



# Dimmitt suffers fourth Vietnam war casualty

Dimmitt mourned the loss of another of her servicemen this week as funeral rites were held for Pvt. Lonzo McDonald, 21, who was killed in a Viet Cong ambush Aug. 8.

**HE WAS the fourth Dimmitt man** to die in Vietnam. Previous casualties in the Southeast Asian conflict were Naval Electronics Technician George Wall and Army Sgt. Gene Easley in 1967, and Marine Cpl. Emilio Nino Jr. in 1968.

A member of the Fourth Infantry Division, Pvt. McDonald was one of 30 American soldiers ambushed by Viet Cong forces while on a night reconnaissance mission Aug. 8. All 30 were killed.

**A HUNDRED flags flew at half** mast throughout the business district as last rites were conducted at 2:30 p.m. Tuesday in the First Baptist Church.

Dimmitt's stores closed during the funeral.

Pvt. McDonald was buried in Castro Memorial Gardens with full military honors. Soldiers from Fort Sill, Okla., made up the honor guard, color guard, rifle squad and pallbearer detail.

Dennis Funeral Home directed the services.

**PVT. McDONALD'S wife, Carolyn,** was notified of his death Wednesday night of last week. His body, with a military escort, arrived in Dimmitt Monday evening.

Pvt. McDonald's wife and two young sons, Quentin and Patrick, live with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Matthew "Mack" Daniel, 111 NE Seventh St.

Mrs. McDonald is expecting their third child next month.

## Wife charged Rumors cloud murder case

County Attorney Robert Buntyn filed murder charges against Mrs. Joyce Kemper of Nazareth Monday afternoon in a case that is bringing new complications every day.

**MRS. KEMPER, 32, is charged** with having murdered her husband of two years, Clois Wayne Kemper, 36, "voluntarily and with malice aforethought . . . by driving over him with an automobile" late last Thursday night.

The incident occurred four miles east and three south of Nazareth on a farm road near the Kempers' home.

Buntyn and Castro County sheriff's officers claim Mrs. Kemper struck and ran over her husband with the family car.

**KEMPER, a farm operator,** was pronounced dead on arrival at Swisher County Hospital shortly after the incident.

In the six days since the incident occurred, the case has involved cross-filings for administration of Kemper's estate, a false report of a gunshot wound and the alleged choking of Mrs. Kemper in her Tulsa hospital room, as well as an unrelated custody hearing on Mrs. Kemper's two adopted sons.

Sheriff Jack Cartwright said his office was notified at 11:30 p.m. Thursday and that he, Deputy Granville Martin and Highway Patrolman James Gilbreath answered the call, which they thought involved an accident.

**BUT WHEN they arrived at the scene,** Cartwright said, officers found the Kempers' automobile and pickup on the road, but Mr. and Mrs. Kemper were gone.

They learned later, Cartwright said, that Mrs. Kemper had gone to a neighbor's home to report her husband's death. The neighbors called Wallace Ambulance Service of Tulsa, which took Kemper's body to Swisher County Hospital. The neighbors also took Mrs. Kemper to the hospital behind the ambulance, Cartwright said.

After checking the scene, Cartwright called out County Attorney Buntyn and Justice of the Peace Elvon DeVaney. The officials were up all night investigating the scene and having photos taken.

**WHEN OFFICERS arrived at** Swisher County Hospital, they found Mrs. Kemper hospitalized and under sedation. Her physician told officers she had been hysterical when she arrived at the hospital.

Cartwright is keeping Mrs. Kemper under guard at the hospital and will take her into custody when she is released.

**AFTER filing a murder charge** Monday in the automobile incident, officials read in an Amarillo newspaper Tuesday that "unofficial sources say the autopsy will show whether Kemper died as the result of injuries suffered when he was struck by a car or as the result of a gunshot wound. The gunshot wound apparently was inflicted with a shotgun."

The Amarillo newspaper repeated Tuesday, "It is believed Kemper was wounded at his home and was walking toward Nazareth when he was run over by an automobile and dragged approximately 50 yards."

County officials, upset over the report, quickly denied that Kemper had been shot.

**AN AUTOPSY report was not** due until mid-afternoon Wednesday.

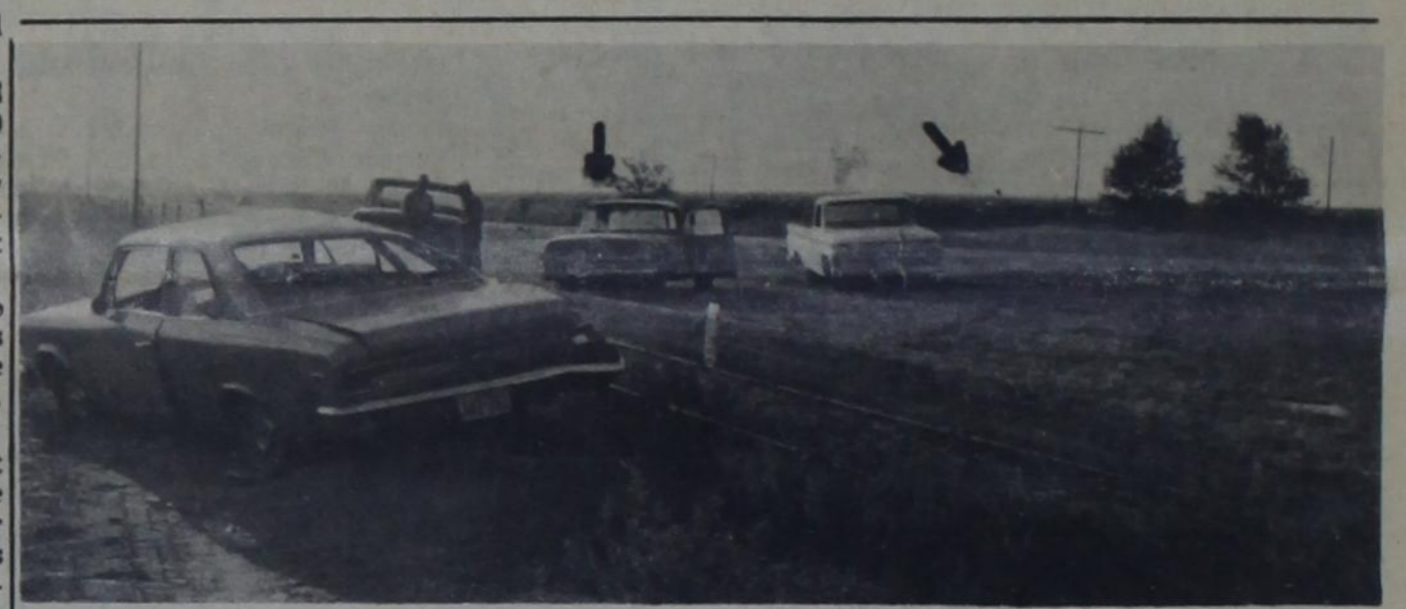
"There was no shotgun wound," Buntyn told the News Wednesday morning. "I examined the body with Deputy Rex Cowart, and he is a licensed mortician and would have noticed the wound if there had been one."

**ALTHOUGH the autopsy report** still was not complete, Buntyn said, "The report will show that the man died of massive internal hemorrhaging caused by a crushed chest and crushed internal organs, such as might be caused by a motor vehicle."

He added, "The autopsy report will also show there was not a gunshot wound."

**MONDAY NIGHT the case grew** more bizarre when Mrs. Kemper was reportedly attacked and choked in her Tulsa hospital room.

The Amarillo Globe-Times reported, "The attacker apparently attempted to strangle Mrs. Kemper."

## New 'pony express race' wins rodeo crowd's loud approval

A new rodeo event, the Pony Express Race, will become a standard feature of amateur rodeos if fans here have their way about it.

**THE TEAM race proved to be** the most popular event at the Dimmitt Amateur Rodeo, and helped bring out record crowds all three nights. It was the first time for most local rodeo-goers to see the hectic event.

The Pony Express Race is conducted between two relay teams of eight men each. The lead riders start the race in the arena, galloping around four barrels and passing their saddle bags to teammates who come charging in to the arena from the entry gate, timing their entry for a smooth handoff.

The race continues, relay style, until the final rider on each team finishes the round, rides to the center of the arena and drops the saddle bag into a bucket. The teams race for two out of three.

**THE PONY Express races** brought the crowds to their feet dozens of times during the rodeo, as riders tried to squeeze each other out during the handoffs and attempted to force each other's mounts inside the barrel barriers at the turns.

Winning the event was the cool, well-trained Tulla team, which defeated all challengers. However, the Tulla riders had a fight on their hands from a hard-charging Earth team Saturday night. Tulla won the first race, but Earth captured the second race by almost a full lap. In the deciding

## Patrol reports 10 July wrecks

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 10 accidents on rural highways in Castro County during July, according to Sgt. Vernon Cawthon, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

**THESE crashes resulted in** three persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$5,780, Sgt. Cawthon said.

The rural traffic accident summary for Castro County during the first seven months of 1969 shows a total of 53 accidents resulting in one person killed, 24 injured, and an estimated property damage of \$37,749.

**THE DIMMITT Day Care Center** for Retarded Children needs women volunteers to replace the teenage girls who have assisted Mrs. Norma Conard during the summer.

According to Mrs. Conard and her adult and teenage volunteer helpers, the work is highly rewarding.

Both regular and substitute volunteers are needed, according to Mrs. Bill Sava, who is in charge of recruiting teacher's aides for the school.

**AS A "regular" volunteer,** you would be asked to help at the school one morning or one afternoon a week for three months.

As a substitute, you would be called in when regular volunteers are not available or cannot work.

Volunteers assist in the classroom and also help conduct the children's "discovery" trips.

The local school operates as a "satellite" of the Amarillo State Center for Human Development. Under provisions of the satellite program, volunteer workers are mandatory if Dimmitt is to keep the school.

**SEVEN Castro County young-**sters attend the school on a year-round basis. Most of them have tested below the IQ level required for admission to public school special education classes.

But the center here — and a handful of others in the state — are proving that the youngsters can be trained to enjoy life and perform work that can make them self-supporting as adults, under a "sheltered" work program.

## Seat belt saves driver

A highway patrolman credited seat belts with saving a Canyon man from serious injury in a rollover accident 1 1/2 miles west of Nazareth Tuesday morning.

**PATROLMAN James Gilbreath,** who investigated, said Jimmy Allen Martin, 24, a drug products salesman from Canyon, was driving west on State 86 at 7:55 a.m. when he attempted to pass a 1962 Ford pickup driven by Raymond Frank Huseman, 17, of Nazareth.

The patrolman said Huseman, not noticing Martin's car behind him, started to turn left off the highway into a driveway.

Gilbreath said Martin swerved to the left to avoid a collision, then swerved back toward the highway and lost control. The right side of Martin's 1968 Rambler American scraped the left side of Huseman's pickup.

"Study To Show Thyself Approved" 2 Tim. 2:15

An Old Professor was addressing his class, "Gentlemen, you do not use your powers of observation the way you should." Pushing forward a beaker containing a chemical of exceedingly offensive smell, he continued, "When I was a student I used my sense of taste much more frequently than you do." So saying, he put a finger into the liquid and then into his mouth. "Taste it, gentlemen, taste it," he exclaimed, "and exercise your perceptive faculties." The container was pushed toward the reluctant class, and one by one the students resolutely dipped into the concoction and, with many a wry face, sucked the abomination from their fingers. "Gentlemen! Gentlemen!" said the professor, "I must repeat that you do not use your powers of observation! For had you looked more closely, you would have seen that the finger I put into my mouth was not the one I dipped into the liquid." We smile, but this incident points up the carelessness that beclouds much of our learning and understanding. False teachers will delude us as easily as that professor fooled his inattentive students if we do not "study" to show ourselves "approved unto God" (2 Tim. 2:15).

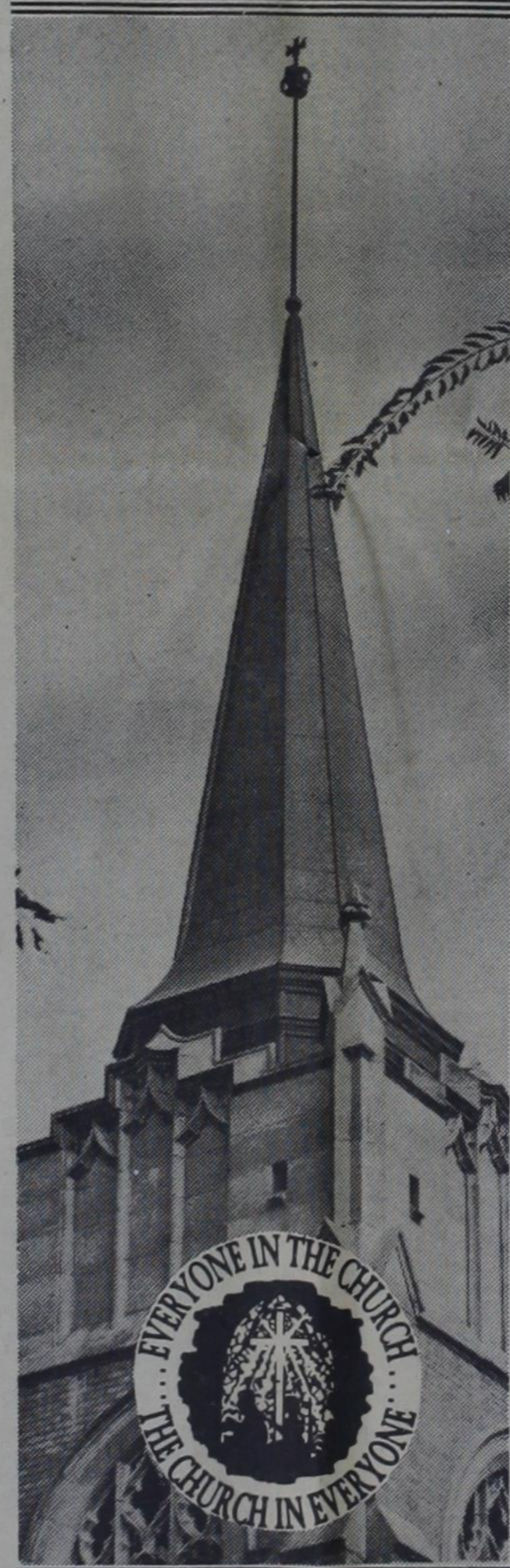

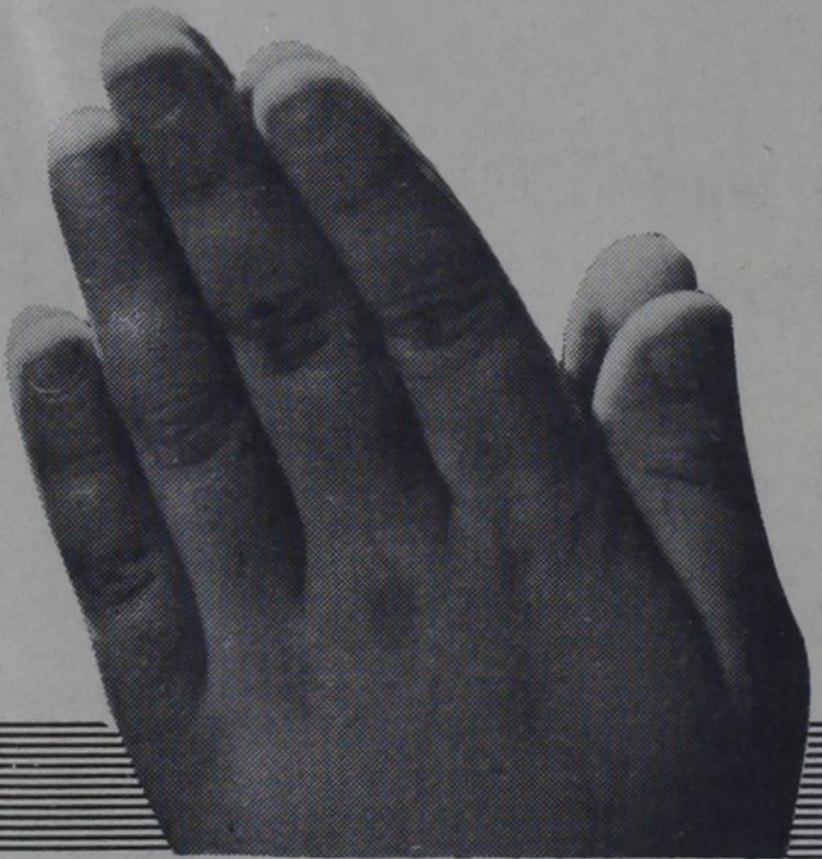

er, but left the room when a nurse entered unexpectedly and began screaming.  
Officials involved in the case are steering clear of that report also, taking a wait-and-see attitude.

**DISTRICT Attorney Tom Hamilton** of Plainview, who is in charge of the homicide case, told the News, "No witnesses we talked to saw any choking, but I can't say that it didn't take place. Our investigation does not reveal whether there was a choking or not. Our information is that there was an argument and some scuffling."

One of Mrs. Kemper's attorneys earlier had reportedly indicated that the hospital room incident was a "family matter."

**THE DAY after her husband's** death, Mrs. Kemper filed an application in county court to be appointed administratrix of his estate.

Monday, Kemper's brother, Truman Kemper of Dallas, filed a separate application to be appointed administrator of his brother's estate, claiming possession of a will dated Jan. 5, 1963, naming him as executor.

County Judge Raymond Wilson Tuesday appointed Kemper's brother as administrator of the estate, which is estimated in the application as being \$50,000 worth of machinery and crops.

**THE MURDER charge** against Mrs. Kemper is scheduled to go to the Castro County Grand Jury Sept. 4. On the same day, a custody hearing is scheduled on her two adopted sons, who are 5 and 4.

# USDA cuts wheat acreage by 12 percent for 1970

Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin has announced a 1970 wheat program aimed at strengthening the US position in world markets and continuing the effort to bring wheat production into line with needs.

**THE 1970 program** has five important features:  
1. The national average price support loan level will be \$1.25 per bushel. Unchanged from recent years, this level is being maintained in an effort to achieve maximum utilization of wheat through increased exports and continued large livestock feed use.

2. A diversion program at the maximum payment rate of 50 percent of county loan rates is aimed at avoiding production of 80 to 90 million bushels of unneeded wheat. This feature will allow producers to tailor their plantings by diverting up to one-half of their acreage allotment's while maintaining incomes through diversion payments.

3. **THE NATIONAL wheat** acreage allotment of 45 1/2 million acres is designed to reduce stocks and reverse the three-year upward trend in carryover levels. This is a 12 percent reduction from the 1969 national allotment of 51.6 million acres.

4. Wheat marketing certificates will be paid on 48 percent of the projected production on the allotted acres of participating producers. For 1969, certificates at a record \$1.52 per bushel are being paid on 43 percent of projected production. They are adding more than \$800 million to the farm value of wheat. Payments per bushel reflecting the difference between wheat parity on July 1, 1970, and today's average loan rate will be as high or higher for the 1970 crop.

5. The option under which a producer can substitute the planting of wheat for feed grains or feed grains for wheat, in any combination, will be available. This is designed to increase farm efficiency by providing producers the flexibility of adjusting acreages to field sizes and to producing the more suitable crop for their particular operations.

In announcing the 1970 program, Hardin said, "There are areas of hopefulness for improved world wheat trade. Following recent sessions of the major exporters, we are moving toward recognition of our determination to maintain the US share of world wheat trade."

"However," he added "the 1968-69 marketing year is the third consecutive one for reduced international trade, putting severe pressures on the world wheat industry. With surpluses piling up in the world's major exporting nation as a result of large crops in recent years, the US cannot go on producing an excessive quantity of wheat which would only lead to larger and larger acquisition and storage costs. The wheat allotment announced meets this problem squarely."

"Our carryover on July 1 this year was around 800 million bushels," Hardin explained. "In view of the 1969 US crop prospects and the world wheat over-supply situation, it is likely there will be an additional buildup of US stocks by July 1, 1970."

"The 1970 allotment is aimed at securing a modest reduction of our national carryover. The 1970 program is expected to produce about 1,200 million bushels of wheat," the Secretary said.

**OTHER features of the 1970** wheat program will be much the same as those for the 1969 crop. Farmers signing up in the voluntary program can qualify for price-support loans, domestic marketing, certificates, payments for diverting acreage below their allotments, and alternative cropping options.

If a farmer signs up in both the wheat and feed grain programs, one option can be substitution between wheat and feed grain acres.  
UNSTABLE land means an unstable agriculture.

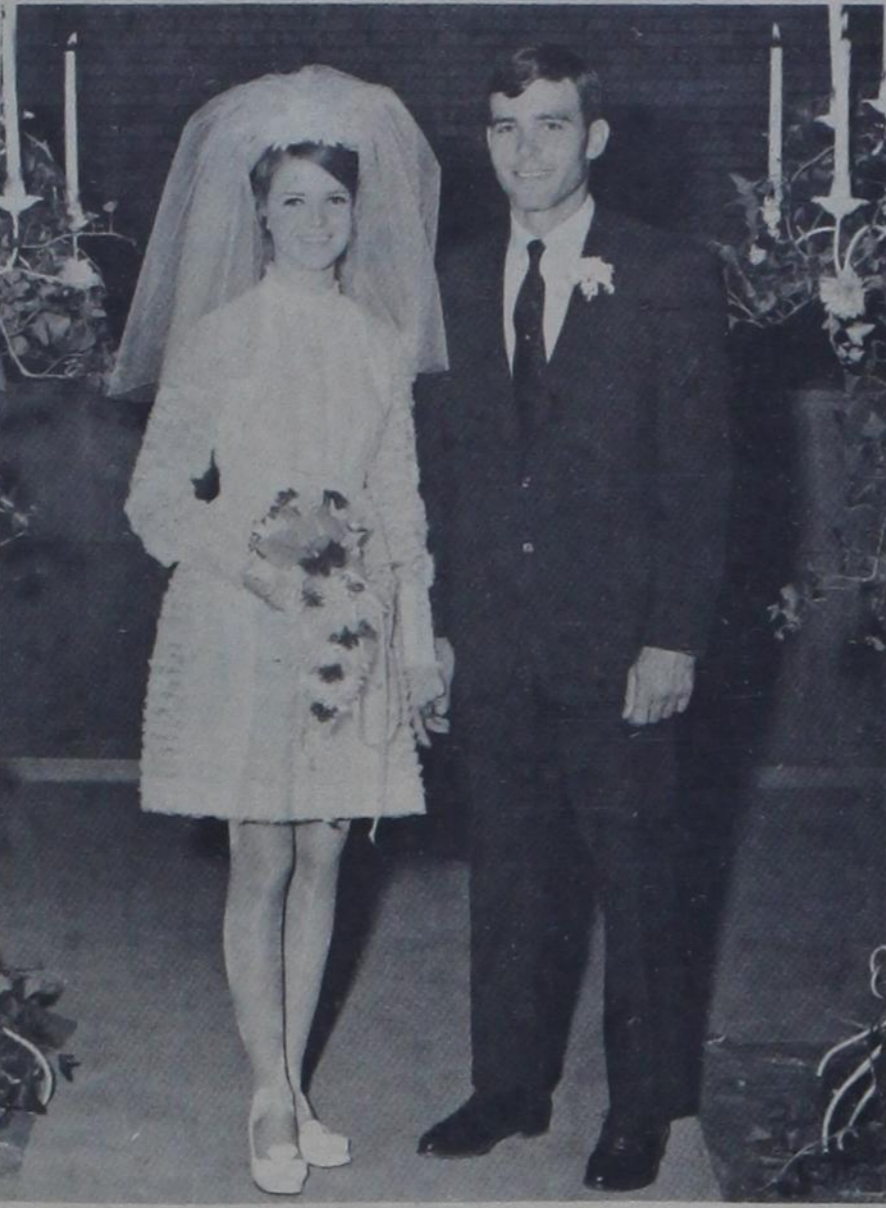

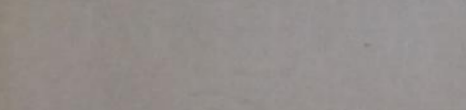

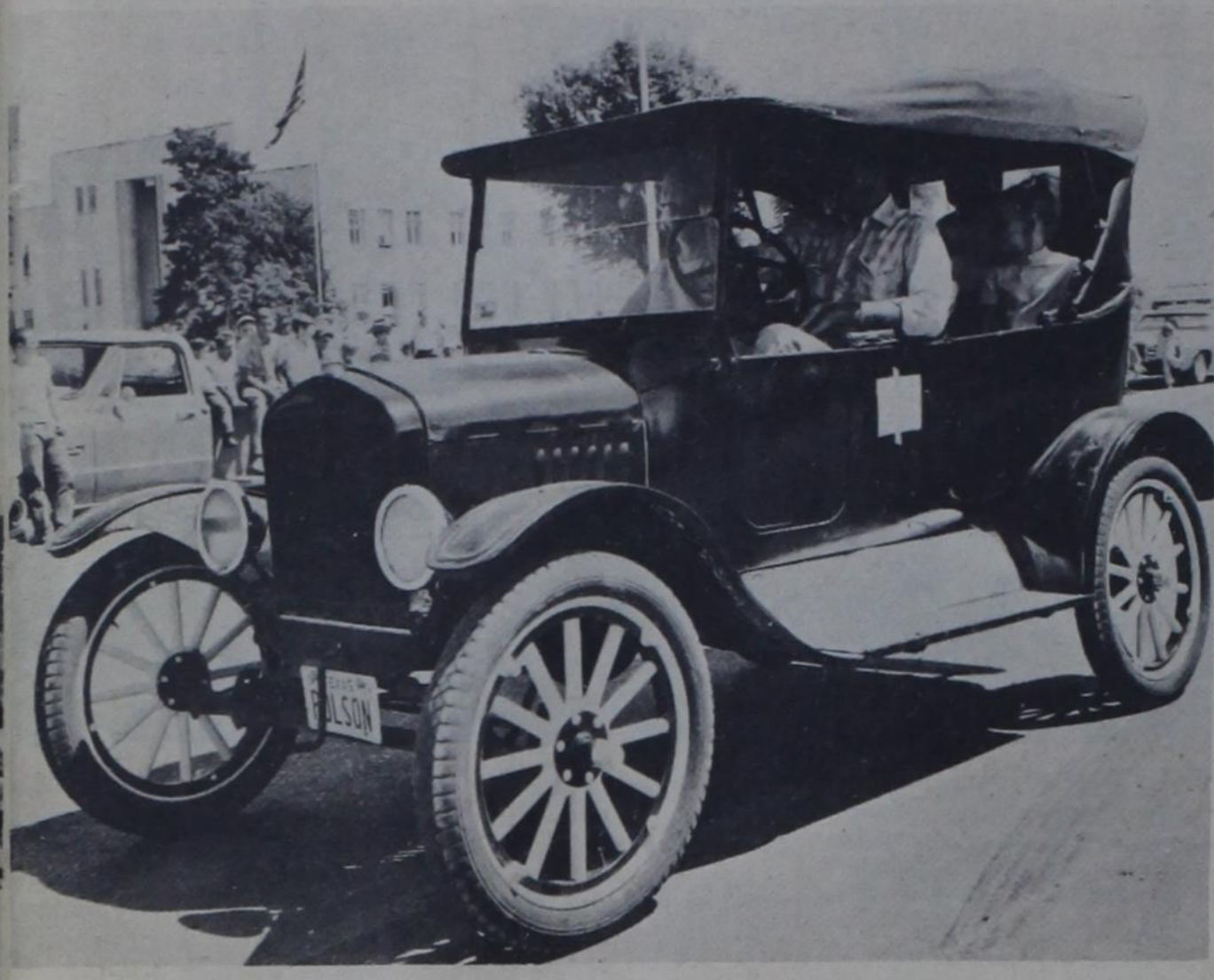

Conservation Time to plant grazing crops By DAVID SPRINGER Now is the time to plant cool-season grasses and alfalfa on irrigated pasture land and irrigated hay land.

ALFALFA should be planted in a moist, firm, weed-free seedbed. It can be planted with a nurse crop of small grain if desired. The use crop should be planted at about one-half of the normal planting rate for the particular small grain. Alfalfa should be planted by Sept. 15 and at a rate of about 15 pounds per acre. The seed should be planted at a depth of one-half to one inch. Cool season grasses such as tall fescue should be planted between Sept. 1 and March 15, 15 with the optimum seeding dates being between Sept. 1 and Oct. 15. Seeded conditions should be the same as for alfalfa. The recommended seeding rate is 14 pounds per acre for tall fescue. Tall fescue should be planted at a depth of one-half to one inch. Other cool season grasses have the same seeding dates and seeding depths as tall fescue. For the recommended seeding rate, check with the Soil Conservation Service office.

AFTER these crops come up it is extremely important to defer grazing or other harvesting methods until the crops are well established. This is usually when the plant is in the booting stage or the bloom stage.

Rayphard Smithson, president of the Castro County Farm Bureau, attended a statewide conference of county Farm Bureau presidents Monday at the Terrace Motor Hotel in Austin.

PURPOSE of the conference was to consider recommendations of a special study committee appointed earlier this year by Texas Farm Bureau President Sidney Dean, on the state organization's structure and operating procedure.

The committee completed its work last month and made its report to the TFB board of directors July 29 in Waco. The board accepted the report and set the Aug. 18 meeting so the recommendations of the six-member study committee could be explained in detail to county leaders.

The proposals will now be considered in the Farm Bureau's policy development process which begins on the county level. After consideration at the county convention in October, the Castro County FB recommendations on the proposals will be submitted to the state convention in November in San Antonio.

GORDON MORROW of San Benito is chairman of the special committee which was appointed by President Dean in April. Other members are Alton Adams of Ferris, Frank Dailey of Grape-Land, Lawrence Hartman of Fredericksburg, Everett Miller of Tulia, and John Huebner Jr. of Matagorda County. All are either presidents or past presidents of their county Farm Bureaus.

Many mistakes were made resulting in court actions for settling claims. The following is a case from ancient records: A greek named Timosthenes left some valuable cups with an Athens banker. The banker lent the cups to a relative. They were never returned. The case was brought into court and Timosthenes was indemnified. The atmosphere of religious awe
