Board sets transfer rate

The Lockney School Board met Tuesday, May 10, for a regular business meeting. President Eddie Foster called the meeting to order at 7:30. All members of the board were present and all three school principals and Coach Purser were also present, along with Superintendent W.H. Hallmark.

Following the invocation by Jim Bob Martin, the minutes of the last meeting were read and approved and payment of all current bills and investments were approved. Tax report #8 showed that 99.5% of the budget money was collected. The report was approved.

During the superintendent's report, portions of the 83-84 budget were discussed as well as the school stands for the 82-83 budget. During the principal's report each of the principals discussed any changes that would have to be made should the State Board of Education adopt a core curriculum which states that every school in Texas would teach all the same subjects for the same amount of hours. The change would mean that any student in Texas, no matter where they attend school would have the same classes and for the same amount of hours.

The main changes for the Lockney schools would occur in the junior high and high school levels. The junior high would have to implement a longer health class and science lab. The high school would have to offer a fine arts class, which could be music of some kind or a theater arts class. One more

math would be required to graduate. If approved by the state this plan would go into effect in the fall semester of 1984.

After the principals report Coach Purser discussed the school athletic insurance program but the matter was tabled until further information was

The board approved a bid of \$11,702.50 from Fred Lipham Paving to do repair and paving work on all of the school system parking lots with the exception of the dirt parking lot on the north side of the high school science building.

The transfer students for the 1983-84 year were approved and the transfer fee for these 11 students was set at \$30 per student, per month.

The only bid for the 1983-84 and 84-85 bank depository was from the First National Bank of Lockney and the board accepted the bid.

The board set the fee for the summer drivers education courses at \$75.00 per student. The classes will only be offered if 20 or more students are interested. The resignations of Martha Millhol-

len, junior high science teacher, and Sheri Haynes were accepted by the The board also accepted a bid of \$5,000 from Bill Hunter to replace

with flourescent light fixtures. The work

will be done through the summer

months while school is out. The meeting adjourned at 12:00 p.m.

Results of the 1983 TABS test released

During the meeting of the Lockney School Board May 10 elementary school principal R.L. Knox presented the school board with the results of the TABS test which the students took in February of this year. The tests were given to students in the third, fifth and ninth grades.

The results showed increases in all areas for each grade. The increases were from 1%-11%. The tests have three sections for each grade, math, reading, and writing. The TABS test is designed to test the students basic skills in each subject area to reflect if they are comprehending what they are learning.

The results for the Lockney students tested were above last year's state level, K-8 and if the score in the grade

averages and above or equal to all others in our district.

During this discussion Mr. Knox stated that each student from kindergarten through the eighth grade will have in his or her report card a copy of a computer print out with the students scores of the Metropolitan Achievement Test. Through this printout parents will have the opportunity to find out how students stand in their grade level.

On this printout there are three subjects listed, math, reading, and language. On the fifth line of the sheet is the grade equivalent for each of the three subjects. In order to find out how your child stands for his grade, in each of the subjects take the childs grade

equivalent line is 0.7 for kindergarten to 8.7 for the eight grade the child is at the recommended level for his or her grade. If the score is below the .7 level then

the student could be having trouble for that particular subject. If you have any questions about the scores call the student's principal.







The Future of **Telephone Rates**

As Southwestern Bell prepares itself to be a stand-alone company in 1984—separate from AT&T - many of you, no doubt, have been wondering what's going to happen to telephone rates.

Will they go up? How much? Will you have to pay twice as much for phone service as you now do?

While it's impossible to answer those questions definitively, it is possible to give you an idea of where rates are headed ... and why.

Local service rates will probably go up

For example, the rate you presently pay for local service will-in all probability-go up. This is primarily due to the fact that local service, for the most part, has been priced well below its cost. The average statewide cost to Southwestern Bell for keeping a residential line in service is about \$30 per month. On the other hand, the average monthly rate our customers pay ranges from \$7.85 to \$10.75. This \$20 or more difference between cost and rates has been made up primarily by revenues from long distance service and

telephone equipment. However, since most of those revenues will not be available to Southwestern Bell after divestiture, local service will have to be priced more closely to its cost.

In turn, though, the rates of long distance and other services which have subsidized local service may go down.

Other factors which will contribute to higher local rates include our need to more quickly recover our investment in equipment and facilities, and the effects that are still being felt from past inflation.

To help offset the rise in local rates. Southwestern Bell wants to offer customers more pricing plans so that they will have more control over what they pay for local service. We are working closely with regulators not only to develop pricing options that will fit almost every pocketbook: but also to keep telephone service one of the best consumer values around.

Effects of divestiture to be studied by PUC

As you may be aware, the Texas Public Utility Commission next month will begin general hearings to examine how divestiture will affect Texas ratepayers. There are a lot of questions and potential problems to be solved. But by cooperating and working together with regulators, we feel we can work out the best solutions, in the long run. for all concerned.





The solitary life: a difficult adjustment

When I first started living alone, it nice if I didn't have to make the choice wasn't an easy adjustment. Whenever the phone rang, I would yell "I'll get it." I would realize then I was the only one there to answer it. Feeling a little foolish, I answered the phone.

Invariably, if the caller knew me, after my "Hello" I would hear "Wes?" as though the caller was expecting someone else to answer.

The people who sell various things over the telephone don't seem to understand people who live alone. One such caller asked if the lady of the house

"There is no lady of the house." The caller paused as if trying to figure this

"What about the gentleman of the house?'

"Well, I am the only person living here so that must be me." Again a pause as if the caller was trying to make up his mind whether or not to finish the

I get the same problem with junk mail. Every now and then I get some that is addressed to "Mrs. Wes Brown." I never really knew what to do with that kind of mail. I couldn't open it or throw it away because it wasn't addressed to me. I could save it until I did get married, but that is not in the near future.

Cooking for one person is a little different. Besides the quantity of food, the whole process from planning to cleanup is done by one person. That is probably why I hate to cook. It would be

to decide what was to be cooked. I've tried to surprise myself, but it doesn't

I am the only one who has to eat what I cook. If I goof up the meal, I have to eat it. I don't even have a dog to give the mistakes to.

The cleanup part is not much fun either. After eating a meal the last thing I want to face is the dirty dishes. More than once I have done kitchen work late that night or the next day. Plates are easy to clean. I wait until I have used the last clean plate, then I open a new

To avoid the mess of cooking, I eat out. But, that wasn't designed for someone who lives alone. About halfway through my meal at a restaurant, I notice the other tables had groups of two or more people. I start feeling self conscious so now I get take out orders.

Food is not the only thing, specials on soap, laundry detergent and paper products are cheaper when bought by the family size. The smaller, single person sized products are more expensive. I don't understand this.

Grocery stores aren't the only ones who advertise specials that are not for people who live alone. Some pizza places advertise "buy one pizza, the second is half price." I just wish they would give me the first one at half price.

Living alone isn't all bad, it does have its advantages. For example, I am not the best housekeeper in the world. Since no one else lives with me, there is no one to complain about the way I keep house. That is, no one unless someone comes by to see me.

Also I can watch any television show I want without having an argument. Of course, there aren't too many TV shows worth arguing over. I could watch as late as I wanted, but going to work the next day limits my nighttime hours.

One of the biggest advantages is the independence. I can come and go when I please. I don't very often because I am always afraid the phone will ring and no one would be there to answer it.





Floyd County Farm Bureau News

Several Bill are now pending before congress, which will affect all Floyd County farmers, ranchers and agri-businessmen. Floyd County Farm Bureau would like you to be aware of these bills and hope you would write or call your congressman about them.

Daylight Savings Time HR 1398 provides that daylight savings time would begin on the first Sunday in May, rather than on the last Sunday of April, extending the length of Davlight Savings time by two months. This bill has been favorably reported out of committee and action is expected by June 1. Farm Bueau policy read: "Daylight Savings Time should be limited to a period between Memorial Day and Labor Day. We oppose efforts to Extend the present length of Daylight Savings Time.

Expanding Agricultural Exports: Now pending before the U.S. Senate is a comprehensive export promotion Bill, S 822, which contains the following major

1. An export PIK (Payment in Kind) program to authorize the giving of "Bonus" commodities to foreign purchasers who buy more from us than they have in the past.

2. Make CCC commodities available to exporters so they can meet subsidized sompetition.

3. Urges increased us of "Blended Interest Credit" to gain new customer, and to counter subsidized competition.

4. Urges that not less than \$1 billion be made available to the export credit revolving fund authorized by the 1981

5. Expands food for peace (P.L. 480) programs, and broadens the present law which governs donations of dairy surpluses to include donations of other commodities.

6. Exempts exports financed under the blended interest credit program and export PIK sales from cargo preference requirements.

However, The House Agriculture Committee has not moved to develop and act on similar legislation. Aparrently. The committee has adopted a wait and see attitude, prefering to see how successful the domestic PIK program is before acting on an export PIK.

We believe that every effort should be made as quickly as possible to expand agricultural export markets.

Plan Now For Grassbur Prevention

Grassburs can be a problem in lawns damaged or weakened by droughts. insects or diseases. They are unsightly and can even be dangerous, especially if you have small children. Now is the time to start planning for grassbur prevention.

Grassburs are commonly found in open fields and meadows where competition from other plants is not great; they are rarely found in a dense, vigorous turf. But when the turf is damaged or weakened, grassburs often

Seed (burs) from this pest may lie dormant in the soil for several years until environmental conditions favor germination.

Once they get started, where there were only a few plants one year, there may be hundreds of grassbur plants the following year.

All the grassbur needs to become a problem is a weak turf and favorable moisture conditions during late spring and early summer. Plants may go unnoticed most of the summer but once burs develop, they're unavoidable.

It takes a good management program to eliminate grassburs. This includes applying a preemerge herbicide in the spring for weed control before emergence of grassburs.

Herbicides or fertilizer-herbicide (weed and feed) combinations contain-

ing benefin (Balan), DCPA (Dacthal), oxadiazon (Ronstar) or simazine are effective against grassburs if the timing and rate of application are correct. As for all pesticites, closely follow label instructions.

In bermudagrass laws, postemerge herbicides can be used for grassbur control. These include products containing one of the organic arsenical herbicides, such as Ortho's Crabgrass Killer, Diamond Shamrock's Liquid DSMA, and Amchem's Weedone Crabgrass Killer.

Of course, herbicides only provide a temporary solution to the grassbur problem. A healthy, vigorous turf is the ultimate solution. Regular mowing and proper fertilizing, watering, and pest control are all required for satisfactory control of grassburs.
