The U.S. now has an official ambassador to the Vatican. Naturally, since the Vatican is the headquarters of the Catholic church, this action has many Protestants upset. Leaders in various denominations have said they would not favor an ambassador being appointed to their denomination, that such action violates the principle of the separation of church and state.

In fact, not much has been said that the Vatican is a city-state, a political entity as well as a religious one. Having a representative of the president has been a good idea since in its function as a political entity the vatican has relations with many other nations. One of the problems encountered by our representatives has been that their status place them in a lower standing than the ambassadors of other nations, and thus their access to the Pope is not as great.

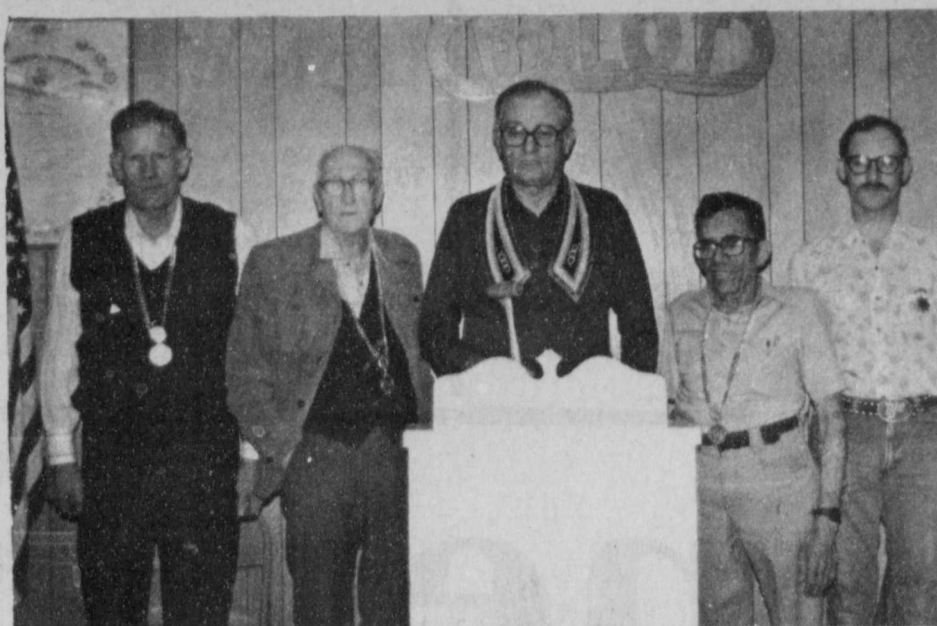
While the case may not be as blatant as this one, we do have relations with countries where the head of state is also the head of the state's official religion.

England would be an example, though we sometimes forget the fact.

At this point, having an ambassador to the Vatican does not elevate Roman Catholicism above other religions in the U.S. It is the establishment of political ties with a political entity. Naturally that entity's religious beliefs will dictate their policy.

In a day when we have religious groups demanding that moral issues, as defined by their system of belief, should dictate which men are elected to our governmental bodies, it seems a bit strange to hear folks complaining about this move on the part of our government.

I do not think this signals the rise of the anti-Christ, as some have suggested, nor am I convinced that this entangles government with religion any more than we already are. Time and events may prove me wrong. Let us hope, rather, that the establishment of these more formal ties will be to the benefit of our country and the people of the world.

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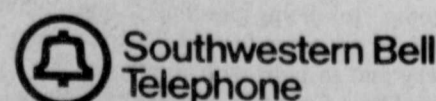

quite so loaded as we went past Buckingham Palace and the London Tower and Bridge — this time flooded in lights since it was still before sun up. Most of the drivers really enjoy pointing out places of interest to tourists, and we certainly had a delightful one that morning.

We went to the Trafalgar headquarters where we would meet our guide and get on our bus to start our European tour — first going to the English Channel. We were the only two couples from Texas, and the varied group represented Canada, Australia, Israel and many of the states.

Leaving London, we went by Westminster Cathedral, Big Ben, the House of Parliament, the River Thames and Cleopatra's Needle, which is a sister to the one in Paris which we would see later there. The buildings are so ornate, beautiful and old. We went through the Blackwell Tunnel which goes under the River Thames.

The houses are so charming — having several round clay stacks on the chimneys — one for each fireplace. The roofs and even some of the sides of the cottages are slate. As we went on to Bexley and Bexleyheath we were amazed at the signs of "Lay By" for emergency stopping, and the "Tea Bar" and "Pie Stalls" along the roads. These were portable, on wheels and provide stops for the travelers who want to stop for crumpets and tea.

The signs were presented in pictures for all the necessary stops and "petrol" is 3.50 a gallon. The American made cars bear signs on them saying "Caution — left hand drive." It was really strange in 4 & 6 lane highways to see the opposite flow of traffic. I just wonder if we could master the art of driving on the "wrong" side!

The yield signs were "Give Way," and traffic was heavy. Past rolling hills, dotted with grazing sheep and cattle in tall grass, fields of hops and apple orchards with boxes under the trees ready to pick and pack, we went to Canterbury, through Kent country, past the Dover Castle and finally into Dover.

Here we saw the beautiful white Cliffs of Dover with old and colorful buildings under the cliffs. Those cliffs really are white, and somehow — I seemed to look for bluebirds to fly over. It was there we boarded the large ferry to cross the English Channel which took 2 long hours. That day made international news as being one of the roughest crossings ever! I don't think the cafeteria did much business on that trip with food and dishes sliding from side to side. We heard several passengers vow never to take a cruise of any kind. We did manage to get American dollars

changed into French francs on board the ferry.

We docked at Boulogne which is the largest fishing port in France. We could not help but remember the Normandy invasion during World War II and knew we were also very near Flanders and Flander's field. Abbeyville suffered most of all during World War I and II.

There were immediate differences in the French living quarters, and at the first sign to Paris — we enlightened our fellow travelers that we, too, had a Paris, Texas.

The roads were narrow through the small French villages with the red tiled roofed homes which were built right on the roads. Each one had its own beautiful flower garden to the side. Some of the houses were covered on the outside with small square tiles like our decorative indoor tiles. All the windows had colorful outside shutters and window boxes full of gorgeous flowers.

The farm plots were small with mostly corn, wheat and lots of cattle. The winding tree lined roads went through very wooded territory, and the hills looked like patch-work — bordered with very tall trees. The small, narrow roads seemed to leave the main narrow going wherever they wanted to go, and could accommodate only one small car at a time.

We passed the Cathedral which houses the largest choir in the world and the memorial to R101. This was in memory of the last flight of the R101 from London to Paris which crashed - killing everyone. Because of this - all aircraft must be well tested and approved, making air travel safer.

We finally reached Paris and saw the many natives walking down the streets with long, unwrapped loaves (about 2 feet in length) of French bread tucked under their arms. French bread and hard rolls are standard food in Europe as well as Britain, and we found it very addictive!

Paris was a French village which started on an island and was built by the Romans. It has now grown into a city of over 10 million with the total of France having a population of 53 million.

When we first came to the city limits, we were still 9 or 10 miles from the center of the city. After being warned, by our guide, several times of pick pockets, we arrived at our hotel with just enough time to get dressed for dinner at a beautifully decorated French restaurant. The entire meal of several courses was served with silver appointments and finished with small demi cups of the very strongest coffee I've ever seen or tasted. One thing never changed though — cold, hard rolls with every meal, regardless of how elegant the setting.

Then for our "tour of illumination," and then we realized why Paris is known as the "City of Lights," and we watched it come alive at night. Past the Maulin Rouge we went to the height of Montartre which rewarded us with a breathtaking view of Paris at night.

Montartre Hill is where the early Christians were taken to their death; during the Roman Empire. Nearby is the Place du Tertre which is a Bohemian square and district of adjacent narrow and winding streets filled with painters and side walk cafes.

Our last stop for the evening was the Champ-de-Mars and the Eiffel Tower flooded with lights as the fountains of water made a gorgeous display — and beyond was Paris with its millions of lights. Finally at 2 a.m., we arrived back at our hotel, still thrilled over seeing this City of Lights and were looking forward to the next day when we would see Paris and some of the historical places we had heard and read about for so long.

After an early breakfast which included, of course, the every present cold hard rolls, we welcomed our native lady tour guide for the morning.

Paris is laid out like a snail-made up of 20 districts, 20 mayors and 20 city halls. For example, the 5th district is Latin Quarters, the 8th district is high fashion shops, and the 16th district is for rich families. Jackie Kennedy Onassis has residence here as well as the Rothschilds and Briget Bardo, and each district has its own personality.

There are 52 Porta's or gates around

Paris, these being part of a fortified wall at one time. Circles are Boulevards, which is a German word meaning fortress. It truly is a city that winds around itself and still contains the best artists, theaters and monuments because the city itself was not damaged during the war. The population of Paris is decreasing because it is so expensive to live there.

We drove past a huge cemetery which was made outside the city, but now Paris surrounds the cemetery, which is now a most beautiful park. Chopin is buried here. We kept seeing these very neat and clean little enclosed stations along the sidewalks. They turned out to be "musical toilets." For the price of 1 franc, it could be used — with taped music — for 15 minutes.

After that allotted time, the door opened, ready or not! Hues are smaller streets, and avenues are the larger streets and they must have trees along them. There are 83,000 chestnut, cherry, oak and golden rain trees along these beautiful avenues. We were so impressed and surprised with the beauty of this Paris.

The Place Charles de Gaulle is the great circle around the Arc de Triomphe which is 164 feet high (more than twice the size of the Arch of Constantine in Rome). It was planned by Napoleon (who is buried in Napoleon's tomb in Paris) to honor his victorious army, and it contains some magnificent sculptures, made with the metal of 1,000 cannons used by Napoleon. A perpetual light to Francis Unknown Soldier burns under the arch. From this circle, which the natives call "the Star," there are 12 tree lined avenues radiating like rays of light from a star — one of which is the famous Champs - Elyseis. At the other end of the Champs-Elyseis is the Place de la Concorde. Its beauty would never suggest that it was once the notorious Place de la Guillotine, splashed with the blood of Louis XVI, Marie Antoinette, Lavoisier and 1340 other victims of the French Revolution.

In the center of the Place is a 200 ton stone needle from Egypt erected in 1836 during the reign of Louis-Philippe. Beyond and framed by the winged horses of Coysevod — we see through the little Arc de Triomphe du Carrousel to the Louvre, which is 1/2 mile long

along the River Seine. It became a museum in 1793, and it was in here that we saw so many famous statues and paintings. Mona Lisa was under glass now. She smiled at us and we smiled back but were not allowed to take a picture of her.

The flower and gardens were living post cards. There are so many Squares, statues and history that it would take years to even see a portion of this City I hadn't even intended to like — at least not this much. We went through Paris' grand cathedral, Notre-Dame de Paris. It is one of the most beautifully proportioned cathedrals large enough to accommodate 9,000 persons. It was here that we heard a tour guide scream "Pick Pocket, Pick Pocket" and a mother and daughter were forced to leave the cathedral. It seems that this is a very common occurrence among the tourists of Notre Dame.

We then took a sight seeing tour on the River Seine, and around the island on which Notre Dame is built. Paris is divided by the River Seine, the Right Bank to the north and the Left Bank to the South. Passing the golden statue of Joan of Arc on a horse, the National

East Berlin sums to be a gauge of Communism in East Germany. There seems to be a "seige mortality" of memories of the last war and fears for the next. Escape is almost impossible from the German Democratic Republic.

There is a border that stands between over 15 million East Germans and the West. This a border with mines, fences, and guards that have claimed almost 200 lives and 20 years. Personal views and disclosed only to closest friends. Officials claim that control is needed since the nation was established only in 1949. Life in the East Germany must be frightening because the nations is only the size of Virginia but has 74,000

police plainclothes and paramilitary. Often "troublemakers" are exiled to West Germany and they in turn bury their relatives freedom. Such as trade has freed 15,000 East Germans since 1964.

In East German schools, emphasis is place on teamwork rather than individual achievement. I imagine their schools bear a strong resemblance to Soviet ones with their anthems, precision marches, and homage to Communist leaders. Relations with Moscow are strengthened by requiring students to take Russian for six of the ten years of mandatory education.

There are campaigns to portray historical figure such as Martin Luther as sudden friends of the working class. One East German was heard to say "Next year they'll claim Johann Sebastian Bach was a Communist com-poser."

Mrs. C.E. Wilson, mother of Chuck Wilson, is in the Methodist Hospital, Room 408, after receiving a fall in her home.


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

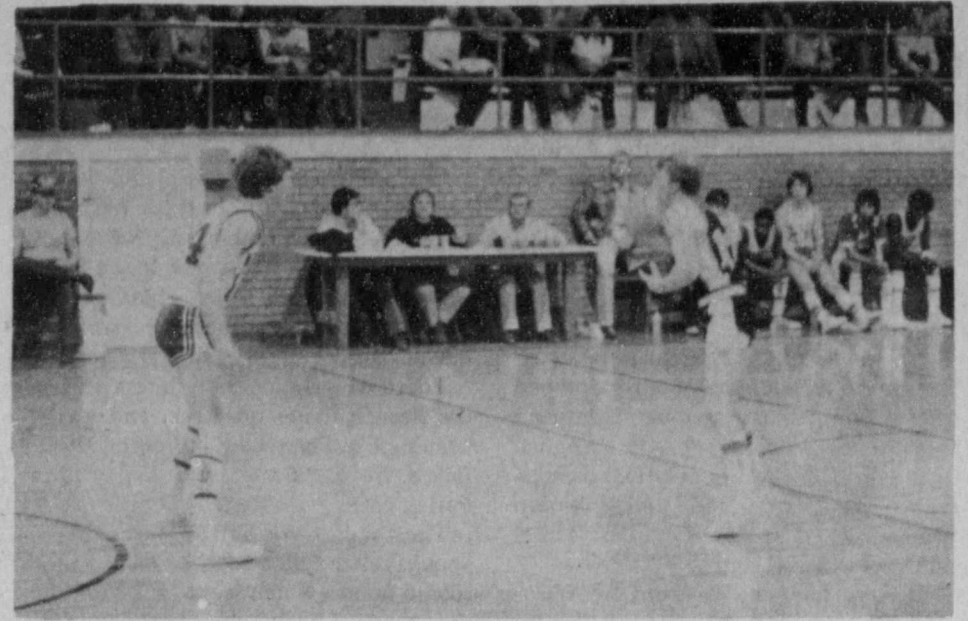

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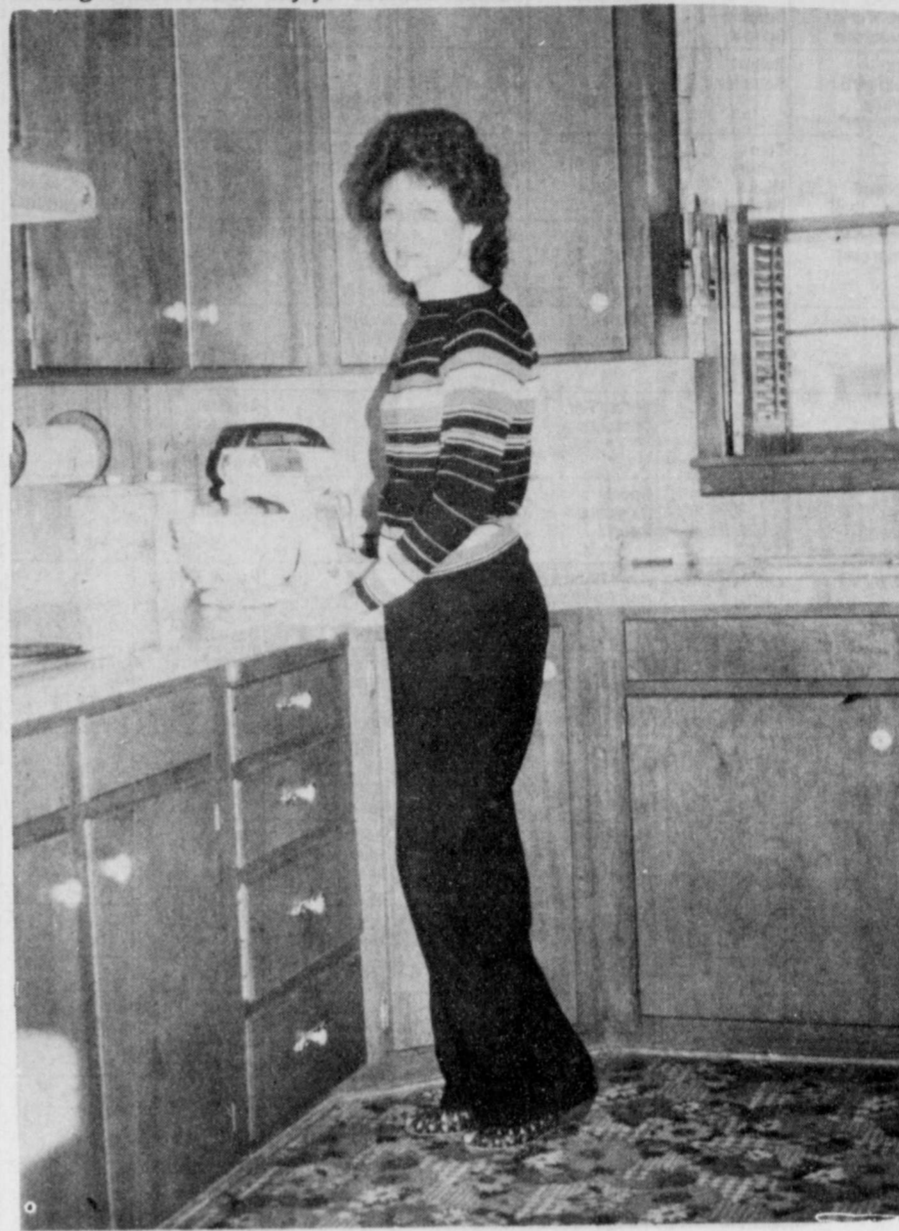

**Strawberry Crunch**  
 Mix together:  
 1/2 cup brown sugar  
 1/2 cup butter  
 1 cup flour  
 1 cup pecans (chopped)  
 Bake this at 350° until it is lightly brown. Stir often. Butter a 13x11 inch pan. Put cool crumbs in bottom, saving enough to sprinkle on top.

**Jello Salad**  
 1 small box strawberry jello  
 1 small box wild cherry jello  
 1 no. 2 can fruit cocktail, drained  
 1 cup crushed pineapple, drained  
 1 apple grated  
 3 heaping Tbl. Ocean Spray cranberry orange relish  
 1 small box lemon jello  
 1 large pkg. cream cheese  
 Mix the strawberry and wild cherry jellos with 1 1/2 cup hot water-dissolve-add relish. Chill down with 2 cups cold water. Add fruit and let jell. Take one package lemon jello and dissolve with 1 cup hot water. Take 1/2 cup of lemon jello and add 1 large package of soft cream cheese to it. Also you can add a little of the fruit juice to make the cream cheese a little softer. Pour this on top of jelled jello.  
 Add 1/2 cup cold water to remaining of lemon jello. Pour this over cream cheese layer when cream cheese layer is jelled.
