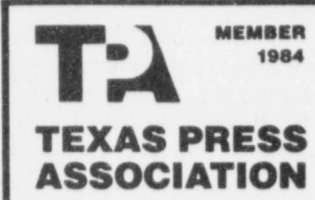

## District Attorney addresses Rotary Club on DWI laws

Friday at noon District Attorney Randy Hollums addressed the members of the Lockney Rotary Club. Hollums spoke about current legal developments and the new DWI laws in particular.

Hollums discussed the scheme of punishment stated in the new laws as well as the definition of intoxication under the new laws.

Intoxication is defined as a blood alcohol level of .10 or above. The new law also states that the refusal to submit to blood and/or specimen tests will result in a mandatory 90 suspension of the offenders license and is also admissible as evidence in criminal action against the offender.

All DWI arrests made after January 1 carry mandatory jail times ranging from 72 hours for the first offense to 10 days for a 3rd offense. There are also fines ranging from \$100.00 to \$2000.00. If an offender is picked up on a fourth DWI or for violation of a DWI probation the district attorney can petition the court for the forfeiture of the offenders vehicle.

Hollums said that the best way to get offenders off the road is to report suspected offenders to law enforcement officials. He also said to beware of offenders driving near you on the street. He said to watch for vehicles making wide turns around corners, vehicles straddling the center marker on streets or those crossing into other lanes of oncoming traffic, vehicles with no headlights, also vehicles with slow or confused responses. He said the best way to avoid accidents with suspected drunk drivers is to put space between you and the other driver, report the drivers to others on the road by CB radios or other means of communication, and to report the driver to the authorities.

Attorney Hollums said that the main problem now facing prosecutors in DWI cases is the juries. Hollums said that juries will set the standard by which offenders are punished. He urged that those serving on juries of DWI offenders should listen to the evidence in the case and also hold into account the punishment recommended by the prosecutors in making their final decisions regarding punishment of the offenders. He said that the punishment handed down by juries will dictate the way future cases are prosecuted.

## Senior, Shawnda Brock chosen as the Lockney DAR Good Citizen for 1984

Shawnda Brock, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Byron Brock of Lockney, was chosen as Lockney's DAR Good Citizen this year and she will be one of the honorees at a Washington Tea held Wednesday at the McClung Center on the Wayland Baptist Campus in Plainview. (Outcome of the tea was not known at press time.) The Mary McCoy Baines Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution hosted the tea.

The DAR Good Citizen contest is open to both boys and girls who are seniors in high school. Three members of the senior class are chosen by their peers for exhibiting outstanding qualities of leadership, dependability, service, and patriotism in school, home and the community. One is then chosen by the faculty as the School Good Citizen.

The contest this year consisted of three parts: personal, including activities, awards, offices held, special interests, service given in the home, church, and community, future plans and hobbies and interests; a national, civic and patriotic quiz, and a patriotic essay.

A chapter winner, chosen by the members of the Baines Chapter, announced at the tea, will then go on to compete in the state level. Should the chapter winner win state, they would compete at the National level.

Each of the four chapter winners will receive a \$100 scholarship to the college of their choice.

The four chapter winners were Angie Lowrey of Silverton, Brent Richburg of Plainview, Tamara Franks of Olton and Brock.

The DAR promotes the observance of February as American History Month and helps preserve freedom by creating a deeper understanding of American History. The local chapter also held a contest this year for fifth through eighth grade students; however no students from Floyd County entered that essay contest.

Shawnda has been involved in several activities in her high school years. Athletics is one of her strong points. She has won the Defensive Basketball Award the last two years, been voted Most Athletic for the past three years, won the Basketball Leadership Award the past two years, was a regional finalist in the 100 meter hurdles the past two.

She was voted Most Attractive her sophomore year, and was a Miss LHS candidate this year.

This year's Football Sweetheart, Shawnda has been a class officer for the past four years, a band officer two years, an officer in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes two years, and is currently secretary of the Student Council. She is vice president of the National Honor Society and was named a Junior Rotarian in September.

She is a very active in the Methodist Church where she is member of the High School Methodist Youth Fellowship group.

Shawnda has a wide variety of hobbies including cooking, sports, handicrafts, and calligraphy. She is

### A tour of eight European countries

## Our September Song

**Editor's Note: The following is an account given by Faye Barker, in cooperation with Dottie Stansell, of the travels by Art and Faye Barker of Lockney and Dewitt and Roberta Seago of Arlington in the European countries during the month of September 1983. The Seagos are former residents of Lockney and Floydada. This is the fourth account of several that will be printed in the upcoming editions of the paper.**

When we left to drive along side the Rhine River, which was quite swift, we saw the Castle of the Cat, so called because the summer castle down the River was smaller and thus called The Mouse. We saw an interesting church and bar combined where one must go through the bar to get to the church. We couldn't help but wonder if it would have been better the other way around. The Rhine is such a winding river that from the top of the mountain one could see the Rhine seven times as it unfolded in its journey. Each little village has its own grape and wine festival the middle of September. The half timbered and leaning houses and town hall looked like Hansel and Gretel.

We stopped at St. Goar, so we could take a boat ride down the River Rhine, and see the vineyards growing up the mountainsides, the castles on top of the mountains and the many clean villages along this beautiful old River. We went past the railroad bridge which crossed over the Rhine and was ordered to be blown up by the Germans. The German officer for some reason didn't do it and was later executed by the Germans for this failure. The Americans were successful in destroying the bridge.

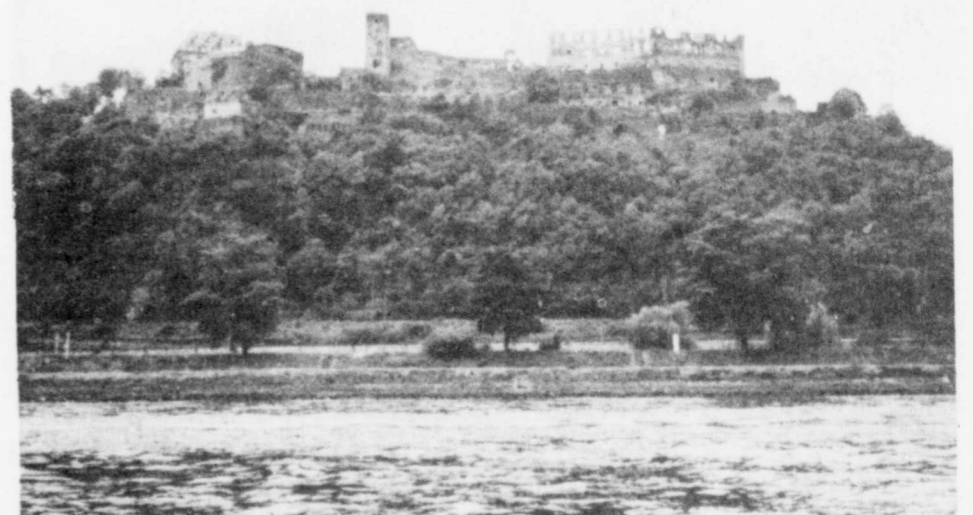
Bonn is the gateway to the Romantic Rhine Valley and is more than 2,000 years old. It was just a peaceful little village of 50,000 when it became the capitol, but has now grown to more than 250,000 now. Here we saw the political building which is headquarters for the Christian Democratic Party, and the White Building known as "The White House", is the home of the President of the Republic. Before we reach Cologne,

we see the great Cathedral, still standing even though this city was nearly wiped out by aerial bombardment in the war. The Cathedral, nearly 500 feet long, is one of the largest Gothic churches in the world and one of the most beautiful. It is situated next to the large rail station which was destroyed. One of the men in our group had been a bombardier during the war and had blown up that railroad station, which has been rebuilt, yet the Cathedral was unharmed. Pretty accurate we thought! It seemed so strange to look across from this ancient church and see the Golden Arches of McDonald's. I guess in this city of over 1 million, they do need at least one McDonald's. As we go back across the Rhine and travel toward Holland and Amsterdam, once more we change American dollars for guilders. When we stopped to change our currency there was also a small restaurant and gift store. It was here that we saw our first delft blue pieces of pottery and china and the first wooden shoes, which I kept trying on for size. How can one know what size - they all hurt! And how do they walk in them with such smiling faces?

"God made the world," say the citizens of Holland, "but the Dutch made the Netherlands." Nearly one half of the 15,450 square miles has been reclaimed from the sea. Dikes are everywhere, holding out the water, and picturesque windmills along the canals gives Holland a very special look. Cattle and dairy farms are everywhere and cheese farms and factories are plentiful. The low hills are covered with purple flowers and fields of flowers of all colors and varieties. The fields have no fences - just canals of water between them. This serves as water for the cattle as well as fences. The grass is lush and the cattle fat. Nearly all the houses have lace curtains - Belgian lace, I suppose. More bicycles than you can believe. The sidewalks have bicycle paths along side them.

Amsterdam, is built on a latticework of concentric canals and is the largest and most cosmopolitan center in the

Netherlands. It is often called the Venice of the North, because of the waterway streets and boats. It truly is a charming city, and it was sad to learn that it has been highly infiltrated with drug trade and crime, one of the greatest in all Europe.

After checking into our hotel, we were off to visit a cheese farm where we sampled various cheeses, and the art of cheese making was demonstrated by a typical dutch man, wooded shoes and all. We bought several cheeses and took them with us to bring home, since he assured us it was aged.

We ate dinner by the sea at a very beautiful restaurant. Holland chocolates are delicious, too! It seemed strange as we drove along on top of the dike, the sea the same level as the dike on one side, while looking down on the house tops on the other side. Even at night we could see how this land had been reclaimed. We then visited the Red Light District of Amsterdam, which was really sad to us, and the memory will long be engraved on my mind.

The next morning after breakfast, hard rolls and all, we took a bus tour of Old Amsterdam, where the houses are narrow and deep because they are taxed according to the width of the house. The only way they can get furniture in and out is through the top windows by pulleys because the stairways are so narrow and winding. The waterways go right up to the doors, some had small draw bridges. There are floating flower gardens which are floating hot house type buildings filled with flowers. We went past the Stock Exchange, the Royal Palace the War Memorial at the Dam Square onto Rokin which is lined with exclusive shops and restaurants. The architect is so unusual and the royal

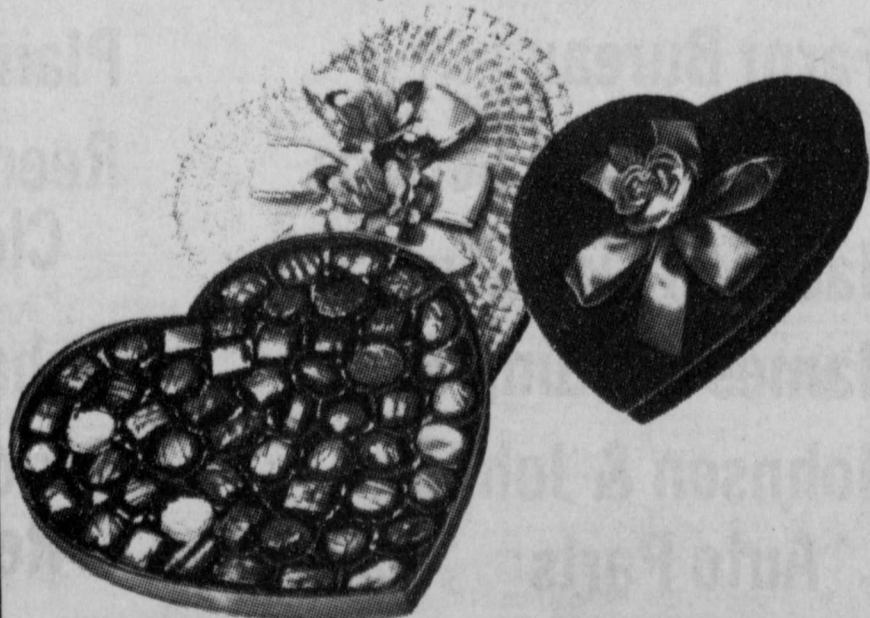
Friday night against Post we led the

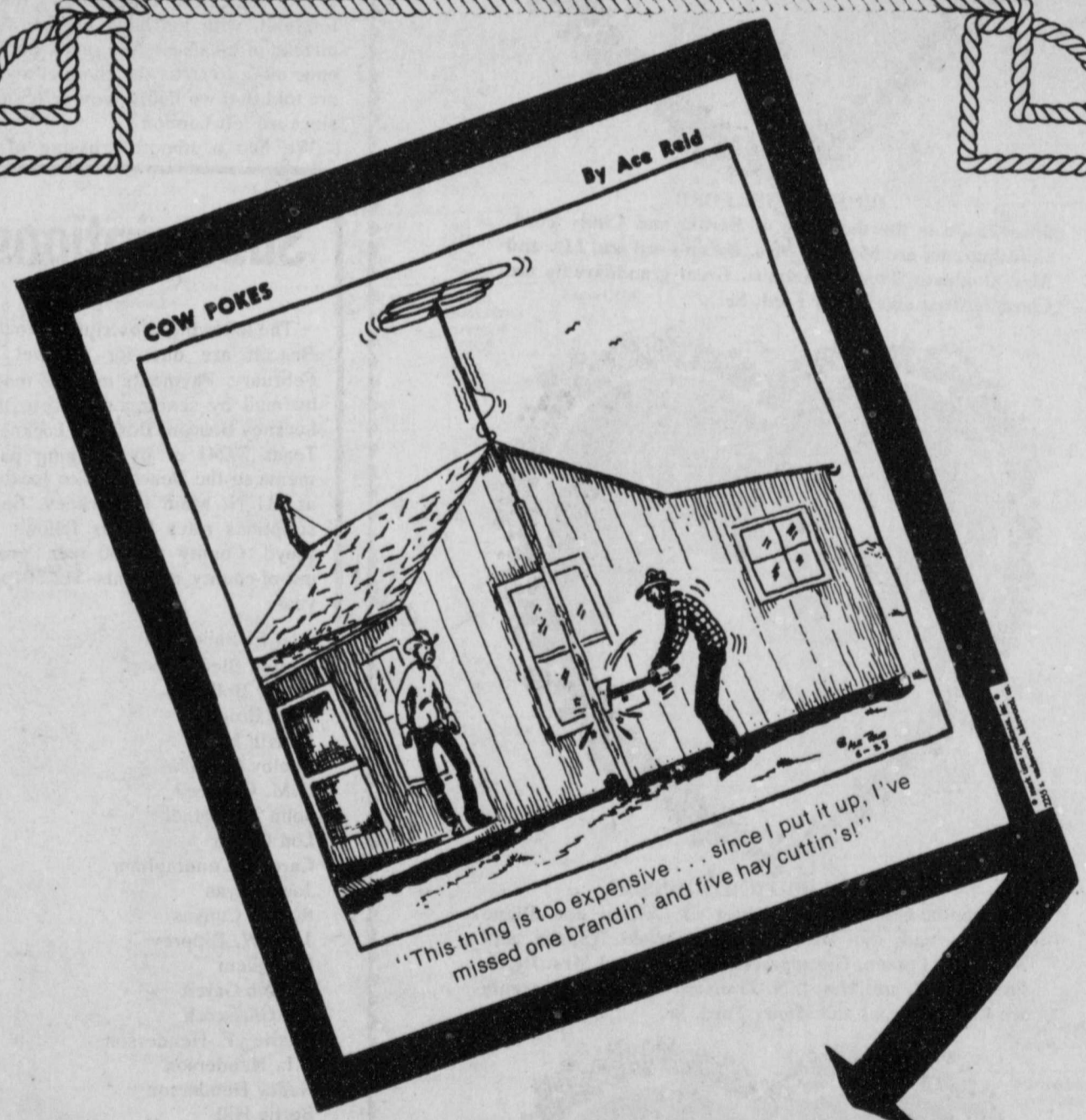

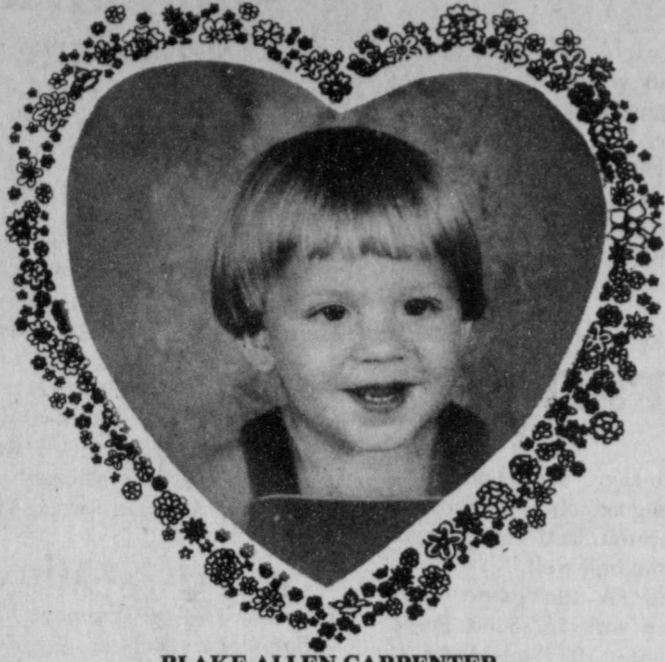

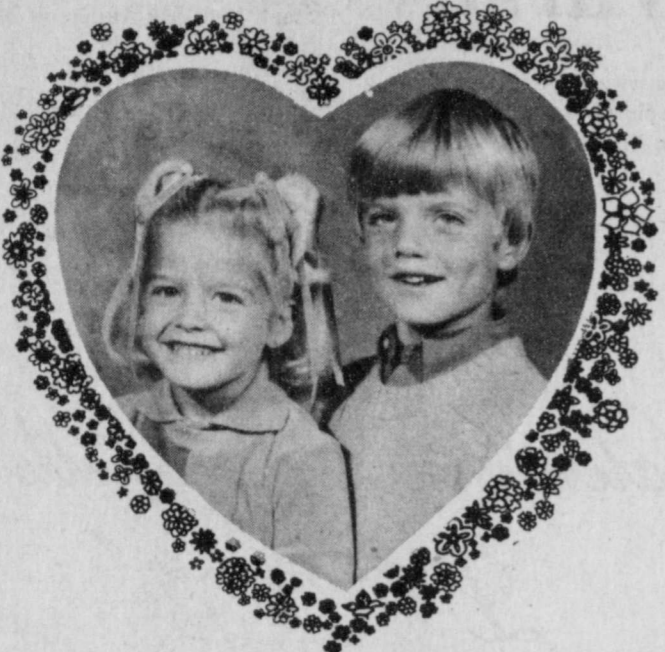

flag is on one store showing that it sells to the royal family. We went by Rembrandt Square and were told that Rembrandt lived here when a poor man and could not sell his now famous "The Nightwatch". All canals are man made which started with a big and main dyke, then a circle canal for protection, then another circle canal for further protection, then many connecting canals.

We went by Heineken Brewery where free beer is given to University students. It was after we returned home that the Heineken kidnapping took place. We saw the Vincent Van Gogh statue and museum and agreed he really was crazy because he cut his own ear off and sent it to his girlfriend. We went past the concert hall and the Olympic Stadium where the Olympics were held in 1932, we finally come to the diamond cutting and polishing capitol of the world. Crown jewels are sent here to be polished and Richard Burton and Elizabeth Taylor used to have their jewelry designed here. We went behind guarded and carefully unlocked doors to see the cutting, polishing and finished work on these beautiful stones.

It was here that our friends from Israel came in to tell us goodbye, since they were leaving the group to go toward Italy, where they were buying a car to be shipped back to their home.

We must leave Amsterdam and as we cross into Belgium, we now need Belgian franc for monetary use. There are small farms, all red brick houses and barns. The wives work in the fields and the men work in the industries of chemicals, glass and armement of guns and weapons. Ford, General Motors and some Japanese cars are assembled here.

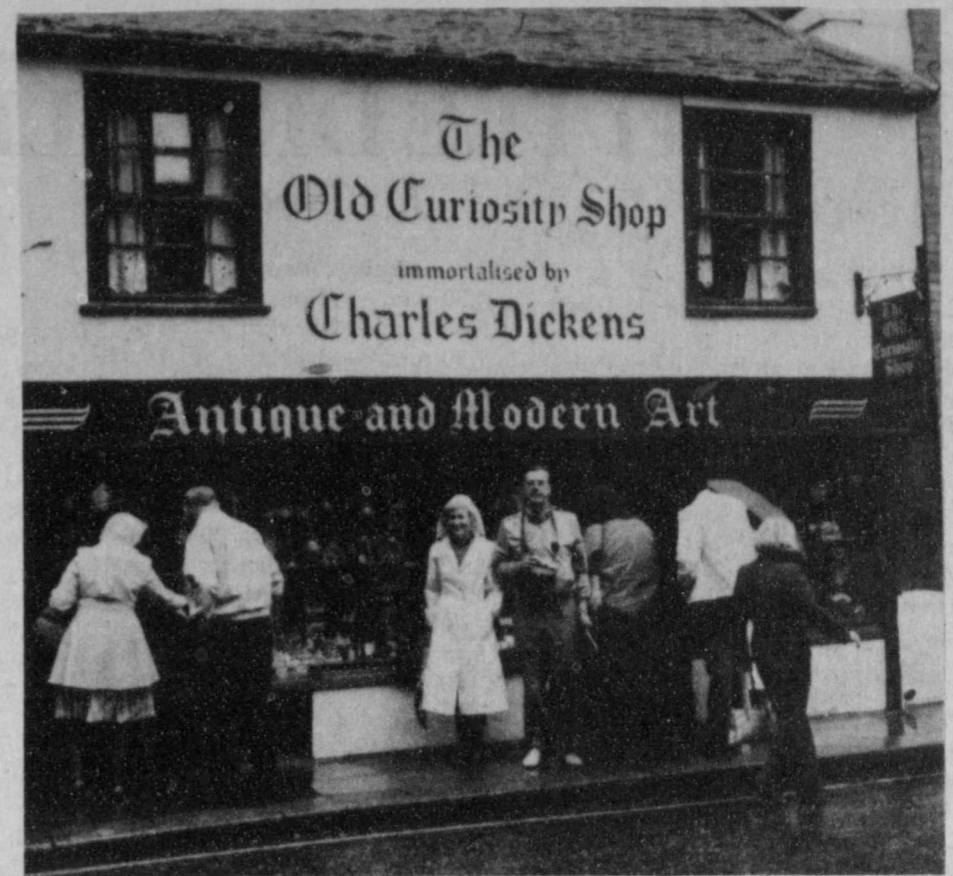
Antwerp is a seaport of yesterday and today and bears mark of every period, most of all the baroque 17th century. Flemish painting schools were founded here. A modern masterpiece is the Kennedy Tunnel, carrying road and rail traffic under the River Scheldt. As we came through the tunnel we came into the city of Gent, which is the capitol of Flanders, which is a university city. As we follow the coast line of the North Sea, we pass through Newport, the largest fishing port in Belgium. All the Belgium coastline was evacuated during teh war, only the German military was allowed to stay. We went through Duinkerke where the British had to evacuate. We could almost feel the scars of war left here. We crossed over the French boarder once more.

As we followed the flat coastline past an old fortress at Clalis, dating back to 1480, we passed a statue of Napoleon on a tall structure, looking out toward England, with his hand on his wallet instead of his chest. We reach Boulgne once more to cross the channel and we are told that we had driven 1,765 miles since we left London.

We had a smooth crossing of the

channel, once more saw those white cliffs of Dover, went through customs and drove back into London. After saying goodbye to our tour group, we took a taxi back to Piccadilly Hotel and realized that in this one day we had been in Holland, Belgium, France and England. Texas really is a big place, isn't it? So here we are back in London, but only shortly, for we are to leave soon to see the highlights of Great Britain.

The next morning after breakfast in the beautifully ornate dining room at the Piccadilly, the Seago's, Art and I walked around Piccadilly Circus, ate lunch at a quaint little restaurant near the hotel, then on a Panoramic bus tour of London with a native London tour guide who pointed out so many historic places, such as No. 10 Downing Street, the Parliament Building, and a short stop at "The Old Curiosity Shop" made famous by Charles Dickens. After the tour, the four of us went to the London Tower, braving that London rain. It would take months to see that place, and the British Beefeaters were in full color. Next was really an experience as we took the tube to the Dorchester Hotel, which is located directly across from Hyde Park, for high tea.



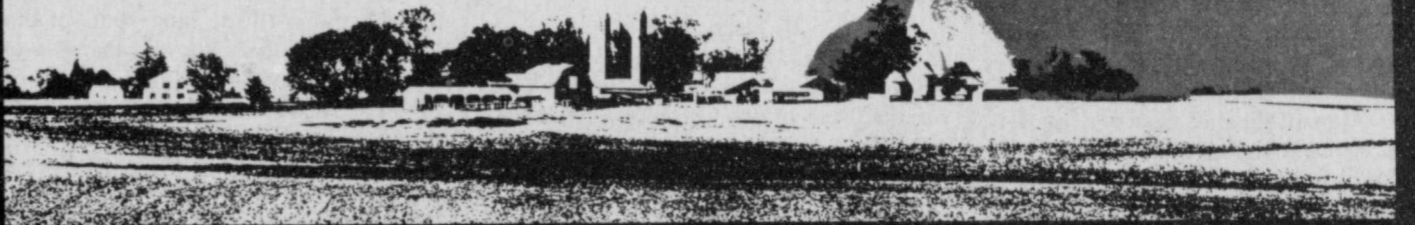

HWY Texaco is all under one roof excepting of course the three self-serve gasoline pumps out front and the garage out back operated by James Bailey and son.

Convenience store is on HWY 70 not too far west of Strickland's Cafe. What is more, it is the only gasoline station convenience store on HWY 70 between Floydada and Plainview.

HWY 70 Texaco has been owned and operated by Helen and "Squeeler" Hodel for over a year now. "Squeeler's" name and the spelling of it is the result of his having five older brothers and four older sisters who named him his name because they said, he acted like a baby forgetting that that was exactly what he was for the normal length of time.

This convenience store is not too far from where Squeeler grew up in about the largest house on the edge of town.

The Hodel daughters-in-law hated the bigness of that house because they were the ones who did the spring cleaning in it each year.

Other houses have grown up near "the old Hodel house" making the location of HWY 70 interesting.

It is not a typical station once on the inside you see what it is all about. First, the pungent smell of popcorn rouses the senses in memory of show-going days. Fresh popcorn can be had in small or large sacks. A jar of freshly-baked cookies and the always pot of hot coffee give this neat place a note of hospitality.

The store is open seven days a week from 7:30 to 7:30 except weekends when it closes at 8:00. Squeeler is on duty mornings, Helen will be there from 1:00 till closing time.

They stock drinks, potato chips, sandwiches, candies, gum and drug items such as aspirin, Anacin, and other such items.

Too, Borden's milk chocolate ice cream, corn dogs, burritos can be had. An ice-making machine produces crushed ice which is sold in small or

large bags in summer. An unusual feature is the sale of used clothes. There is almost always something in clothing for sale. Baseball caps are on extra item.

As usual, maps for 35 cents are sold here. These sales do not detract from the attention given to a large United States map which covers its share of the north wall.

It is surprising the number of people who use this map even if it is only to study it for a while. But the big map serves its purpose in other ways primarily for people in an attempt to locate themselves when they find they are lost on 70.

"There are more people out of New Mexico who stop to ask about Lubbock Airport. One woman came in almost in tears thinking she was in Amarillo. She got off somewhere in New Mexico.

Also, a couple were supposed to meet a person in Amarillo, but found that this person had gone on the Lubbock. Couldn't understand how they had missed the road to Lubbock.



The operation of the store falls to Squeeler in the mornings and to Helen afterwards. The busiest time is about 9:30 in the morning. Some days the flow of customers lasts all day. Most gas is sold locally and in summer vacation time. Also weekends are busy times. A bigger sign is to be put up because people often face to see the present one.

As is often the case, the Hodels have not had as much to do in town as they had when their two children, Douglas and Dinah were in school. During those days when Dinah had

the honor of being elected Miss Lockney Hi while at the same time serving as cheerleader, they were in and around town frequently.

Now Dinah and husband Keith McCulloch operate the McCulloch Home Water System in San Angelo. Dinah, in the meantime, has had national recognition in photography. Her "Double Rainbow" won a \$100 prize and was pictured on a calendar last year.

Douglas, too, was active in school life. A memorable experience for Helen was when Douglas was "knocked out cold" on the football field and it did not stop the game nor was there a place in that Lull were separating the teams from fans where she could run out to see about him. 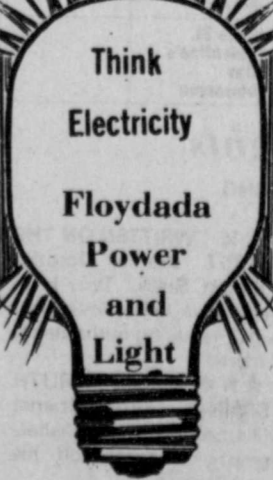
