$\qquad$ When Susan Garms, Floydada Cham-
ber Manager, said that she and two accomplices "hyped" over $\$ 3000$ worth of goods from Floydada merchants in
$31 / 2$ hours last week, 1 looked the word up in the dictionary.
Hype is a slang term meaning
deception, esp. exaggerated promotion. eception, esp. exaggerated promotion.
Hyped means to promote in a sensa
tional way.
That is exactly what Susan and her confederates, both Floydada police
officers, were doing as officers, were doing as they demonstra-
ted how vulnerable local merchants are to shoplifters.
The exercise in thievery was to put
emphasis on the Chamber sponsored emphasis on the Chamber sponsored
workshop given by William Beauworkshop given by William Beau-
champ, specialist with the Small Business Administration, Thursday night.
The program concerned how merchThe program concerned how merch-
ants can protect themselves from shop ants can protect themselves from shop-
lifting, bad checks, and misuse of credit cards; in short from retail theft.
Before beginning the shoplifting spree, Susan checked with local law spree, Susan checked with local law
entorcement agencies, District Attor-
ney. Randy Hollums, advised her to ney. Randy Hollums, advised her to
contact the target merchants before hand and get their permission. "If you walk out of the store with
unpaid goods, that's stealing." Hollums said.
So the merchants were notified. gave So the merchants were notified, gave
their permission. and aterted their
derks that shoplifters would be working their permission, and alerted their
clerks that shoplifters would be working "Stolen" Goods
Thursday night, during the meeting at Lighthouse Electric, Susan unveiled a countertop full of articles taken from Floydada stores. The team had not bee
caught taking any of the items caught taking any of the items.

As she related the adventure, she told

Homemade Ettergate helps set accurate flow rate on gated irrigation pipe

| Up until now, setting the flow rate on gated irrigation pipe was a slow job: and there was no accurate way of doing it. Cecil Regier. Manager of the Texas A\&M Research Field at Etter, solved the problem. He built the Etfergate. Nobody manufactures the gadget, but almost anyone can make one. <br> Regier says it takes a standard one gallon metal can, a one pound coffee can. several plastic lids from coffee cans, and a little welding or soidering. The gallon can should be rectangular, 4 inches wide. 6.5 inches long and inches tall. This is a gallon can used for oil. pesticides or anti-freeze. About one half of the top including the spout and 4 inches of the adjoining, narrow side are cut out. The coffee can with the bottom removed is brazed into a 4 inch hole next to the bottom on the intact side of the gallon can. About three inches of the coffee can must stick out and the |
