As things stand now, a family's home cannot be foreclosed upon, thanks to the foresight of our state constitution as of 1895. But now pressure is being exerted on the House Financial Institutions Committee on August 20, will reconsider this law. One faction represents Texans who want to be able to use their property as they see fit, borrow more money and use their homesteads or collateral. The other faction sees changing the Homestead Act as opening Pandora's box of | troubles. Protection of the home and family is the major reason for opposing a change. Lawmakers foresee an increased number of foreclosures and families finding themselves without homes in order to make car payments. etc. The proposed floor of $\$ 2,500$ on loans would require notice to debtors that they could lose their home for non-payment of loan. <br> A constitutional amendment will be required to change this law.
