Mendy is 27 years old. She was born and raised in Alice, Texas, where her parents still reside. She attended Texas A and I University where she graduated with a B.S. in Elementary education. Her specialty is music. She has four years of teaching to her credit. She taught first grade for two years in Robstown and also first grade for one year in Liberty before the Crowes moved to Houston.

In Houston, because there were no openings in any of the school systems around, she taught 2 year olds in a Mother's Day Out Nursery. Mendy is

looking forward to getting back into the public school system.

In Lockney Mendy will be teaching third grade. She is looking forward to teaching the children and says, "It should be interesting, because they are so independent at this age."

Besides coaching, Crowe has taught business classes including bookkeeping and record keeping, and health, P.E., and junior high science.

When asked what the main difference in South Texas and here were both of the Crowes had the same answer: the weather. South Texas is hot and humid. Here it is hot and dry. Our weather has effected Mendy most since she is expecting their second child in February.

Darrell, not to be left, has already named the new baby Kevin, whether it is a boy or girl.

Crowe also commented he would not miss the Houston traffic.

Townmeetings scheduled for citizen data input

There will be two public hearings held in August at the City Hall. Purpose of these meetings is to get input from the townspeople of Lockney on an application the City is planning to file with the Texas Department of Community Affairs (TDCA) for a Texas Community Development Program (TCDP) grant.

The main intent of these grants is to eliminate slum areas, blighted housing, and deteriorated neighborhoods by providing improved streets, parks and community centers, improved utility systems, better drainage, and other

public facilities. These funds may also be used to support economic development activities, public services including manpower training, crime prevention, health care, drug abuse, and child care programs.

As this is an information-gathering meeting, everyone interested is urged to attend. The City will also accept written comments up until the application is submitted to TDCA.

The first of the two meetings is scheduled for Tuesday, August 9, 1983 at 12:00 noon. This meeting will be held at the City Hall at 215 East Locust Street. At this first meeting the City's

housing and community development needs will be discussed. Also an assessment of the City's past housing and development efforts will be made.

The second meeting is scheduled for Thursday, August 25, 1983 and will be held at 9:00 a.m. at the City Hall. This meeting will be to review specific details of the City's application before it is submitted to the TDCA.

Everyone interested in presenting suggestions or ideas is urged to attend these meetings. Handicapped persons who wish to attend and may not have transportation are urged to call City Hall to arrange for assistance.

Castro visits UT campus

Paul Castro, a senior at Lockney High School, this year, recently visited the University of Texas campus to participate in the 1983 Honors Colloquium.

Paul was one of 707 top ranked students who attended. All of those attending were identified as academically talented on the basis of scores on the preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test and were guests of the University.

During their four-day stay (July 21-24), the students saw a wide spectrum of campus life. They attended lectures by faculty members, toured campus sites such as the Performing Arts Center and athletic facilities,

talked with academic counselors about educational planning, were introduced to an array of student services available for UT students and took in a dance, films and games at the Texas Union.

Colloquium participants were housed in a University dormitory. Many UT students and faculty members served as mentors for the small groups to which the visitors were assigned.

Dr. Ronald M. Brown, vice president for students affairs, deemed the Honors Colloquium successful because of its "intellectual challenge and warm social atmosphere."

Teachers attending were Goree and Felicia Applewhite, R.L. and Betty Knox, and Jeanette Marr, all of Lockney.

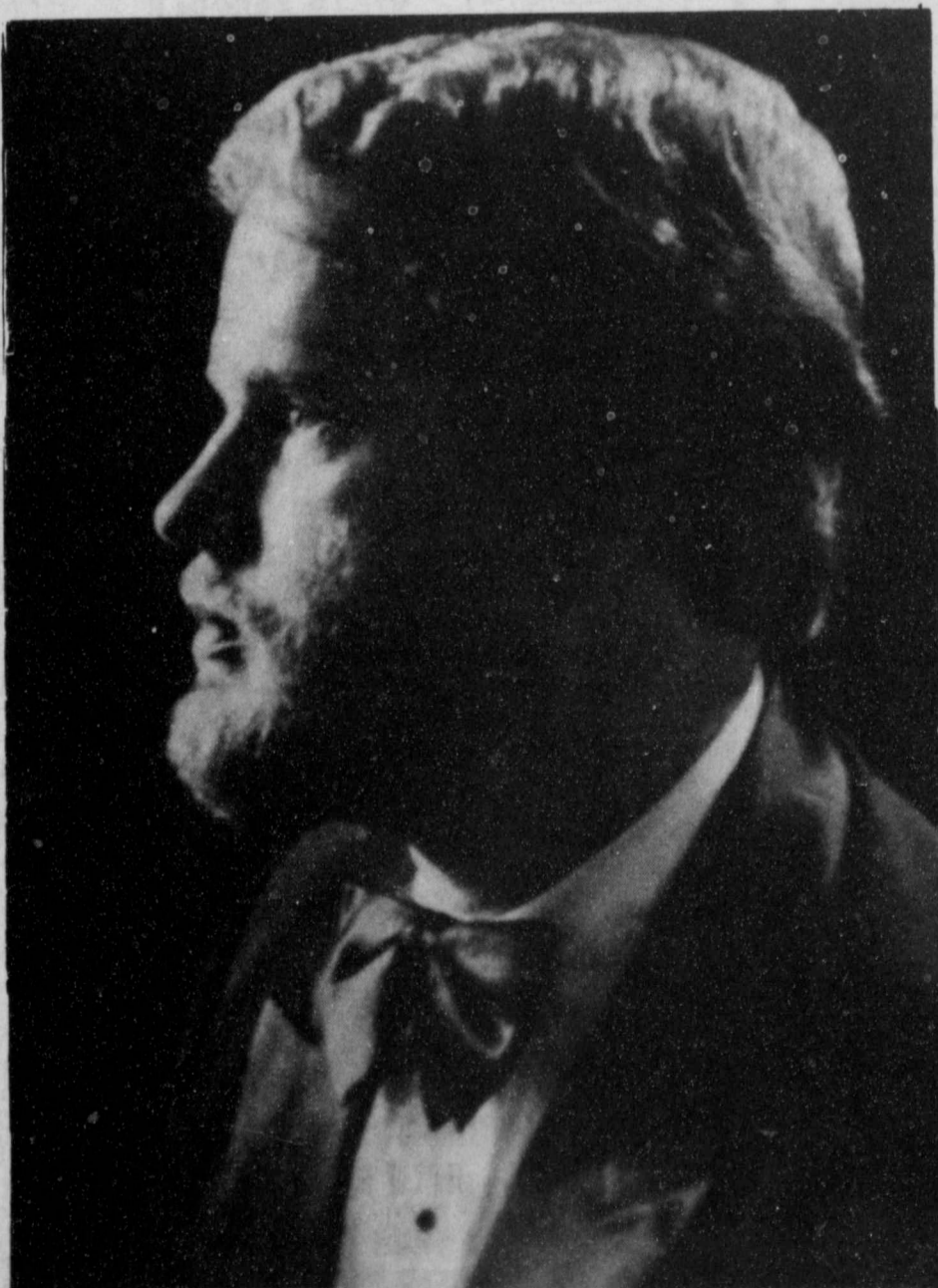
The group met for a picnic and ice cream and had a wonderful time visiting together. Perry Cox sent a letter and picture of his family which everyone enjoyed seeing.

King to study in France

Benjamin King, Assistant Professor of Voice in the Houghton (NY) College School of Music, has been invited to spend September 1983 studying with the eminent French baritone Gerard Souzay at the International Ravel Academy in St. Jean de Luz, France (Ravel's birthplace).

King, a 1968 graduate of Lockney High School and 1974 graduate of Texas Tech University, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Herman R. King of Route 1, Lockney.

According to King, who is also a doctoral student at Eastman School of Music in Rochester, NY, "I feel very honored to have been invited to such a prestigious gathering, especially since the invitation carries a full scholarship. Souzay worked with me in a master class at Eastman, and called the next day with this once-in-a-lifetime offer."

While in France, King will coach repertoire by Ravel and Poulenc with M. Souzay and will perform with the Academy orchestra. In addition, he will present a recital of American songs under the supervision of Thomas Grubb, prominent American coach and diction teacher. King said, "Both my teaching and performance abilities will be greatly enhanced as a result of this experience."

King will be on graduate study leave from Houghton during the 1983-84 academic year, completing a residency for the doctor of musical arts at Eastman. He hopes to complete the degree by 1985.

Well there is a shift change and it is getting noisy again.

We had a nice surprise this afternoon. I was keeping company with Granny, when I heard our "Western Troabadors" (that is what I call them) band tuning up and that meant some good old toe tapping music. We enjoyed about an hour of good music. It was hot so they broke up and left. I could have listened for another hour or more.

It was the women's turn to sit outside and take in the fresh air and the evening cool. There was John Charles Smith? (I put him ahead of us because he was the only man) Mamie Wofford, Hassie Arnold, Euna Bradshaw, Granny Self, and Mavis Barton, (that's me) and for a while Manemma Hutsell joined us. It was only women talk - but did we go!

Sunday, July 24th: It was our anniversary on the 24th and I am glad it

came on a Sunday, so we could celebrate it together, it was our 29th. Our son and grandson came over for a while and it was a good day. It was 105°, almost as hot as the day we married, in Bakersfield, California. It was 109° that day. We went the back way home, we turned left at Muncy Elevator, (but don't ask me which way we were going each time we turned, because when I leave home, I am lost.) We saw some different country and the cotton everywhere was looking good if it was only two months earlier. Lets hope for some more rain and a very late frost.

Monday, 25th: We have started taking exercises and I like it very much. Those who are able to stand for some of them, do so. It makes everybody feel good. We play ball for a few minutes and then church.

The Residents had planned a picnic in Mackenzie Park in Lubbock, but being hot like yesterday would have put a damper on things. (I was not going anyway) Then they thought about, having it in the front, but that was turned down, because of the heat. So we ended up having it in the lobby and kitchen.

Tuesday, 26th: I was in our room trying to keep cool. We had the air conditioners worked on and it certainly made it better. We had our exercise and then playing ball and church. In the afternoon we had "Bingo." We all won two fruits. Mrs. Edna Hunter won the blackout game. She won a "Lovers Knot" pin.

A new "resident" came to the Care Center this morning. Laverne Christian came in the dining room at lunch, and told me there was a puppy at the front door, and if I would start feeding it, she would see about the necessary shots for it. It doesn't look like the other residents - it is tan with a black muzzle face and a black tipped tail. I fed it my diced steak and had just finished when Esker Pyle brought out some chicken and dumplings to feed it. So it had a well balanced meal. However, I think he is going to be "ferocious" because he really was barking up a storm at Mr. Pyle when he was out trimming the shrubbery.

Wednesday, July 27th: Clyde and Manemma Hutsell went home today with their son and daughter-in-law. They did a few jobs around the house and inside. They told me later they enjoyed it very much. They came back in the late evening. Their home is

"Silverton". Donie Hanson also went out for the day with her cousin and did a few chores in her home too. She is a widow and lives in Floydada. She has an aunt who lives next door to her. The aunt and niece brought her back.

This Wednesday afternoon, we paint ceramics and have a good time getting the paint all over us as well as on the article we are painting. Bill Poole visited his father, Mr. William Poole.

Thursday, 28th: We usually do quilting Thurs. mornings, but didn't get started until afternoon. We were quilting when Jean said we could quilt all afternoon if we wanted and we did just that. I have taken some pieces to my room so when I have a little spare time I can add some to the big strip. If you ladies out there have some double knit material, or odd scraps that you do not want, we would greatly appreciate it if you would send them or personally drop them off here at the home. Please help keep us busy.

Friday, 29th: I was up early this morning, had breakfast and now I have to put my feet in the whirlpool and then have them doctored. I was almost late for church.

It is raining, a nice slow shower. If only it would rain like this on the cotton it would be great.

Mary Jo Fielding and Esker Pyle had to rush to lower the flag and bring it in.

Saturday, 30th: The weekend is here again and it is our son's and son-in-law's birthday today. They were born the same day in the "Matador Hospital" as it used to be called, and Dr. Stanley delivered them both. Eunice McFall and myself had no idea that our two boys would even be related. It was a surprise when Bruce started dating our daughter, Ann and found out where and what hospital they were born. So today it's kind of special to both families. Well, "Granny Self" went outside this morning and was playing with a little puppy that has been hanging around the home for a couple days.

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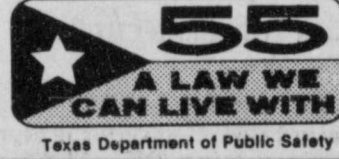

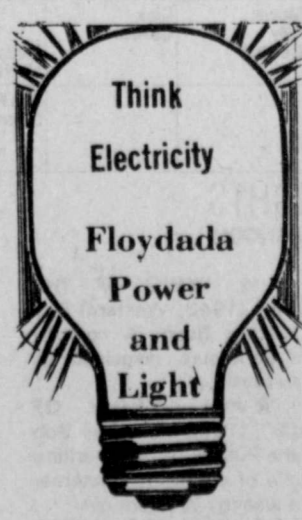
- Whole-Wheat Pecan Muffins
