five percent shouldn't be applied to puppies or young kittens.

Severe tick infestations may require
three applications at seven- to 10 -day intervals to obtain a adequate control.
If a tick becomes attached remove it bith a slow, steady the skin.

 Always apply an antiseptic to tick bites. If your hands touch the tick, wash hem thoroughly with soap and water On a positive note. once ticks are
controlled around your home. you are
