Preschool registration and clinic to be held March 28

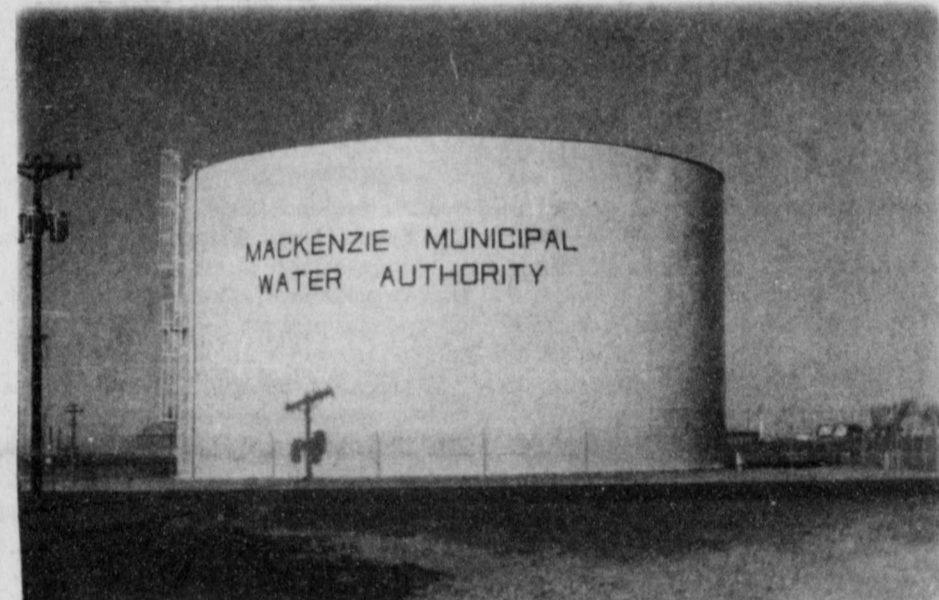
The Athena Junior Study Club is sponsoring the annual preschool registration and clinic on Wednesday, March 28. The clinic will be held from 1:30 to 3:00 p.m. in the Elementary School Cafeteria.

This clinic and registration is for all children who will be 5 years old by September 1, 1984, and will be attending school for the first time or children who are 6 years old and have never attended school before. This clinic and preregistration is free to all and is provided by the Athena Club members.

Both Dr. W.J. and Gary Mangold will be on hand to give each child a physical examination and Dr. Stewart Webb will be screening children for any vision problems.

Mothers must bring the child's birth certificate and any immunization records for the child. It was not known at press time if preschool immunization shots will be given at the clinic.

All mothers with children starting school for the first time are asked to bring their children to this free clinic. It will save time in registering children for school and will also offer a checkup and eye exam at no cost to the parents.

Floyd County awaits Mackenzie water arrival

Lockney and Floydada are awaiting their initial supplies of water from the Lake Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority. Silverton and Tulia have been receiving water for the past several weeks. The problem in Floyd County has arisen from problems with the control systems. These will hopefully be eliminated soon the two towns will have access to the water.

The dedication for the new water treatment plant was held March 10 with city officials from Lockney, Floydada, Tulia and Silverton, attending. Speakers for the dedication were State Representative, Foster Whaley, of Pampa and U.S. Representative Jack Hightower of Vernon.

The treatment plant on Lake Mackenzie is designed to treat 3 million gallons of water daily which is nearly 600,000 gallons more than the combined daily allotments for all four towns. This ability for extra production allows a "cushion" when the use of water is increased by the cities during the hot summer months. Water Authority manager, Neil Taylor, added that the plant has the capability to treat up to 5 million gallons of water per day for short periods of time.

A total of 1,175,000 gallons of water has been allocated for Floyd County per day, with that being divided between the two towns for Lockney to receive up

to 405,000 gallons and Floydada to receive a maximum of 770,000 gallons per day.

In order to treat the water, it is first pumped from behind Tule Creek dam, built in 1974, to the treatment plant where alum and chlorine are added in a rapid mix box and then collected in two settlement basins.

From this point the water is sent through four filter basins, where it is filtered through charcoal, sand, and gravel. From the filtering process it goes to a 500,000 gallon holding tank located at the plant. The water is then sent to the south pumping station near U.S. Highway 86 and then dispersed to the four cities on the system by way of the supply and transmission system.

Planning for the \$12,005,000 project began in 1972. Calling the bids in 1982 coincided with a severe lax period in the construction business. Because of this, the system was built for \$3 million less than the 1981 project cost of \$15 million.

Construction was started in January of 1983 and was completed in ten months rather than the expected year and a half projected for the project.

The entire Mackenzie Water Project System consists of the treatment plant, three pumping stations, 70 miles of water lines, and four storage tanks, located in the respective cities.

Also awarded Sunday will be the Little Princess belt buckle. The buckle is silver and gold with turquoise and coral inlays and was made by an Indian silversmith. The Little Princess will be determined by the girl selling the most tickets to the rodeo.

Rodeo contestants will be competing

on stock provided by the Terrell Rodeo Company of Roaring Springs, Texas.

The Silver Spurs Rodeo Club will have a concession stand at the rodeo and will have food and drinks for sale.

Ed Marks of Lockney will be serving as the rodeo announcer and Bruce Williams and Roy Henderson will be the featured clowns for the event.

Performances on both days are scheduled to start at 1:30 and the scheduled events include bareback riding, bull riding, calf roping, team roping, ribbon roping, breakaway roping, goat tying, barrel racing, and pole bending.

Stolen property returned

On March 12 several items stolen from the San Jose Church rectory were recovered by the Lockney Police Department. The burglary was reported to the Lockney police on March 1 by Father Jack Gist. Stolen were a 19 inch color tv, a coffee maker, an electric clock-radio, a windup clock, and a crucifix, all valued at \$462.50.

When Father Gist reported the burglary, he had reported that it occurred between February 29 and March 5 and when the three suspects were picked up they revealed that the incident occurred March 1.

Questioning of a 16-year-old Hispanic male by Police Chief Ken Farrow led to the arrest and subsequent confessions of two more Hispanic males, both 17 years of age.

One of the alleged perpetrators is presently in the Floyd County jail on \$10,000.00 bond. The other 17 year old and the juvenile were released on their

own recognizance.

The two 17 year old perpetrators will stand trial on charges of burglary of a residence, a first degree felony.

At press time members of the Lockney Police Department and the Floyd County District Attorneys office were awaiting the sentencing phase of the Willie Phillips case. Phillips was arrested on charges of aggravated sexual assault of a minor. Phillips was indicted by the grand jury on December 14 after the minor and his mother filed a report with Lockney Police Chief Ken Farrow on December 9.

Phillips is expected to be sentenced sometime this week after probation officer James Pevyhouse has filed his investigation report. Judge George Miller will set the sentence based on the report given by Pevyhouse.

Phillips was found guilty on Thursday, February 23, in District Court.

Incumbents run for board

Jackson, Shaw seek reelection

The Lockney Independent School Board of Directors will be holding an election on April 7 to fill two positions on the school board. The positions are presently held by Keith Jackson and Kelton Shaw. Both incumbents remained the only candidates to file for the seats on the board at the March 7 deadline.

Keith Jackson was first elected to the school board in 1981 to serve a three year term and is running for his second three year term. Jackson is presently a member of the building committee of the school board.

Jackson is a farmer in the Providence area, where he has farmed for the past twenty years. He is also the self-proclaimed mayor of Providence community.

In addition to being a member of the school board, Jackson is a member of the Lockney Masonic Lodge. In December of 1983 he was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Herman King on the Floyd County Soil and Water Conservation Board. He is also a member of the Floyd County Farm Bureau.

Jackson and his wife, Gayle, are both active members of the First United

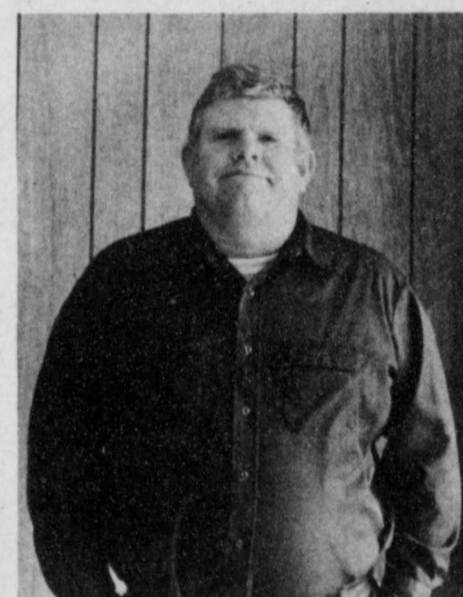
Methodist Church in Lockney. They have three sons: Dwight and Wade, both who attend West Texas State University; and Boyd, who is an eighth grade student in Lockney Junior High School.

Kelton Shaw will be running for his second three year term, having been elected to the board in 1981. Previous to that, Shaw had served two 3 year terms and then left the board in 1978. Shaw presently serves as a member of the insurance committee on the board.

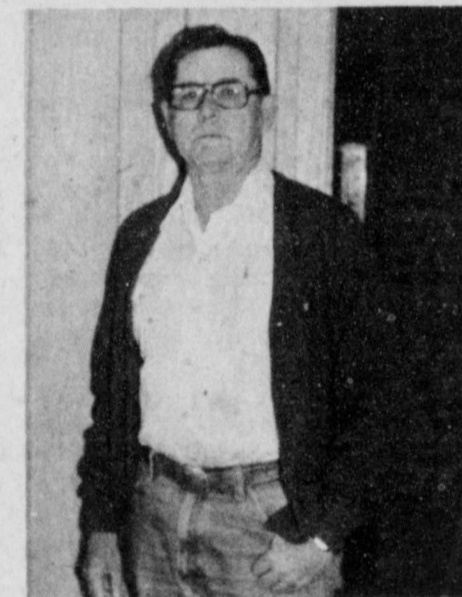
Shaw is the owner/operator of Patter-son Grain in Lockney.

PERSPECTIVES

Should a church be allowed to discipline its members in any way it sees fit? Should they be allowed to publicly condemn members who are found to be engaging in sin? Up in Tulsa, Oklahoma, the leadership of the Collinsville Church of Christ accused a lady of having committed adultery and read a letter to that effect to the congregation where the lady had once attended.

The result of such an action was a lawsuit against the church, which they lost. The woman claimed that she had suffered much because of this public humiliation, that the church should not be doing such things, and that she had withdrawn her membership some time before the letter was read anyway.

The church felt they were simply exercising Biblical discipline and that the woman remained under their care since they do not hold membership in the same way that many denominations do. A court felt differently and awarded the woman over \$300,000 in damages.

This is not the first time a church has decided to discipline a member. Some groups practice "shunning", whereby church members are directed to have nothing to do with an offending member until repentance acceptable to the leadership has been accomplished. The Mormons and the Catholics have excommunication procedures for violators of church precepts. My own denomination has procedures for church trials of members, though that process is seldom used. I can only remember one

case in the whole denomination since being ordained almost nine years ago.

The biblical record indicates that there was discipline in the New Testament church. In a few extreme cases Paul told church to get rid of members who were engaged in particularly repulsive sins. But the main course of action seems to be that a person not living up to standard would be admonished at first privately, then by church leadership, then, if by this point he had not mended his ways, publicly before the church.

That sort of process is intended to bring the offender to an understanding of the problem, with an eye toward restoring the fellowship. Even in the old days of my denomination when discipline was stricter, the idea to heal rather than destroy, and our current procedures are considered as a last resort for the reprobate.

Then, of course, there is the always thorny issue of how Jesus dealt with the woman caught in adultery. His solution at that time was to forgive rather than punish, and to admonish the woman to a new life. How much that applies to the situation in Oklahoma is perhaps debatable. Still I wonder how much time was given to trying to help the woman. Unfortunately, the media is no help here.

The case bodes ill for those who practice strict discipline in churches. But then again, maybe it will help them see not everyone needs to be turned over to the devil for correction.

Its purpose is to make you aware of a prosecutor's role, of your responsibility as a resident of Floyd County and how we can work together to alleviate some of society's problems. This is the first in a series of three articles examining the justice system in America.

AMERICAN JUSTICE (Part I) Crime & Imprisonment

The system of justice in America is complex, often confusing, and even contradictory. No doubt misconceptions about it flourish among the public. Here is the first part of a short quiz to test your knowledge of its operation and effect.

The entire quiz (three parts) is based largely on research gathered by U.S. News & World Report. It is offered here as general information, not specific to this county, nor is it a substitute for legal advice on any issue. Rather, it should serve to heighten your interest and awareness of concerns of the justice system.

1. In the last two decades the rate of reported violent crime has:

[A] doubled. [B] nearly tripled. [C] more than quadrupled.

(C). This has put an ever-increasing strain on police, prosecutors, courts, and prisons — whose facilities and staff have not quadrupled.

2. On the average, for every 100 felony crimes committed, how many result in a person going to jail?

[A] 1. [B] 5. [C] 18.

(B). Eighty of the 100 cases will go unsolved; the others (save the one, imprisonment) will result in probation for the defendant, bail-jumping by the defendant, dismissal by the judge, or rejection by the prosecutor.

Twirlers earn trophies

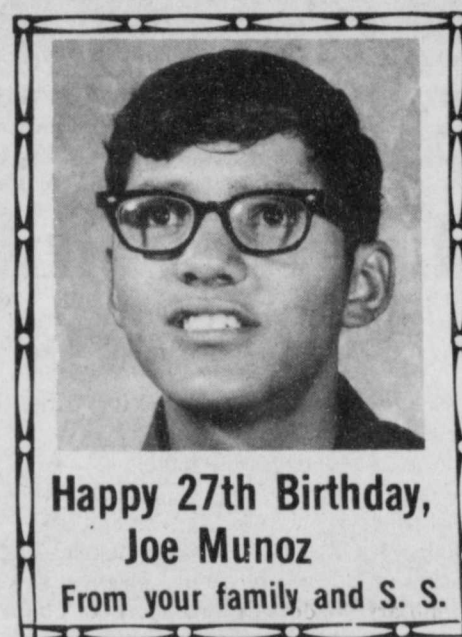

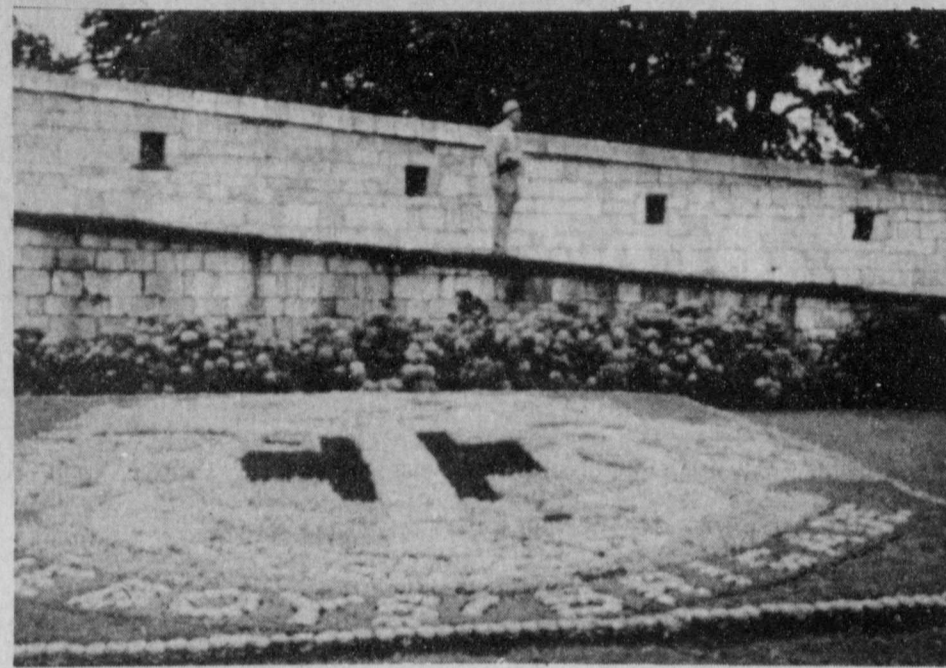



Editor's Note: The following is an account given by Faye Barker, in cooperation with Dottie Stansell, of the travels by Art and Faye Barker of Lockney and Dewitt Roberts Seago of Arlington in the European countries during the month of September 1983. We arrive at beautiful unique and old York and go to the Viking Hotel. Before dinner we took a short walk on the famous walls of York and went to the York Minster, one of the largest medieval churches north of the Alps, and beyond question one of the most beautiful, with the largest area of medieval glass in the country. Our farewell dinner for our tour group was that evening and this was the best yorkshire pudding we had eaten. The next morning dawned cold and damp, but no one missed the walking tour of York with our local lady guide. The wall was built in the early 1300's and now the city because the growth, stands on both sides of the section of the wall which remain. We walked the old wall, through gateways on the new wall and to that street called "The Shambles." It retains the quaint look of medieval times. The half timbered houses on both

It is made up by permanent shops, stalls of goods, vegetables and fruit stands and actors doing their thing. We came back there to eat that night for the theater where we saw Mr. Cinders, was only a block away. After another taxi ride back to the hotel, we realized that we only had one more day in London.

Rising early we were on our way down the Thames via boat to Greenwich for lunch, and the boat trip back past history still unfolding before our eyes. Our guide on the boat was informative and delightful. There was just enough time for our last trip to Harrods via "the tube", then dinner at the Piccadilly Hotel.

The art of packing after all this time was put to the test in our room that night. We didn't have room for that cheese anyway! We got an early start the next morning in one of those every present black taxis back to Victoria Station to catch the train to Gatwick airport. It all went so smoothly we could not believe it, and soon we were boarding that plane that would take us to Dallas where we would go through customs, race to another part of that enormous DFW Airport.

We said goodbye one more time - this time to the Seago's. I just knew that Pat Thornton had not allowed us enough time to claim our luggage, recheck it, go through customs and change buildings, but it was just right, with time to spare. You did a good job Pat.

Lubbock looked dry and brown and absolutely beautiful. Lockney looked even better. It was truly good to be home. Where did the time go so quickly? A whole month has gone but we will forever fondly remember this - our September Song. But now really, we do have all these strange coins that we need to use - and that chocolate over there is so very good! Besides I saw over the news where Harrods is having its first sale ever! 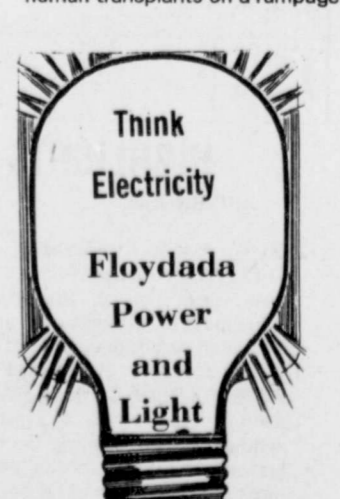
