Two local men held on rape charges

On Wednesday, May 25, an alleged rape occurred in Floyd County. The rape was reported about 10:00 Wednesday night. Sheriff's deputy Olan Potet transported the victim, a 22 year old white female, Lockney resident, to Lockney General Hospital. She was then transferred to Lubbock General Hospital. The victim was escorted to Lubbock by Chief of Police, Bill McConnell.

Within hours of the alleged incident the police had arrested two Spanish-American males, both in their early twenty's, both local residents. Police Chief McConnell stated that charges have been filed against both men and are presently being held in the Floyd County jail in lieu of \$50,000 bond each.

McConnell also stated that police deputy Charles Higgs, sheriff's deputy Olan Potet and McConnell are continuing the investigation of the alleged incident.

The Lockney Police Department is also investigating a burglary at the San Jose Church. The burglary occurred last Tuesday night. Three inner doors of the church were kicked in and several musical instruments were taken from the church. Several leads on the burglary are being checked out at the present time.

Ervie Muse among early Floyd County settlers

Ervie Muse arrived in Floyd County on December 9, 1925 for the first time. He traveled on an immigrant boxcar from Frisco, Texas, bringing his father's horses, mules, and a Fordson tractor.

When the Muse family were preparing to put their animals and the tractor on the boxcar, they were told by the railroad that they could not put the tractor on the train because of its weight. They had a friend who was a railroad agent at the Frisco station. He told them what he didn't see loaded he was not responsible for, so they loaded the tractor on the train and covered it with sacks of oats.

Muse also carried a beehive, covered with wire, with him on the train. Muse's family, set out in a wagon to Floydada.

Upon arrival in Floydada the boxcar was weighed and they had to pay weight fines (because of the tractor). When they unloaded the horses and mules, they were so stiff they were hardly able to untrack. They filed a claim with the railroad for damages on the animals, and the railroad adjuster settled with them for more than enough money to cover the cost of the train trip from Frisco.

The Muse family settled 5 1/2 miles north of Floydada. The Texas Land Development Company, landowner, built two houses on the 1120 acres for all of the family to live in. Muse stayed with his family for 3 1/2 years. When his brothers began to marry and the family needed more room, he and his wife bought a farm northwest of Lockney, near the land John T. Carthel farms now. While there he purchased a new Model T Ford.

Also while on this farm, he was given a small puppy able to fit in a small shoe box, but quickly outgrew this. Muse taught Sport that when someone knocked on the front door, he was to attack the leg of the person knocking. Muse taught the dog this because of a persistent crop insurance salesman who refused to take "no" for an answer.

One day he called at the house, met Sport, and never returned.

Muse said that his family's crops were good in the 1930's. They got 30 cents a bushel for wheat and \$6.30 per 100 pounds of cotton.

He farmed northwest of Lockney until 1940 when he sold his farm to J.R. Belt, who was just beginning at the time.

Muse moved back home with his parents for six months and then returned to Desoto near Frisco. He farmed 260 acres for a year until the owner, a Dallas banker went bankrupt.

While still near Dallas, Muse met a man who was so impressed with him that he purchased land for him to manage. The man built new barns on the land, furnished new equipment, and anything else needed. He bought laying hens and milk cows. When the eggs and milk were ready for sale, Mr. Martin, the owner, would take the products to Dallas to sell them.

This was during the Depression and steel and gas were just a few of the scarcities. However, Mr. Martin arranged that Muse had anything he needed. They even buried a 500 gallon gas tank on the farm for their use.

Muse stayed in the Dallas area until 1945 when his family asked him to come back to Floyd County.

He farmed east of Plainview for several years. In 1961 he married his present wife Oneva. In 1963 he suffered a heart attack and was sent to Houston for open heart surgery. He returned to Plainview and farming for his sister upon recovery. In 1974 he managed a farm in Bovina belonging to his nephew for a year until the doctor told him to stop or he would have another attack.

He and Oneva lived in Plainview for 13 months and then Muse went to work for the Tye Company where he worked until July, 1979.

Since then he and his wife enjoy spending time with their grandchildren, nieces and nephews in their leisure time.

Season football tickets on sale

Preparations for Texas production underway

Preparations for the 18th opening of the musical drama "Texas" are underway.

"Texas", written by Pulitzer Prize winning playwright Paul Green, was first performed in 1966. The drama recreates the story of settling in the Texas Panhandle in the 1880's.

One of the highlights of the show is the spectacular sound and lighting effects during the storm portion of the show. If rain does not cause any of the shows to close, lightning will strike 59 times in Palo Duro Canyon this year. The lightning storm is just one of the carefully executed effects of the show. One of the other special sequences is the prairie fire in the show. Both of these special parts show some of the harshness and severity that the early settlers faced in the early days of settling this area.

The cast and crew of the show is made up of 145 members who are mostly college students who are selected at auditions held in Dallas, Austin, Lubbock, Albuquerque, and Canyon each year.

The play is not only of interest to Texans but people from all over the world as well. In 1982, 88,182 people viewed the production. This included

people from all 50 states and 84 foreign countries.

The cast began rehearsals on May 22. They learn dance steps, solos, and speaking parts. While the cast is rehearsing the crew must put up lights, put up sets, and install and check sound equipment. Wardrobe people are also hard at work to check dress sizes, hats, shoes and boot sizes to be sure everything is just right for the 80 performers in the show.

In the 17 years prior only 24 of the 986 performances have been lost to rain. Since the Amphitheatre is located well above the water line of Palo Duro Canyon, theatre patrons need have no fear of being caught in the canyon due to flooding.

Performances will begin on June 15 and run through August 20 this year. The shows will be on Monday-Saturday with the only Sunday performance being on July 3. Tickets may be reserved by calling 806-655-2181, or at 2010-4th Avenue, Canyon, or by writing P.O. Box 268, Canyon, Texas 79015. The Beacon has mail in reserve seat orders for anyone wishing to mail in orders.

Palo Duro Canyon has camping facilities with water, electrical, and disposal hookups and restrooms.

FARM NEWS

Ag receipts down in Texas

Total cash receipts from farm and ranch products in Texas were down about \$1 billion—or 9 percent—last year compared to 1981.

Cash receipts from agricultural production last year are estimated at almost \$9.6 billion based on figures compiled by Dr. Carl Anderson, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

"This total figure is based on input from county Extension agents and Extension economists from the various regions of the state," says Anderson. The total estimate does not include government payments.

"1982 was obviously a tough year for Texas farmers and ranchers due to the general downturn in economic conditions and poor farm prices that resulted from huge stockpiles of agricultural

commodities," notes Anderson. "Weather losses also were heavy in some areas, particularly in the South Plains where hail destroyed more than half the cotton crop."

Cotton led the decline in cash receipts from crops, which totaled almost \$3.8 billion compared to the previous year's \$4.6 billion. Cotton receipts dropped from \$1.4 billion in '81 to \$875 million last year.

Sales of food grain crops, mainly rice and wheat, were down almost \$300 million at \$739 million. Feed crops—corn, grain sorghum, oats, barley, hay and ensilage—sold for just over \$1 billion, down only slightly from 1981 levels.

Oil crops—soybeans, peanuts, sunflowers, guar and flax—contributed \$228 million to last year's receipts—up moderately from the previous year.

Receipts from vegetables were at \$364 million while sales of fruits and nuts added another \$83 million; both of these categories of crops had reduced sales last year.

Sales of all other crops totaled \$412 million, up from \$339 million in 1981.

Sales of livestock products contributed most to the overall agricultural receipts in Texas last year—more than \$5.1 billion although the total was down \$300 million from '81. This included the sale of meat animals, dairy products, poultry and eggs, and various other livestock products, such as wool and mohair.

Cash receipts from cattle and calves alone totaled \$3.8 billion or 40 percent of the state's agricultural sales.

Hog sales totaled \$113 million while sheep and goats contributed another \$65 million.

Sales of dairy products amounted to some \$545 million while poultry and eggs kicked in another \$514 million.

The sharpest increase in cash receipts came from farm-based timber, horses, fish farming, hunting leases, farm pond leases and recreation. Receipts in these areas jumped from \$581 million in 1981 to \$724 million last year.

"Despite the economic woes in agriculture in 1982, Texas continues to rank third in the nation, behind California and Iowa, in total cash receipts," says Anderson. "The \$9.6 billion in agricultural receipts has a tremendous effect on the Texas economy to the tune of about \$35 billion in economic activity."

Looking to the future, the economist sees some encouraging signs for farmers and ranchers. "Farm prices and incomes will improve as supplies decrease and demand increases," says Anderson. "Hopefully, the PIK program will be successful in reducing the level of surplus commodities. In addition, production costs should be fairly stable through 1983, and reduced interest and inflation rates should also help the farm economy."

Estate Tax exemption is supported

The Floyd County Farm Bureau is working to preserve the Economic Recovery Act of 1981 by opposing efforts to freeze the estate tax exemption at its present level of \$275,000, according to Dan Smith of Lockney, president of the Floyd County Farm Bureau.

Floyd County Farm Bureau supports completion of the estate tax exemption phase-in which would increase the exemption to \$600,000 in 1987.

Floyd County Farm Bureau also opposes repeal of the third-year of the income tax cut due to go into effect on July 1 and objects to the repeal of the indexing provision of the Economic Recovery Act of 1981.

The Congressional budget office claims that estates of more than \$250,000 belong only to the "very wealthy taxpayers." A farmer whose land is worth \$1,000 an acre would only need 250 acres to have an estate that large. However, the average farm in the U.S. today is slightly over 400 acres.

Moreover, that figure does not take into account the value of the farm's equipment and buildings, which for some farmers could easily approach \$1 million.

Meanwhile, an average return of three to four percent per acre would mean a farmer might net under \$10,000 in a good year. The heirs of such a farmer would have had to pay \$70,800 in estate taxes prior to the 1981 Economic Recovery Act.

The 1981 act addressed a real problem facing a family farm's heirs: the debilitating estate tax burdens resulting from land values inflating an average of 13 percent a year during the 1970's.

It was observed that one Texas rancher explained it best when he said:

Immigration bill upheld by supporters

On Wednesday, May 18, the U.S. Senate passed S.529, the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1983, by a vote of 76 to 18. Senator Tower voted against the bill. Senator Bentsen voted for it.

Floyd County Farm Bureau and Texas Farm Bureau are working to secure sponsors and votes for amendments to soften the impact of this bill on agriculture, but chances of passing such amendments are not very good.

Dan Smith, President of Floyd County Farm Bureau is urging farmers to write your Congressman asking him to vote for amendments to H.R. 1510, which would soften its impact on farmers and ranchers, and on agriculture in general, and Vote against the bill if amendments are not adopted to correct the severe employer sanction provisions, or to provide a workable guest worker or

TICK PROBLEMS BLOSSOM IN SPRING

Ticks are already an early problem across much of Texas this Spring. A relatively mild winter probably was responsible for better than average survival of ticks in our area. More problems are expected.

Ticks are biting, blood-sucking parasites, the agent explained. Their feeding results in blood loss and irritation to pets and to people, and the possible spread of diseases.

The most important disease transmitted by ticks is Rocky Mountain spotted fever. Two deaths from this disease have already been recorded this year in Texas.

The brown dog tick is the most common tick around home landscapes in this area. They are reddish-brown in color.

A female tick can lay several thousand eggs, beginning a two- or four-month life cycle. Ticks require four blood meals: three to grow to adults and one to lay eggs. After each feeding, the tick drops off the host animal and hides temporarily until the next growth stage. Tick control requires treatment at three sites simultaneously. The pet, the yard and the interior of the home must each be treated at the same time. This is the only way to break the cycle.

Heavy infestations in the home probably will require the assistance of professional pest control operators. The inside of the home can be treated with sprays containing diazinon, ronnel, or Dursban. Particular attention must be paid to nooks and crevices where ticks hide.

Outside the home, diazinon, Sevin or Dursban can be used. Pay particular attention to areas frequented by pets, such as dog houses and trails along fences.

Pets are the third site which must be treated to succeed in tick control. Light infestations can be controlled by rubbing Sevin dust into the pet's hair. Formulations of Sevin dust greater than five percent shouldn't be applied to puppies or young kittens.

Severe tick infestations may require three applications at seven- to 10-day intervals to obtain adequate control.

If a tick becomes attached to the skin, remove it with a slow, steady pull. Be careful not to break off its mouthparts.

A drop of chloroform, isopropyl alcohol, ether, acetone, or fingernail

polish rubbed over the tick may help remove it. It can be removed a half-hour later with less damage to the skin because its oxygen supply is cut off.

Always apply an antiseptic to tick bites. If your hands touch the tick, wash them thoroughly with soap and water to reduce the risk of spreading disease.

On a positive note, once ticks are controlled around your home, you are unlikely to be reinfested unless tick-infested animals enter the yard, bringing new pests with them.
