Lockneyites to hear talk on dumping

Friday, May 27, the Rotary International meeting will feature speaker Delbert Diven. Mr. Diven is a representative of STAND (Serious Texans Against Nuclear Dumping) who will speak on the effects of nuclear dumping in the Panhandle. He will be able to answer any questions anyone might have on the subject.

STAND was formed in November of 1981 when concerned citizens of the Swisher County area foresaw dangers and hazards to present and future generations of the area. There are many oppositions to putting a nuclear waste dump in this area.

A bedded salt site in the Texas Panhandle will be officially chosen by the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) by June 1983 as one of five potential locations for the nation's first commercial nuclear waste repository. The site will be in either northeastern Deaf Smith County or north central Swisher County. If selected as the disposal site, up to 70,000 metric tons of spent fuel, the equivalent of what the 70 operating nuclear power plants produce in 50 years, would be transported across the country to the west Texas site.

Specific Issues Related to the Texas Site

Although DOE has determined that bedded salt formations surface, are potential repository horizons and has spent over \$25 million on work in west Texas, various technical issues are unresolved.

1) **Inadequate salt thickness in Swisher County.** Salt at least 200 feet thick is preferred, though DOE's screening criterion is 125 feet thick in Texas. The December 1981 Draft Area Geological Characterization Report showed that Swisher County preferred areas do not have salt even 70 feet thick.

2) **Salt dissolution, especially in Deaf Smith County.** Salt being dissolved by water is an unfavorable condition for burying nuclear waste. Such dissolution has occurred in the Seven Rivers salt formation above the proposed repository horizons in Deaf Smith County.

3) **Salt depth and strength.** Salt is relatively easy to mine at shallow depths, deeper salt closes up, making mining and retrieval of wastes, should that be necessary, very difficult. The Texas Panhandle salt may not allow a repository below 2,500 feet deep, which eliminates Swisher County completely as well as portions of Deaf Smith County.

4) **Faults and seismic activities.** One significant fault or fault zone has been identified running northwest through Swisher County. Other faults are possible and rock fractures (lineaments) exist throughout the area.

5) **Potential contamination of the Ogallala aquifer.** This essential resource for millions of people could be contaminated by leakage from the repository resulting from the five shafts going through the Ogallala to the repository. Additionally, water from the Ogallala flowing down to the repository could accelerate dissolution.

6) **Impact on private agricultural land.** Deaf Smith and Swisher counties are among the leading agricultural counties in Texas. A waste repository would require condemnation of at least 4,000 acres of land. The WIPP military waste site in New Mexico covers over 10,000 acres. The value of surrounding farm land could decrease because of concern about possible contamination from accidents at the repository or during transportation of the wastes.

7) **Inability to scientifically compare Texas to other salt sites.** Though a sound scientific, publicly acceptable and legally adequate waste management program requires that comparable technical information is available on all of the potential sites, less data is available on the Texas sites than on the other salt areas.

Though the possible site of the dump is not in Floyd County, it could effect the water in this county and could have other unknown effects on our county. Anyone interested in hearing Mr. Diven speak is urged to attend the meeting at the Rebekah Lodge at 12:20 to hear this informative meeting.


Following an address to the graduates by Mr. Hallmark, superintendent

Dr Gary meets requirements

Dr. Gary B. Mangold of Lockney has completed continuing education requirements to retain active membership in the American Academy of Family Physicians, the national association of family doctors. The Academy formerly was called the American Academy of General Practice.

The requirements call for members to complete a minimum of 150 hours of accredited continuing medical study every three years. Members become eligible for re-election at the end of the third year following their election to membership. The Academy, the country's second largest national medical association, was the first national medical group to require members to keep up with medical progress through continuing education.

The Academy, founded in 1947 and headquartered in Kansas City, Mo., was instrumental in the establishment of a new primary specialty in family practice in 1969. The new specialty is expected to increase the number of family physicians available to serve the public in the future. The Academy's continuing education program is the foundation of eligibility for family doctors now in practice who apply for certification in the new specialty.
