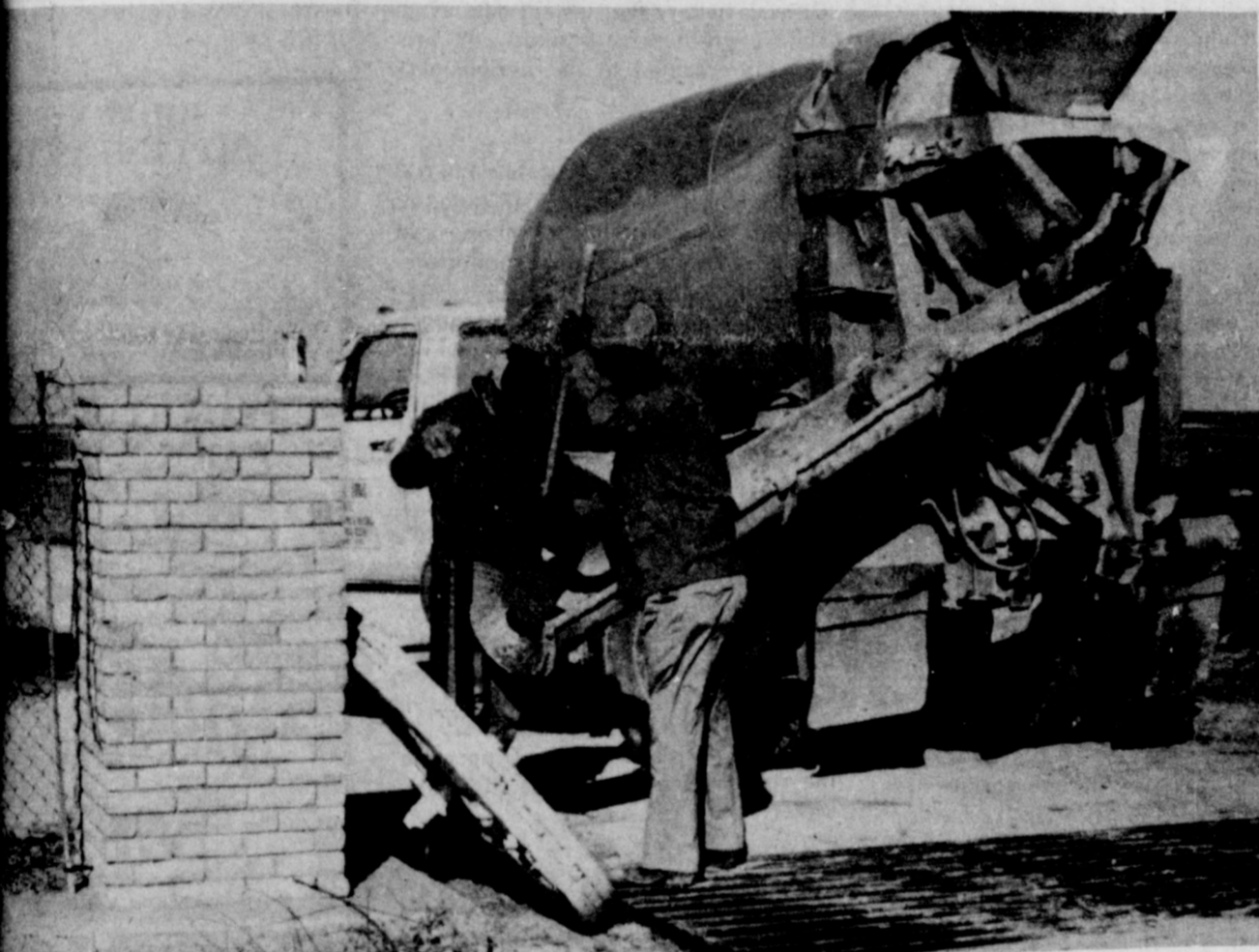

Monitoring team completes study Lockney Independent School District receives clean bill of health from state

The report goes on to commend the staff and students for their behavior and operational methods and the results that are being obtained from them.

There were a few minor recommendations, but no corrective actions needed were listed by the team.

The annual audit report by Orland Gilbert for the school year 1981 shows a cumulative surplus in the General Operating Fund of \$275,446. This was especially gratifying to the board, according to LISD Supt. Dub Hallmark, because it furnishes a cushion upon which they can rely to carry on the business of the school system. He was quick to explain, however, that this surplus was not generated in that single year, but was a cumulative total of all the years in the past history of the school system.

The Textbook Selection Committee, which, as Hallmark explained, is one of the most important functional bodies of any successful school system, and therefore the prospective members are carefully screened by the school board members.

The accreditation team report read in the Lockney Independent School District generally exceeds minimum standards in the areas of governance, instructional planning process, instructional personnel, facilities, and health safety. Also, the students are to be commended for their excellent behavior, grooming and discipline; the staff—both administrative and instructional—for their enthusiasm, professionalism and willingness to their classroom instruction and efforts with the accreditation

Commissioners court approves formation of Library Board

The Commissioners Court recently approved the formation of the Floyd County Library Board. When the board is appointed by the local governing body, such as the commissioners court, it functions in an advisory capacity.

"In most cases the first responsibility is to advise the librarian and the local government on library concern; the second duty is to use its influence to promote services and programs of the library in the community," said Virginia Young of the Texas State Library Development Division.

Floyd County's library board will be a policy-making group. It will help in such decisions as hours the library is to be

open, basic policies regarding books and materials selection and purchase and charges for lost library materials and fines on overdue materials.

The Friends of the Library, an auxiliary group of volunteers, will work closely with the governing board to establish and support a planned program of public relations. The two groups will also promote and support adequate funding of the library program and plans for expansion of service and facilities.

"The Friends of the Library will work with the advisory board to complement each other and work for better library facilities for Floyd County, including the

branch library," said a spokesman for the Friends.

The Friends will continue to sponsor the annual book sale at the Floyd County Pioneer Reunion.

Members of the board, appointed by the county commissioners, are Barbara Bernard and Pat Zimmerman for Precinct One, G. B. Johnston and R. L. Knox for Precinct Two, Francis Staniforth and June Ware for Precinct Three, and Amy Hollums and A. C. Pratt for Precinct Four. Martha Farris is member at large. Jackie Walls is advisor to the board.

The board has not met formally but will schedule a January meeting.

Top ten 1981 news stories as rated by Associated Press

- 1. The newsmaking events of 1981 were studied carefully by an impressive array of editors who are members of the Associated Press. In a copyrighted story December 28, the editors and publishers revealed their selections. The following is a brief summary of those newsworthy events that shaped the way we viewed the world in 1981.**
- 1. Reagan Assassination Attempt**
At 2:25 p.m. on March 30, the president was leaving the Washington Hilton after addressing the AFL-CIO Building Trades Council when he and his press secretary James Brady were wounded along with two policemen and two Secret Service agents. Police and Secret Service agents soon captured John W. Hinckley Jr., 25, son of a wealthy oilman from a Denver suburb. Hinckley was reared in Highland Park and then attended Texas Tech University. It was reported that his "unrequited passion for teen-age actress Jodie Foster might lead him to do something
- 2. Hostages Return**
The 52 American hostages held in Iran were not actually released by the time Jimmy Carter left the Oval office. The Iranian government held them in the Tehran airport until Ronald Reagan had taken the oath of the President and the new president announced the safe return of the hostages. The hostages were taken to Algiers, Wiesbaden, Germany, they returned to the United States to a host of welcomes, parades and emotional greetings.
- 3. The Sadat Assassination**
President Anwar Sadat of Egypt was gunned down by four men in military uniforms while he was watching a military parade. His successor, Vice President Hosni Mubarak was elected president and vowed to keep the country safe and sound.
- 4. The Attack on the Pope**
Pope John Paul II was shot by Mehmet Ali Agca, a 23 year-old Turk, as the pontiff greeting pilgrims in St. Peter's Square on May 13. Prosecutors say they were unable to prove that Agca was part of a conspiracy.
- 5. Reagan Takes the Lead**
Ronald Reagan, with the support of a newly Republican Senate and a House in democratic power, proceeded to cut taxes and government spending in all areas of government. He opened a new era in the nation bringing with him a time of conservatism and glamour to the White House. Mrs. Reagan met with criticism because of her elegant and sometimes extravagant taste.
- 6. The American Economy**
Reaganomics became the rule of thumb for government spending ideals, yet the country saw a rise in unemployment and soaring interest rates.
- 7. The Space Shuttle**
On April 12, the space shuttle Columbia, a reusable space cargo ship, zoomed into space from Cape Canaveral with astronauts John Young and Robert Crippen aboard. The missions was successful as the craft landed at Edwards Air Force Base 54½ hours later.
- 8. PATCO Strike**
Reagan threatened to fire the 12,000 PATCO air traffic controllers who went on strike. He gave them one day to return to work. They did not return. Reagan then fired them. Public support was not strong for public workers who made \$33,000 a year.
- 9. Sandra Day O'Conner**
When Justice Potter Stewart announced his stepping down, Reagan named Sandra Day O'Conner, a 51-year old Arizona appeals court judge to the Supreme Court where 102 men had served but a woman never had.
- 10. Poland**
The threat of Soviet intervention in troubled Poland was dispelled when the Polish government and military forces declared martial law on December 12 in Warsaw. Solidarity and dissident leaders were imprisoned and the government sought a "return to normalcy."

so carefully wrapped that was addressed to me.

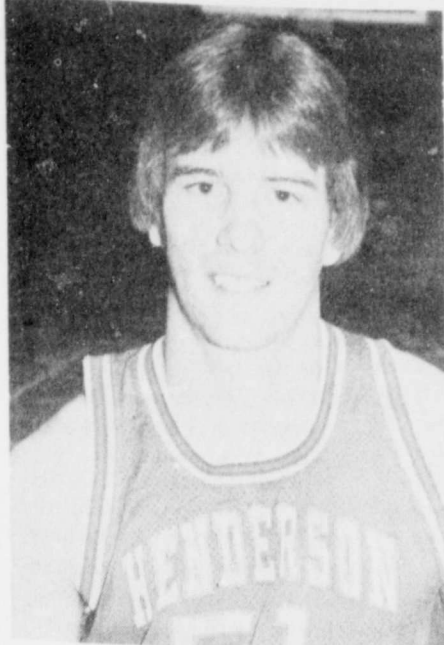
I found a gift to Beth and Joe, then I turned them all over for I wanted to know; If under the lights of that Christmas tree, among them a present that was addressed to me.

There is a fellow on the lecture circuit now who claims that the advertising media is being used to give us subliminal messages about sex. He has even written a couple of books on the subject.

The idea is that some ads contain messages subtly hidden within them that the conscious mind does not pick up, but the unconscious mind does. These obscene messages are subverting our morals.

The two day affair was hosted by the Poores, two children and their families: Dee Poore and wife Ann and three daughters Dana, April and Kelly and her husband Randy Neisler from Florissant, Missouri, and Pansy (Poore) Lasley and husband Ray and children Diane and Brian of Torrance, California.

The Sunday afternoon open house at their church, University Height Baptist Church was very similar to many such celebrations. More than one hundred thirty friends and relatives called to congratulate the honored couple and to wish them well.

Orville is retired from the maintenance department of Southwest Missouri State University, where Maurette is still employed in the food

service division. Friends from the church and university, as well as their neighbors and friends from their former home, Purdy, Missouri were present. It was a lovely occasion, but it was the unusual party Saturday night when you were mentioned.

Last summer, under guise of completing the Poore family history, Ann and Dee obtained photographs and a tape recording from Orville and Maurette concerning their early years. These things were actually the nucleus of a slide show presented on Saturday night, and narrated by Dee.

Enjoying and contributing to the festivities were relatives, most of whom lived at Lakeview at one time. Present were two of Orville's sisters Deota (Poore) Odum of Floydada and Odessa (Poore) Cage of Lubbock, also a cousin H.B. Barnett formerly of the Wake community. Maurette's brothers and wives, Weldon and Claudia (Patton) Thornton of Lubbock, Herbert and Mary Thornton, Houston, Van and Dorthy (Hodges) Thornton Fort Worth. A picture of the Lakeside Baptist Church flashed on the screen, then one of the Lakeview school house. "That is where I met Orville, at a graduation exercise. That was about three months after we moved west from Burleson Texas," Maurette explained. Their wedding picture brought this comment from Orville: "It rained and that Saturday we couldn't pull bulls, so we drove to Clovis and were married." Orville asked me to go with them. I thought we were going shopping in Plainview, never dreamed I was to witness their marriage," Deota commented.

A picture of the Thornton family flashed on the screen. Dee commented, "This is on the steps of the Brentz Breed home, after a big Sunday dinner." From the darkened room came an unidentified sad longing voice: "Please, keep that picture on the screen a little longer. It has been oh so long since I saw hair on my forehead. I would like to enjoy it just once more." The voice could have belonged to any man in the room who is over thirty.

There were early marriage pictures of Maurette and Orville and their friends and relatives — the Brentz Breeds, and of course Joe and Ruth Breed, the Canavases, Wayne and Naomi Batty, the Pattons, Willie and Mamie Bunch, the Floyds, the Nelsons, Luttrells, Willis, Withners, and many, many others.

Some pictures flashed on the screen were taken at the "in spots" of the day: Raring Springs, and Silver Falls. These were pleasant times, long forgotten.

Of course the times did improve. Through the slides we followed Orville and Maurette and the children to Amarillo where Orville worked in defense plant during the war, and at it's end moved to a farm at Purdy, Missouri, then into town, where they owned and operated a grocery store and locker plant, before moving to Springfield, about twenty years ago.

The show ended on a happy and beautiful note, the beautiful wedding in August of Kelly and Randy.

The six grandchildren, all college students, summed up the weekend. It was entertaining and educational, for the first time the children understand a little about the Great Depression, as there on the screen were their blood ties to it. They left with a new respect for and an inspiration from their grandparents, knowing that they would have to work very, very hard to equal their achievements. Even in fifty years.

RENDITION, EXEMPTION FORMS MAILED TO PROPERTY OWNER JAN. 1, 1982

Rendition and exemption forms, as required by Sec. 5.07 of The Property Tax Code, are scheduled to be mailed to The Public, Jan. 1, 1982. The deadline for filing Exemptions and Renditions is May 1st, 1982.

After filing the following Exemptions in 1982, they need not be claimed again: Residence Homestead, Over 65, Disability, Charitable Organizations, Religious Organization and Agricultural.

A person who receives a one-time exemption must notify the Appraisal Office by May 1st, after his property no longer qualifies. If he fails to do so, he incurs a penalty of 10% of the difference between the taxes he erroneously paid and the taxes he should have paid.

The Appraisal Office urges the Property Owner to sign only the exemptions which you qualify for and return them with your rendition form as soon as possible. Many people last year misplaced the forms they received from The Appraisal Office. When they received their Tax Statement, they found their Taxes were higher because they failed to sign exemptions. To prevent this and help The Appraisal Office, please return the Exemptions and Renditions, properly signed, as soon as possible.

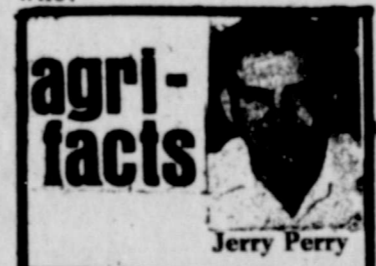

If you aren't preconditioning weaner calves... you're probably still experiencing additional death losses and disease treatment costs unnecessarily. Eighty percent of calves are reconditioned before they are sold to feeders. Although programs vary, John Herrick, Iowa State University, says there are some basic guidelines. The most important aspect is weaning, done at least 30 to 35 days before sale. Castration, vaccination and denorning, at the same time, is a mistake he says, adding too much stress to the calves. Vaccination should be done thirty days before weaning, he says. Dehorn and grub calves two weeks before weaning and allow calves to return to their mothers. Second shots should be given two weeks after weaning. A good preconditioning program saves calves and costs.
