

Celebration of Christmas varies in land throughout the world

It is quite generally known that Christmas began as Christes Masse, a beloved religious festival originating with the angel's song on Bethlehem's plains, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men." It is less well known that only as late as 350 a specific date was set for the observance of the birthday of Christ, namely December 25, by Julius I. Bishop of Rome, though tradition says that it has been celebrated since 98, and was ordered to be observed as a solemn feast by Telesphorous. Bishop of Rome. in 137

Since then, we have created and followed many Christmas traditions and customs. Not everyone celebrates Christmas in the same way. The following excerpts are from the collection of Christmas books in the Floyd County Library.

In some Scandinavian countries a charming custom of ceremoniously taking down the Christmas tree and decorations makes a happy ending of the holiday gaieties.

Called a "plundering party" it is observed in many small communities. Groups of people meet at the village square and go from house to house to

"plunder" the Christmas trees. In each home the hostess and the children dismantle the tree in advance and place the ornaments on a tray. Simple refreshments are spread out on a table. Each guest is allowed to select a tree ornament to take home with them. When all the homes have been visited, the bare trees are carried out to the village square to be burned. As the huge bondfire flares up, all the company sings the carols and the end with 'Auld Lang Syne'' as the bells are rung at midnight.

The following Christmas, the bells and stars will adorn trees in new homes. The people will be reminded of incidents at the various plundering parties and will remember the former owners of the ornaments as they hang them on their own trees.

In Belgium Saint Nicholas Day is celebrated on December 6. They set up a tree and expect Saint Nicholas to fill it with gifts and good things to eat.

He is supposed to be riding a gray horse or white ass, so the children put out water, hay, carrots, and potatoes for it to eat. In the morning, the furniture is in general disorder, which shows that Saint Nicholas has been there, and in

their shoes the children find sweets and playthings if they have been good that

Among the "letters to Santa" in this edition one child, tells Santa that there will be coke and cookies at his house "in case you are tired of cookies and milk" which typlifies the tradition in this country of setting out refreshments for Santa.

In Denmark there is always food on the table during the twelve days of Christmas and especially on Christmas morning after church services. The houses are opened then for guests to come calling and let no one think to escape with out partaking of the family hospitality. Something must be taken, be shared, if it be but a crumb or a sip, for the guest who goes away without breaking his host's bread takes away the house-hold "vule" or their luck for the year.

In Slavic countries hay decorates the table as the families gather for the Christmas supper. The hav is to remind all of the humble birth of the Child.

The people of Finland have a special custom all their own. Tradition rules that everyone must take a steam bath on Christmas Eve.






There are a lot of Christmases past that come to mind when I begin to think about those that were most memorable. It is easy to think back to childhood days and remember the good times with Mother and Daddy and my two brothers.

There were those boxes that we rattled to try and guess the contents. There was the one that had the familiar smell to it, but, for the life of me, I couldn't identify. until Christmas day (a whole box of Juicy Fruit gum).

There were the years of demand when I remember telling my parents that if I didn't receive a particular item. then I didn't want anything else for Christmas. My. how glad I was that they didn't hold me to that selfish demand. Or the year that my older brother. Mike, and I spend all Christmas day putting together a see-through engine that had movable parts for our little brother. Steve. It even had a chassis to mount the engine on, but there was one missing part and we never finished it.

Christmas at home was always a wonderful time and experience. But, I believe that one of my most memorable Christmases was spent thousands of miles away from home, family and friends.

Christmas 1969 was to be my third consecutive Christmas away from home. In 1967, I had been on a temporary duty assignment at Andersen Air Force Base. Guam. Had it not been for a major and his family inviting me to their home. Christmas would have been a sad and lonely day.

In 1968, I was unable to leave my responsibilities as Director of Information for the 70th Bomb Wing at Clinton-Sherman AFB, Oklahoma. I remember how quiet and dim-looking the Bachelor Officers' Quarters were on that day, with almost everyone else gone. Even the football games on television held little interest.

In 1969, I was stationed at Pleiku AB, South Vietnam. I had only arrived there in October, having spent the first, and previous, six months of my Vietnam assignment at DaNang Air Base.

However, without knowing it. Christmas away from home was to be different this time, most assuredly because of a fresh commitment of faithfulness that I made to the Lord.

I had not lived as a Christian should live while I was stationed at DaNang. The things of the world were more important to me then. Occasionally, I would struggle out of bed on Sunday morning and attend chapel. But, then it might be several more weeks before I would attend again. Even then, however, I didn't worship much.

I was aware of all that when I was reassigned to Pleiku, and so I saw that time as an opportunity to begin to serve the Lord and to be more faithful to Him.

Almost from the beginning I immersed myself in the program of the base chapel. I became acquainted with the Southern Baptist chaplain stationed there. I was a regular attender at chapel services, played ping pong with the guys in the back room area, and participated in Bible study.

It was out of all that involvement that I knew that I didn't want to miss the Candlelight Service on Christmas Eve.

Of all that took place in that service, what I remember most is how the chapel was decorated. Airmen from the chapel had cut 7 foot poles from a stand of bamboo in the jungle, and had attached one of them to the end of every pew. On top of each pole they had placed a large, lighted candle.

On top of two high platforms on each side of the altar, there were two Christmas trees with lights and tinsel. Christmas trees were hard to come by in Vietnam. Some were shipped over from the States, but never enough for every unit. The chapel had been fortunate to receive two of them.

I'm sure we sang several Christmas carols, but I remember most of all "Silent Night" and "O Holy Night." In the congregation were people from many different faiths and denominations. Each of us received a small candle. The chaplain lit his candle from the candle on the altar, then lit someone else's candle. In turn, we lit the candle of the person standing next to us, until all the candles had been lighted. As we sang and prayed, in the glow of all those candles, that Christmas became something very special to me. Thousands of miles separated me from those who meant the most to me. There was always the danger and fear of another Viet Cong rocket attack. Yet, in spite of all that. Christmas 1969 was a very meaningful time for me.

I can still see that chapel on Christmas Eve in my mind's eye. Someone has said that only to man has God given the capacity to gather up our yesterdays and hold

DILAPIDATED STRUCTURE REMOVAL ORDINANCE AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF LOCKNEY, TEXAS, **REQUIRING THE DEMOLITION OR REMOVAL OF VA-**CANT AND DANGEROUS BUILDINGS, DEFINING CER-TAIN TERMS, PROVIDING FOR INSPECTION OF PRIVATE PREMISES, PROVIDING FOR CITATION, PROVIDING FOR HEARING, PROVIDING FOR REMEDY AND POSTING OF ORDERS, PROVIDING FOR ESTABLISHMENT OF LIENS, AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION.

Whereas, the City of Lockney has need for procedures by which to demolish or remove structures which are vacant and unfit for human habitation.

Now, therefore, be it ordained by the City Council of Lockney. Texas, as follows:

Section 1. DEFINITIONS

For the purpose of this Ordinance, certain abbreviations, terms, phrases, words and their derivations shall be construed as set forth in this section.

Words used in the present tense include the future. The singular number includes the plural, and the plural number includes the singular.

The following definitions shall apply in the interpretation and enforcement of this Ordinance.

A. BUILDING INSPECTOR. The legally designated inspection authority of the City, or his authorized representative.

B. CITY COUNCIL. The governing body of the City of Lockney.

C. DANGEROUS STRUCTURES. Any building or dwelling. found by the building inspector to have any of the following defects and be unfit for human habitation.

1. Lacking illumination, ventilation, sanitation, heat or other facilities adequate to protect the health and safety of occupants or the public.

2. Be damaged, decayed, dilapidated, unsanitary, vermininfested or otherwise unsafe to such extent as to create a serious threat to the well-being of occupants or the public. D. VACANT STRUCTURES. Any building or dwelling to which utility services have been disconnected and/or which has been continuously unoccupied for as long as sixty days.

E. OWNER. Owner or owners of the freehold of the premises or lesser estate therein, a mortgagee or vendee in possession, receiver, executor, trustee, lessee or other person, firm or corporation, in control of a structure.

F. PREMISES. A lot or parcel of land, including a building or dwelling, and auxiliary structures thereon.

SECTION 2. ENFORCEMENT OFFICER.

The provisions of this ordinance shall be administered and enforced by the building inspector, or his duly authorized reprisentative, of the City of Lockney.

SECTION 3. RIGHT OF ENTRY.

The building inspector shall enforce the provisions of this ordinance, and he, upon presentation of proper identification to the owner of such property, and in such manner as to cause the least possible inconvenience to the persons in possession. may enter any building, structure, or premises during all reasonable hours, to make inspections or examinations thereof in order to perform the duties imposed on him by this



SECTION 10. FAILURE TO COMPLY

In any case where the city council orders a building or structure demolished and cleared or removed, and the owner of any such building or structure fails to comply within the time period allowed in the order, the city council may cause the same to be done, and pay therefor, and charge the expenses incurred thereby to the owner of such premises. Such expenses shall be assessed against the lot or real estate upon which the work was done. The doing of such work by the city or the ordering of the same by the city council may not relieve the owner from prosecution for failure to comply under the terms of this or other Ordinances.

SECTION 11. ESTABLISHMENT OF LIEN

Whenever any work is done on any building or structure by the city under the provisions above, the building inspector on behalf of the city, shall file a statement of the expenses incurred with the county clerk. Such statement shall give the amount of such expenses and the date or dates on which the work was done, or the expenses incurred, and costs of demolishing, cleaning, or removing the building or structure. When this statement is filed with the county clerk, the city shall have a privileged lien on the lot or real estate upon which the work was done to secure the expenses involved. Such lien shall be second only to tax liens and liens for street improvements, and the amount thereof shall bear interest at the rate of ten (10%) per cent. per annum from the date the statement was filed with the county clerk. The statement of expenses for work done and filed with the county clerk, or a certified copy thereof, shall be prima facie proof of the amount expended for such repairs, demolition, clearance or removal.

SECTION 12. LIABILITY

Neither the city nor any authorized agent or employee of the city acting under the terms of this ordinance shall be liable or have any liability by reason of order issued or work done in compliance with the terms of this ordinance.

SECTION 13. PENALTIES

Any person violating the terms of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be subject to a fine of not less than Five Dollars (\$5.00) nor more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00), and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00); and each and every day's violation shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

SECTION 14. SEVERABILITY



SECTION 4. WARRANT TO INSPECT PREMISES.

If the owner of any building or dwelling refuses admittance thereto of the building inspector, or his agent or representative, for the purpose of making an examination or inspection of the premises, the building inspector may make an affidavit before any judge or a court of competent jurisdiction that the building inspector believes or has reason to believe, that by an inspection of certain premises designated in the affidavit, he will obtain evidence tending to reveal the existence of violations of this Ordinance. Upon receiving this affidavit, the judge may issue a warrant authorizing the building inspector to inspect the premises named in the affidavit and designated in the warrant, to obtain evidence tending to reveal the existence of violations of this ordinance.

SECTION 5. CITATION

When it shall be determined by the building inspector that a building or structure is vacant and dangerous, within the terms of this ordinance, the building inspector shall cite the owner of such building or structure, or his authorized agent or representative, to appear before the city council and show cause why such building should not be declared to be a public nuisance and why the owner should not be ordered to remove or demolish and clear such building or structure from its premises. The date of such hearing shall be not less than (10) days after such citation shall have been made.

SECTION 6. SERVICE OF CITATION

Citation may be served by personal delivery of a copy thereof to the owner of the property, as such ownership appears on the last city tax roll; or by deposition such citation properly addressed and as certified mail in the United States Post Office: or by attaching a copy of such citation to a place of prominence on such building or structure. Notice shall also be given by publishing the same in the official publication of the city at least ten (10) days prior to the date set for a hearing which notice shall state the time and place of such hearing.

SECTION 7. HEARING.

On the date set in such citation for hearing, hearing shall be had and on the basis of such hearing the city council shall determine whether or not such building or structure is vacant and dangerous.

SECTION 8. REMEDY

When, upon proper hearing, the city council determines that a building or structure is vacant and so dilapidated. damaged or decayed as to be beyond repair, it shall issue such orders, by the adoption of a proper resolution, as shall appear reasonably necessary to prevent that building or structure from continuing as a hazard to life and property. Such order shall ordinarily be to demolish and clear or remove the building or structure, and such orders shall include the specifying the owner may voluntarily comply with the provisions of this ordinance.

SECTION 9. POSTING OF ORDER

Any order issued by the city council for the demolition or removal of a building or structure shall be immediately and prominently posted by the Building Inspector on the premises, in the form of a placard. Such placard shall declare the premises unfit for human habitation and contain other information as to the order in force.

Any person who shall use, enter or occupy such premises and/or any person who shall interfere or hinder the demolition or removal of any building or structure under the terms of this Ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be subject to a fine as prescribed herein

Like the big, old house in which they live, the residents of 302 15th St. N., St. Petersburg, show the ravages of tough times. The house is 69 years old and might be excused for its timeworn appearance. But most of the 30 or more men are young or middle-aged. Their problem is alcohol. not vears.

Usually, they arrive at this house as hopeless derelicts. Most have no money, no families and little. if any. luggage. They are burdened instead with the luggage of desperation over their present condition and guilt over. their inability to change it.

Their ages range from 19 to 69 years, but up to half of them are under 30. They include one 24-year-old who. when he arrived, could remember only one two-week period since he was 13 when he hadn't been drunk. But there are men in their 30s and 40s who have had long periods of sobriety during which they pursued careers as teachers, college professors, engineers, lawyers. Most have wives and children somewhere - families who have given up on them. Sometimes, after a few days of sobriety and a weak attempt at reform. they succumb once again and leave in much the same condition that they arrived.

But, for a few, the house has become a lifesaver - a safe point in which they are able to reconstruct their lives.

Known as Faith Halfway House, the residence is the only one of its kind in St. Petersburg. It is unique not Petersburg with his family to care for his ailing mother. He hoped to find a new kind of ministry here. Instead. he found a job at Maas Brothers, became a department head and spent a year as a




only because it provides haven for alcoholics who want to be independent but also because its focus is on a religious approach to reform. Founded in 1976 by a group of local Alcoholics Anonymous members, the rented, 18-room, former nursing home has sheltered hundreds of such men with varving degrees of success.

Initially, the founders hoped it would be the forerunner of a chain of similar homes for both male and female victims of alcoholism. Its first residents were women. But the overwhelming demand for facilities for men. plus the difficulty of sheltering women who were unable to find jobs. led to its conversion to a male-only facility. The plans for expansion have not vet materialized.

Unlike detoxification and rehabilitation centers where clients are "dried out" and treated in a confined atmosphere. Faith Halfway House is meant to be, as its name implies. a station for alcoholics who have gone through such programs and are able to hold outside jobs. It is designed to fill a need for interim quarters that can ease the re-entry of reformed alcoholics into the mainstream - a place with a wholesome, homelike atmosphere. free of the influences that might lead a still-vulnerable alcoholic back to drink.

A primary goal is to incorporate Christian counseling and Bible study into the rehabilitation effort. To maintain freedom for this religious emphasis. Faith Halfway House accepts no public funds. It depends instead on private donations. plus modest charges for room and board based on each client's ability to pay. But. throughout its brief history. Faith Halfway House has been plagued with financial problems.

"We always seem to be about 10 days away from closing." says Rev. Roy Turner who, with his wife Thelma. took over management of the house in June 1979. "Passage of the 1981 Farm Bill by Congress will do little to halt the decline family farmers are facing in prices and income which will result in the liquidation of many family farms in 1982." stated Mike Moeller. President of the Texas Farmers Union. "We think the bill should be renamed the 1981 Farm Bankruptcy Act because that is exactly the affect it is going to have on many producers.'


Moeller said "Because of the irresponsibility of the Congress and the Reagan Administration, we want them to reopen hearings for emergency legislation for farmers. Also, the TFU will be calling on the Congress to adopt legislation which will allow farmers and

at the lowest level on the parity index since the height of the Depression in 1933. On top of that, we are still faced with high interest rates and projections that 1982 net farm income will drop \$3 billion to \$17 billion." Moeller said. Residents should beware of cotton bale haulers

Each year at this time the motoring public on the South Plains experiences a large influx of cotton bale haulers on the highway. Even though the majority of cotton has been stripped from the field these vehicles will be on the roadway carrying 500-pound bales for several months.

Keep in mind that many of these semi-trailers are unsafely loaded. It has been noted that these flat bales of cotton are not secured properly in many instances when they leave the gin and proceed to their storage place. These trucks are on the road 24-hours a day. Sometimes they carry 45, 50 and maybe as high as 60 bales of cotton on one flatbed float.

After the last carol she said aloud, "This is the Best Christmas!" Mac barked and everyone laughed.


