

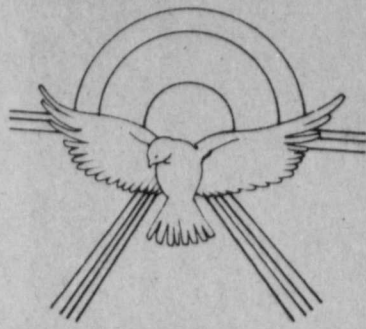
Sunrise service slated

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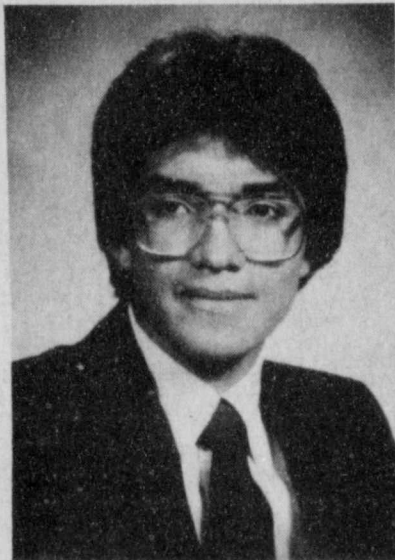

Castro, Williams named top graduates

Paul Castro and Libby Williams, the current Mr. and Miss LHS, have been named as valedictorian and salutatorian of the Lockney High School graduating class of 1984.

Castro's four-year average was 96.90; Miss Williams' average was 96.28. Closely following the top two were Shawnda Brock, 95.68; Aurora Garcia, 95.41, and Kim Carthel, 95.31. Five other seniors also will be recognized as honor graduates. They are Glenn Sutterfield, 92.80; Karyn Foster, 91.58; David Martinez, 91.90; Gary Bigham, 91.36, and Hope Cantu, 90.06.

Castro, the valedictorian, is the son of Richard and Felecita Castro. He plans

to attend the University of Texas after graduation. At LHS he has been in the band for four years, serving both as president and vice president, and earning all-region band honors for four years. He was president of his junior class and vice president of his freshman class. Castro was a Student Council

representative three years and is president this year. He is yearbook editor and has been a member of National Honor Society for two years and of Future Homemakers of America for one year. In sports he has been in track for four years, and on the cross-country track team for three years where he has made the regionals two years and this

year went to state. He also was on the football team his freshman and senior years.

For the last two years she has been FFA sweetheart and was runner-up last year for the district FFA sweetheart honor. She is Texas Junior Angus Princess. Libby is a four-year member of the LHS band and of FHA, and a two-year member of National Honor Society.

Graduation for the 33-member class of 1984 will be May 21.

The salutatorian is the daughter of Jerry and Kay Williams. She plans to enroll in Texas Tech University. All four years her class has chosen her as a favorite and as most attractive girl. She is senior class president and also has been class treasurer and class secretary. 3 councilmen sworn into office

Three incumbents city councilmen were sworn into office during the regular meeting of the Lockney City Council Tuesday morning.

Paul Reece, Dub Dipprey, and Pat Frizzell returned to their seats on the city council following the election last Saturday.

After the three were sworn in department assignments were also made by Mayor J.D. Copeland. Alderman Dipprey will remain in charge of the police department, Reece the fire department, Frizzell the water and sewer department, Kring the street and alley department, and Wofford the city farm. Wofford was also elected Mayor Pro Tem.

The council also approved the budget for 1984-1985. The budget amount of \$544,698 was approved. This includes an increased monthly donation to the volunteer fire department.

Other business agreed upon by the council included:

- approved a contract with the Floyd County Appraisal District to collect the 1984 taxes and the 1983 delinquent taxes.

Board approves refurbishing

The Lockney School Board during a regular monthly meeting, accepted a bid of \$30,941 from Carr Taping of low to do the renovation work on the Lockney High School, junior high, and administrators complex.

A total of five bids were submitted to the board. They included a bid of \$36,444.00 from Madison Co. of Lubbock; \$39,113.00 from Gilbert Building Co. of Amarillo; \$49,100.00 from Gerald Martin of Plainview; and \$45,000.00 from Pioneer Masonry of Lubbock.

The board accepted bids from Buckner and Sons of Plainview for two of the old school buses and one from Fierros and Son to install a concrete floor in the new garage on the school bus lot. Amount of the bid was \$1,099.00 Also submitting a bid for the floor was High Plains Pavers with a bid of \$2,106.00

The board approved sending a 1975, 54 passenger bus to Huntsville for repairs. A new engine will be installed, the back end will be repaired, and the bus will be repainted.

Coach Purser came before the board to discuss the overall athletic budget for the 1984-85 year. The budget will be slightly higher this year due to an increase in girls track, first aid supplies, and travel expenses. The board approved \$10,986.00 of the football budget so that the coaches may begin ordering new equipment for next year.

During the meeting each of the school principals were asked to explain how many new teachers would be needed for

In Times Like These...

During and after the Presidency Gaule of Charles de Gaulle France went its own way in what seemed at times to be deliberate efforts to "truant" American noses. All of this has Mitterrand changed since Mitterrand became President in May 1981, four months after Reagan entered the White House. The personality of the two differs quite a bit. The French President is a studious man who loves literature and President Reagan is a sports fan.

The surprising tie between the two is a shared mistrust of the Soviet Union, its military buildings and its ambitions around the globe. Mitterrand has endorsed himself to many people when he expelled 47 Russian spies from France. Shawn Tao, he has an interest to meet with Kremlin leaders, as prior French governments did. Such positions have won American respect for the Socialist party leaders.

Mitterrand has been an ardent supporter of deployment of U.S. cruises and Pershing two missiles in Western Europe. He also is cooperating more with the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) than any recent French leader. France withdrew its troops from NATO in 1966, but now has liaison with all NATO staff and command centers. An U.S. official say, "It's the end of a reticence which began with General de Gaulle."

President Mitterrand friendship with President Reagan was very wident when the two visited in the White House last month. Reagan will visit France and the Normandy beaches June 6 for the 40th anniversary of the allied D-Day landings in World War II. Relations between the two countries now are the most harmonious in a quarter of a century.

 Soviet military buildup in Asia raises alarms from China to Australia. Moscow has turned Vietnam's Cam Ranh Bay into a forward base. Some 27 warships, including six attack submarines, anchor there regularly. Five floating piers and a dock service the ships. Missile-armed Soviet bombers fly out of Cam Ranh Bay fields.

In response, Southeast Asian nations are building up aerial defenses. Australia is reconsidering plans to withdraw 19 fighters based in Malaysia, Indonesia, which is unable to afford jets, looks for a new missile air defense. Thailand, Singapore, Malaysia seek to purchase American F-16 fighters.

One place where Communist rebellion is stumbling, is in Thailand. Thai military officials credit all that to China's decision to end aid to rebels and improve ties with Bangkok. However, what Asians really want is an increased U.S. naval presence.

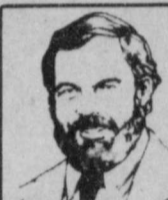
Dorothy Smith gave a program on the Easter Parade for the El Progreso Study Club which met Wednesday week at the home of Cornelia Johnson in Lockney.

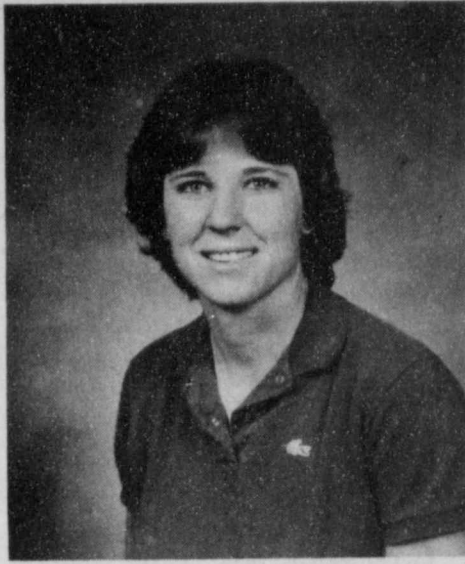

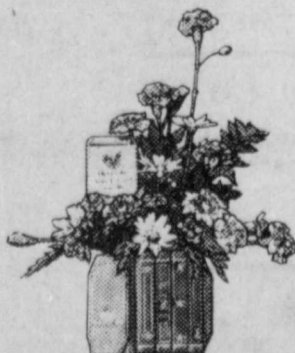

A look at "local measured service"

Perhaps you've heard about a new optional type of service that Southwestern Bell Telephone is proposing for its Texas customers. It's called Local Measured Service (LMS). Simply put, LMS would give you the option of paying for your direct use of the telephone network.

Southwestern Bell Telephone's LMS proposal to the Public Utility Commission (PUC) includes an option that would lower fixed monthly charges while adding a low usage charge for each completed outgoing call. Those calls would be billed on the basis of distance, duration of the call and the time of day.

Another option would be a "LIFELINE" service at a \$5 monthly fee. This service would be targeted to the elderly on poverty-level income. The rate would include a usage allowance of 25 completed outgoing local calls. Additional completed outgoing local calls would be billed at the rate of 8 cents each. Customers would not be charged for incoming calls under either plan.

It's your option

LMS is for residence customers, as well as single-line, one-party business customers. And of course you could keep the current "flat-rate" monthly service if you'd prefer.

These new local service pricing plans would be available within 60 days of Commission approval in 89 offices which currently serve over 2,500,000 customer lines. The company plans to equip the remaining offices within two years after approval.

I think you'll agree there are several benefits to measured service. It would give you options for choosing the plan that gives you more control over your phone bill. You'd also have the option of paying for the service you used, rather than subsidizing those who use their phones a great deal more than you do.

While LMS as a standard ser-

vice offering would be new to Southwestern Bell Telephone's Texas customers, it isn't new in Texas. Customers of three other companies in the Lone Star State — General Telephone, Continental Telephone and Cent-Tel — are taking advantage of LMS. And like us, other companies — United Tel, Palo Pinto Tel and Mustang Tel — have requests pending with the PUC.

Customer interest

We're proposing the service because we've known there has been a need for optional pricing in Texas. Last summer we conducted a survey to determine customer interest in LMS.

We found that interest was strong, particularly among those customers making fewer local calls or shorter-duration calls. The results also showed that customers want wider choices in how they pay for service by having the ability to match their cost to their calling needs.

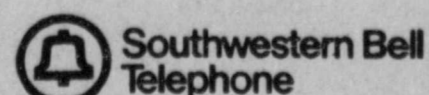

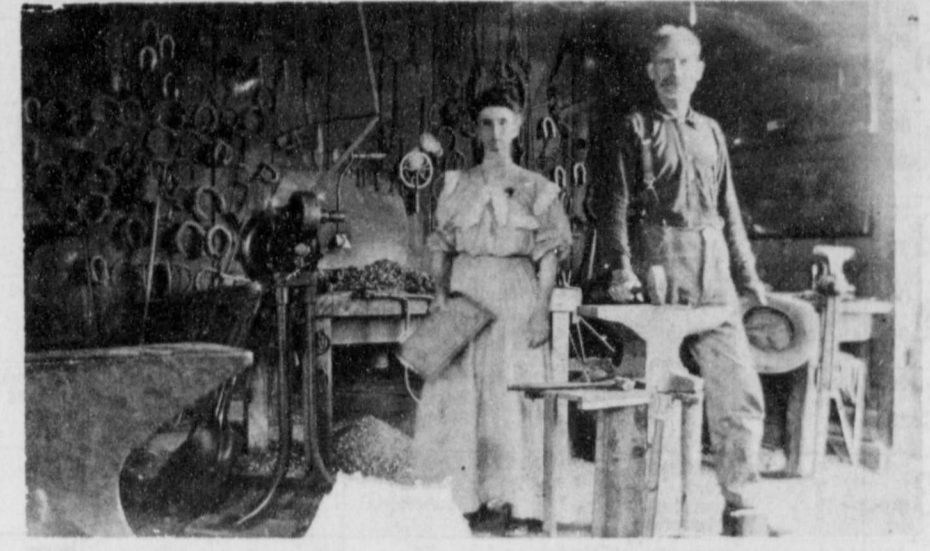

JOHN E. AND NANCY BURNS inside the Burns Blacksmith Shop, about 1910.

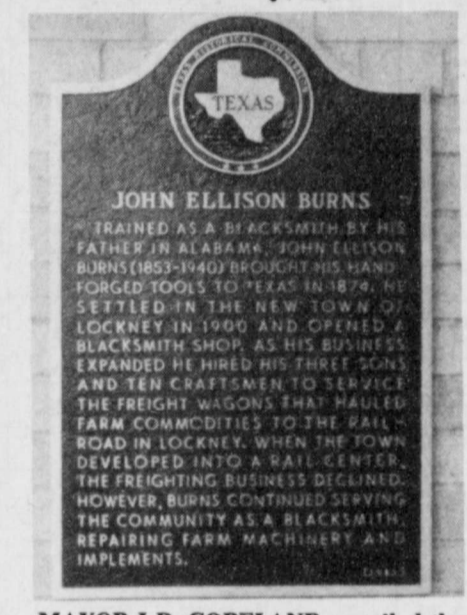

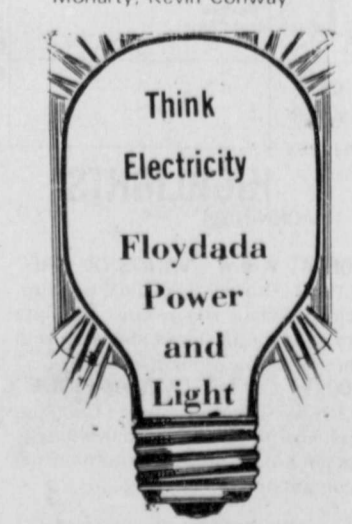
