three Rs. I think some courses taught in school now are a bit far out. When I finished high school it was the exception if a boy or girl went on to college. Now it's the exception if they don't go on to college. That's how we've come," he said. Bill served on the county school board in Floyd County for 12 years and was on the school board at South Plains 12 years. "At one time there were 32 rural schools in Floyd County. Now there are only four schools in the county—Floydada, South Plains and Dougherty," he stated. Concerning life's philosophies, Bill said "I don't exactly live one day at a time. I anticipate the future and I try not to be too critical of the modern generation; I'm not like it used to be. We older people are inclined to believe our young people aren't what they used to be, but they have to keep up with the times. We are in a different world now and our young people are not all bad." The mode of transportation has changed drastically. When I was young, if we were as far as Lockney or Plainview, we were a long way from," said Bill.

Debbie Griffeth, the manager of the Hollis Jones Dairy Queen restaurant in Lockney, and Rhonda Rob-

gers of the 28 Hollis Jones Dairy Queen Restaurants in Texas held in Lubbock at the Villa Inn there.

All 28 of the heads of the restaurants in Texas' fourth largest Dairy Queen organization, Hollis Jones Dairy Queen Restaurants, were present at the session, the program for which featured three guest speakers and all six executives of the Jones firm.

Including the local DO head (s), the 28 managers present at this meeting were from 26 towns in West and North Central Texas, including Lockney and Floydada. The Hollis Jones group of Dairy Queens began in March, 1969, when he quit a five-figure annual salary position as district manager of Allied Finance in Dallas, where he had worked for more than a decade, to enter the food field by opening his first DO in Decatur. His wife, Sue, a native of Decatur, joined his first restaurant's staff in 1970; they married in 1973; and their Hollis Jones Dairy Queen Restaurants organization has been growing continuously ever since. Its two newest DOs were opened this year—in Lorenzo in February and in Groom in March.

## Inheritance state law now in effect as of September 1st

State Comptroller Bob Bullock's office Monday reminded Texans that a new state inheritance tax law took effect this month and will apply to estates of those who died on or after September 1, 1981.

The Comptroller's office reported the new law will save Texas taxpayers at least \$20 million in death taxes the first year.

The new law did away with the state's basic inheritance tax schedule and statutes, replacing them with a law that ties Texas inheritance tax collections to a part of the federal estate taxes owed.

For example, under the old state law if the federal tax due was \$5,000, the "federal credit" would be \$500 and the state inheritance \$700, resulting in the Internal Revenue Service collecting \$4,500 and Texas \$700.

Under the new law, Texas would now collect the "federal credit" of \$500 and the IRS would collect \$4,500, using the \$5,000 example.

In effect, the new law allows persons who owe federal estate taxes to deduct from the amount due the federal government any inheritance tax paid to the state. The amount is determined by an IRS formula.

The Comptroller's office said this also means that if federal estate tax rates are cut, Texas inheritance taxes are automatically dropped back. More than 45 other states have similar laws that piggy-back on the federal law. Estates of those who died before September 1, 1981 are subject to Texas' old inheritance tax law and tax schedule, Bullock's office noted.

## Zesty season ahead for most Texans

Wintertime in Texas is a zesty season. During the period when much of the country is bundling up for survival, Texans are taking to lakes and woodlands, to fairgrounds and festival streets for celebrations ranging from Highland flings to tortilla tossing to symphonic music. Hundreds of pageants, fiestas, and community frolics are cited in the brand-new Calendar of Texas Events just released by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

Beginning with robust Octoberfest in the Calendar's opening month, the variety of activities throughout the six-month period includes such outdoor happenings as art and music encounters, barbecue and chili cookoffs, flea markets, golf tournaments, fun runs and walk-fests.

Harvest jubilees honor such typical Texas products as pecans, sugar cane, rice and peanuts. Winter vegetables, citrus and prized livestock are featured in dozens of events reflecting the bounty of Texas agriculture.
