

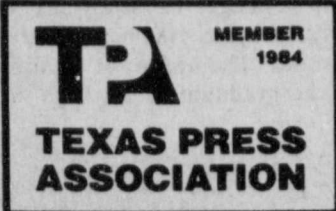

Karla Josey hired to teach junior high science

Karla Josey was hired by the Lockney School Board as the new junior high science teacher during the regular meeting of the board last Tuesday night.

Josey is a science major and did her student teaching in Lockney in 1984 prior to her graduation from Wayland.

The board approved a motion to call for bids on school insurance to cover the buildings, buses, and liability to be opened during the July 12 board meeting.

Also approved was the replacement of the red panels over the east entrance of the old gym and the east doors of the high school building with brown panels to match the new window coverings. Superintendent W.H. Hallmark reported all gutters are being repaired and painted to match the brown window coverings.

The board approved paying Carr Tuckpointing for the work they have done to the outside of the junior high and high school buildings. Carr has chemically cleaned the entire building and were, as of Tuesday, waterproofing the building. They have replaced several tiles around the top of the high school and have repaired all of the cracks in the building. The board is "very impressed" with the work Carr has done. Payment of \$30,941.00 will be made upon the inspection and approval of the board tentatively set for Monday. Hallmark reported that as of Tuesday the Lockney Independent School District is \$35,887 over the projected budget for 1983-84. This is due primarily to the work which has been done to the school buildings.

School principals reported it would be one year before Lockney will be

implementing the full program of new curriculum changes, but that several steps have already been taken toward enacting the program. Spanish will be offered as a foreign language to be taught in high school by Lynn Harvey of Plainview. It was also reported that the school system will need several more computers to meet the necessary computer literacy credits.

The principals discussed several options which the board will legislate the local policies to coincide with the new program including loss of class time, limits on student absences and mastery of the essential elements of the program. The student absences, a major part of this program, states that no student may miss more than ten days of school or the student will fail for the year.

The board approved a motion to accept the athletic insurance from American National Federation at a cost of \$3,344.00, which will cover all high school football players. The policy also offers individual coverage for \$18 which would cover students during school time or at a cost of \$45, a student could have 24 hour coverage for 12 months.

In other action, the board approved the minutes from the last meeting, approved payment of current bills, and were presented a tax report showing \$583,127 taxes collected of the total \$601,011 owed by taxpayers. The report also showed that \$39,000 collected in delinquent taxes.

Present for the meeting were board members Clar Schacht, Keith Jackson, Jim Bob Martin, Bill Race, and Eddie Teeter, superintendent W.H. Hallmark, and principals James Poole, Raymond Lusk, and R.L. Knox.

Fair Board holds meeting

The Floyd County Fair Board met for a planning session for the 1984 Floyd County Fair. The fair dates are set for September 13, 14, and 15.

The theme for this year's parade and fair is "Happiness is a world of colors".

This year a few new events have been added to the fair lineup. There will be a petting zoo for children. The board is looking for a chairperson for the zoo and for baby animals to be exhibited in the zoo.

A chili cookoff is also planned. It will be held on Saturday. During the afternoon and scheduled to coincide with the cookoff are several games including a cow chip throw, tobacco spitting contest, horseshoe throwing and other games.

A flower show will be judged in the women's department. A chairman of

the flower show is being sought. Other changes include a varsity show Thursday night at 7:30 following the cheerleading contest at 6:00. Also a chairperson is needed.

The antique car show has been cancelled this year.

In addition to the above needed chairman, the board also needs a gate chairman.

This year's carnival will be bought by the Pride of Texas who have provided a carnival for the Floyd County Fair for the past several years.

The next fair board meeting is scheduled for 8:00 p.m. July 9 in the Lockney High School Home Economic building. The meetings are open to the public and anyone interested in helping to make this fair successful is encouraged to attend.

5 attend Republican convention in Ft. Worth

Albert Scheele, Floyd County Republican party chairman, along with Hank Winter of Lockney, and Mr. and Mrs. Bill Hale of Floydada left last Thursday afternoon for the State Republican party convention in Fort Worth. The convention was held on June 15 and 16. These Floyd County representatives attended the convention along with 4,631 voting delegates, alternates, and guests from around the State of Texas. Scheele, Winter, and Hale were serving as the voting delegates from Floyd County. Also accompanying the group was Tim Winter, Hank's son from Lockney.

Highlights of the convention included addresses by Vice-President George Bush, Senator John Tower, and former Governor Bill Clements. About 50 resolutions were discussed and adopted at the convention. Among them the ones of particular interest to people of Floyd County dealt with agriculture, education, and a balanced budget for the federal government.

The convention passed an agriculture resolution supporting and promoting legislation and/or programs to encourage the sale of raw agriculture products in the market place at prices on par with the rest of the economy. Regarding education, the state Republicans supported the continued election of members of the Board of Education, reduced terms of office to four years, limiting terms to three.

Recommended competency testing and merit pay for teachers, implementation of a voucher system and/or providing and valorem tax credits for funds spent by parents for their children's education.

The convention passed a resolution pointing out that Gov. Mark White campaigned promising lower utility rates and no new taxes and now utility rates are higher than ever and Gov. White has proposed the largest tax increase in Texas history. The Texas Republicans resolved to continue to expose Gov. White's unkept promises.

Business of the Week features Webster Service

Webster's Service Station and Supply, Inc. has been operating in Lockney since April of 1948 with three generations of Websters working and serving the citizens of Lockney. R.V. Webster and his father, Kelly began the endeavor at 302 S. Main shortly after R.V.'s tour of the South Pacific. During the late 50's, early 60's they were joined by Bobby Webster after school and during the summer.

R.V. married Rita Mullins on July 22, 1947, and the couple have two children. Debbie is a pharmacist at Lubbock General Hospital. Dr. Bobby Webster has returned to Vanderbilt University at Nashville to study endocrinology and laser beam surgery. Dr. Webster and Mamba Frizzell Webster have two daughters and one son.

The Websters have witnessed many changes during their years in Lockney. Business boomed during the late 40's early 50's cotton hit forty cents a pound and the station was kept open seven days a week, often until eleven or twelve o'clock at night. Two gas shortages curtailed business during the seventies. Webster's moved to its present location in 1979.

Rita has kept the books for the operation and remarked that two generations of Martinizes have worked along beside the Websters. Arcenio Martinez, who is currently employed,

began working with his father, Chano, doing odd jobs, when he was about eleven. When Chano retired, Arcenio continued working.

The Websters have not only contributed to the economy of the city but have given of themselves to the people of Lockney. R.V. coached little league for ten years, pony and teenage league for six years, served on the hospital board for two terms, served as a director of the chamber of commerce for two terms, and taught the senior boys' Bible class at the First Baptist Church for twenty years. He has earned the 32nd degree of the Scottish Rite Masons and has filled several offices.

Rita, a past matron of the Eastern Star was also a Mother Adviser for the Order of the Rainbow for Girls. She is currently an elementary school aide and continues to be the bookkeeper at Webster's.

Webster's Service Station and Supply features the Goodyear line of tires, batteries, belts, etc. Also AC spark plugs and oil filters are sold. Fina gasoline and oil is highlighted as the major brands sold. This station offers full service for any vehicles. In fact, service is the basis of business at Webster's. R.V. states, "We try to give to best service because the customer is the one doing me the favor when he drives into my driveway."

Lockney finally receives much needed rainfall

Wednesday afternoon Lockney residents and farmers saw something they have not seen enough of lately, RAIN.

The rain fell in different quantities at different areas around the county. The largest amount of rainfall seems to have been in the Lone Star and Sterley communities where 2 to 4 inches of rain fell. Duard Reeves of Sterley reported two inches on his farm northeast of Sterley and Bill Sherman of Lone Star reported four inches.

Southwest of Lockney near the Buster Terrell farm 1 1/2 inches fell; Eddie Teeter, west of town, reported 9/10 inches.

Both Muncy and the Pleasant Valley communities reported 9/10 of inch. Eddie Teeter said he "would like to see another 9/10 but I am very pleased with the rainfall we had."

The City of Lockney received between 1 and 1 2/10 inches during the rain showers Wednesday and Thursday morning.

In addition to adding moisture to the ground, the rain has enabled farmers to stop watering corn and cotton for a short time.

The rain halted the wheat harvest in Floyd County for three to five days, if it does not rain more.

The wheat harvested has met and even surpassed many farmers' expectations this year. Jerry Ford reported that the dryland wheat he has

harvested has made from 18 to 28 bushels per acre, which is more than he had expected. Duard Reeves said he was going to reap a record harvest on one field of his irrigated wheat. The field produced an average of 106 bushels per acre. Reeves attributes this record harvest to the fact that "the wheat had plenty of water, fertilizer, and had never been in wheat before." Reeves said this was "the best by far" of his wheat fields and does not expect the others to produce this much. But he is "optimistic" about the rest of the harvest.

Other farmers have reported dryland wheat making 18 bushels and more per acre.

Estimations made by Kelton Shaw at the Patterson Grain Elevator are that the irrigated wheat is making between 60 and 70 bushels per acre on wheat that has been watered three times. Shaw also estimated wheat that was watered only one time is making 40 to 50 bushels per acre. He reported that his own wheat made about 80 bushels per acre.

All in all, the farmers seem to be pleased with the yields of this year's crop and are optimistic about the possible yields of the wheat yet to be harvested.

An estimated 60 percent of the crop is left to be harvested.

Hazlett resigns post as administrator of Hospital

On June 18th, at the regular monthly meeting of the board of directors of Lockney General Hospital District, Guy Hazlett, II, Administrator, announced his resignation. In his resignation he announced July 13, as his last day as administrator.

Mr. Hazlett will be assuming the position of administrator of Caprock Hospital District, effective immediately.

Mr. Hazlett and his family moved to Lockney in July of 1982. "During his service to the Lockney Hospital," Mr. Hazlett stated, he felt "several major accomplishments have taken place." Among these accomplishments were:

- *Purchase of numerous pieces of equipment for improving patients care including completion of installation of radiology equipment, addition of several pieces of new lab equipment, a new operating room table, a new kitchen stove, an EKG defibrillator/monitor of emergency room, a new Ohio incubator for nursery, electronic thermometers for the clinic patients, a new emergency radio paging system for on-call emergency personnel, and numerous small pieces of equipment for respiratory therapy.

- *Building and grounds improvements including the paving of the south parking lot, addition of outside lighting for patient and employee safety, new carpeting for in-patient hallways, remodeling of the central nursing station, reconstruction of the incinerator, and repaving of the emergency room drive and north parking areas.

- *Affiliation of hospital with H.A.S.I., and other group purchasing hospital cooperatives for reduced supply costs.

- *A decrease in billing time to insurance companies, resulting in quicker account settlements and quicker insurance company payments.

- *An increase in the overall hospital collections to a figure in excess of 98% during the last eighteen (18) months.

- *The establishment of a long-term system for planning, for setting goals and objectives, and for providing higher levels of continuing clinical education for employees.

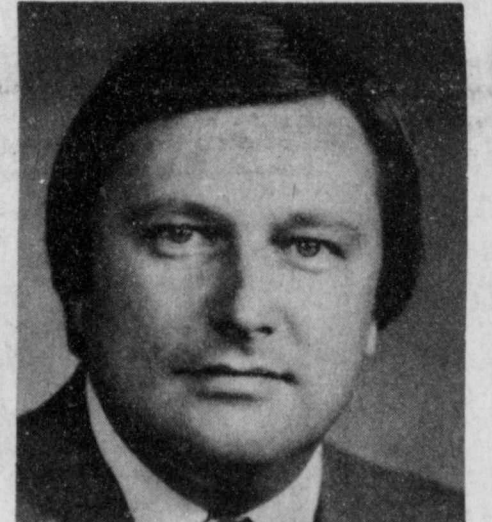
- *The improvement of the hospital employees group insurance program.

- *The implementation of an employee service recognition program.

- *The implementation of and concern for quality assurance and quality control for patient services.

- *The improvement of the relationship among all those serving and caring for patients as members of the hospital "service family"

Mr. Hazlett closed his remarks by stating that the experiences he received and the friendship he and his family have made in the past two years have been enjoyable and will be treasured. He stated, "Many thanks must go to those who have volunteered many hours and years of volunteer services to the hospital and to those who have been directed into a career or profession in health care. May God continue to bless the community, the directors, the doctors, and all those employees who work so very hard every day."

3 visit Democratic convention

Attending the Democratic Convention in Houston this past weekend were Buster Terrell of Lockney and Lynn and Orville Marler of Floydada.

While at the convention those gathered heard many speakers including Governor Mark White, Lt. Governor Bill Hobby, State Agriculture Commissioner Hightower, Ralph Yarbrough, former congressman Bob Kruger, Kent Hance, Lloyd Doggett, and presidential nomination hopefuls Walter Mondale and Gary Hart.

The Democrats passed many resolutions during the convention and many of the committees were strongly controlled by the liberal factions, including the

women's and the black caucuses, of the party.

Passed at the convention were an agriculture resolution for a 10 percent return on the farmers' investment in order to achieve parity and a resolution to stop the nuclear waste sight in Swisher County.

Buster Terrell said he felt the members of this community and of Floyd County should "become more active in the political process. If the citizens do not become more active in the local, state, and national political affairs, special interest groups could up controlling the government."

Computer representative addresses Rotary Club

David Howard of Val-Com Computer Center of Plainview was the featured guest speaker at the Lockney Rotary Club last Friday.

Howard's program was geared toward computers in agriculture. He discussed many different computers and also several programs geared toward the farmers and their use of computers. He discussed a general ledger program which has the capability of accounts, allowing, the farmer to put the various farming costs into separate accounts. These would include sales; bills such as fuel and repairs; and expenditures such as fertilizer, seed, and irrigating costs. This same program also breaks down into enterprises which would allow the farmer to break down each of accounts into particular fields and crops.

Howard said that many manufacturers are offering programs especially for the farmers.

Howard told the group that different computer sizes depend on the needs of the buyer. Many people want to buy systems for their immediate needs with the capability of expansion in the future. Howard said that for a minimum of \$1,000 one may purchase the basic system that would set up a bookkeeping system. Howard also advised a system with a disk drive and printer in order to have a printed record of information put in the computer.

Howard answered many questions from the members of the club.

He said that many of the computer manufacturers make their computers closed to programs made outside the

company; however, several of the makers of computers make it so that many programs are being manufactured for several computers.

Howard said, "Choose a computer by your needs and remember to consider possible future needs with the leeway to expand your system at a later date."

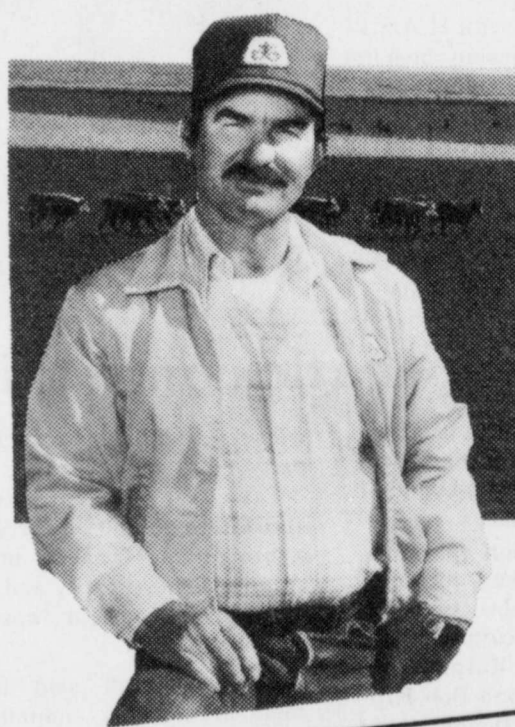
