## Lockney rodeo kicks off tonight

The First Annual Lockney Championship Rodeo will take place on July 21, 22, and 23. The rodeo will be held at the rodeo arena on the Floyd County Fairgrounds in Lockney.

The Floyd County Fair Association is sponsoring the rodeo. The stock for the rodeo is being furnished by the C bar T Rodeo Company of Lubbock which is owned and operated by Charlie Thompson. The rodeo is approved by the Texas Cowboys Rodeo Association and over 300 entries are expected with over \$15,000 in prize money expected.

Scheduled events for the rodeo include barrel racing, barebacks, bull riding, team and calf roping, saddle

bronc riding, and a calf scramble, and other special events. The rodeo will begin at 8:30 on each night. Some top rated contestants from Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Colorado are expected to enter. Clown for the rodeo will be Bullet Bob McClury who will be performing special and humorous antics.

Tickets for the rodeo are \$3.00 for anyone 13 and up. 6-12 are \$1.00, and under 6 are free.

The Rodeo queen will be announced on Thursday night. The queen will be awarded a \$150 belt buckle. The four queen contestants are Karen Ford, Rachelle Ford, Julie Collins, and Tam-

my Hollifield. Karen is a rodeo club member, a member of band and 4-H and she is also very interested in the piano. Karen will be a sophomore.

Rachelle will also be a sophomore. She is interested in the piano and is also a band member.

Tammy will be a junior this year. She is a member of band and the rodeo club.

Julie will be a senior and she is the oldest queen contestant.

Also scheduled for Thursday is the Floyd County Chili Cookoff. The gates

will open at 12:30 for anyone wishing to set up their things and begin cooking early. The judging for the cookoff will be at 7:30.

During the rodeo, the Lockney Rodeo Club will have a concession stand. They will be selling barbequed German sausage and hamburgers, homemade ice cream and will have soft drinks and chips for sale.

Following the rodeo on Friday and Saturday nights there will be a dance in the entertainment building on the fair grounds. Admission for the dance will be \$4.00 per person on both nights. The Playa Playboys from Floydada will be providing the music for the dance.

The North was down by as many as 11 points in the first half then tied the score in the third quarter with a shot by Mary Johnson of Longview and then took its first lead of the game on two free throws by Connie Coffman. Though the North team fought hard they just couldn't come back. Connie had a total of four points for the game.

In some game comments Connie said that the North team was "controlled, patient and very disciplined. Coach (Dean) Weese won't let it be anything else." Connie also said, "There's not a difference in talent, but it's a whole different style of basketball in this part of the state. You can run a fast break and not be out of control."

The North-South game wraps up a week long Texas High School Girls Coaches Association clinic held each year. The week is geared primarily to team play. One of the coaches commented that the major job is getting the girls to play together.

Coaches for the North team were Dean Weese and Melynn Hunt.

## Two new coaches and elementary teacher hired

The Lockney School Board met Tuesday, July 12, at 7:30 for a regular business meeting.

Following the invocation by Eddie Teeter, tax report #10 was approved, payment of current bills was approved, and the minutes of the last meeting were approved.

Dub Hallmark gave the superintendents report. Mr. Hallmark reported that there was currently a teachers in-service being held at the elementary building and that 57 teachers from Lockney and the surrounding area had attended on Tuesday and that 60 were expected on Wednesday and Thursday. In the building report Mr. Hallmark discussed the improvements being done. He reported that the new lights for the high school would be installed by the time school starts in August. He also reported that the new gym floor would be completed in about two weeks. In the personal report he discussed the possibility of hiring a full rather than part-time speech therapist for Lockney. However, if a therapist has not been found by the time school starts, Karen Quebe has said she would teach part-time.

The resignations of two teachers were accepted. Kathy Grissom has resigned as girl's coach to go to Lubbock Monterey and Nell Carlton has resigned as junior high math teacher's aide.

The board also hired Alayne Slover as

the girl's assistant coach and junior high science teacher. This will be Alayne's first coaching job and she is a recent graduate of Wayland Baptist University. The board also hired Mindy Crow, wife of new boy's coach Mickey Crow, as a teacher for the elementary school. Mindy will teach 3rd grade. Third grade teacher Jamie Moerbe will be moved to the fourth and fifth grade to teach language arts.

During the meeting the board appointed Tom Duvall to represent the Lockney I.S.D. on the Appraisal District Board. The board, by proclamation also elected to put Tom Duvall and Eddie Teeter on the ballot of the Appraisal Board election.

The board also approved a new school insurance plan. This new plan is going to cost what it would normally cost to insure just the football players for the year. This new insurance plan will cover all students enrolled in the Lockney Independent School District. The insurance will cover all students during all school hours. It will also cover any student while attending or going to and from any school sponsored activity. This policy will also cover football and will cover grades K-12. This policy is a secondary policy to other person policies.

Following completion of the regular business the board began another work session on the budget.

Connie Coffman, 1983 graduate of Lockney High School, left Sunday to begin workouts for the annual Texas-Oklahoma all-star basketball game which will be held on July 23 in Lindsey, Oklahoma. Head coach for the Texas team is Dave Ketterman, the head coach at Wayland Baptist University.

## Assistance offered by Texas Rehab Commission

Today there is considerable concern about shortages in our various energy resources. There is one source of energy, however, that seems to become more abundant even as other resources decline. That is human energy—our most reliable energy resource. Human energy breathes life into the ideas, plans and dreams that shape our society.

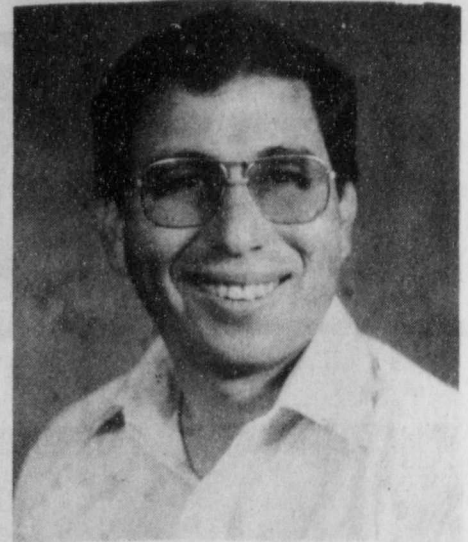
The Texas Rehabilitation Commission is a human energy agency. TRC employees have one major goal—to channel their energies and talents in directions that will assist disabled persons in Texas to realize their own potential. Each of the Commission's two major divisions makes a distinct contribution to reaching this goal.

The Vocational Rehabilitation Division was established in 1929 in response

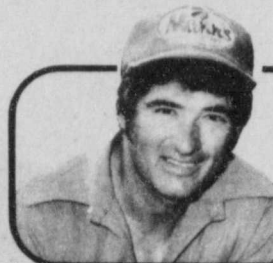
to the needs of disabled veterans returning home from World War I. Under the State Department of Education, the division grew through the years to serve persons who have a wide variety of physical and mental disabilities. Employees of this division work with vocationally handicapped persons who want to enter or return to the work force.

In 1954, the Disability Determination Division joined the Vocational Rehabilitation Division in what, by then, had become the Texas Education Agency. This division was created as a result of legislative amendments to the basic Social Security Act. DDD, funded entirely by federal dollars, is responsible for determining the eligibility of persons applying for Social Security disability benefits.

In 1969, the Vocational Rehabilitation Division and Disability Determination Division were removed from the Texas Education Agency's program and, together, formed the Texas Rehabilitation Commission, an independent agency. In Fiscal Year 1982, these two divisions served a combined total of 213,510 disabled Texans.

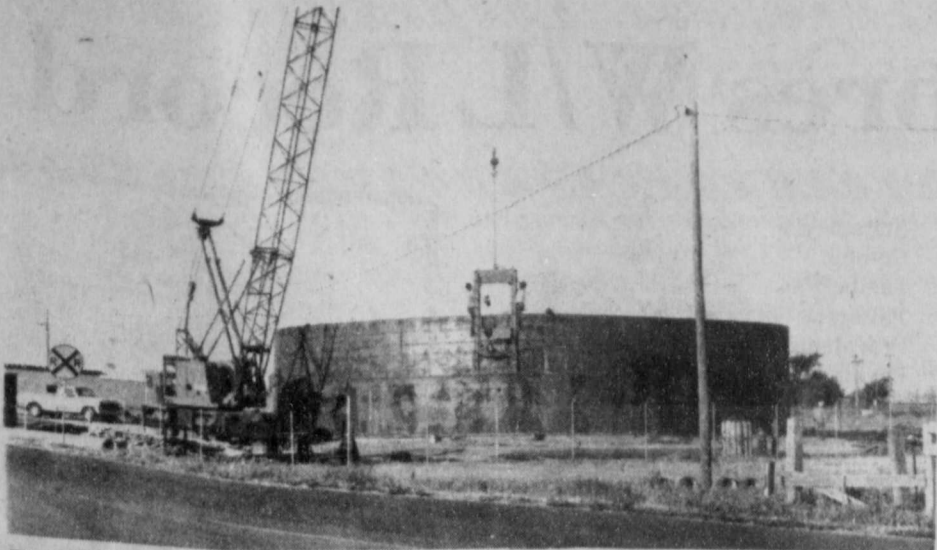

## Williams to attend show in Iowa July 19-22

The Jerry Williams family will be attending the National Junior Angus Show in Des Moines, Iowa from July 19-22. Libby and Matt will be showing heifers at this years show. Libby will be one of two representatives from Texas to attend this years show.

Libby is one of two voting delegates representing the Texas Junior Angus Association. Earlier this year Libby was elected to serve on the Board of Directors of the Texas Association.

## VA NEWS

The Veterans Administration and Department of Justice now are 2 1/2 years into their effort in Texas to collect debts owed by veterans who attend school under the GI Bill. Most of the monies owed the VA stem from educational overpayments while the veteran was in school or from defaulted education loans.

Under VA's program of collecting debts of \$1,200 or less, Waco-based VA District Counsel Richard J. Jones so far has received more than 13,468 debt cases totaling more than \$8,325,023. In response to VA demand letters 2,362 Texas veterans in the Waco VA Regional Office area already have repaid in full debts totaling more than \$1,174,742. Another 2,658 veterans now are repaying a total of nearly \$1,550,500 through repayment plans. The District Counsel staff has filed suit in state and federal court on another 2,002 cases totaling \$1,006,607. The four U.S. Attorneys in Texas have also filed suit on numerous VA cases referred to them during the last 2 1/2 years.

VA's aim is to collect the debts in instances where the veteran hasn't made repayment arrangements. The veteran first is notified by letter of the indebtedness, and advised that about 30 days remain after its receipt to pay the debt in full or make other arrangements for payment before necessary court action is taken. Further, VA now is authorized to charge interest and administrative costs on those debts.

Debts in excess of \$1200 are referred to the Department of Justice. As a general rule, the department will demand immediate repayment of the debt and is prepared to litigate the matter in court. It also will use various post-judgment remedies such as taking liens on properties, garnishing and attaching bank accounts and other liquid assets.

## Brock, Johnson to compete in Greenbelt

The Annual Greenbelt Football Classic will be played in Childress on August 5 at 8:00 p.m. Two boys from Lockney will be playing in the game. Steve Johnson will be playing for the east team under the coaching of Gary Howard from Central State University in Edmond, Ohio, and Kyle Brock will be playing on the west team under the coaching of Rodney Murphy of McMurry College.

The Greenbelt Bowl is designed to showcase the top players from West Texas and Central Oklahoma, many of whom may have been overlooked by colleges and universities for scholarships. Some of these athletes have signed to attend schools and many other talented boys would like one last look at their abilities.

Nominated as one of the queen contestants this year is Shawnda Brock of Lockney.

Jinna selected this recipe for Pineapple Cake to share with our readers. She got the recipe several years ago from a former Lockney resident. This cake is very easy and only takes 35 to 45 minutes and is very good.

PINEAPPLE CAKE

- 2 cups flour
- 1½ cups sugar
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 1 #2 can of crushed pineapple (large can)

Mix all these ingredients together and pour into an oblong cake pan. Top this mixture with 1 cup of crushed pecans. Bake at 375 degrees until brown.

Icing

- 1 stick oleo
- ¾ cup sugar
- small can of canned milk

Cook this mixture in a quart saucepan. Boil 10 minutes until thick. While cake is still hot, poke holes in cake with a fork then pour icing over top of cake.
