

Incumbents take general election

Despite rumors of write-in candidates, Saturday's election proceeded without a hitch.

In the city election Major J.D. Copeland was re-elected with 113 votes. Re-elected as aldermen were Gail Kring with 104 votes and Kenneth Wofford with 109. Write-in candidate Jerry Johnson received three votes in the alderman race and Clarence Ansley received 4 write-in votes as mayor.

Assisting with the city race were judge Willis Reynolds, assistant Jesse Garza, and clerks Bernice Reynolds and Jewel Thompson.

In the hospital board race, incumbent Kenneth Tate received 116 votes and Rusty Baccus received 117 votes to retain his seat. Larry Golden received 113 votes to win the seat on the hospital board vacated by Chester Carthel.

Write-in candidates in the hospital

board election included Paul Schacht with two votes, Claude Brown with two votes, Jesse Garza, Charles Huffman, C.L. Henderson and Buster Terrell, all receiving one vote each.

Officials for the hospital board elections were J.D. Copeland, election judge, and assistants Boyce Mosley, Soila Reyes, and Weldon Dodson.

In the race for school board members Bill Race and Eddie Foster received 114 votes for re-election as trustees. Clar Schacht, newcomer to the school board, won election to the board with 109 votes. Write-in candidates for the school board were Jerry Johnson with 14 votes and Jesse Garza receiving 1 vote.

Officials for the school board election were judge Mike Mooney, and assistants Kenneth Wofford, Kenneth Tate, Merle Mooney and Maria Arellano.

Lockney General increases room rate

The hospital board met for its regular monthly meeting on Tuesday, March 29. All members and administrator Guy Hazlett were present.

Under old business Guy Hazlett gave the monthly administrators report. It showed a monthly deposit total of \$119,210 which is the biggest cash month in the hospital's history. Emphasis was placed on delinquent account collections. Of the over five hundred delinquent accounts, 200 are being worked out of the hospital business office and 350 are being handled by collections agencies in Lubbock and Dallas. Results of this work has been excellent and accounts for part of the increase in cash flow in the hospital. Collection rate for the clinic is 106.8%. The hospital collection rate is 94.6%.

In an effort to increase Medicare reimbursements, room rates will be increased on April 1. Before the increase semi-private rooms were \$91 and \$94 and private rooms were \$95 and \$97. After April 1 semi-private rooms will increase to \$98 and \$100 and private rooms to \$102 and \$104. This will cause an increase in the Medicare reimbursement by \$12,000 to \$15,000 per year. This is the first time in nearly two years that room rates have been increased. Even with this increase room rates at Lockney General are still \$15 to \$30 below other area hospitals.

The board approved a nursing loan

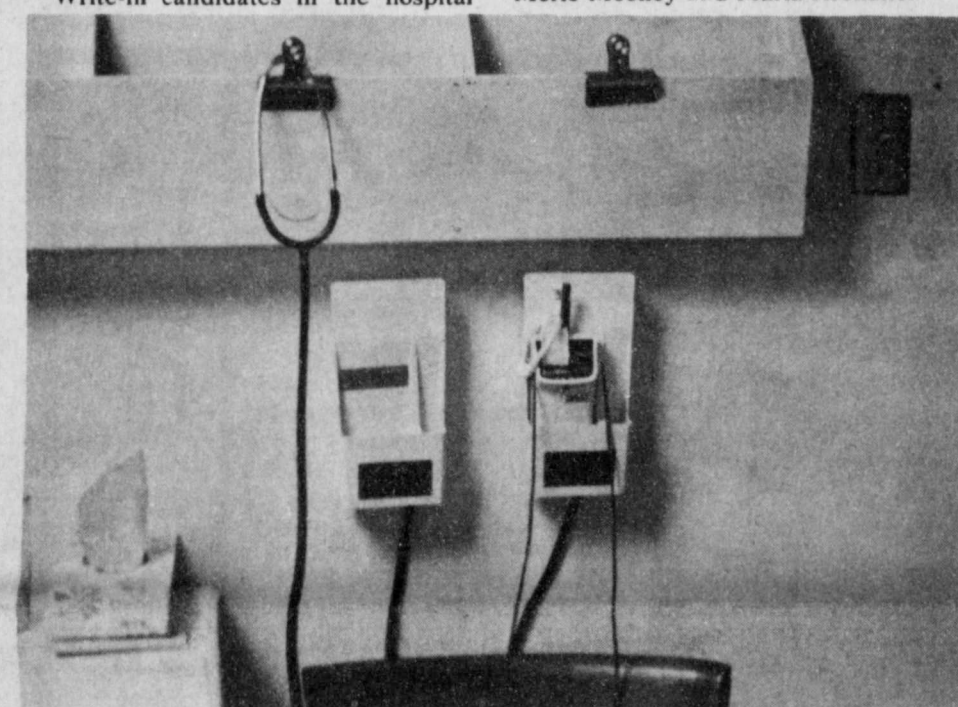
program that will allow two L.V.N.'s from Lockney General to receive R.N. training. This is a one-time program to solve a future need for R.N.'s at the hospital.

The board authorized payment of delinquent taxes on lots 7 and 8 of block 6 of the Pickle Addition. This will give the hospital clear title to these two lots that adjoin the hospital property to the east. The taxes were estimated at \$1700.

Also in the administrator's report was the financial breakdown for February. Reports showed \$92,577 in revenue and \$102,236 in expenditures.

The reason for the loss was explained by Guy Hazlett. "Part of the loss was due to the purchase of large quantities of supplies for the lab and other areas of the hospital. These supplies were purchased in February because of the large discounts the hospital obtained. The hours needed in February also contributed to the loss." Mr. Hazlett also stated that the large purchase of supplies, would last at least 6 months, so expenditures would be decreased the next several months.

Also in a year-to-date assessment of the overall financial status of the hospital, the hospital shows \$891,216.00 in assets and \$120,751.00 in expenditures and a year-to-date loss of \$63,477 as opposed to last year's year-to-date loss of \$75,209.

Hospital implements new portable incubator

Last week Lockney General Hospital received a new portable incubator to be used in newborn deliveries at the hospital.

The incubator is being paid for by the Penserose Junior Study Club. The club pledged the money earlier this year, with the money being raised through club projects which included a bridge tournament, arts and crafts show, hunt breakfast in December and Farm Sale concession.

Friday Reeda Kay Smith presented administrator Guy Hazlett with a check for \$1,000 as partial payment for the incubator cost of the incubator was \$2250.

The incubator is used to transport the

baby from the delivery room to the nursery. There the baby will be left in the incubator for several hours until the baby's body temperature is stabilized. The incubator also controls humidity and enables the baby to become used to the environment.

The incubator is manufactured by Ohio Medical products for Armstrong. It is very similar to the old one the hospital has used for several years, but is a more modern and efficient model.

Dr. Gary Mangold stated that this incubator would get much use, as births at the hospital increase every year. In 1978 196 newborns were delivered at Lockney General, in 1981, 198 were delivered, and in 1982, 226 babies were born, and 250 are expected to be delivered in 1983.

Hospital receives new digital thermometers

One month ago the doctors at Lockney General Hospital requested that electronic thermometers be purchased.

They received their request as the clinic began using the new thermometers last week.

According to Guy Hazlett, administrator for the hospital, the new thermometers will save about 5 minutes per patient and save the nurses many steps. The three thermometers were purchased with money that has been saved on other purchases on which the hospital received large discounts. The thermometers are more accurate than the standard mercury ones, and they will be

less expensive since they will not get broken. They are run on rechargeable batteries and are charged when not in use.

Thermometers identical to the ones recently received by the clinic have been used in the hospital for over 2 years without any problems. The doctors and nurses are very pleased with the new addition of equipment and Dr. Gary Mangold said "They will save steps and time and enable the staff to serve more patients per day."

The thermometers were purchased from United Medical Supply in Lubbock for \$320.25 and this included an 81.2% discount.

Sheep shearing is springtime task

With an estimated 10,000 or more head of sheep in Floyd County, it is time to shear sheep. Before shearing can begin the weather must cooperate. It needs to be warm and dry so that the sheep can adjust to being without their coat of wool.

The shearers first shave the under sides and legs of the sheep. Then the legs are tied together with a leather strap to inhibit activity and kicking the shearers. The body is then sheared. It takes a good shearer 3-5 minutes to shear a full grown sheep. Special attention must be paid around the ears and face to keep from cutting the sheep. The wool comes off the sheep in a layer that is then rolled and put in bags.

After the wool is put in bags, it is packed down. The different kinds of wool are kept separate for a better market price when sold. Most herdsmen find immediately following the shearing a good time to work the lambs.

Since there are no wool or sheep markets in this area, both the sheep and wool must be transported elsewhere for sale. Markets are located in Brownwood, Roswell, New Mexico, and San Angelo, one of the largest markets in the United States.

When the wool is processed, grease from the wool is extracted. From this wool grease we get lanolin used in medical creams and cosmetics. The wool is used in many aspects of the clothing industry.

Special people need Medic Alert

The week of April 3-9 marks national Medic Alert Week. The purpose of this week is to acquaint people with the purpose of the Medic Alert Foundation.

The foundation's main purpose is to let people with special medical problems know that there is a way to let emergency personnel know any medical problem one may have if the need should arise in case of unconsciousness or other emergency situations. The Medic Alert system entails either carrying a card or wearing special jewelry that can alert medical personnel to a special medical problem such as diabetes, heart conditions, epilepsy, or an allergy to penicillin. Therefore, if you are in an accident or are unconscious and are unable to tell someone of any special problem, they may be able to read the card or jewelry you have and be able to know how to deal with your problems. Not being able to provide doctors with information can slow down treatment. The cards which are carried provide medical information and a signature that authorizes surgery if necessary.

The Medic Alert emblems, which are worn, are engraved with the medical problem, an individual membership number and a toll-free number of the emergency answering service. If you

require medical attention from a doctor other than the one you normally use he can phone the emergency number and within 30 seconds can have your medical information.

The Medic Alert system is an excellent way for people who are frequent travelers, elderly people and people who encounter special problems on the job to relay medical information which they might not be able to relay to medical personnel. Since there are some 200 special or hidden medical problems that, left unknown, could either slow down medical treatment or endanger life if undetected.

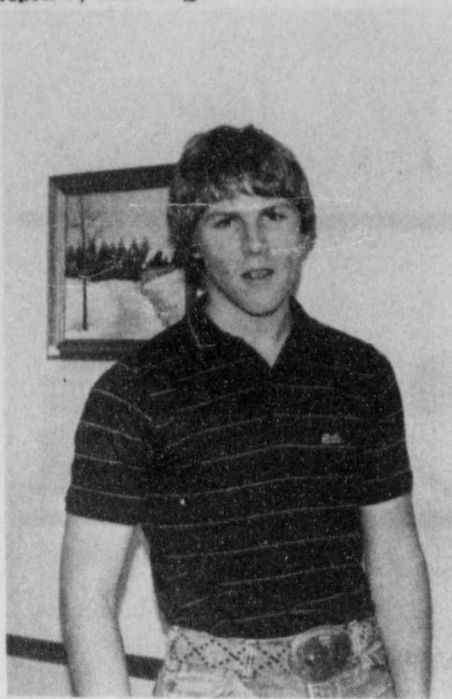
There are other reasons for joining Medic Alert such as: if you wish to be an organ donor or if you wear contact lenses. Hypoglycemics, allergic reactions to codeine, insect bites, morphine, and many other problems are reasons to consider Medic Alert.

Medic Alert jewelry can be purchased at many drug stores without joining the foundation, but these do not have a membership number which links your emblem to your personal history in the Medic Alert computer.

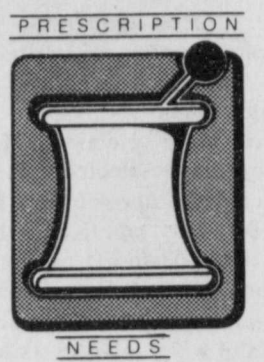

Perspectives

Somewhere in the United States there is a young man \$210,000 richer because he now looks normal. Sound ridiculous? It is. Seems that a young man who had been heavily into bodybuilding as a teen-ager, winning several awards, had a collision with a school bus operated by a private school. The young man was riding a motorcycle and broke his hip in the accident. He sued the school because he says that he is no longer able to lift the large amounts of weight he used to build his body to Olympian perfection, and now looks normal.

The jury that tried the case found that the man was 40% at fault in the accident, and awarded him only \$210,000 of the 350,000 dollars he had asked for. It should be noted that the person in question is able to function perfectly normal, he just cannot lift as much weight as before.

Pictures of the man's award winning form were shown to the jury and the man's attorney made what must have been an impassioned argument about taking pleasure and enjoyment of bodybuilding out of the young man's life. How terrible that he should be left to be only normal!

This case probably should have been laughed out of court. At very best, I would have only given the guy an award of about \$70,000. (I figure his 40% fault cancels out part of the bus driver's leaving 20% of the fault to be awarded in money penalties.) If that seems silly then it is no more silly than the case itself.

Had the man in question been disabled in a way which would have prevented him from functioning normally in society, earning a living, or had the accident severely restricted his abilities to gain enjoyment from the pursuit of

any kind of recreation at all, then perhaps he would have a point. But to simply be somewhat restricted in the pursuit of a pleasure which contributes little to anything except to make him look abnormal (what he is really admitting weight lifting did for him) is not the kind of thing that ought to be seriously considered by a judicial system which is already overloaded.

I suspect that all that really suffered was a man's self esteem. He had used a particular method of gaining attention. Now he will get attention because of the case, or because he has money. He would do better to learn how to live with himself with those sorts of gimmicks.

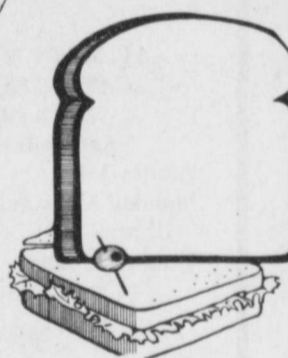

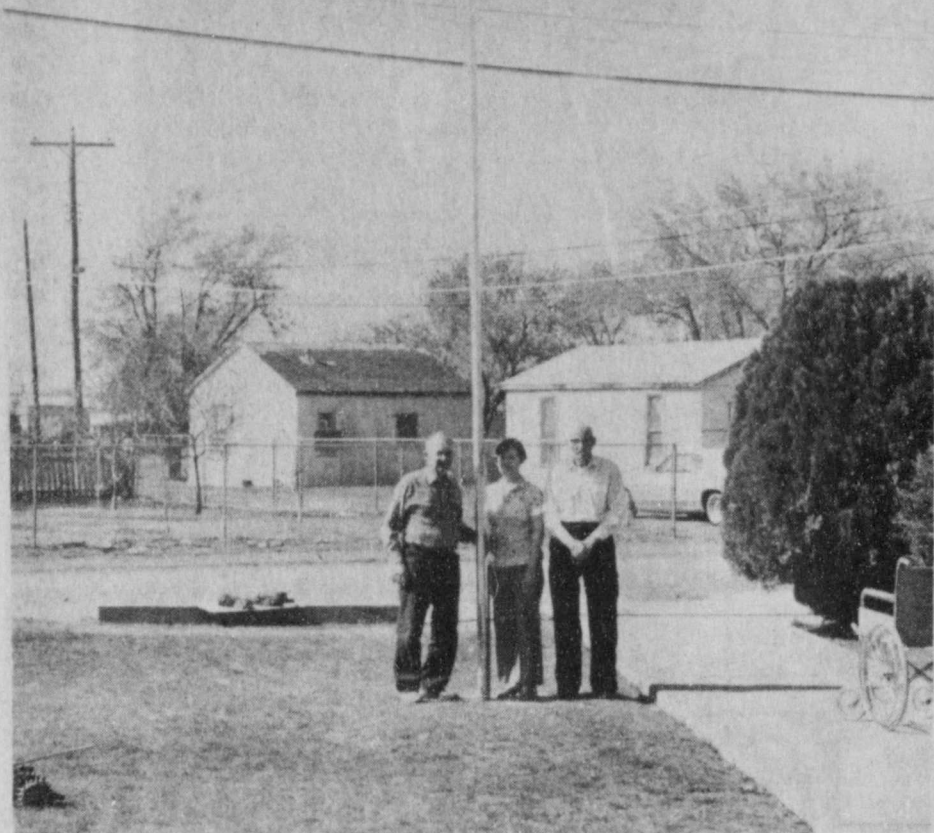

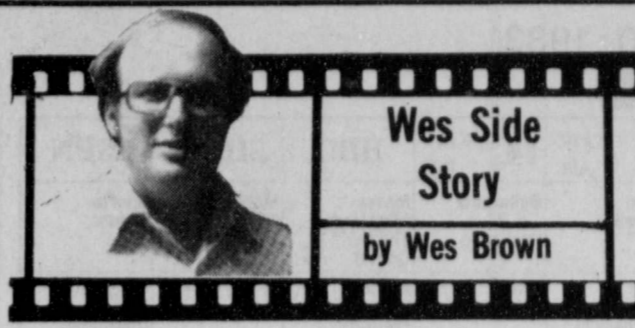
