Dimmitt police officers arrested three juveniles last

Thursday morning in connec-

tion with the Feb. 12 burglary of the C. R. Anthony store in

Dimmitt. Police recovered over \$2,000 worth of merchandise which had been taken in the burglary.

'We found the merchandise in several different locations throughout town where it had been stashed, said police Chief Don Franklin.

Chief Franklin said that footprints and fingerprints at the scene led police to believe that juveniles were involved.

"The footprints were small so we knew we were looking for juveniles," he said. "We had suspects in mind because of previous burglaries with the same modus operandi."

Police questioned several iuveniles before getting statements from the three they arrested. The three juveniles have been turned over to juvenile

authorities.
