## Taxes to be withheld from savings

| the nation. <br> Under this law all banks, savings and loans, money market mutual funds, credit unions, mutual savings banks and other payers of interest or dividends will ten percent of the interest and dividends earned by their customers and transmit this amount to the IRS | vance. <br> Banking officials say this rule is wrong because of the following reasons: <br> 1) Withholding will cut the amount of cash the saver will have available during the year from interest income. <br> 2) The amount withheld may not be correct for your tax bracket. If over withholding occurs, savers will have to file for a tax refund to get back their own money. <br> 3) Total interest earnings will be reduced because of less income from reinvestment and compounding. | individuals (including children) will have to file an exemption certificate for each and every account they have in order to avoid withholding. If the exemption is not filed in time, a tax return must be filed the next year, or the withheld money will be forfeited to the government. <br> Unless Congress acts to stop the withholding rule, it will go into effect on July 1, 1983. some of the money they could earn in compounded interest. We urge you tojoin our efforts by writing letters to your representative in Congress and
to the two senators from this state. Tell them you want the $10 \%$ withholding tax repealed, because it would impose an unfair penalty on savers like yourself. For assistance in contacting your representative and senators please ask any of our
bankers. If we all act now, Congress will get a clear message from the voters back home, and they will work to repeal this need
