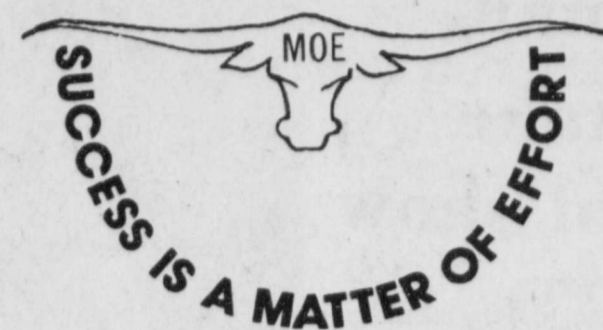

Farrow named new Lockney police chief

Monday was the first day on the job for Lockney's new police chief, Ken Farrow.

Farrow and his family will be moving to Lockney from Washington, D.C. where Ken has spent the last three years working for the United States Treasury as a security officer.

Farrow is 36 years old and he and wife, Barbara have two daughters, Danielle, age 8, and Patrice, age 5. Ken was born in McAllen and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Farrow have since moved to Lubbock.

Ken holds two college degrees, a bachelors degree from Columbia College in Missouri and a masters from Webster College in St. Louis. Both degrees are in law enforcement.

Ken served 17 years in the military services. He had a tour of duty in Germany, two tours in Vietnam, and one tour in Korea. While in the service he attained the rank of Major in the

Military Police and his specialty was criminal investigation. While in the service, Ken was highly decorated. He received some 27 medals, and several were for heroism. Some of the medals he received include the Distinguished Flying Cross, four bronze stars, three air medals and two medals from the Republic of Vietnam. Ken also attended all law enforcement classes possible while in the service.

Ken is a certified investigative hypnotist, a licensed Emergency Medical Technician, and a notary public.

Some of his hobbies include photography, locksmithing, reading, hunting and fishing. Though Ken admits it has been many years since he has had the time to hunt and fish.

When asked why he chose Lockney, Ken said he was tired of the "hustle and bustle" of big cities and he likes small towns and he wanted to be closer to his parents.

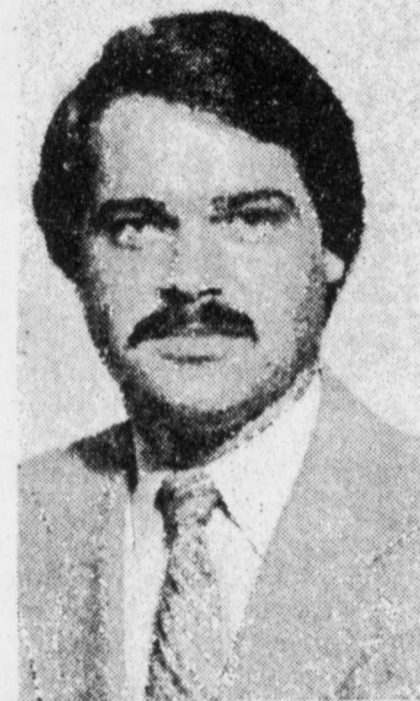
Hodel is active in both civic affairs and advertising organizations. He is a board member for the South Plains Council of Boy Scouts and the local multiple sclerosis society.

Four named to board

Four sorghum farmers were elected to six-year terms on the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board (TGSPB). One incumbent was re-elected. He was Olan "Jack" Crowl of Morse. New to the board are Jack Cobb of Plains, George Reeves of Dalhart and Delbert Watson of Muleshoe.

Elections are held biennially to fill four positions on the twelve-man Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board. The election was conducted by mail balloting which concluded on September 15. A canvassing committee met on September 22 to tally the votes and certify the election. Chairman of the canvassing committee was Lubbock County Judge Roderick Shaw. Other members of the committee were: Dirk Aaron, Assistant Agricultural Extension Agent of Lubbock County, Lynn Kemper, District Supervisor for Texas Department of Agriculture and Albert Scheele, TGSPB Chairman. Also present were

Mrs. Dolores Hibbs and Patrick Redman of Texas Department of Agriculture in Austin.

The Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board is composed of farmers who are elected by their fellow-producers to administer the program of market development, research and education that is supported by producer assessments of five-cents per ton collected at the point of first sale (or CCC loan) in a 29-county area of the Texas High Plains. The sole objective of the TGSPB is to work on projects that will improve the profitability of grain sorghum production.

TGSPB directors are non-salaried elected officials of the state of Texas. The newly elected board members will be sworn in at the next TGSPB meeting in November. At that time, the board will elect its officers for the next year.

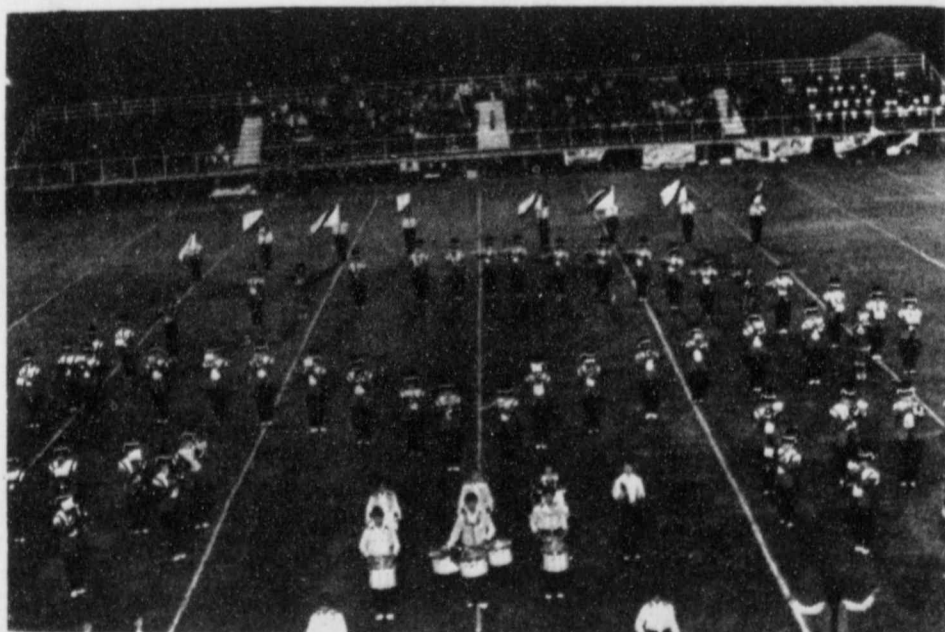
Randall Stapp wins football contest this week

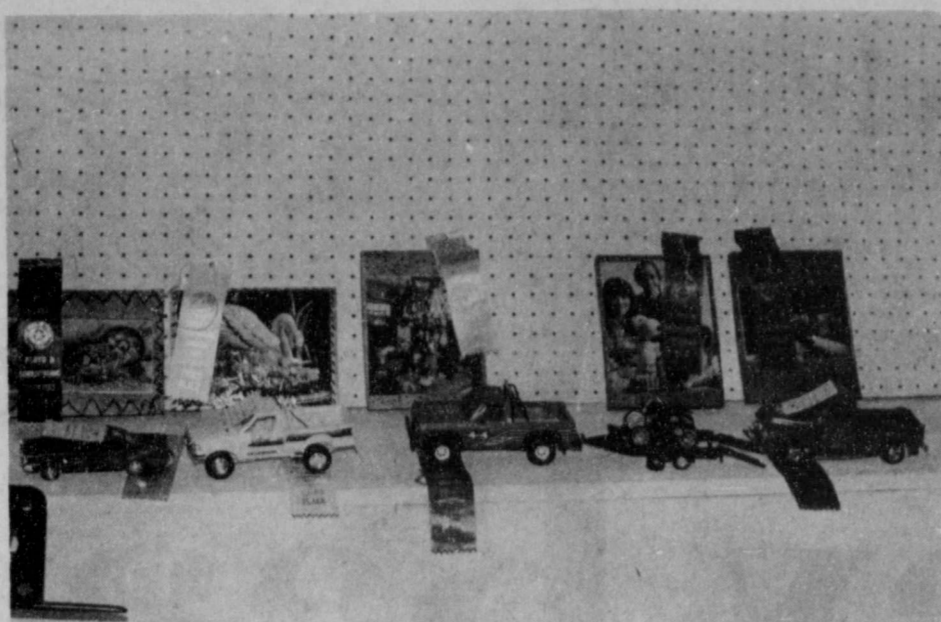

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Lockney Care Center Capers

Monday, Sept. 19th: I went home again Sunday and this time I was ready and waiting for my husband, for a change. Maybe because he was a little later than usual. We stopped in Floydada and he did a little grocery shopping, then home. It was a little windy so we stayed in the house, fixed a bite to eat, then we watched football. The first game of the double header was "Green Bay Packers and L.A. Rams." The Packers beat the Rams 16-15 or 14-13. I don't know which.

September 20th, Tuesday: Hallie came home this morning. I am glad to tell you. I did not know that, until I overheard Lewis Roberts telling a member of the church group about his sister being back home. On the way to the lunchroom I saw her. I stopped and took her hand and told her I was glad she was back home. We all had missed her very much.

The doctor saw me today and is changing some of my medication.

We had Bingo this afternoon, we all enjoyed it and all won fruit, but the blackout was won by three of us. Mary McCracken she chose the candy. Myrtle Howell also chose candy and myself. I chose the jewelry. Mary McCracken and myself sat in the dining room talking and I enjoy it and soon Mary Jo came back to set the tables for supper and when the juice, milk and water wagon came. Mary and I went to our own tables. After supper there was who else but Mary McCracken, Granny, Euna Bradshaw, Mary Jo, Lewis Roberts, and Richard Lanham watching TV. I was visiting and all the others went to bed one by one, except Mary McCracken and myself and we talked and talked until Mrs. Gibson our nurse came and ran us off to bed.

Friday: The downing of the South Korean Airliner was only the latest disastrous episodes in a series of attacks by Soviet gunners on military and commercial planes, a top-ranking U.S. official said that the Soviet air defense has standing orders to take action against any aircraft that appears in U.S.S.R. airspace. The Korean plane was not the first to be shot down by the Russians. In 1978 another Korean airliner wandered off course and was downed near Murmansk, with two killed. There, has been at least 28 aircraft, civilian and military, attacked over the past 30 years. In the U.S. News and World Report the Soviets are referred to as being "Trigger Happy", and I can't think of a more accurate description.

I surely had a nice surprise yesterday. My husband came to see me. We went to the Dairy Queen, had a snack and then drove out in the country to see what effect the freeze had on the crops.

Laverne Christian and Jackie Yenhardt went to Lubbock to a meeting and didn't get back until about 3:30 or 4:00 p.m. and Jackie called the hospital and asked how Ada Hopper was feeling and they told her that she passed away about 2 a.m. this morning. Our grievances and prayers go out to her family, from everybody here at the home. We are going to miss her for a long time.

Janis Nickols didn't come today with ceramics. I guess they still have a lot of

paper work to do if "Kim Sherman" and Janis Nickols read this column. I want to tell you we all miss you, and hurry back.

Thursday, 22nd: We got up early and had breakfast, we had exercises and then church. We enjoyed it as much as we could because we had the flag at half mast. We had Ada on our minds also.

Mamie Wofford has not felt good the last two days, but I was glad she came for breakfast this morning. Myrtle Howell was not at breakfast this morning.

Mrs. Mary Green is still going out with her niece Carol to her own little house here in Lockney and cooks meals in her own kitchen. She is going to do it every day next week too. I sure have missed her at dinner times. She tells me all about it at supper time.

Richard Lanham, John Smith and Esker Pyle are soaking up the sunshine today, after a cold day yesterday. Jackie said they had twenty six degrees at Silverton. I did not hear what the temperature was here in Lockney, but it was cold enough.

Well we had a float in the parade last Saturday. We didn't start getting it ready making paper flowers of all colors and sizes until Wednesday or Thursday. Then we kept running out of material and it was a mad house getting everybody ready who was going to be riding the float if the float had been longer everybody in the home who was able would have been on it. After the parade we came back home, but we

didn't know who won first prize. It was a mystery. Then Jackie came to work last Monday and had Floydada radio station going and she said she was not sure but it sounded like we "The Home and Care Center" had got first prize. We got the "Lockney Beacon" today and Jackie showed me our picture on the front and Jackie said "that seals it, we won first prize." Oh, I was glad to hear that.

Friday, 24th: After breakfast, we went into the lobby and thought we were going to exercise but instead Jackie talked about the book review. We could hear stories or tapes and read them if we liked that better. She already had a number of tapes and more coming next week. I think we are going to enjoy them.

Rabbits squeeze by Longhorns

Though Lockney dominated Friday night's football game against Ralls, the Longhorns were defeated 10-0 by the Rabbits. The story of the game, according to head coach Bob Purser was in turnovers. Lockney had five and Ralls had only one.

Lockney had 10 first downs and were inside the Ralls 20 yard line five times but were unable to score all night. All points scored by Ralls were in the first quarter of the game and were scored by Ralls running back Robert Hall. Hall kicked a 38 yard field goal, made a nine yard touchdown run and then kicked the extra point.

Buffo Rodriguez and Richie Thornton lead Lockneys ground attack with Rodriguez gaining 77 yards and Thornton gaining 68 yards rushing. Quarterback Brent Hallmark completed only 5 of 17 pass attempts but those five

passes gained 111 yards.

Penalties also played a big part in the game. Lockney had 10 penalties for 85 yards and Ralls had 8 for 55 yards.

In the second quarter on a fourth and 10 play Ralls passed and Lockney's Abel Salas intercepted. Though they got down to the Ralls 13 yard line Lockney was unable to score.

Lockney was not only plagued by turnovers this week the Longhorns lost Danny Perez this week. Danny plays guard and end positions and had to have surgery on his right knee Tuesday and will be out for the rest of the year.

Jackie Cunyus was back this week after having a separated shoulder which happened during the Petersburg game.

Tomorrow night Lockney will face the Abernathy Antelopes in Abernathy. Game starts at 7:30. Coach Purser says that Abernathy will be by far the best team the Longhorns have faced this season. Coach Purser also commented that he feels that the boys have improved a great deal since last weeks game and they are getting better as each week passes.

This week the varsity got a new player from the freshman team. Ricky

Brotherton will be playing on the varsity for the rest of the year. Purser stated that freshman Brotherton and Dickie Hernandez would be playing more as the season progresses, and that the sophomores would probably be seeing more action.

Players of the week on the varsity team this week are offensive back and defensive lineman, Buffo Rodriguez, offensive lineman Monty Teeter, and defensive back John Torrez.

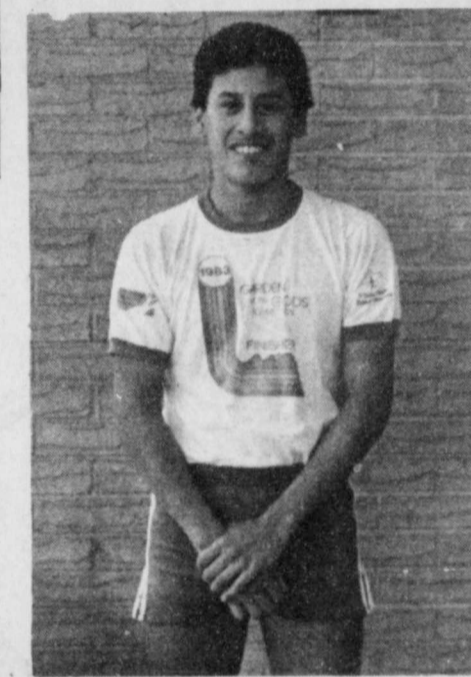

After-school is healthy snack time

Along with the school bells ringing and children returning to the classrooms, comes the age-old problem of new ideas for healthy after school snacks.

All too often, children consume snacks that are high in fat, calories, sodium, or sugar. Typical after school snacks usually include candy, soft drinks, ice cream, chips or various other items. These foods are acceptable on occasion, but as daily after school snacks, they provide high calories with little nutrition.



Advanced planning by moms and caretakers can aid children in gradually being "weened" from their typical snacks to more nutritious, wholesome snacks. TEXAS PUMPKIN MUFFINS is a good alternative snack to the typical cupcake.

muffins could also be served as the bread accompaniment to the evening meal or served as dessert with fresh or canned fruit.

"Walking Salads" are another healthy snack. Some ideas to give your imagination a nudge include:

Coring an apple or tomato and filling with cottage cheese or fill the apple with a mixture of peanut butter, carrots and raisins.

Fill celery sticks with peanut butter and sprinkle with sunflower seeds.

Wrap a cabbage leaf around a slice of cheese.

Make a mini-kabob with fresh vegetables - cucumber, cherry tomatoes, broccoli, and carrot curls.

Roll sliced chicken or turkey in a lettuce leaf.

Snacks for the diabetic, as well as the non diabetic child include:

Homemade popsicles which can be made by freezing apple, orange, pineapple, or grape juice in 3-ounce paper cups, using ¼ cup juice. One serving = ½ fruit exchange for all except grape which equals 1 fruit exchange.

The seasoned cereal snack, sometimes called "TEXAS TRASH," is a very good substitute for chips. It is easy to make and can be stored in a covered jar for several weeks - if it last that long.



Texas Pumpkin Muffins

- 1 1/2 C. sifted all-purpose flour
3/4 tsp. salt
1/2 C. sugar
2 tsp. double-acting baking powder
1 tsp. cinnamon
2 eggs
3 T. melted butter
1/2 C. milk
1 C. canned mashed pumpkin
1 1/2 C. chopped pecans
3 tsp. grated orange rind

Seasoned Cereal Snack

- 1 1/2 C. wheat square cereal

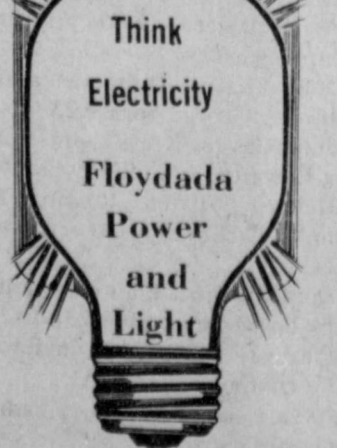

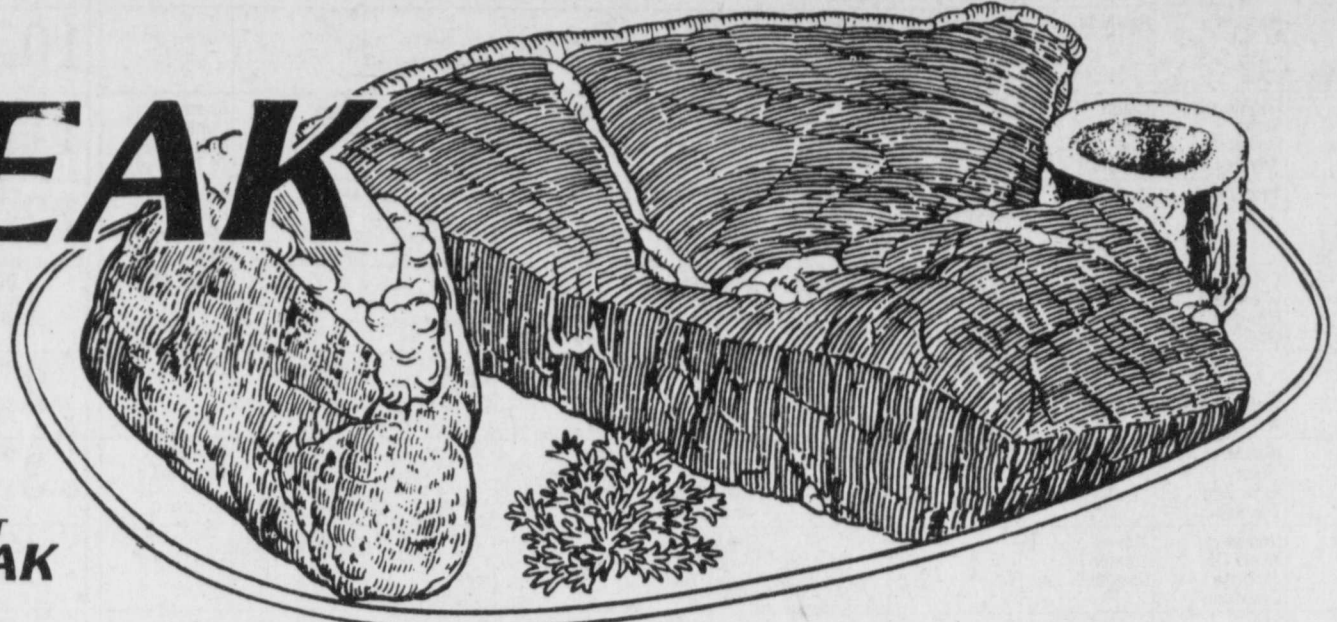
