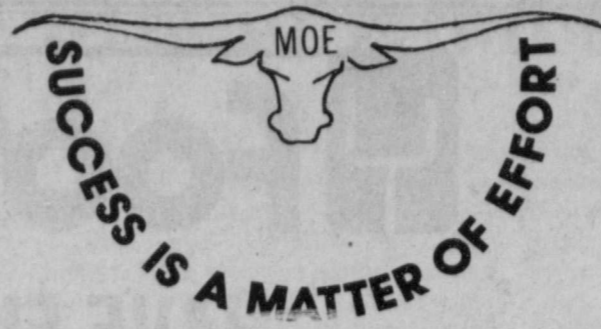

The induction service began with NHS officers, president Glen Sutterfield, vice president, Shawnda Brock, secretary Karyn Foster, and treasurer Gary Bigham, speaking on what qualities are necessary for induction into NHS. Those qualities include not only scholarship but service, leadership and character.

## High School and JH hold joint open house

The Lockney Junior High and High Schools held a joint open house Monday night. The open house was for parents and anyone interested in the school system. Both schools had a very good turnout with about 70 parents present in each school. Parents of students in each school attended general assemblies conducted by principals Lusk and Poole.

Both principals discussed school curriculum, grading policies and progress reports and report cards.

After Mr. Lusk was through addressing the Junior High parents they were invited to pick up copies of their children's schedules and visit the classrooms and teachers. Parents were also served refreshments in the Junior High Library.

High School Principal James Poole discussed several things with the high school parents. In addition to curriculum, and grading policies he discussed classification credits, graduation requirements, class ranking and scholastic honors.

Classification credits are as follows: sophomores must have five credits, juniors must have 10 credits and seniors must have 10 credits, bringing the requirements for graduation to 25 credits. Graduation requirements set by the state are math, two credits; English,

three credits; social studies, three; science, 2; health, 1/2; P.E., 1/2; state electives, six; and local electives, seven. However starting with the 1984-85 school year students must have three credits in math, four in English and five local elective credits. Even with this change students will still need only 25 credits to graduate. The Lockney High School presently offers 42 various courses from which students may choose.

Mr. Poole also discussed the accelerated classes offered in Lockney. These include English IV, Biology II, Physics, gifted and talented, Trigonometry, Elementary Analysis, Computer Programming, Algebra III and IV, Shorthand, and Accounting.

Mr. Poole also explained about the exemption policy and excused absences.

Parents were then invited to pick up copies of the children's schedules and visit the classrooms and teachers.

The National Honor Society hosted a reception for parents, faculty, and guests in the high school library.

One of the attractions in both schools was the classrooms where the computers are. Parents were able to observe as their children showed them what they had learned and see the children demonstrate their computer skills.

# PERSPECTIVES

There is a lady in Haskell, Texas who thinks she is John Wesley Hardin's second wife. Hardin was a renown gunslinger in the last century. Vicki Henshaw says she remembers details of his life with Hardin's second wife Helen.

Ms. Henshaw also claims an "inner sense" which allows her to know things about people and to see the future. She has taken classes to develop her psychic powers, and claims hers is an ability which comes from God.

We have a fascination with this sort of thing. Someone is always claiming to have powers which defy the normal. Some of them, like Jeanne Dixon, have fashioned a reputation and a living around their so-called abilities. Perhaps we seek some sort of assurance that the supernatural really exists.

But is there any basis in the concept that these powers find their origination in God? Do prophets really live in our midst? I tend to think not, not in psychics, anyway.

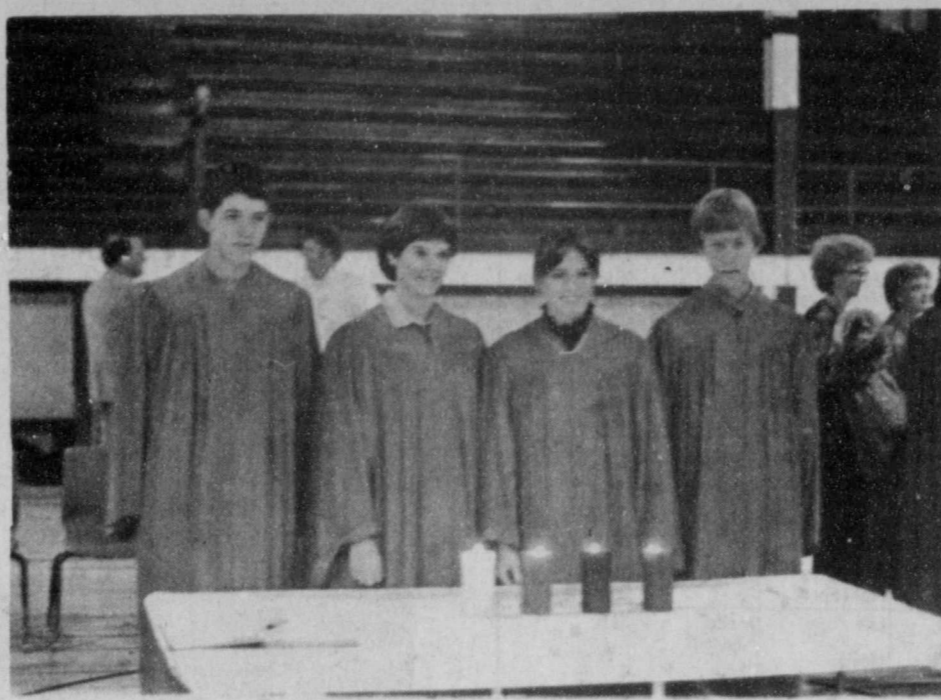
From the Biblical perspective we understand that these powers do indeed exist in the realm of the supernatural. (Of course, I assume the Biblical record to be accurate and reliable.) We should see whether or not this particular activity stems from God.

Prophets often foretold the future.

One of the criteria for a prophet was that his predictions, when made, would come true. If we examine the predictions of the so-called modern day prophet with any kind of honesty we find that their predictions are accurate at a level of around 50 percent or less. In other words, you could do as well flipping a coin, and probably better by reading the daily newspaper and using your brain a bit.

Foretelling the future was not the prophets primary activity. They tended instead to bring messages of gloom to individuals and nations that did not follow God. Most of their predictions are in conjunction with those messages. In times when that was not the case, their predictions were seen as validation of their authority to speak. The kind of activity reported by psychics, and other like Ms. Henshaw who disavow that term, is never credited to an act of God.

The Old Testament calls such activity divination, and those who practice it are diviners, seers, and oracles. They receive universal condemnation. I don't claim to know where such ability comes from - the theories are broad and diverse, even among Bible believers - but I do think there is no basis in the Scripture for claiming it comes from God. The burden lies on the practitioners.
