Child abuse The Problem
The most serious threat to children in
America is not disease or accidental njury but is injury intentionally inflictinjury but is injury intentionally inflict-
ed upon children by their parents. Each year more children die at the hands of
their parents than die from infectious heir parents than die from infectious disease, leukemia, or automobile acci-
dents. Our children are being beaten with belts and clothes hangers, stabbed with knives, cut with razors, burned with cigarettes, sealded with water,
bludgeoned with fists, struck with clubs and slammed against walls and floors. Children under three are the most severely injured and illed

Child abuse can be physical, sexual or mental. Reported cases involving the
sexual abuse of a child are on the exual abuse of a child are on the
ncrease in the United States. But many more cases go unreported. Department of Human Resurces officials note: "In
almost every case, we can relate some almost every case, we can reates some
prior sexual experience with a parent to prior sexual experience with a parent to
present sexual abuse of a child. A
person with that in his past who feels person with that in his past who feels
rejected by society and yet feels
accepted by his children will turn to his aceeted by his
hildren for sex
parent and is passively accepted by the
other. The experts in child abuse teach other, The experts in child abuse teach
that abusing parents generally are not
mentally ill or alcoholic, but are mentally ill or alcoholic, but are unable
to cope with the problems and stress of to cope with the problems and stress of
life. Abusing parents do not have the ifiental energy to meet the needs of the child. They are to busy trying to meet
their own needs. In order to eliminate heir own needs. In order to eliminat
he demands of the child, abusing parents impulsively batter the child often striking out in rage. When the
natural needs of a child are answered natural needs of a child are answered
with a punch or a slap or verbal abuse, the child soon learns to make few demands on his parents. The child learns that he is unloved and unaccept-
ed and avoids confrontation with his parents as far as possible often living in solitude. The very young, however,
cannot withdraw because they devend cannot withdraw because they depend
upon their parents to satisfy their upon their parents to satisfy their
biological needs. They must simply endure.
Report
Reporting Suspected Child Abuse
In Texas, is is against the law not to In Texas, is is against the law not to
eport suspected abuse or neglect of children. The first step in solving the child dattery problems is to identify the abused child. It is not necessary to
dentify oneself in making a report: it is delpful to do so, however, and the identity of the person making the report
is never revealed. Usually it is obseris never revealed. Usually it is obser-
vant and concerned teachers, neighant, and concerned teachers, neigh-
bors, relatives, and often, strangers. who provide information which helps to
uncover instances of abuse. uncover instances of abuse.

parental effectiveness training and psy parental effectiveness training and psy-
chotherapy while the welfare of amy child remaining in the home is moni
tored. In extreme cases, the parental cored. In extreme cas.
rights are terminated.
In appropriate cases, criminal char ges are brought by the local Law
Enforcement Agency. The prosecution Enforcement Agency. The prosecutio
of such cases serves to inform the public of the child abuse problem, to protec or abused child, to punish, the abususing
the arent, to encourage abusing parents to parent, to encourage abusing parents to
seek help, and to inform abusin seek help, and to inform abusing
parents who do not seek help that chiid abuse will not be tolerated. Once a case of child abuse is
detected, or even suspected, the swift gathering of physical and medica gathering of physical and medical
