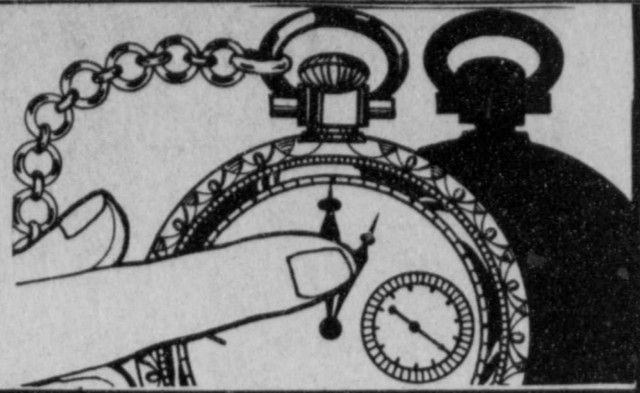

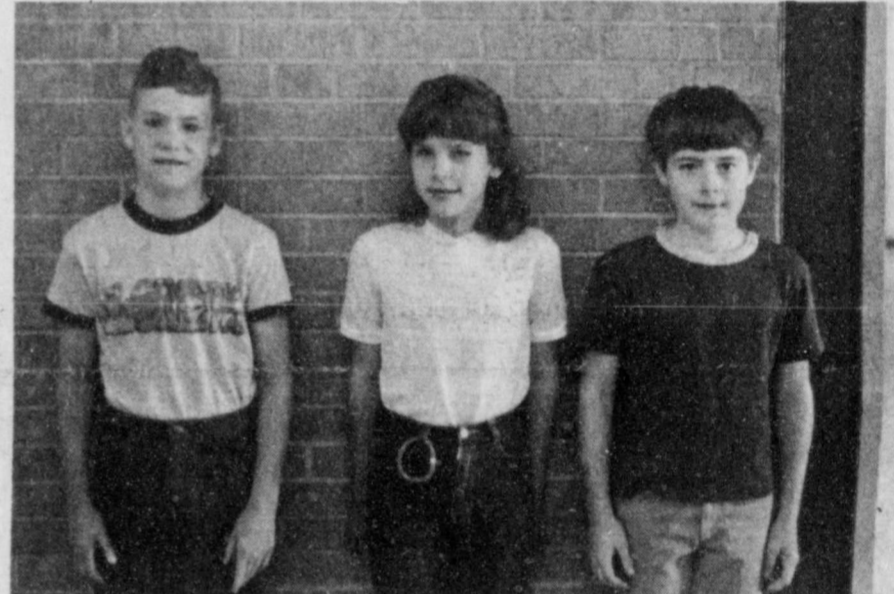
Curtis Briggs received a superior rating at the competition. Curtis had only one mistake and received a "Superior" certificate.

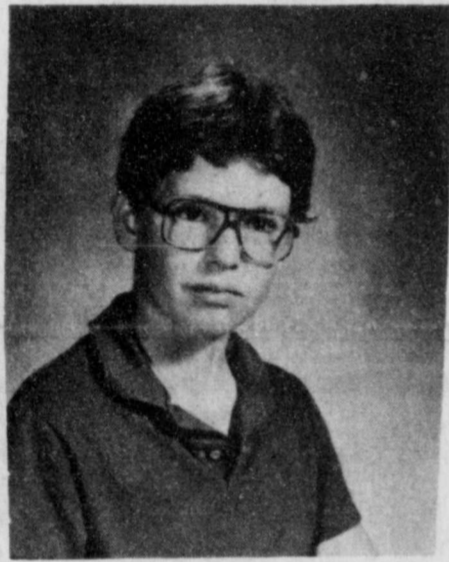

At a recent press conference Governor Mark White was asked his views on the contest between Mr. Mondale, Mr. Hart, and Mr. Jackson. # PERSPECTIVES

Education is in the news a lot lately. Specifically, the recommendations of the Governor's specially appointed commission on education. Since the often controversial Ross Perot is in charge of the commission, the recommendations his group comes up with were likely to be controversial as well.

I have to admit that I am not conversant with all of the recommendations but it seems to me that some of them are perhaps overreactions to a perceived lack of quality in our educational system, and some of them are probably exactly what we need to do. The problem with such a statement is that is probably true for nearly everyone reading this, and their list of what is absolutely necessary, and what is expendable, would likely be much different from mine.

The question I would ask first is: What is our basic philosophy of education? That is to say, what do we intend to accomplish when we educate people for the world they will someday have to run? I wonder if the commission asked themselves that question. I wonder if we ourselves have ever taken the time to decide what it is we really want our kids to learn.

I read recently about Plato's ideal educational system. The courses in his curricula were designed to produce the kind of leaders he felt Greece needed. There were some basic things he expected his students to know, and then he moved them gradually to a higher level of thinking until he had brought the student to an understanding of all

the disciplines he thought they would need to be the best possible leaders. He was not concerned with educating peasants, unless they were demonstrated to have the abilities to survive his training. Similarly, being an aristocrat did not guarantee acceptance into the school. Those among the upper class who were not worthy should be sent to live the peasant life where they would then be productive individuals.

In Plato's system, form followed function, and there was a recognition that not all individuals are suited to the same type of training. The philosophy could be distilled as: production of leaders and productive followers.

I do not say that we should adopt his particular philosophy, or even his curriculum, but I think we would be better off having some kind of real starting point when we try to change the system. As it is, I get the impression from the things I read that people are looking at the shape of education in America and saying, "This is a mess." How do we know we have a mess if we don't know what we want the end product to look like? Maybe we really do need more time in the classroom, fewer extracurricular activities, more "basic" courses, etc. But we only need them if we know what we expect to produce. Maybe we need more specialized instruction, like they have in Europe, then again, maybe we don't. What we do need is some understanding of what education is and what our purpose is in education before we start tearing up our system.

In mid-December 1978 former President Carter announced that the U.S. planned to derecognize Taiwan. The former president of Taiwan's Junior Chamber of Commerce recalled, "Many people panicked. Some worried about an imminent invasion by the Communists. Some packed up and left. Most were angry, disbelieving, and unsure."

In recent years Taiwan has acquired a sense of well-being. The recent celebration of the lunar new year gave evidence of this. Families who shopped for traditional banquets found a bountiful selection of fruits and vegetables, chicken and ducks, seafoods and slabs of fresh meats. All this was in contrast (Taiwan's capital) complains about U.S. limitations on military sales. Officials still hope that President Reagan will reverse his decision not to sell a new generation of warplanes to Taiwan. I would like to again express my sincere appreciation to all of the Lady

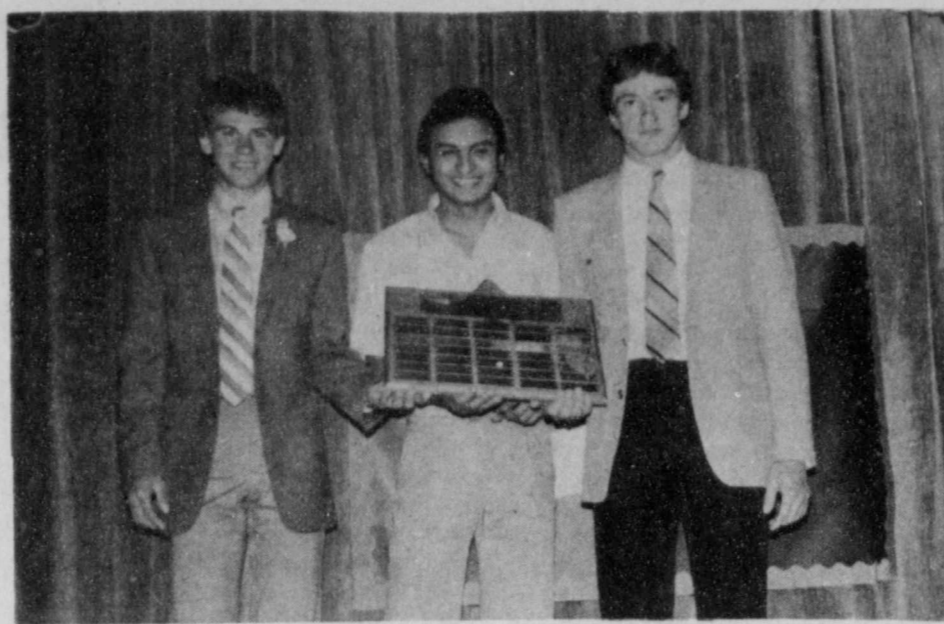

## HOME ECONOMICS TODAY

### MAKE MORE USABLE SPACE IN THE HOME

With current housing prices, moving to larger quarters is out of the question for a lot of homeowners. Adding to the squeeze is the current trend in housing construction which emphasizes compactness and economy.

As a result, many of us will need to learn how to live comfortably with less space.

Furniture selection and placement and other decorating devices can help.

Start with an inventory of the total amount of available space in your house and its divisions, the arrangement of rooms or areas and size and location of home furnishings.

If some areas seem overcrowded, while others appear underused, reorganize your use of the space. Explore new and different ways of making space function better for your needs.

Some changes can require costly remodeling or decorating, while others may be achieved by minimal purchases or simple furniture rearrangements.

Here are some low-cost ideas for making cramped quarters look larger:

- \* Plan the decor for the entire home as a unit rather than for each room separately to create a feeling of spaciousness and continuity.

- \* Carry wall and floor colors from room to room and change textures rather than colors. Blending simple window treatments with wall colors will make rooms seem larger.

- \* Rooms with pastel colored walls reflect light and seem more spacious, while darker walls soak up light and appear to confine.

- \* Modify a guest room or extra bedroom to double as a study, television room, sewing and/or hobby room.

- \* Choose small-scaled furniture with simple lines, and choose multi-purpose pieces such as sofa beds or drop-leaf tables when selecting or replacing furniture. Place furniture against walls to leave as much space as possible in the center of the room.

- \* Expand space visually by using mirrors.

- \* Eliminate furniture that's not used and limit the number of accessories to two or three to a room. Beautiful objects need space around them to give people eye as well as elbow room.

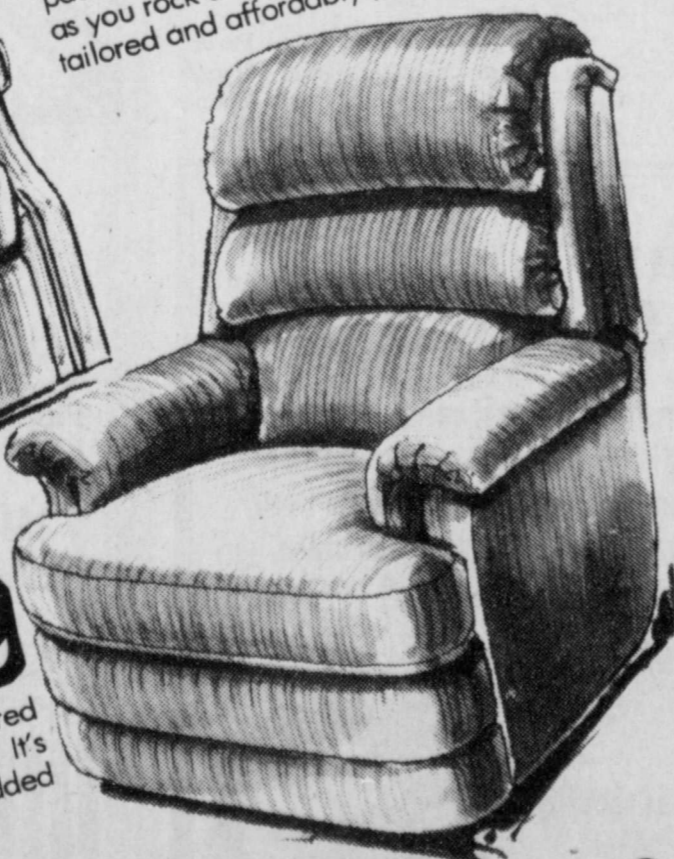

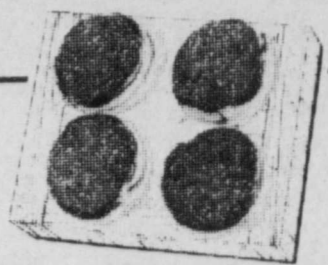
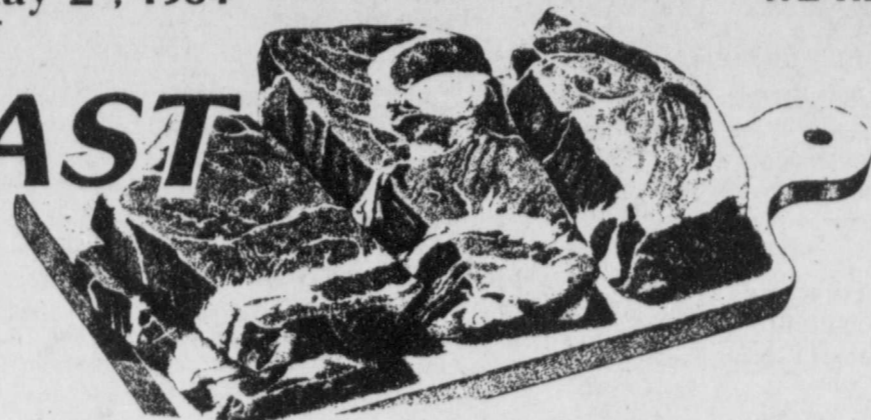
