THERE ARE about 79 basics in square dancing, and most of them are used by the caller during a tip which consists of one hash call and one singing call.

The next question often heard is what is a basic? A basic is a necessary movement with a short clear call that cannot otherwise be given descriptively in the time needed. The movement should be smooth-flowing (not erratic or awkward) and should lend itself to

A new student in square dancing is taught in ten lessons about 28 basic calls. From these 28 basics, the caller-teacher works in the remaining 51 basics. A square consists of eight people or four couples. Any goof of a call can stop that square. It doesn't matter whether you are a newcomer to square dancing or an eldtimer, goofs are made by all A good square dancer upon a "goof" immediately returns to home position with a big grin or smile, and waits for the next call. That's why square dancing is so
