The Lamplighter

Well, back to one of my favorite subjects, the teevee network newspapers.

Remember the scene when Andropov died and Chernenko came to power: Well, there was the t.v. reporter in Moscow, bundled against the cold and telling us what was happening. Fine. But then he begins to complain that so little is known of Chernenko, that our intelligence community was caught flat footed on the subject, and did not even know Andropov had died until they heard it on Moscow television. Over in the corner of the screen while this was going on, appeared a picture of William Casey, head of CIA. The reporter went on: There was a time, he said, when the intelligence community was in better shape, as far as things like this were concerned. Years ago, he said, our intelligence community could listen in on conversations of Soviet officials as they sped to and from work, or wherever they were going. Then there appeared a picture of a speeding limo in the background as the reporter continued. They could no longer do that, he said, because the Soviets now "scramble" their phone conversations.

Partly true. But not enough truth. If you really want to know what happened, read on.

It is true that we could and did listen, but not because the conversations were unscrambled. They were in fact scrambled, but had been "unscrambled". The information gained thereby was of immense value. Nixon was preparing to go to Moscow to meet with Brezhnev. The politburo was divided as to how they were to approach Nixon, knowing him to be a tough negotiator. Transcripts of the phone conversations were closely scrutinized in Washington, and the contents shared with very, very few people. So secret was the information that it was not even placed in the written daily intelligence briefings that were distributed, on a need to know basis, among top government hands in Washington. The briefer would come and make an oral report to those of us who it was determined should share in the information.

I remember one conversation between Brezhnev and his Defense Minister, whose name escapes me at the moment. The minister was opposed to the whole idea of the summit, at the time, fearing the Soviet military might suffer as a result of an agreement between the two heads of state. Brezhnev finally persuaded him that it would be a good idea. "just to get him over here and size him up, so to speak."

Nixon went. The meetings were generally successful. One reason was that he at least had an advance insight into the thinking of Soviet leadership.

Not long after, there appeared a little paragraph in the column of a Washington newspaper reporting that the U.S. had been listening in. Overnight the source dried up.

Obviously someone leaked the information, for whatever purpose. But the government did not make a big deal of it, for to do so would focus attention on a subject that was better left in the grey area.

We all know what happens when the government tries to tighten up on leaks like that. A great howl goes up, primarily from the teevee types, like the one who was complaining about this nation's inability to know exactly what is going on at all times in all places.

Lockney cheerleaders attend Texas Tech camp

Tye Company announces new line of merchandise

J.M. Tye farmed in the Lockney community and wanting to "build a better mousetrap" constructed the first Tye cotton planter for his private use. Neighboring farmers witnessed this innovative piece of equipment and began ordering them. Before long, Tye found himself in the manufacturing business. These were the auspicious beginnings that served as a backdrop for what is now known as the Tye Company.

The Tye Company was erected in its presented location on U.S. Hwy. 70 in 1964. The maiden manufacturing edifice contained about 5,000 square feet and has gradually expanded to 165,000 square feet in twenty years. Originally the cotton planter was the principal product, but by degrees, drills for grains such as wheat and soybeans have been added. The smallest drill manufactured by the company is 40" wide and can be pulled behind a garden tractor. At the other end of the spectrum, the largest fold-up model made, spans forty feet.

John Tye, the eldest son of J.M. and Jessie Tye, joined the organization in 1972 and has become the firm's president. He stated that the Tye Company employs about 100 workers and some employees commute from as far away as Amarillo and Lubbock, although most are from the Lockney,

Floydada, and Plainview areas.

John explained that "although Tye's equipment is used locally, the firm exports products throughout the Corn Belt, the south southeastern coast of the United States, Arizona, California and Eastern Canada. The company exports merchandise internationally, shipping drills as far away as Saudi Arabia."

The Tye Company is continually working on new products and refining existing equipment. John cites for example that the grain drill is in its fifth modification process.

Referring to new products, John Tye announced that the Tye Company is now involved in another business—the manufacturing of children's recreational equipment. This business will be operating under the name Horizon Sports. John stresses that this will be a strictly wholesale operation and hopes that the products can be mass merchandised through chain stores such as Kmart and Toys R Us.

Tye pointed out that "the Tye Company has been affected by the farm recession dramatically for the last three years, like everyone else in the country has been." However, he optimistically hopes that "the recreational sport like line will be comparable to the farm equipment line within the next three to four years."

U.S. officials are very concerned over the impact that turmoil could have on the Panama Canal. Some of them think that an upheaval in Panama could spark even greater turbulence all across Central America, already in turmoil because of a Communist led rebellion in El Salvador. The newly elected President Nicolas Barletta is pro-American and anti-Communist. However, there is the threat of strikes and violent protests by supporters of the defeated candidates, Arnulfo Arias.

The Panama Canal is 40 miles long and is a lifeline of trade and seaborne

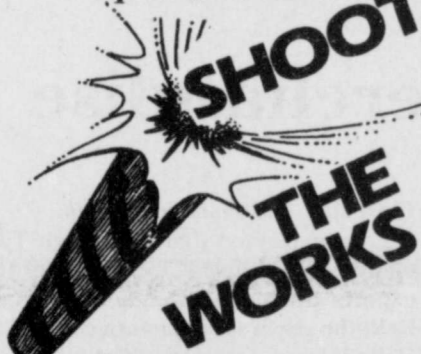
