Board increases tax rate

The Lockney School Board met in a regular meeting on Tuesday, August 9, in a regular business session. Purpose of the meeting was to adopt the 1983-84 budget and to set the tax rate for the year.

Attending the meeting were school board members Eddie Foster, Eddie Teeter, Clar Schacht, Keith Jackson, Jim Bob Martin, Bill Race, superintendent Dub Hallmark, and high school principal James Poole.

Following the invocation by Keith Jackson, the minutes of last month's meeting were read and approved. Tax report #11 and payment of the current bills was also approved.

During the superintendent's report, Mr. Hallmark reported that, following approval of the new teachers in this meeting's agenda, all personnel positions would be filled. He also reported that most of the work done on the buildings had been finished. The new gym floor has been completed and the board personally inspected the floor and gave its approval.

New lights in the high school would be completely installed by the time school starts on August 24th. Several new lockers have been purchased for the gyms and have been installed.

A new speaker is being installed on the visitors' side of the football field. New shelves have been built in the band hall and 12 new music stands have been purchased. The homemaking department has 15 new chairs to replace old ones. Besides the new floor in the gym, the scoreboard is being repaired and screens have been installed on the windows. The seats in the gym are also being refinished.

Two new benches have been put up in front of the high school and several shrubs have been planted. The money for the benches and scrubs was donated

by the 1983 graduating class from remaining funds and were installed by principal James Poole and Sammy Silva.

Following the superintendent's report the subject of lunchroom prices was discussed. The board voted to raise prices by .5 cents for all student lunches.

New prices will be as follows: elementary lunches 60 cents, junior high and high school 65 cents, reduced lunch 35 cents, paid breakfast 30 cents, and reduced breakfast 25 cents. Milk will be 17 cents this year and this price is firm for the entire year year as per the accepted bid from Bell.

The board approved the substitute list for this year. Those on the list are: Arla Copeland, Reeda Kay Smith, Kathy Hunter, Martha Mangold, Mary Ann Kring, Vera Jo Bybee, Debra Parrish, Karla Sherman, Lesca Durham, Laura Wilson, Dena Hinkle, Carla Josey, Carol Huggins, Cheryl Teeter, Karen Thacker, and Linda Marr.

The board raised the amounts for travel expense this year. The school will now pay \$35.00 per room per individual and will pay \$15.00 for meals and \$6.50 per single meal for those only gone for the day.

The board hired two new teachers and one aide. Karen Evans will teach special education and Cindy Cotham will teach junior high math. Yolanda Garcia was hired as a junior high aide.

The school board approved the budget for the 1983-84 fiscal year. The budget shows a 3% overall increase in expenditures for the year. This increase is due to several things. Overall the budget only increased \$6,202.00 over last years. This year instruction costs are up 5.3%, library costs are down

22.9%, health and transportation costs are up, more money has been up into the athletic and extracurricular activities, and the building improvement budget is up.

The board set the tax rate for the 1983-84 year at .78 cents per \$100 evaluation. After three motions the board came to an agreement with four members voting for the .78 rate and two voting against. The new rate is 2% above the present effective rate. This rate will be paid on a tax base of \$79,595,857 as opposed to last years base of \$86,541,475 which is a loss of \$6,945,618 in tax valuation.

The taxes will bring \$601,011 in the school system with a total of \$582,243 going into the operating and maintenance fund and 1 cent or a total of \$7,561 into the interest and sinking fund.

The board also approved the calling of bids for 10 computers: 7 for high school and 3 for junior high. Bids on these computers will be opened during the September board meeting. Board president Eddie Foster appointed a building committee of Bill Race, Jim Bob Martin, and Keith Jackson to research the possibility of closing in the junior high windows. If done these would mean covering the windows with corrugated steel and in doing this heating and cooling costs would be cut down. Cost for closing in two of the three sets of windows in each room will probably run in the neighborhood of \$17,000.

The board also approved installing a new lab table in the junior high science room. The table will be built by Bowman and McDonald. Also approved by the board was the installation of three new sinks for the science room. Sinks and all plumbing and gas lines will be installed by Workman Plumbing.

The meeting adjourned at 11:15 p.m.

The injured persons were transported from the site of the accident to the hospital by members of the Lockney Volunteer Fire Department and were treated by Drs. W.J. and Gary Mangold.

Nancy Ray to head girls athletics

She was raised in Abilene. A 1980 graduate of Abilene Christian University, she majored in physical education with a minor in biology.

Following her graduation Ray went to work for the state where she worked with the Special Olympics. She held the title of pool manager and certified state employees to work in the water with handicapped children. She also traveled to special olympics meets with the young people she coached.

While working with these special children, she also coached them in basketball. She was instrumental in starting the Special Olympics swimming program in Abilene.

When asked if there was anything different in Lockney that would take some getting used to, Ray said she had always considered herself a smalltown girl and she felt comfortable with Lockney. She commented that Lockney is cleaner than most of the places she has lived.

When asked why she chose Lockney, Nancy said she wanted to live in a small West Texas town where there was support in the community for girls athletics and where the girls were

enthused about basketball as well as other sports.

This is Ray's first head coaching job and she said she is looking forward to coaching the girls. She said her coaching would differ slightly from that of prior coaches, Haynes and Grissom, but she does not expect to make any major changes.

Besides coaching the 7th, 9th, and varsity team Ray will be teaching a high school civics class.

She and assistant coach, Elaine Slover, would be observing each of the teams that the girls will play in basketball at least twice so that Lockney will know what to expect from each team. She said she thinks Lockney and other area towns will be starting out on the same level this year, because many of the area towns will also have new coaches.

Ray stated that Childress and Slaton will be the two teams to watch this season, but she said that if the Lockney girls work hard they can beat these teams.

Nancy has one brother, Nathan, who lives in Lubbock.

Lone citizen appears at public hearing

One of the areas which will be suggested is the target area in northeast Lockney. Another is the streets surrounding the blocks where the new public housing project will be constructed.

The final hearing on the grant application will be held on August 25th, at 9:00 a.m. at the City Hall.

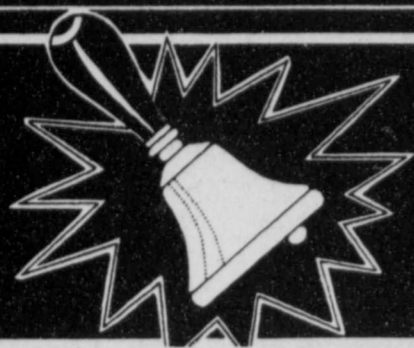

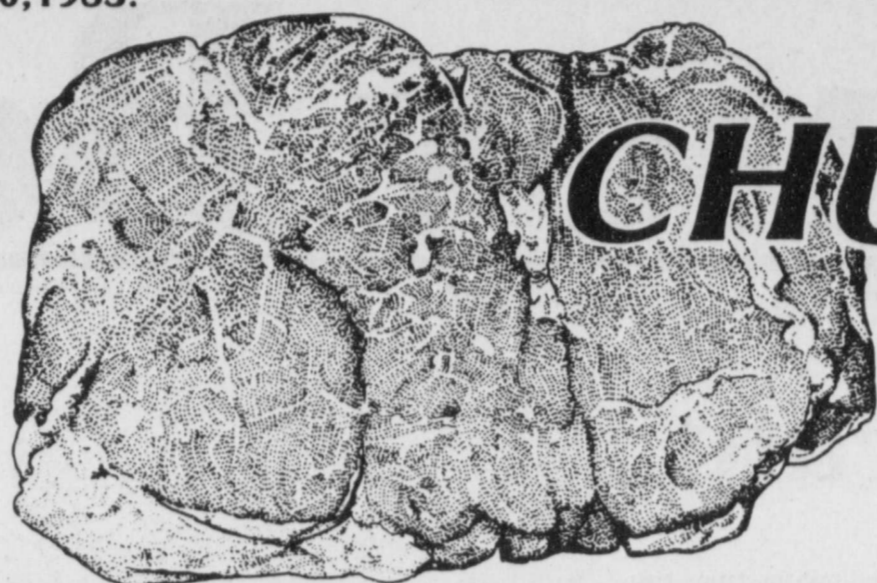

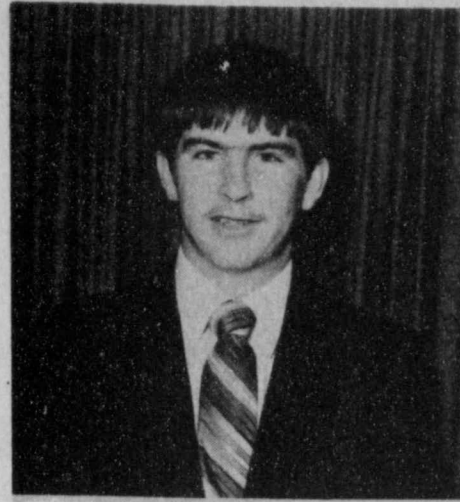

PERSPECTIVES

What do you do on the weekends? If you are like the people in a recent Merit Report, then you are most likely to clean your house or do yard work. You probably most enjoy laying about in the sun, or going camping or fishing, regardless of what you actually wind up doing.

About 52% of the scientifically selected poll said they attended church or synagogue. That compares with the generally accepted dictum among most preachers that about one third of their total membership, or about one half of their in town members will be in church on a given Sunday. At least that is the way it works out in my denomination.

When asked to list the things they actually do on weekends, church was listed in frequency behind yard work, housecleaning, visiting relatives or friends and reading. Church going tied for fifth. When asked what they really enjoyed doing, church fared worse, coming tied for eighth. Doing the yard ranked higher than church in enjoyment value.

The people most likely to go to church and enjoy it are in the lower income brackets, married, women and "older". What I saw on the report did not define older.

What does all this mean? That depends on the slant you want to take.

This group of people does better at going to church, or so they claim, than the statistics from my denomination. So one could say that as a whole nation the nation is doing reasonably well at going to church. But one could also reasonably conclude that there are plenty of prospects out there for the churches to work on.

On the basis of the data, some of my colleagues may well preach a sermon, or two, on the state of our houses and yards as compared to the state of our souls. The former could be in better condition than the latter.

But we should also question ourselves as to why church is not more enjoyable. Strangely, moves movies and TV ranked below going to church in things people enjoy doing, which calls into question the theory of some that we must compete with those media. Of those things which were not outdoor activities (and fair weather ones at that) the only things which ranked higher than church were visiting friends and family outings.

Maybe this is the key. Perhaps church must come to be the place where one's family and friends gather to enjoy one another. Just how we will accomplish this I am not sure of, but at least we would have a starting place. Attend the church of your choice this weekend.

Both of them can't hear or see too good, and when we introduced them, they have talks about how long it has been since they saw each other. Mrs. Workman is the grandmother of Olive O'Donnell, who used to bring ceramics for us to paint every two weeks. So we will be seeing Olive a little more often.

The patients and residents were a little slow in getting to the lobby this morning so Diane Truitt, who is taking over for Jean for a few days had a hand job getting the them for exercise.

Tuesday, 9th: It is ten to two and I am amused listening to the Cubs or Cardinal baseball game. The score is

5-0 in favor of the Cubs (bottom of the third). It is difficult to pick a favorite. I like Cubs but a Cardinal with its "Red chest" and a tuft of feathers on its head is endearing too. (See you after bingo.) I got back to the ball game in the ninth inning, the score being 5-3 in favor of the Cubs.

We played bingo and we want to thank Linda Holly and Clara McClain for the fruit today. Mamie Wofford won the blackout prize today and she chose a piece of jewelry.

I am writing this in the lobby, some of the residents are watching TV. (Some of them are looking outside at it raining and others are napping. Ooh my gosh, wow, we had a bolt of lightning and thunder together so close or it hit the home somewhere, because it set off the fire alarm and I felt tingles running down my arms. Granny Self said that she could feel tingles in her arms too. Maybe others felt it also. Clyde and Manemma Hutsell had their TV blown out.

Wednesday, 10th: Janice Nichols came this afternoon and we painted ceramics. There were only six of us Nina Loudermilk, Mary McCaracken, Mavis Barton, Mary Green, Edna Hunter and yours truly, Mary Jo.

This morning Mary Green went to Plainview and enjoys baking cookies and making candies and playing pool and making other things such as well planters, pet rocks, necklaces and even does a little dancing now and then. And she tells me everything she has done. Next Wednesday they are going to do something different. So you will have to wait until she tells me before I can write it.

Granny Self still feeds the birds and I guess she will do as long as she lives, it give her something to do and she loves those birds. If she does not get too many biscuits, bread and cornbread she feels guilty, like she is feeding them too little. I tell her that there is plenty of bugs, seeds and other stuff they can eat. But she said, "Yes but they have babies now and the momma ones won't have to go too far to get something for those little ones." So she is going to continue doing it.

Thursday, 11th: Today started like any other day. Rose Pyle hasn't been feeling to good this last week and stayed in bed. But yesterday she was up in her chair and had her meals taken to her room. I was very pleased to see her at breakfast in the dining room this morning. Good luck to Rose and keep it up.

I have been trying to keep up this column, write to my sister in England, (which is long overdue) write to my daughter Ann, in Muleshoe and keep up

writing my fluid intake, for the nurses. It takes some doing to get it all right. There was Mary Green, Richard Lanham and Lewis Roberts, making wishing well planters, Mary McCaracken and Mary Jo cutting squares and there was only me to sew them together. Nena Loudermilk was sleeping, she had her quilt top almost finished. So I had to put all writing off for a while and sew on my quilt top. Well there is Clyde and Manemma Hutsell, Richard Lanham, Esker Pyle, Euna Bradshaw and Charles Smith, also Granny Self was out with them, but now has come in, she said it was too hot outside.

Friday, 12th: I was in time for exercises this morning and I enjoyed it. There was Amelia Ashton, Melvin Thacker, Richard Lanham, Lewis Roberts, Mary McCaracken, Mary Green, Mary Jo Fielding, Myrtle Payne, Clyde and Manemma Hutsell and myself. We all like the exercises and then we played ball, throwing it only or bouncing it to anybody and keep it going but somebody had had an accident and the ball rolled in it, so Jean took it to get a bath and it came back looking like a new ball. We had to applaud Alex Raissez and she bowed her her thanks, because she gave the ball its bath.

Then we had church, but all of the usual ones didn't turn up. I mean church group for Friday and some of the usual residents didn't come either.

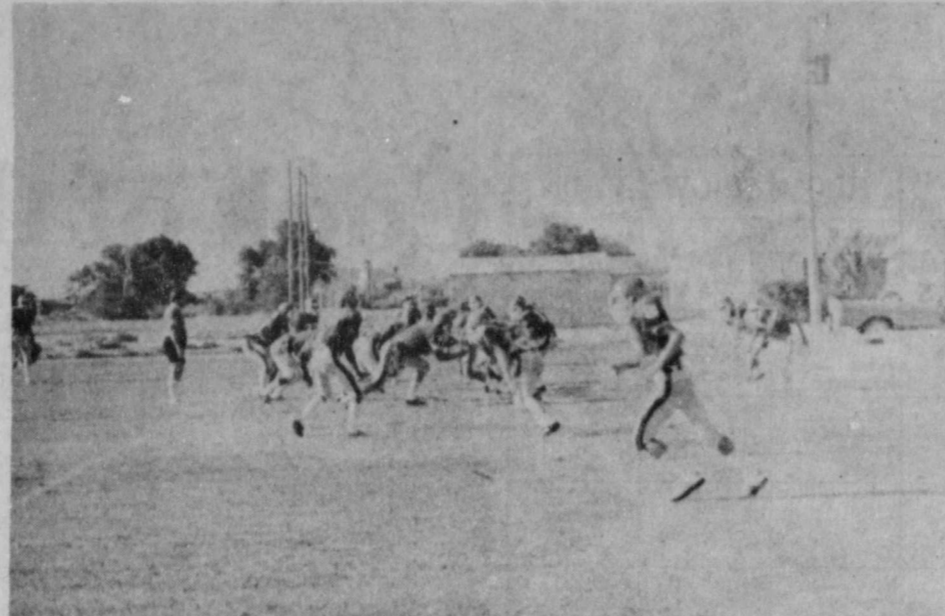

 1 can chopped green chilies (mild)
 Small jar pimentos
 Small can evaporated milk
 Heat above ingredients in a double boiler until cheese melts.
 Brown 1 pound hamburger meat with garlic, salt, and pepper to taste.
 Have ready:
 1 cup chopped onions
 1/2 pound Longhorn cheese, grated
 1 dozen tortillas
 Dip tortillas in hot oil. Drain. Put hamburger, onion, and cheese tortillas and roll up. Place in an oblong pan. Pour sauce over enchiladas. Cover with foil. Cook for 30 minutes in an oven heated to 350 degrees.

 1 cup buttermilk
 1 can blueberries
 2 tablespoons baking powder
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 Mix oil and oleo; add sugar and eggs. flour, butavan baking, baking powder. Add buttermilk and juice from blueberries.
 Gently stir in blueberries. Grease muffin pan well. Bake at 400 degrees for 20 minutes.
 Mary says the only problem with this recipe is getting the butavan flavoring. The only place to get it in Lubbock and it must be bought by the gallon, but but Mary says it's worth it.

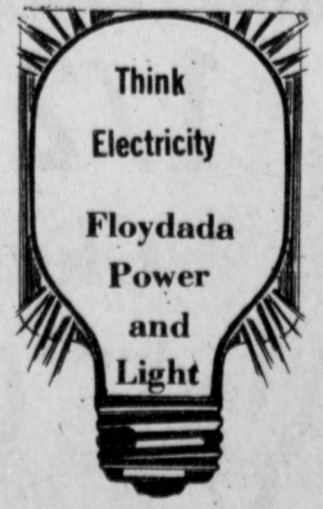

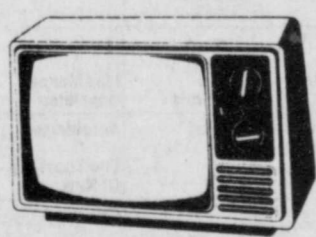
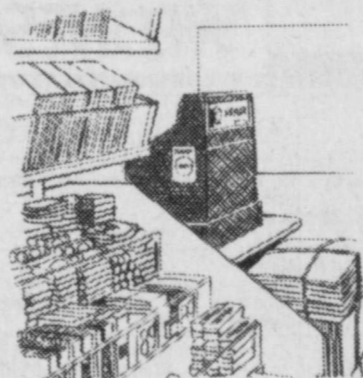
