The Reagan administration is moving towards closer relations with Israel, and the Israeli government welcomes the switch in U.S. policy. They have been perplexed for a long time by U.S. criticism, but now since President Reagan and Prime Minister Shamir met November 29, there are closer ties between the two countries. Two days later President Gemayel of Lebanon and President Reagan consulted each other. Quite a change has occurred since Israel invaded Lebanon. Such an invasion resulted in a deep freeze coolness from Washington. However, now is seen a new appreciation of Israel. It could be used as a base from which the U.S. could mount a defense of the Persian Gulf. A ranking U.S. expert said that in case war ever breaks out in the Mideast,

Israel could play a role comparable to that played by Britain for the U.S. in World War II.
 Since Shamir has replaced Begin as Prime Minister last October, there has been more of a pro-U.S. sentiment. Israel's high priority is increased American aid for their defense industry. Also they would like a more apparent American military backing such as joint military exercises and frequent visits to Israeli ports by American warships.
 America is concerned over the impact such a close relationship might have on moderate Arab nations. They might remember that Egypt's Sadat, highly respected by Arab nations, made a peace pact with Begin. So that should speak well of Israel.

In and around Lockney

The Indians say, "If you would know me, you must walk in my moccasins."

According to Indian philosophy, if you would know your Lockney schools, you must walk with the school administrator.

The system is headed by a school board. One administrator described the board as one that "looks ahead." Much of the change and upgrade begins with the future.

Superintendent W.H. Hallmark reports a stabilized school enrollment of 375 students. The enrollment change is controlled by the number of farm labor in the school area. Since recently farmers have let numbers of farm labor go, the school enrollment is down by so much. Then, too, migrant farm laborers have dropped down in number.

One change is being brought to schools through House Bill 246. This bill calls for reconstructing all curriculum. English, math and science are directly affected in the Bill.

Mr. Hallmark also reports that the computer class has reached 37 in number in separate classes of adults.

The maintenance and upgrading of the school facility began before Hallmark took office, he says, but \$30,000 to \$70,000 every year is spent on some facility.

For the first time in several years, it is reported, school indebtedness will be clear this year. Lockney schools will be free of debt.

No one has had more interest in maintenance and upgrading schools than James Poole.

His latest visible change in High School is in the windows with corrugated metal for looks and for temperature control. This treatment of windows makes a difference of 6 degrees. Such treatment leaves the original space for windows to be used for bulletin boards.

Eventually, central heating will be the result of the window treatment.

An earlier improvement in the high school building concerns the front entrance. Any former student or teacher can not help but appreciate how hammer and paint produces an expression of school spirit in that entrance. A visitor, the principal from Post, could not believe "a building built as far back as '29 could look so good."

In this school, there are 19 teachers teaching grades 9 through 12. Curriculum and personnel changes are a part of the future.

As principal, Mr. Poole's door is open for students and faculty to come in when they want to talk. He says, "We like for people to visit - especially parents."

It is understood in high school that "there is a thing" here about a student or teacher that would walk the hall with no smile.

There is no stated dress code in Lockney High, but there is an accepted appreciation of neatness - neatness is the word. As a result girls wear dresses - more than in years.

"You look neat today," is a remark often used.

"Kids like to be noticed."

There are no major problems in school. Two-thirds of graduates attend college following graduation from high school.

Then there is Junior High with Raymond Lusk and ten teachers looking forward to some change in the re-constructing of the school curriculum even though the present schedule is adequate in many ways.

One example - a new dictate requires teaching of reading in Junior High, but they "already teach reading," so no change.

The new program demands two specifics. The first is the requirement of teacher lesson plans. The second is a requirement of teacher talks with persons appointed by state.

Junior High school set a school ideal of computer literacy before students graduate from Junior High.

Mrs. Lusk is doing special study now and is to teach computer science again in the school.

The lowest grade-level school, Elementary School, is where the introduction to the basic studies is begun. R.L. Knox is principal.

It is doubtful whether anyone knows more about the Lockney school system than Mr. Knox.

He graduated from Lockney High School and did his college work in West Texas University where he wrote his graduate thesis on the history of Floyd County schools.

Mr. Knox has been principal of elementary six years, principal of high school nine years, and principal of junior high three years. He taught in high school two years before becoming principal.

His thesis study goes back to early Floyd County schools including Lockney Christian College which taught from kindergarten through graduation. High School also taught from 12 through to Kindergarten. At times there was an exchange between the two schools.

People who have gone from Lockney through college are fitting into medicine, law, military, science and any number of fields. The list is too long to name.

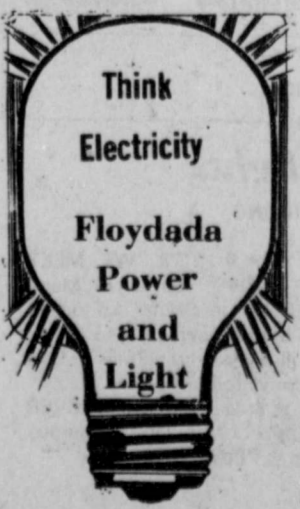
