## Pheasant season opens Saturday in Floyd County

Pheasant season in Floyd County opens Saturday, December 10 and will continue until December 25. Limits for this year are 2 cocks per day and 4 in possession.

Other seasons open at the same time are sandhill crane season, opened December 3 thru February 12, 1984. Cranes have a daily limit of 3 and a possession limit of 6.

Goose Season opened November 1 and will run through January 22. Bag limit for geese is 5, not to include more than 2 Canada, Black Brant, of White Fronted geese in the aggregate. Possession limit is ten and may not include more than 4 of the above mentioned geese.

Duck season for Floyd County opened November 1 and will run until January 22, 1984. Daily bag limits on ducks are based on a point system. The total points for each day is 100. Using the point chart below can help to figure points for each species and sex of ducks.

**Duck Daily Bag Limit:** One to 10 ducks in the aggregate based on the following 100-plus point system.

**100-Point Ducks—Canvasbacks.**  
**70-Point Ducks—**Hooded mergansers, mottled ducks, black ducks, Mexican-like ducks, mallard hens, red-heads and wood ducks.

**10-Point Ducks—**Gadwalls, mergansers (except hooded mergansers), pintails, scaups, shovelers, all species of teal (blue-winged, cinnamon and


green-winged) and wigeon.  
**20-Point Ducks—**All other species and sexes not listed above.

**Illegal Ducks—**The season is closed on blackbellied whistling ducks, fulvous whistling ducks and masked ducks. Quail season opened October 29 and will close January 29.

The opening of pheasant season brings out more hunters, some from out of the country that are not as familiar with the county and land owners in this area. It is advisable that, if one is going to be hunting on land other than his own, that he check with landowners for permission to hunt on their land and also to find out if he has invited other people to hunt on the land. If so, it is good to know the whereabouts of the hunting parties. By knowing where everyone is, hunting accidents can be avoided.

In conjunction with opening of pheasant season residents of the Providence community are holding the annual pheasant hunters breakfast. Cost for the breakfast is \$3.50 per person and the breakfast will be held at the Trinity Lutheran Church at Providence. The breakfast will include omelettes, sausage, biscuits, gravy, and all the fixings. Everyone is invited to come by from 5-8 a.m. and have a good breakfast before a big day of hunting.

Remember to use all safety precautions while hunting this year and avoid any accidents.

## Tye Company aides in soil conservation with drill

The Lockney based Tye Company is working together with the Soil Conservation Service (SCS) and the local ASCS office to promote soil conservation through no till planting.

Tye Company is aiding in soil conservation by working through dealers to lease two different designs of its no till drills. The most requested drill at this time is the Pasture Pleaser drill. This drill can be used for interseeding and overseeding pasture land with no plowing. It can also be used for double cropping and may be used in conventional seedbeds. The drill is equipped with individually spring loaded swivel durafilte coulters which can cut through stubble, sod, or grass. These coulters prepare a track for the double disk openers which deposit seeds uniformly through the row. The disc openers are followed by spring loaded press wheels which firm the soil around the seeds for proper germination.

One of the most important factors in no till planting is weed control since no cultivation is used. It is important to use the proper amount herbicide at planting time to control weeds. This is easily done with the Pasture Pleaser drill in that it has a front mounted fertilizer attachment that drops dry pellet fertilizer directly in front of the coulters blade. It also has a rear mounted fertilizer hopper that drops fertilizer in the furrow after the double disk opener. Additional seed hoppers made to go with this drill are suitable for planting fluffy, hard to plant, small seeds such as alfalfa, clover and rye grass. The large hopper is made for use with wheat, sorghum, oats and soybeans.

The other drill in use now is the Stubble drill which works on the same principle as the Pasture Pleaser but is made to plant directly on corn, wheat, or soybean stubble.

The Pasture Pleaser drill has been put to practical use locally in Silverton. Don Brown, owner of Brown McMurtry Implement in Silverton, used the drill to

sow approximately 60 acres of land that has been in pasture for several years. This pasture has mesquite and other grasses on it but the grass had been grazed down and there was nothing left to graze. Brown, SCS representatives and Tye representatives sowed the wheat in a test plot around Labor Day and the wheat can be grazed from now until March. No preplowing was necessary due to the unique design of the Pasture Pleaser drill.

Tye has also planted a test plot about 1 mile east of the Tye Company facility in Lockney.

These no till drills have been used successfully all over the United States and especially in the eastern U.S. where farmers have great amounts of soil erosion due to rain and wind.

Researchers have been studying the problem of soil erosion for over 20 years. They looked for and tried to find the best no till drill to help alleviate soil erosion. Since the mid 70's researchers have studied no till planting and have found that it does definitely cut down on erosion.

Andy Anderson, marketing manager for Tye Company, said that at the Soybean Association meeting in Nashville earlier this year experts reported on just how much soil erodes when conventional methods are used. For every 1 bushel of corn harvested 2 bushels of top soil are lost and for every 1 bushel of soybeans harvested 6 bushels of soil are lost. With a report like this one, farmers can see good reasons to investigate no till farming further.

Farmers interested in finding out more about these Tye Company drills and how to go about using the drills are urged to contact their local Soil Conservation Service, the ASCS office or the two dealers who lease the no till drills. Brown McMurtry in Silverton and Scott Tractor in Plainview.

## Hospital Board hears administrators report

Lockney General Hospital District Board of Directors held its regular monthly meeting on November 17, 1983, at 7:00 p.m., in the hospital board room. Members present were: Rusty Baccus-president, Kenneth Tate-vice president, Larry Golden-secretary, Chester Carthel-member, and Hubert Frizzell-member. Others present were: Guy Hazlett, II, Administrator.

The minutes of the previous meeting were unanimously approved as printed. The Administrator presented a verbal report on each department to the board. The board reviewed the following items:

\*The summary of delinquent taxes for previous tax years, totaling \$45,308.04, as of 10-31-83.

\*A price quotation from Combustion Service Co., Inc., Lubbock, Texas, for \$6,753.00, or repairs to the hospital's incinerator which is 7 years old.

\*The November 11, 1983, Texas Hospital Association, Legislative Bulletin, regarding U.S. Senate Committee Medicare and Medicaid Plans to further reduce payments to hospitals or to limit rate increases 4 percent for two years.


\*Medicare inpatient claims processing time study for the period November, 1982 through October, 1983, showing that the Hospital is submitting billings and receiving Medicare payment more quickly than the average of all Texas Hospitals.

\*County precinct and voting box maps.

\*Hospital reimbursement under the new Medicare DRG Hospital Reimbursement System, which became effective 10-1-83.

Guy Hazlett, Administrator, presented a verbal financial and statistical report to the board. October in-patient census figures show 218 patient days (7.0 average daily census), down from the 277 patient days in October, last year. October's Hospital revenues were \$75,500. Hospital expenses were \$91,200, leaving a loss from Hospital operations of (\$15,700), for October. This compares favorably with the losses in October, 1981, and October, 1982, at (\$57,437) and (\$38,324) respectively.

The Board adjourned at 10:45 p.m.

## In time like these.....

President Reagan couldn't have made a visit to Seoul at a better time to lift the spirits of the South Koreans. In recent weeks, they have been shackled by two incidents.

First came the shooting down of a South Korean airliner by a Soviet jet fighter. Then six weeks later a terrorist bomb in Rangoon, Burma killed 17 top ranking Korean government officials. The bomb was evidently intended for the South Korea's President Chun who was visiting. Although North Korea has a population only one-half that of the South, it has a formidable military might. In fact, it was so large that it force former President Carter to retract his campaign promise to withdraw U.S. troops from South Korea. This was a

decision reaffirmed by Reagan shortly after he took office in 1981.

President Reagan was scheduled to visit the DMZ, where he would be able

to view from an observation post enemy troops digging a line of bunkers. The main reason of Reagan's visit was to demonstrate to the Communists that he is determined to defend U.S. interest in the Far East. The DMZ lies between the South and North Korea and is only 2.5 miles wide but it is one of the fewer hot spots where U.S. military forces face a





**Santa's Whiskers**  
1 cup butter or margarine, softened  
1 cup sugar  
2 tablespoons milk  
1 teaspoon vanilla or rum flavoring  
2½ cups all-purpose flour  
¾ cup finely chopped red or green candied cherries  
½ cup finely chopped pecans  
¾ cup flaked coconut

In mixing bowl cream together butter or margarine and sugar; blend in milk and vanilla or rum flavoring. Stir in flour, chopped candied cherries, and chopped pecans. Form dough into two 8-inch rolls. Roll in flaked coconut to coat outside. Wrap in waxed paper or clear plastic wrap; chill thoroughly.

Cut into ¼-inch slices. Place on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake at 375° till edges are golden, about 12 minutes. Makes about 60.

**Luncheon Casserole**

A luncheon casserole using leftover turkey or chicken chunks.  
1 onion chopped  
4 tablespoons of butter  
6 tablespoons of flour  
1 tablespoon mustard - prepared  
2½ cups of milk  
1 cup of sliced celery  
3 cups of turkey or chicken  
2 oz. jar of chopped pimientos  
½ cup raisins  
1 cup seasoned bread crumbs

In a sauce pan melt butter and saute onion till golden. Blend in flour, mustard and salt, add milk and cook till thick. Add celery, turkey or chicken, pimientos and raisins, heat thoroughly and spoon into a casserole, top with seasoned bread crumbs. Bake at 350° for thirty minutes.


