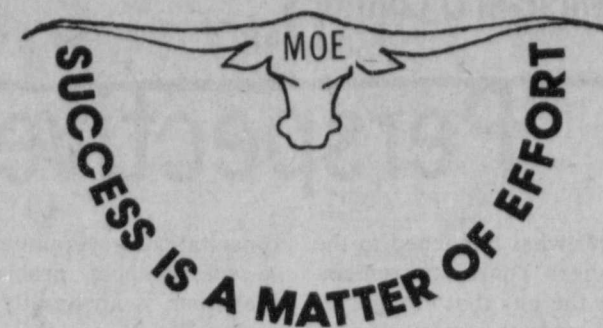

Three new officers elected

Farm Bureau holds meeting

The Floyd County Farm Bureau hosted its 31st annual convention on Saturday, September 10th, at 6:30 at the Lockney Elementary Cafeterium.

A barbecue dinner was catered by Stubb's Barbecue of Lubbock and supervised child care was provided for younger children who accompanied their parents.

President Dan Smith called the meeting to order. Doug Galloway gave the invocation. Martin Stoerner lead the pledge of allegiance, and guests were welcomed and introduced by Dan Smith. Larry Schneider read the minutes of the last meeting and gave the financial report.

Following the financial report the four students who attended the citizenship seminar in San Angelo this summer spoke. Jeri Ann McCormick, Stephanie Bybee, Patrick Lloyd, and Wayne Morren, all thank Farm Bureau for the opportunity to attend this informative and enjoyable seminar.

Carroll Sims of the Floydada Volunteer Fire Department reported on his trip to the Texas A&M Fire Training School. The A&M school is recognized as a premier training school and have had students from 25 other states and several foreign countries. Sims has attended the school for the past eight years, but this was the first time he was sponsored by Farm Bureau. In addition to learning fire fighting techniques, he learned about fire prevention, arson investigation and rescue procedures.

Among the various activities that Farm Bureau had sponsored, Dan Smith mentioned last year's fair and intentions to do so this year. They sponsored Farm Safety Week in Floyd County, as well as Fire Prevention Week, and contributed \$250.00 to the county Drug Abuse Program. They have attempted to establish a TASCOCO warehouse in Floyd County, directors attended leadership and presidents conferences. Farm Bureau sponsored the Annual Stock Show Banquet after the March show. A building committee has been established to check on the possibility of relocating the office in a few years, as the business is growing so fast that a larger building will soon be required.

The county Farm Bureau Insurance Agency manager's report was given by James Race. Race recognized the agency employees, career agents, Donice Casey, Clar Schacht, and Bud Rainey, and their wives, office staff Carrie Bertrand, Lynda Seymour and Pat Batty. Race also reported that the agents had written over \$5 million dollars worth of life insurance the past year.



PRESENT for the Farm Bureau Convention Saturday were District Director Neil Burnett, outgoing county president Dan Smith, TFB president S.M. True and Representative Foster Whaley.

Director Craig Gilly gave the membership report, reporting the membership at an all time high for Floyd County with 981 members, an increase of 76 from last year.

Delmas McCormick gave the TASCOCO report. He reported that TASCOCO sales to date were in excess of \$95,000. The two TASCOCO dealers in Floyd County are Jackson Tire in Lockney and Tipton Oil in Floydada.

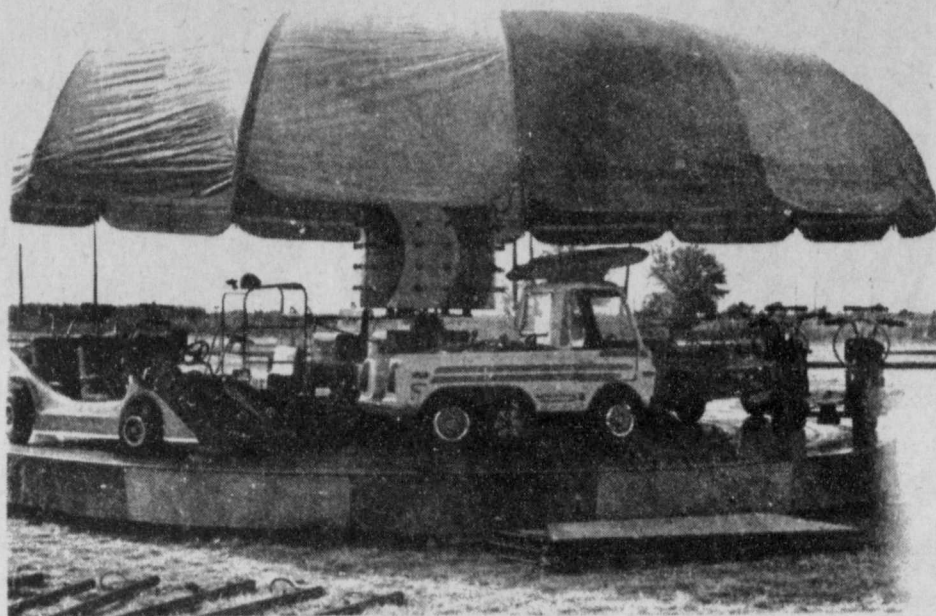
Texas Farm Bureau president S.M. True then addressed the gathering. True began by thanking all those present for supporting him and electing him to the position of president. He had served for six years on the State board of directors of Farm Bureau before being elected as president.

Ricky Mosley headed the election of three directors. Incumbents Warren Mitchell and Larry Schneider were opposed by Ronnie Aston and Stan Pierce, respectively. Keith Phillips and Jerry Davis were selected to run for the position vacated by Dan Smith who has served his two terms on the board. Mitchell, Schneider, and Davis were elected.

Guest speaker for the evening was representative Foster Whaley of Pampa, who represents the 84th Congressional District. Whaley was instrumental in having the farm machinery and livestock removed from the tax roll. He reported that through support from Farm Bureau several bills that would have adverse effects on farmers had been killed in the House and Senate. Whaley will return to Lockney on Saturday for the fair parade.

Bill Bounds, legislative representative of Farm Bureau then addressed the group. Bounds reported that not one of the bills before the House and Senate that were opposed by Texas Farm Bureau passed in either house. He also said of the 12 proposed bills suggested by Farm Bureau nine of those passed. Bounds congratulated Farm Bureau members for their wise decisions in electing Foster Whaley, district director Neil Burnett, and S.M. True to the posts which they hold. He stated that these three men are doers, in that they work for the beliefs of the Farm Bureau members and what they think is in the best interest of those they represent. He reported 86% success rate for Texas Farm Bureau on legislation supported or opposed by Farm Bureau.

Other judging events will get underway today. At 1:00 judging for the community and women's division will begin; judging in the agriculture department at 3:00. The pet show will get underway at 4:30 this afternoon. The cheerleading contest will be at 7:30 tonight.

Cheerleading Contest
The cheerleading contest will be held on Thursday night at 7:30. The squads who will be participating are Lockney, Floydada and Petersburg. Judges for the contest will be some of the Texas Tech cheerleaders.

Women's Day

Friday is Women's Day. There are four women scheduled to speak on Friday, Francis Samms, Lynne Griffith, Mrs. Hurley Carpenter, and Marla Stark. All four speakers have very interesting programs so go out and enjoy them. Also scheduled for Friday night is a gospel singing which will begin at 7:00. As Friday is designated as senior citizens day, everyone 65 and older will get in the gate free.

Door prizes will be given away during the Women's Day.

Stock Show

Saturday will be the big day of the fair. At 8:00 all livestock to be shown must be in the show barn when the animals will be weighed and classified. At 9:00 the open breed sheep show will begin. The junior showmanship contest will be held at 11:00. Market Steers will be shown at 11:00 and market lambs will be shown at 12:30. Awards will be presented at 5:00 p.m. Saturday afternoon.

Parade

The parade will kick off at 10:30 Saturday morning. Parade entries should be in place 30 minutes prior to the beginning of the parade for preliminary judging. Final judging will take place during the parade.

Quarterback Club raffles 12 gauge shotgun

The Quarterback club is presently accepting donations on tickets for a Remington 870 pump, ribbed barrel 12 gauge shotgun. Donations are \$2.00 per ticket. Drawing for the gun will be held on October 7th, during the football game against Floydada which will be held in Lockney.

The children's rodeo and playday will begin at 2:00 on Saturday. Events are open to children ages 2-10. Events for the 2-5 year olds are: a boot race, sack race, stick horse, baseball throw, goat ribbon race, and a barrel race on stick horses. Events for the 6-10 year olds include: barrel race, pole bending, goat ribbon race, and a baseball throw.

Booths

Several local clubs will have booths at the fair. The Athena Junior Study Club will have an ice cream booth. Il Penseroso will have a booth where they will be selling fried fruit pies. They will also have the quilt they are giving away on display. The winner of the quilt will be announced at the queen's contest on Saturday night. The quarterback club will have a booth displaying the gun they are now taking donations on. The gun will be given away during the Lockney/Floydada football game in Lockney on October 7.

Other booths at the fair will include a hamburger booth by the Band Boosters, several craft booths, an arcade booth by Pastime Arcade, and several food booths.

Satellite Systems will have a demonstrator set up at their booth, showing the pickup ability of over 100 channels in a week.

City Council raises water deposit rate

The Lockney City Council met for a regular meeting Thursday, September 8 at the city hall. Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved and payment of current bills was also approved.

The council tabled one item on the agenda until the October meeting when city attorney Paul Lyle can attend and explain a matter concerning filing suits to abet nuisances within the city limits. The council discussed raising the amount required for a deposit to have water turned on. The present amount is \$20.00. This amount rarely covers bills

if persons move without paying their final bills. After discussion the council raised the amount to \$50.00 for a deposit in order to have water service turned on. This will apply only to those having new service in the city; those who have service at the present time will not be effected.

The council then went into executive session to review the applications that have been turned in to fill the Chief of Police job which was vacated on August 31 by Bill McConnell. The council reviewed two applications, but took no action during this meeting.

Bike-A-Thon to be held next Saturday

Riders of all ages for the St. Jude Children's Research Hospital Wheels for Life Bike-a-thon are now asking Lockney citizens to back their efforts by pledging a contribution for each mile they ride.

"The money our riders earn will help continue St. Jude's life-saving study of childhood cancer that has become so important to children all over the world," said Bike-a-thon chairman Patti Purser.

"We'll be showing that we care about children by helping this cause," Patti said. "Please support your rider with a generous pledge, and then help them get the funds to us as soon as the ride is over."

"Each rider will be given a lap card when they register at Elementary School on Saturday, September 24," Purser said. "Every time they ride through the check points, we'll initial

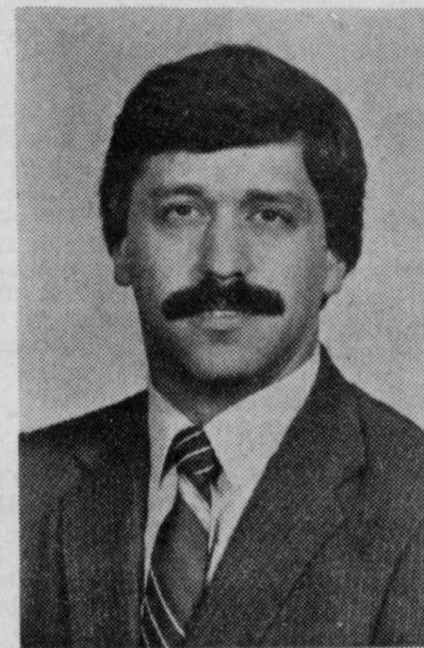
the card. At the end of the ride, we'll check it and sign it to show that the rider earned what the sponsor pledged." Riders will then return to the sponsors to collect the pledge.

Perspectives

Every wonder what happened to the Maharishi Mahesh Yogi? You remember him. He is the guy that brought us transcendental meditation and got people all over the U.S. looking at their belly buttons, muttering special words called mantras. As I recall TM caused quite a flap, especially on my college campus where TM was taught as an extracurricular course on campus, but religious organizations were not allowed to use campus buildings, even when they were registered campus organizations.

It seems that after not being much evident on the scene for the last several years, the Maharishi is back. This time he wants to save the world. In major magazines, "His Holiness", as he apparently calls himself, has taken out full page ads touting his newest venture, something called "The World Government of the Age of Enlightenment."

What Maharishi wants is for national governments to contact him and let him solve their problems. According to the ad, the "World Government" is non-political, non-religious, and will not take over any government they help.

They purport to apply the power of natural law to education, health, administration, defense, and rehabilitation. When they get through with their

consultation, governments will be able to rule without problems. In fact, Maharishi is apparently offering us a perfect life.

There are problems with what Maharishi says. If, for example, his group is non-political, why do they call themselves a government? And if they are non-religious, why is it they say their principles are found in Vedic literature, the religious writings of Hinduism?

More than these problems is the rather scary idea, to me at least, that this seems to fit in with the theories of my friends who insist we are living in the end times. They believe on world government will be formed, before the second coming, and the leader will be the beast of Revelation.

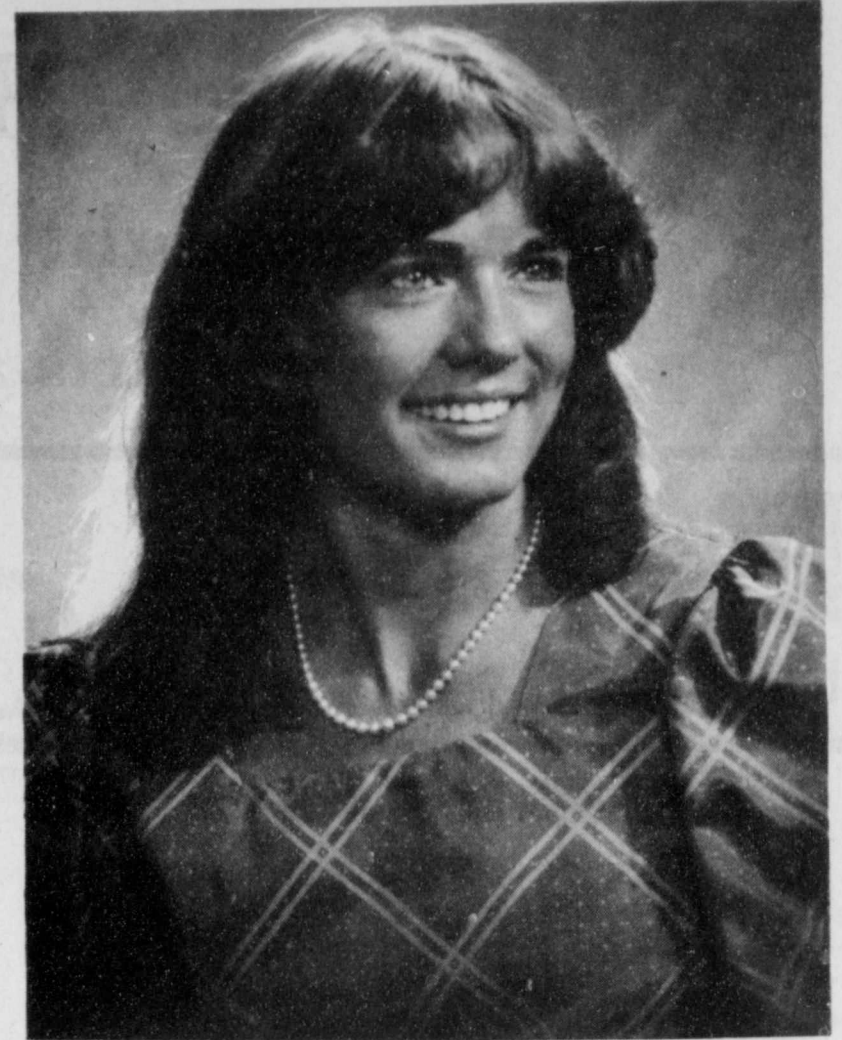
I have heard these things so long that I worry when some nut like Maharishi shows up on the scene. I'm not terribly worried that any major government will take him up on his offer, but you never know what small country may want to visit awhile. That could cause as many problems as it solves.

We shall have to wait and see what happens. But I would think we might want to especially watch for the not so obvious offers of salvation that may follow on the heels of this one. They are bound to come now that the subject has been breached.

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 8, 1983

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 91 proposes a constitutional amendment which requires a county with a population of 30,000 or more to be divided into not less than four nor more than eight justice of the peace precincts. A county with a population of 18,000 or more but less than 30,000 shall be divided into not less than two nor more than five justice of the peace precincts. A county with a population of less than 18,000 shall be designated as a single justice of the peace precinct or, upon a finding of necessity by the commissioners court, shall be divided into more than one justice of the peace precinct but not more than four. The amendment provides further, that in any precinct in which there is a city with a population of 18,000 or more, two justices of the peace shall be elected. The amendment allows a justice of the peace, constable or commissioner to continue in office until the expiration of his term, although a change in precinct boundaries results in the officer no longer being a resident of the precinct for which he was elected or appointed and allows a justice of the peace or constable to continue in office until the expiration of his term even though a change in precinct boundaries results in the abolishment of the precinct or more than one justice of the peace or constable serving the precinct. Vacancies in the office of justice of the peace or constable that result from a precinct boundary change shall be filled by the commissioners court until the next general election. The amendment would take effect on January 1, 1984, and counties with populations of less than 30,000 and with more than four justice of the peace and constable precincts would have until January 1, 1987 to comply with the amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing fewer justice of the peace and constable precincts in counties with a population of less than 30,000 and providing for continuous service by justices of the peace, constables, and county commissioners when precinct boundaries are changed."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 105 proposes a constitutional amendment which would limit a homestead in a city, town or village to a lot or lots amounting to not more than one acre of land, together with any improvements on the land. The constitutional requirement that, at the time of

designation, an urban homestead not exceed ten thousand dollars in value without reference to the value of any improvements on the land would be eliminated.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment replacing the limitation on the value of an urban homestead with a limitation based on size."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Legislature to enact legislation that permits representative associations of agricultural producers to collect refundable assessments on their product sales to be used solely to finance programs of marketing, promotion, research and education relating to those products. It provides, further, that adoption of the proposed constitutional amendment will bring into effect Senate Bill 607, Acts of the 68th Legislature, Regular Session, 1983, with rejection of the amendment resulting in Senate Bill 607 having no effect.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the advancement of food and fiber production and marketing in this state through research, education, and promotion financed by the producers of agricultural products."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 30 proposes a constitutional amendment which authorizes the Legislature to enact laws to provide for the succession of members of the Legislature in the event of enemy attack and allows the suspension of procedural rules imposed by the Constitution in the event of, or immediate threat of, enemy attack. The amendment empowers the Governor, after consultation with the Speaker of the House and the Lieutenant Governor, to suspend the constitutional requirement that the Legislature hold its sessions in Austin and allows the suspension of procedural rules by the Governor issuing a proclamation in which the House of Representatives and Senate concur by resolution approved by a majority of the members present. Suspension of the constitutional rules may not exceed a period of two years under a single proclamation; however, the Governor may renew the suspension by issuing a new proclamation concurred in by the House of Representatives and the Senate through a resolution approved by a major-

ity of the members present.

The amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing statutory provisions for succession of public office during disasters caused by enemy attack, and authorizing the suspension of certain constitutional rules relating to legislative procedure during those disasters or during immediate threat of enemy attack."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 12 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Legislature to enact legislation providing for the use of the permanent school fund and income from the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts. The amendment provides, further, that the Legislature may appropriate part of the available school fund for administration of the permanent school fund or of a bond guarantee program established pursuant to the amendment.

The constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing use of the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment which would permit the Legislature to provide for the garnishment of wages to enforce court-ordered child support payments. The garnishment remedy would not be available for other purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment allowing the Legislature to provide for additional remedies to enforce court-ordered child support payments."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 14 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Veterans' Land Board to provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed \$800 million to provide financing to veterans of the state. The amendment requires that three hundred million dollars of the state bonds be dedicated to the Veterans' Land Fund. The Fund is to be used to purchase land to be sold to veterans under such terms, rules and regulations as may be authorized by law. The amendment creates the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund and requires that \$500 million of the state bonds authorized by the amendment be dedicated to the Fund. The Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund will be utilized by the Veterans' Land Board for the purpose of making home mortgage loans to veterans for housing within the state and for the administrative

costs of administering the fund and issuing the bonds. The amendment provides, further, that if there is not money in either the Veterans' Land Fund or the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund available for payment of principal and interest on the general obligation bonds issued pursuant to the amendment, then money coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year is appropriated in an amount sufficient for payment of principal and interest due in that fiscal year.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment for financial assistance to veterans and to authorize the issuance of \$800 million in bonds of the state to finance the Veterans' Land Program and the Veterans' Housing Assistance Program."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes political subdivisions to exempt veterans' organizations from ad valorem taxation on their property. The amendment requires that the veterans' organizations be chartered by the United States Congress, be composed of members or former members of the United States Armed Forces, and be organized for patriotic and public service purposes. The amendment provides, further, that political subdivisions may exempt fraternal organizations from ad valorem taxation on their property. The amendment requires that the fraternal organizations be organized to perform and be primarily engaged in charitable or benevolent functions. The Legislature would be authorized to enact laws that prescribe eligibility requirements for fraternal organizations to benefit from the exemption and to pass legislation limiting the types or amount of property owned by a fraternal organization which may be exempted from ad valorem taxation.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize taxing units to exempt from taxation property of certain veterans' and fraternal organizations."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 70 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to provide, by local or general law, a method by which judges of statutory courts with probate jurisdiction may be assigned to any other statutory court with probate jurisdiction and to any constitutional county court in any county in the state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for assignment of judges of statutory probate courts to other statutory county courts with probate

jurisdiction and to county courts."

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 17 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Legislature to enact laws which would allow a city or town to relocate or replace sanitation sewer laterals on private property if done in conjunction with the replacement or relocation of sanitation sewer mains serving the property. The amendment requires that the law authorize the city or town to affix a lien on the private property, with the consent of the owner, to cover the costs of the replacement or relocation of the sewer laterals on the property. The lien may not be enforced until five years have expired since the date the lien was affixed. The amendment provides, further, that the law require that the costs of the replacement or relocation of the sewer laterals on the private property be assessed against the property with repayment to be amortized over a period not to exceed five years and at an interest rate provided by law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to permit a city or town to expend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of sanitation sewer laterals on private property."

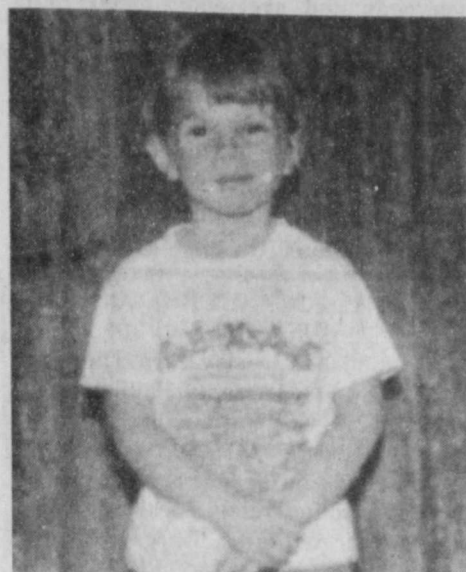
PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 13 proposes a constitutional amendment that would change the Board of Pardons and Paroles from a constitutional agency to a statutory agency and would eliminate the Governor's power to revoke paroles. The Legislature would be authorized to establish the Board of Pardons and Paroles and to require it to maintain records of its actions and the reasons for its actions. The amendment would empower the Legislature to enact parole laws. Constitutional language specifying the qualifications and terms of office for members of the Board of Pardons and Paroles is eliminated. The constitutional language governing the composition of the Board of Pardons and Paroles and the manner of filling vacancies on the Board is eliminated.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to change the Board of Pardons and Paroles from a constitutional agency to a statutory agency and to give the board power to revoke paroles."
