Lockney Outstanding Citizens named



KENNETH AND JUANITA BROSEH were named the 1983 Outstanding Man and Woman of the Year at the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet Friday night. This marks the first time in the 29 year history of the Outstanding Citizens awards that a husband and wife received the award in the same year.

Our September Song...

Wales claims to be the most mysterious, mystical and the least understood of the three nations which compose Great Britain. We stopped in a little Welsh village of Ruthin and as I was sitting on a bench among the flowers taking pictures, a young Welsh said to me "You want to take it home with you don't you! You don't have anything like this in America, you are too young. Once a Welsh, always a Welsh-Goodby and good fortune." We pass through glens and typical Welsh farms, the well of Clyde, medieval castles where bowls of water were once served since spoons were the only eating utensils since the hands were mostly used.

In and out of villages along side streams and through mountains of heather, over the River Conway, into Snowdonia National Park and Forest. We stopped at Betsw-y-coed for lunch and saw beautiful Welsh woolens and leather pieces. We could have spent days here! We later drove past the beautifully decorated Waterloo Bridge.

The Battle of Waterloo, fought on June 18, 1815 was the final battle of the French military genius, Napoleon Bonaparte. It put an end to his political ambitions to rule Europe which includes Great Britain. His defeat was so crushing that when a person suffers a disastrous reverse, we say he has "met his Waterloo." The battle took place at Waterloo, a small town near Brussels, and this bridge commemorates Napoleon's defeat.

This used to be common land and you could keep any house you could build in a day from sun up to sun down using all the family help you could find. You could also claim the land within the distance you could throw a rock in all directions. We stopped to look at what is now called "The Ugly House" because it was one of those houses, but

we didn't find it really ugly at all.

At last, the main objective: North Wales. Some say it is an "optical illusion," meaning that although it seems enormous, it actually is small. The illusion is created by its height. No where in the world are there more towering mountains rising from such a small base. It is a center of mountain climbing schools, and we could see the mountains dotted with climbers. Snowdonia's five savage peaks reach straight for the sky and Sir Edmund Hillary trained here before tackling Everest. This is enchanted and rugged Wales. Although these mountains are not the highest, they remain some of the most dangerous ones and the accident rates are high. A television camera and set up were there filming as we went through this area. All the road signs are in Welsh with English below.

We go to the smallest rail station in Wales with the longest name in the world. You will always see visitors photographing the unbelievable sign at the station and buying a ticket to nowhere. We were among those same visitors. Llanfair-pwll-gwyn-gyll-gogery-chwchwyn-drobwill-llantysilio-gogoch, which means "The Church of St. Mary-on-the-pool-of-the-white-hazel-by-the-raging-whirlpool-near-the-church-of-St. Tysilio-of-the-Red-Cave." but the Post Office insist on writing it Llanfair P.G. The village people like to say the word and know what it means, and since our driver was born in Wales he was no exception.

We crossed over Menai Suspension Bridge which joins the island to the mainland, over the Strait and into Bangor which is famous for its university and on to Swallow Falls, a very swift and steep cascade of water. At the foot of the mountains is another tongue

Kenneth and Juanita Broseh received the two awards at Friday night's annual Chamber of Commerce banquet. The Brosehs were chosen from a field of five men and four women for the honor. It was thought that the Brosehs might not be present for the banquet to receive their awards as they had been in Houston for the stock show and sale earlier in the week.

For the first time an Outstanding Family of the Year was named. Chosen from three nominated families, the Jack Frizzell family was awarded the new honor.

The Family of the Year was presented their trophy by incoming Chamber of Commerce president Gary Marr.

Kenneth Wyatt, renowned western artist of Tulsa, spoke to a gathering of 252 Lockney residents and guests on Friday evening.

His usual entertaining wit kept the audience spellbound while he aimed his jokes at those in the audience from his wife to both Doctors Mangold.

Juanita Broseh has given many hours of her time and homemade items to residents of the Lockney Care Center. She also makes and donates many handmade items for the annual Harvest Festival Auction at the First United Methodist Church.

She has spent much time involved in the Floyd County Fair, registering Arts and Crafts items and food items, and has been there to help in other areas where needed.

She is an honorary member of the LHS Future Homemakers of America and has helped with the 4-H club in various phases through the years. She has served as a Food and Nutrition and sewing leader for the 4-H. She has been a diligent worker on 4-H fund raising projects. In addition, she has been a sponsor on 4-H trips to other states and has hosted 4-H'ers who were visiting Lockney from other states.

Juanita is a sponsor of the Silver Spurs Rodeo Club, having made one of the club's flags.

Kenneth Broseh came to Lockney in 1957, working as an entomologist. He married Juanita, a lifelong Lockney resident in August of that year. Since 1958 the Broseh family has lived and farmed in the Lockney community.

Kenneth has served on many boards of directors during his life in Lockney: the Floyd County Fair Association, the Floyd County Farm Bureau, the Lone Prairie Gas Assoc., Floyd County Junior Livestock Assoc., Floyd County 4-H Leaders and the Floyd County Historical Museum. In addition to being a member of the above organizations, Kenneth has also served as the president of each one and as a member of the Floyd County Historical Museum; he was instrumental in the decision to mint a bicentennial commemorative coin. He has also served on the Lockney Independent School District Board of Directors.

Consumers Fuel to hold stockholders meeting

Together Kenneth and Juanita Broseh have served as Band Booster presidents which put them in charge of the concession stands at both the football games and at the Floyd County Fair. Both have been very active with the youth of our community through their continued involvement with the 4-H clubs. They have worked from tagging in lambs to buying animals from the shows to support the youth of the community.

In the past the Broseh team sponsored a Vietnamese family, providing them a place to live and work. They are also the first to offer help with children of friends and relatives in times of emergencies.

The couple have two children, Darlene, a senior nursing student at WT, and Earl, a senior at Lockney High School.

Both Kenneth and Juanita are Outstanding Citizens in their own rights and as a couple.

Chosen for the first time in the history of the Chamber Banquet was the Outstanding Family of the Year bestowed on Jack and Lucille Frizzell, residents of Floyd County since their marriage in 1936.

They first farmed in the Lone Star community and then moved into Lockney.

They have four children: David, a farmer in Lockney; Jackie Lou Holt of Lockney; Mamba Webster of Nashville, Tennessee; and Joy Camden of Weatherford, Oklahoma. The couple have nine grandchildren.

Both the Frizzells are active members of the First Baptist Church. They are the first to welcome newcomers to the Lockney area and have sponsored a girl from Buckner's Baptist Children's Home in Lubbock.

The Frizzells have always decorated their year at Christmas time, and they enjoy dressing up and sitting on their front porch at Halloween and adding their share of treats to the children's trick or treat bags of goodies.

Lucille was a Woman of the Year in 1974, having been presented with the trophy by her daughter Jackie Lou who was the Woman of the Year in 1973.

The Frizzells were nominated for the Family of the Year for their love of people, from children to adults, and for their continued support through the years of the schools, church, and other community organizations and activities.

This year's Man and Woman of the Year were presented with the traveling trophies by last year's honorees, Chester Carthel and Ethelyn Vernon.

Serving as officers for the year are president Gary Marr, vice president Carroll Anderson, secretary Donnie Meriwether, and incumbent treasurer J.D. Copeland.

Other newly elected directors include: Jack Covington, Vera Jo Bybee, Merle Mooney, and Joe Zorger. Hold-over directors include Buddy Wiley, Boyd Lee, Jeff Race, Guy Hazlett, Raymond Lusk, and David Patterson. Appointed directors include Dickie Lambert, Mike Mooney, and Roy Howell.

Missing ring returned to owner

In October of 1979 a senior ring belonging to Mike Ford was stolen from the Lockney field house during a football game. The owner had "no hope of recovering the ring since it was small, easy to hide, and there were no witnesses to the theft."

However, on February 24 detective Sergeant Jack D. Kelley of the Austin Pawn Shop squad came across a ring in Scott's Pawn in Austin. After looking carefully at the ring and wondering what a ring from Lockney was doing in an Austin pawn shop, he investigated and found that the ring was pawned by Baldemar Deluna of Austin. After investigation, he found out that the ring was not Deluna's and called the Lockney High School and reported finding a ring from the 1980 graduating class with the initials EMF engraved inside. The school identified the owner as Evan Michael Ford. Austin police contacted Lockney Police Chief Ken Farrow, who in turn contacted Ford.

A copy of the police report was sent from Lockney to the Austin police and

the ring was returned to Ford on March 1.

The ring had been pawned by Deluna on February 17, 1984, just seven days before the Austin pawn shop squad, headed by Detective Kelley, made its routine inventory at the pawn shop. The squad is to be commended for finding and returning a ring valued at \$125.00 at the time of the theft.

Chancellor Helmut Kohl of West Germany has been described as the "harried" friend of the U.S. His greatest accomplishment since he has been elected is to restore close ties with the U.S. Such a relationship had sunk to a low under the government of his predecessor, Helmut Schmidt. Chancellor Kohl plans to make a visit to Washington early this month. It will be his third visit within a year and that reflects the friendly atmosphere between the two nations.

Although only 53, he has smoothed relations with the Communist bloc, especially East Germany, and has confronted the Soviet opposition to

placement of new U.S. nuclear missiles on German soil. Although he hasn't been popular with the press, (he has been described as being weak and indecisive), Kohl is praised by the West German public. His standing is as high as it was last March when his coalition easily won the "missile election". Kohl has overcome one factor of the election that was causing turmoil, that was the antinuclear Grums Party. Their movement came to a sudden halt when U.S. missiles began arriving.

I hope the good relationship between West Germany and the U.S. continues. The soft spoken Kohl is worthy of U.S. admiration.

twister "Penrhynedraeth." Near it is possibly the world's most curious coasted resort, Portmeirion, a luxury hotel built in the form of a village filled with archways and bell towers, so enchanting it was used as the "never-never land" in a science fiction thriller, "The Prisoner."

We stopped at Caernarfon Castle, which I mentioned earlier. It occupies 3 acres and is probably Britain's most splendid ruin. Outwardly the castle appears uninjured, but on entering, one realizes that what is seen on the outside is actually a shell. The grass is beautiful inside and Art and I stood on the balcony overlooking the sea and town where in 1969 Queen Elizabeth's eldest child was "invested" Prince of Wales in exactly the same ceremony as took place in 1301. We go past Liverpool and its theater as we go back to Chester for another night in the Plantation Hotel.

The next morning we take a short walk in Chester, just to walk on the old Roman walls and down those Tows along side the streets, then we leave for the Lake District of northern England. It is truly Lake country, with beautiful lakes surrounded by trees and mountains. We stopped at Grasmere for lunch which is a small village and was a favorite with the Lake poets.

Wordsworth lived here in Dove Cottage (now a museum) and is buried in the church yard of the little church of St. Oswald. We learned that "meres" are small bodies of water, not large enough to be called lakes. The waterfalls cascade down the mountains under

the road into the streams. There must be a waterfall every few feet-I've never seen so many and forest fern covers the ground under the trees.

Lake Windermere is England's largest lake 10 miles in length. Its shores are beautifully wooded, and our hotel is overlooking this lake. The hotel has rounded glass sitting rooms with fireplaces burning (and they were enjoyed) and everyone enjoyed the view of this gorgeous lake district.

The next morning we left for the highlands of Scotland and crossed into that region at Gretna Green, where runaway couples from England used to be married by the local blacksmith who performed over 10,000 such marriages. It wasn't too far until we came to Loch Lomond, which is 2.4 miles long and 700 feet deep in places. We all remembered the song, but were told that it was indeed a sad song. In 1746, the uprisings around Bonnie Prince Charlie became a serious threat to the government of London, and Parliament decided it was time to disarm the clans, break down the old clan system and rule the highlands from Westminster. The writer of the song and Prince Charlie were the best of friends and spent a great deal of time at Loch Lomond. The friend knew he would be put to death because of his loyalty to the Prince when he worded the song and his spirit would take the low road and be in Scotland before Bonnie Prince Charlie-who was also to die.

The mountains here are high and popular ski areas. The waterfalls and

In and around Lockney

It's not surprising, in the least, that Hubert Davis will tell you that once there was found a good saddle thrown away at the Lockney dump ground. Nor is it surprising that he will tell you that he found a good television there once and that he is still using it at his home, "good as new."

"Old refrigerators and old car bodies are hauled off. They a little more than pay for the fuel to haul them to Lubbock. Dead cows are sent to the rendering plant in Plainview."

however tree trimming time is the special burning time. "I try to burn where the smoke goes to the east away from town. I don't burn to where smoke gets in anybody's house if I can help it. One thing for sure, I don't burn on a day of a funeral in the cemetery next to us. I have too much respect for people."

At least, it's not surprising if you happen to be at the moment sitting, talking to Hubert while you survey peaks and valleys of junk that has been brought in "from everywhere" to the Lockney dump ground. Anything could be in those heaps. "Yet," he says. "Of late, no good things are thrown away - not much that is usable. Times are getting tight, now. People are more saving, I guess."

"Twice a day, a kid comes from school with school trash from lunch rooms and school papers. There was a time when cafeteria scraps were brought out, but no more," explains Hubert, and he adds, "lots of stuff comes in here. I don't know from where. On the other hand, there are lots of days when no one comes out here but me."

The gates to the dump grounds stay locked all the time Hubert is not on duty. When the gate is open, sometimes people drive in to look around. They can't haul anything out without permission.

Hubert, following 30 years with Consumers Fuel Association is the caretaker of the dump grounds. He is out there from 8 to 5 weekdays to tell people who come with trash where to dump.

He stops in his explanations to remark, "One thing I am proud of is that nobody has ever bothered. I can lay something down and it can stay there two or three months untouched. It's true, if you are nice to people they will be nice to you."

There was a time when rats ran over the grounds, and were so thick "you could look in a pit and see rats running over each other, but I put out poison. I have not seen one alive in over a year."

At present, there are five lanes that run between the pits from dumping. The making of pits and the covering of full pits is done by county machinery and maintainer operators.

All through the year, material to be burned - such as old tires - is brought in.

At long last we have our chance to look for the Nessie, the friendly monster of Loch Ness. We were to take a boat trip on Loch Ness, but all the Lochs are full to the brim because of the earlier rains; and the boats were not making the trips.

Hubert estimates that the last pit dug will last two more years. It has been in use one year. The pit is 15 feet deep at its deepest part. A dirt barricade is used to border the pit to prevent trucks from rolling in. "The bulk of junk comes from north Floyd County," estimates Mayor Copeland, "even though we get it from everywhere."

We stopped at Urganh Castle which is built on a tongue of land projecting into the Loch, giving the residents a full panoramic view. As we drove along side this Loch we saw our first, but not last, full rainbow-starting and ending on the lake. This is a lovely old hotel with wide stairways, halls and a large lobby with several small ones.
