PAC holds dinner meeting with Lockney parents

The Lockney Parent Advisory Council held a dinner meeting for parents of students in the Lockney Title I reading, migrant, and composatory math and english.

Sally Reyes, president of the local PAC committee, welcomed all the parents and thanked them for coming. She said, "The great turnout showed that the parents are interested in the PAC group and in the seeing that their children are offered the best possible educational opportunities."

Following the reading of the minutes from the last meeting, held in November, superintendent of schools W.H. Hallmark addressed the group. He explained that even though it was not required to have a PAC committee this year, Lockney had continued with its committee. He explained what PAC is: an organization of parents, teachers and administrators involved with any of the four above mentioned programs.

The organization elects a board to serve two year terms. This board meets

regularly and holds two public meetings a year to get input from parents and to discuss problems, suggestions, and changes with parents. He also said that even though earlier in the year it appeared that funding for the programs might be cut, now it appears Lockney will receive the same funding for the 1984-85 year.

Several of the teachers were called on to explain to parents the subjects they teach and what they do to help those students who need extra aide. Mrs. R.L. Knox, elementary math teacher called on several of the fifth grade students present to help her demonstrate how she teaches math. Assisting in this multiplication exercise were Mr. Hallmark, Mr. Knox, and several adults present.

Following explanations of the subjects by Maria Arellano, the migrant liaison, all those present participated in a meal consisting of many dishes brought by the parents and the PAC board members.

PERSPECTIVES

The man who designed the shape of the Barbie doll is now not too sure he did children a favor by giving the doll the proportions he did. He feels there may be something to the theories that Barbie's looks may have caused inferiority feelings in teenage girls, and that in turn could have led to all sorts of ills, including the current problem of anorexia, girls starving themselves to be thin.

Barbie is a classic by now. I am sure she will go down in history with the Teddy bear, Raggedy Ann, and a whole host of other famous dolls and toys. She has been a fixture in many a young girl's life, and will continue to be part of many more lives. But is she an evil influence?

My daughter was given a Barbie recently. I had originally thought that might not be such a good idea, but watching her play with the doll, dressing it, pretending all sorts of things with it, I can see a healthy imagination going to work, something I don't always see when other toys are played with. My anxiety about the doll centered around her looks. By allowing my child to play with such a doll, would I be condoning or pushing a poor concept of what women ought to look like?

To be sure, Barbie is a bit top heavy. If you proportion her measurements to a woman 5 ft. 6 in., the woman's chest would be some 14 inches larger than her waist. "Ideal" proportions would have the chest only ten inches larger than the

waist. But the problem is not her chest size, it is the rest of her. Barbie is remarkably thin compared to the average woman. Her chest size is average for the size woman mentioned, but her hips and waist are ridiculously small.

Barbie alone, however is not likely to cause a great deal of trauma to a child. Dolls are dolls, and one of the features I noticed about dolls is that, unless they are patterned on real individuals, they really don't have much in common with humanity. My daughter's other dolls wouldn't measure out right proportionally either. Her baby dolls have heads that are too small compared to a real baby's, for example. No, I think dolls are useful for developing imagination and fantasy in a young child's mind.

Instead, the blame is going to have to be shifted to a wider group. It will have to be placed with advertisers who almost universally show us women who are thin, except when they are trying to make us thinner by selling diet food and aids. Blame will have to be placed on we men who are stupid enough to want the women we love to look like the fashion models and beauty queens, instead of appreciating the qualities in women that do not dim. And the blame will have to be placed on women who succumb to societal demands for thinness rather than health.

Barbie is here to stay. It is up to parents to teach their children that looks do not a useful person make.

TABS tests scores released by local school officials

R.L. Knox released the Lockney T.A.B.S. scores to the Lockney school board and to the Lockney Beacon for publication during the May 10 meeting of the school board. These tests are given to students in grades, 3, 5, and 9 to assess the students' knowledge of the basic skills including math, reading, and writing.

The third grade scores proved to be excellent, well above the 85% mastery recommendation set by the state, in all three subjects. In math the students scored 100 percent on 6 of the 10 objectives on the test. They also scored 98 percent in 3 of the objectives and 95 percent on 1.

The third grade reading test was much the same with students showing 100 percent mastery of 6 objectives and 98 percent in 2 of the objectives. Of the 3rd graders handwriting test 98% were acceptable with only 2% being hard to read.

The writing test had 5 objectives and the students showed 100 percent in 4 of those and 98 percent in the remaining subject.

The test results from last year showed a total of 98.6% mastery in all three subjects and this year the students improved to 99.3% mastery of all three tests.

The fifth grade tests showed the students are grasping the main ideas in each subject with the only score under the 85% goal being in reading and that in identifying the main idea in which they scored 74%. In the other reading objectives the students scored 100% in 1, 98% in 3, 96% in 1, 93% in 1, 89% in 3, and 85% in 1 objective.

The fifth grade math tests showed 100% mastery in 5 of the twelve objectives and 98% in the remaining 7.

The fifth grade writing tests were also good with the students scoring 100% in 1 of the objectives, 98% in 4, and 96% in punctuation. The students handwriting was also scored 100% acceptable to

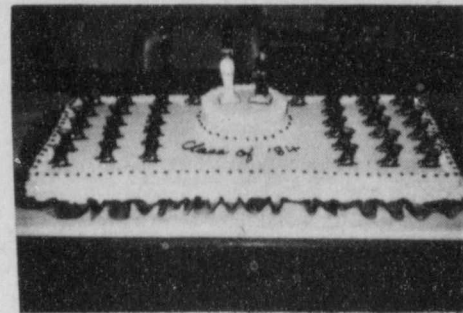
The class progressed to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Delvin Bybee for a complete salad bar with several salad toppers and condiments.

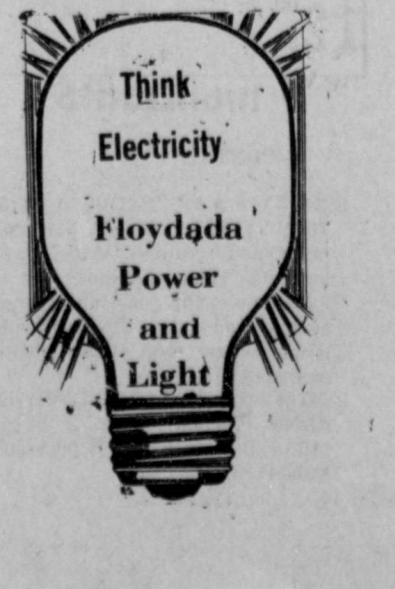
