Following the invocation by Russell Ford a meal of enchiladas was served. Cindy Ford's homemaking girls helped serve.

The special guests at the banquet were introduced by Keith Hight. They included Mr. and Mrs. Dub Hallmark, principal James Poole, Eddie Foster, Mr. and Mrs. Keith Jackson, Cindy Cantrell and Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Williams.

The Juniors

Newly-passed hospital regulations introduced

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of Lockney General Hospital District was held on Tuesday, April 26, at 7 p.m. in the hospital board room.

Members present were R.D. (Rusty) Baccus, president; Kenneth Tate, vice-president; George Sparkman, secretary; Hubert Frizzell and Larry Golden, Guy Hazlett, II, administrator, was also present.

The previous meeting minutes were approved as corrected.

The administrator announced to the Board that a new set of Medicare Hospital Reimbursement regulations had been passed into law by the U.S. House and Senate and are to become effective on October 1, 1983. The new regulations are an attempt of the U.S. Government to further limit hospital costs and lower hospital reimbursement under the Medicare program.

The new reimbursement regulations will be gradually phased into effect over a three (3) year period beginning October 1, 1983, and will regulate hospital reimbursement by paying hospitals a flat or fixed rate based on the patient's diagnosis rather than payment based on the actual costs of the hospital - which is currently the case. It is unclear exactly how and to what extent our local hospital will be effected financially by the new regulations. It is predicted that most of the impact of the new regulations will be felt by the larger hospitals and hospitals with higher than average operating costs.

The March business office report showed that 75 out of the 2050 March clinic visits were new patients. Also, the business office reported that 106 new patient admissions (patients never before admitted to the hospital) were processed for the period January 1, 1983 through April 20, 1983.

The Dietary department reported securing a new discount purchasing agreement with White Swan which will save the hospital several thousands of dollars annually on its food and dietary supply costs.

Nursing reported an average daily census of 12.5 patients (adult) and 1.9

newborns for March, producing a total average daily census of 14.4 patients.

The Board reviewed and discussed the administrator's written recommendations for re-instatement of a physical therapy service within the hospital for both inpatient and outpatient treatment. The hospital previously had physical therapy service provided under a contract arrangement through a contractor. Under the proposed re-instatement, the administrator reported that the service would be provided by a Licensed Physical Therapist hired directly by the hospital at a savings over a contract service. The Board unanimously approved the recommendation which proposed re-instatement of the service on or about October 1, 1983.

The Board authorized the administrator to spend up to \$550 for improvements to the loading dock area of the hospital located at the West Dietary department entrance.

The Board reviewed a proposal and estimate presented by Board President R.D. (Rusty) Baccus involving the paving of the hospital's south parking lot. The Board authorized the administrator to publish a request for bids. If the bids are accepted, it is estimated that the project will be completed by early June, 1983.

The administrator explained to the Board the mechanics of a proposed new check verification service known as "TeleCheck". The service involves computer verification of checks over the telephone. The service identifies high-risk personal checks. The "TeleCheck" network is nation-wide and also includes data from Canada. The intended purpose of the service is to decrease the hospital's exposure to "bad checks."

The proposal received unanimous approval of the Board and will be implemented within the next several weeks.

At the end of the administrator's report, the Board President made the following committee appointments for the period April of 1983 to April 1984:

Building and Grounds Committee: George Sparkman, Chairman and Larry

Golden, member; Finance Committee: Hubert Frizzell, Chairman and Kenneth Tate, member; Liaison Committee: Rusty Baccus, chairman, William Mangold, M.D., member, and Guy Hazlett, II, member.

The administrator's report was concluded with a lengthy written proposal and analysis favoring automated date processing for the hospital. After review and discussion, the Board tabled the recommendation for further study during the coming meetings.

Under new business, the Board reviewed the March financial statement and the year-to-date financial summary for the first 6 months of the fiscal year which began October 1, 1982. The March financial statement showed a gain of \$18,012.98 (revenue in excess of expenses), bringing the fiscal year to

date loss down to \$45,464.61.

Fiscal year to date revenues totaled \$525,049.47 and fiscal year to date expenses totaled \$570,514.08.

Total patient days for the first six months of the fiscal year totaled 2,008, which was very close to the 2,020 estimated for 54% of the years total patient days which fall in the first six months.

March cash collections totaled \$127,039.07, a new all time record for a calendar month for the hospital; comparing with \$98,873.38, March of 1982.

Hospital collections showed 102.0% for the month of March, showing the effect of the collections effort on past due accounts.

The next Board meeting date was tentatively set for Tuesday, May 17, 1983.
