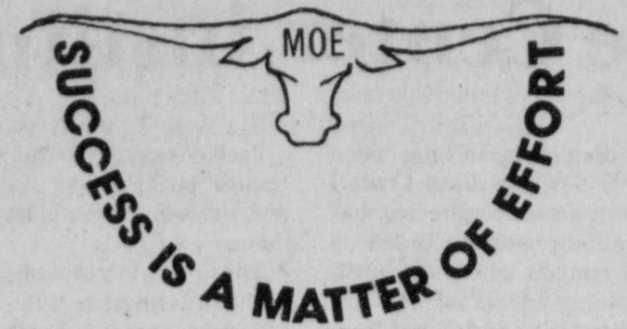

Horn's surprise experts with win

Picked as 21 point underdogs in Friday night's game against Abernathy, Lockney surprised even the experts when they defeated the heavily favored Antelopes on homecoming night with a score of 34 to 20.

Lockney's first scoring drive came with the very first possession of the ball when Lockney used six plays to travel 80 yards to the touchdown. Lockney's Abel Salas returned the kickoff to the Lockney 40 but the ball was called back to the 20 on a penalty. Buffo Rodriguez carried from the 20 to the 44 yard line and this was followed by a 40 yard pass from Brent Hallmark to Robert Rendon to set the Horns up on the Abernathy 16. From there it took three plays with Buffo scoring from five yards out. The extra point attempt was no good.

Abernathy's possession lasted only a short time as two excellent defensive plays by Terry Mathis and an incomplete pass forced Abernathy to relinquish the ball. However, Lockney was also unable to capitalize on their possession at this time.

Abernathy then had another chance at the ball but on a 2nd and 7 play Abernathy fumbled the ball and Scott Poole recovered for the Horns. This set up Lockney's second scoring drive of the night. With the ball on the Abernathy 43, Lockney had only moved the ball 4 yards when Brent Hallmark connected with Robert Rendon for 24 yards and then Jackie Cunyus stepped in and hit Rendon for Lockney's second score of the quarter. Again the extra point failed but Lockney had a surprising 12-0 lead.

During the second quarter both defensive teams saw that neither team had a clear advantage until the last minutes of the quarter when Abernathy scored its first touchdown of the night. The extra point attempt failed due to a bad snap and the score was Lockney 12, Abernathy 6.

The second half saw Abernathy start playing like predicted. They were able to score in less than 2 minutes after the kick off and used only two plays. The extra point was good and for the first time the Antelopes were ahead 13-12.

Following the Lopes touchdown, neither team was able to capitalize on several scoring opportunities. However with only seconds remaining in the third quarter the Lopes again scored and the score was Lopes 20, Horns 12. That was the last score the Lopes made Friday.

The fourth quarter saw Lockney turn the game around. Lockney received the kickoff and put together a 9 play, 67 yard drive, which included a Cunyus pass to Rendon for the score and a 2 point run by Cunyus. Now with the score tied at 20 each and 10:20 left in the fourth quarter, Lockney showed the Lopes what MOE was. During Abernathy's possession of the ball after the touchdown, on a 2nd and 17 play

Abernathy fumbled and an alert Terry Mathis recovered his second fumble of the night. This set the Horns up to score again. When tailback Jerry Mathis took the pitch on the fourth play of the drive and headed around the right and Mathis then pulled up and hit a wide open Rendon for his third touchdown of the night. This time the extra point by Moses Blanco was good and Lockney pulled out in front with a score of 27-20.

With 2:03 left in the game Abernathy had the ball and on a second and 10 pass play the Abernathy quarterback got off a pass to what appeared to be a wide open receiver, however Horn Scott Poole stopped in front of the receiver and picked off the ball and made a 30 yard run for the final touchdown of the

game. The extra point by Blanco was good and the final score was Lockney 34, Abernathy 20. This brings Lockney to a 2-2-1 record for the season.

Players of the week this week are on defense Terry Mathis, George Basaldua and John Torrez. Offensive players of the week are Moses Blanco and Robert Rendon.

This week Lockney begins district play against Floydada. The game will begin at 7:30 and will be played in Lockney. Thursday night at 7:30 there will be a bonfire at the fairgrounds. Let's go out and support the Horns and cheer them on to their first district victory.

Hospital board holds regular meeting

The Board of Directors of Lockney General Hospital District held their regular monthly meeting and the annual budget hearing on Tuesday, September 27, at 8:00 p.m. in the hospital board room. Members in attendance were: Rusty Baccus, President; Kenneth Tate, Vice-President; Larry Golden, Secretary; Hubert Frizzell and Chester Carthel. Others present were Guy Hazlett, Administrator.

The meeting was called to order by Rusty Baccus, President of the Board at 8:00 p.m.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

Guy Hazlett, Administrator, presented an overview of the 1983-84 Hospital District Budget. Since several of the board members had been out of town during portions of September, and because of the amount of detail presented in the budget, the Board postponed a full approval of the budget until October 11, 1983.

Under the regular monthly business portion of the meeting, the board

approved the revisions to the hospital's personnel policy and procedures.

Also, under old business, the Board renewed the agreement with Mathis, West, Huffines, & Co. for auditing services for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1983. Mathis, West, Huffines & Co. are located in Wichita Falls, Texas and were engaged as the auditing firm which performed the previous fiscal years audit.

Under new business, the Administrator presented the financial/Statistical Report for the month of August, 1983. The month of August showed a revenue of \$98,736.00, and operating expense of \$107,800.00 and a net loss from hospital operations of \$9,064.00. The average daily census for inpatients during the month of August was 10.84 and the average daily nursery census was 2.13. These figures show an increase over the August 1982 figures.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned by the president of the board at 11:00 p.m.

Kenneth Wyatt to exhibit artwork at bank

The art work of renowned Western Artist, Kenneth Wyatt, will be on exhibit Tuesday through Friday, October 11-14, at First National Bank in Lockney. All art work shown may be purchased and the exhibit is free to the public.

Kenneth Wyatt of Tulia, Texas, is a Western Artist. But more than just a Western Artist, Mr. Wyatt is the West and has been all his life.

Wyatt's dedication to his work and his lifestyle has led him to an interesting career that includes religion, public speaking, writing and art. He pastored a church at the age of 14. Since then, his pastorates have included a total of nine churches between 1944 and 1967. He is an ordained deacon and an ordained elder. Wyatt is a graduate of Stephenville High School, John Tarleton Junior College, Stephenville, McMurry College and did graduate work at Baylor University in Waco, and at Iliff School of Theology in Denver, Colorado. Wyatt holds a Doctorate of Fine Arts from McMurry College.

Wyatt's representative, James Jolley, will be present to answer questions and guide the visitors through the exhibit. The exhibit will include oil paintings, sculptors in bronze and pewter, books filled with Wyatt's pictures and writings, and prints of his

paintings. Kenneth Wyatt is a name that's well known in the panhandle of Texas and many other parts of the country. The name belongs to a man of many talents and he uses those talents to express his feelings about life and his faith in God.

Jolley said, "A true artist paints true things. Things he has experienced and can appreciate when other people experience them too. Happiness, love, sorrow, a hard day's work, a day in the house of God, the cool of the evening and the heat of the day. A true artist paints the beauty of the flowers and the blue skies and the peaceful pines and the majestic mountains, but he also paints the sweat and callouses and the weariness of a hard day's work whether it's done by the cowboy, the farmer or the doctor or the woman who toils to care for her family and home. A true artist paints an interpretation into his work. Kenneth Wyatt is a true artist."

Kenneth Wyatt's work, which includes original oils, bronze sculptors, pewter sculptors, books he has authored and art prints, will be on display at the bank.

You are invited to come to the show and bring a friend or two with you. You may find a part of your life painted into a Kenneth Wyatt picture.

Care Center institutes new reading program

A new reading program has been instituted at the Lockney Care Center. Jackie Gearhart, activities director, has been busy ordering books recorded on cassettes and records which are available to all the residents of the Care Center. The materials are ordered from the National Library Service for the blind and handicapped. The library is funded by the Library of Congress and by the government.

These materials are free to those who have disabilities that prevent them from being able to read because of visual or physical handicaps. There are thousands of books available and the subjects range from animals to westerns. Jackie has already ordered some 110 books and several are here and ready for the residents use. When ordering books from this source the library also sends tape recorders and record players to those who use the recorded books and these are also free.

Some of the books Jackie has ordered include Louis L'Amour, Paul Harvey's - The Rest of the Story, The Wagon's West series which is set in the northern United States and has old west content, Erma Bombeck books - "because everyone needs to laugh", Mark Twaine books, and the Old and New Testament in both King James and New American versions.

Another book she has ordered and seems to be resident favorite in Miss Piggy's Guild To Life. Miss Piggy, self made star of the muppet TV shows and movies shares her secrets to beauty, dieting, fashion, and finance. Two of Miss Piggy's secrets are never wear yellow lipstick and never put flowers up your nose. Jackie has also ordered books on Egyptology for one of the residents who is interested in Egyptian history. She has also had several requests for books on animals, mysteries and romance novels.

Jackie says that the residents can request books on just about any subject and she will try to obtain the books for them.

These recorded materials are loaned to the ordering party for 30, 60, 90, or 120 days and the books at the Care Center are loaned for 120 days to give all the residents a chance to enjoy them. If needed for longer Jackie has to call the library for an ok but there is no problem there.

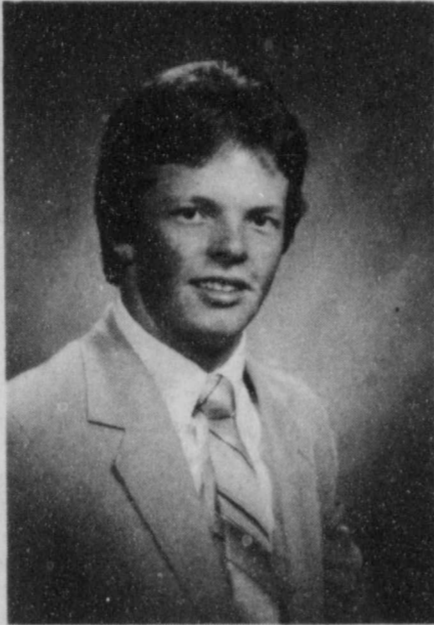
In addition to the recorded books, Jackie has been recording music for the residents to enjoy. She will also be getting some large print books for the residents use. The Care Center already receives the large print Reader's Digest. The large print books Jackie will be ordering are not free like the tapes and anyone who would like to make a donation or possibly a memorial toward the purchase of these large print books should contact Jackie Gearhart at the Care Center.

The reading program will get into full swing in October, but in September Jackie started discussing the program with the residents and they have begun using the recorded books. Jackie is planning to review one book a week for the residents interest and then they can check out the book for their use. Jackie will be selecting two residents for the positions of librarians who will help her get the recordings checked in and out as the residents use them.

Jackie is to be commended for her work on this new program for the resident of the Care Center by enabling them to "read" again.

The Texas Tech University Music Department has announced that its list of scholarship recipients for academic year 1983-84 includes Billy Karl Race, Jr., of Lockney. The freshman piano major is the recipient of one of the university's Piano Scholarships.

Set up in 1971, the Piano Scholarships stipulate that the recipients be piano majors in good academic standing. They

are funded by interest on money left to the university by the estate of Eva Browning, a Lubbock piano teacher.

The Texas Tech Music Department awarded over \$50,000 in scholarships to 130 undergraduate and graduate students for this year. These awards range per year in amounts from \$100 for band scholarships to \$1250 for the first place Browning freshman piano winner.

General scholarships are available in the areas of woodwinds, brass, percussion, strings/guitar/harp, piano, organ, voice and music theatre. Although most music scholarships are designated for music majors only, a limited number of scholarships are available to the non-music major.

Scheduled auditions for scholarships, all of which are competitive, will be held on the Texas Tech campus on Friday and Saturday, February 24-25 (University Day), Saturday, March 31 and Saturday, April 7. Taped auditions are also acceptable in lieu of personal appearance when necessary, and auditions on dates other than those designated may be arranged by request.

My husband had been working on his father's farm (you know the one with the broken leg) all of last week and he was not feeling good when he picked me up on Sunday, he was going to see how he felt in the morning and if he was no better, he would see the doctor today. He didn't come and see me, so I know he didn't go to see the doctor.

He was going home last Saturday night from Flomot and it was just about dark, when he turned off the highway onto the dirt road to go home and about halfway he saw two bulls going south, he thought they had come from the gravel pit and he tried to turn them north, but those two bulls just would not turn north, they turned south everytime, and they meant to go south, so he went home. But when he got home, there was 14 more bulls all over the place. He managed to get Richard Morgans two bulls back in his pasture. He called Vance Campbell and he came and was looking for bulls with a flashlight. He met us going home on Sunday and stopped to tell us he thought he had them all back in the pasture but the wire gate looked like it was shredded wire. Now he has to go and see where his two southbound bulls are. He said he doesn't think there is anybody in Floyd County who has as much trouble with his bulls, as he does.

Tuesday, Sept. 27th: Well, today is another day. Our grandson is three years old today. Happy birthday Blake and save me a piece of cake.

We should have had the "Church of Christ" group today, but they called and said they had a funeral today and wouldn't be able to come. So Jackie played some hymns on the piano and sang too. And Jackie, I want to thank you for your help, you have a beautiful voice and I loved it.

Mary Green is still going out with Carol, her niece, and tells me all about it at supper time. I am going to have to put a stop to all of this gadding about. I am getting lonely, nobody to talk to at dinner time. I don't begrudge her going out, she is entitled to have a little fun. But I still miss her.

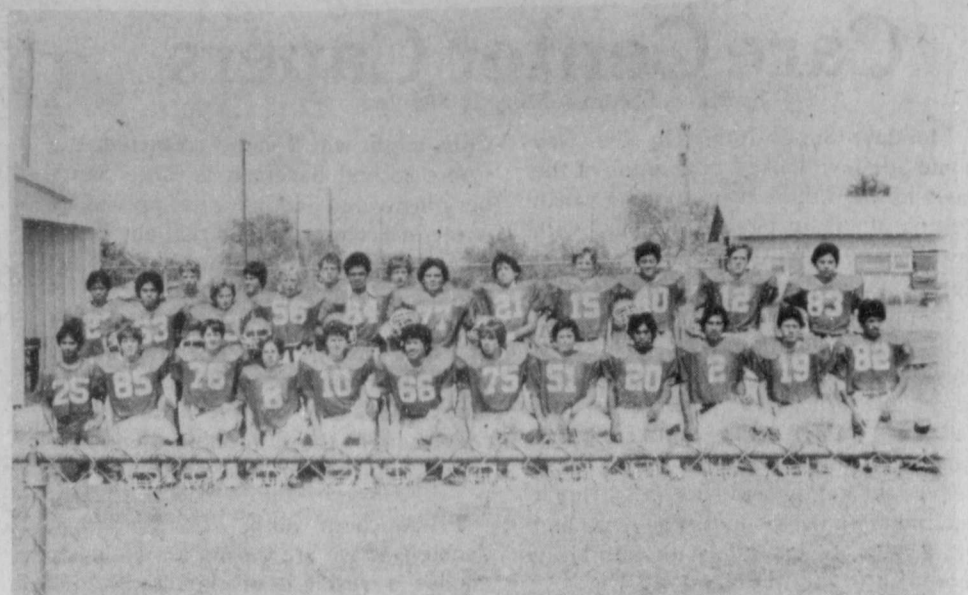

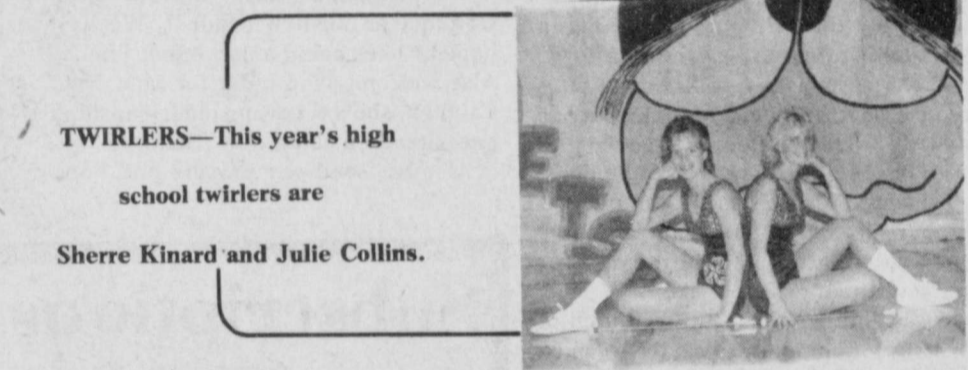

Cook of the Week



HEATHER HOLT

Over the next few weeks we will be featuring members of the 4-H cooking classes with our readers.

Our first 4-H cook of the week is Heather Holt. Heather is a varsity cheerleader, treasurer of the sophomore class, a student council representative, a member of band, and she enjoys sports of all kinds including basketball, tennis and softball. Heather is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Holt.

Heather chose to share two recipes with our readers. The first is cheese balls with which both she and her brother Kip have made and won the county 4-H food shows.

CHEESE BALLS

- ½ cup soft oleo
- 2 cups finely grated sharp cheese
- ¼ teaspoon tabasco
- 1 teaspoon paprika
- 1 cup flour
- ½ teaspoon salt

Blend together and shape into balls around stuffed green olives. Place balls on cookie sheet and freeze. Preheat oven to 400 degrees and bake 12 to 15 minutes.

The second recipe Heather chose to share is for potato soup.

POTATO SOUP

Cut into small cubes: 6-8 cups potatoes (10-12 medium size potatoes) Set aside. Sauté the following in 3 tablespoons of oleo for 5 minutes.

- 2 large stalks celery-chopped
- 1 large onion-chopped
- 2-3 cloves garlic-minced
- Add above to following:
- 10 cups water
- potatoes
- 2 medium carrots-grated
- 2 tablespoons instant chicken broth
- ½ teaspoon paprika
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper
- 1 slightly rounded tablespoon season salt
- 1 tablespoon dried parsley

Let simmer 8-10 minutes. Remove from heat and let sit 5 minutes. Stir in 1-16 ounce carton of sour cream.

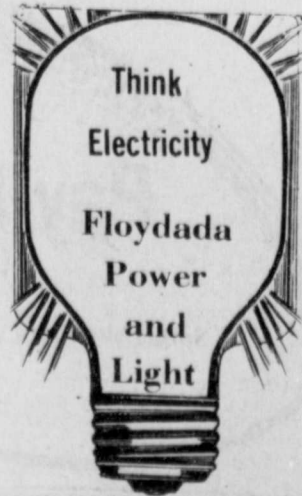
