

Bank reports mid-year drop in deposits

"The fourth quarter and the first quarters of the year are the biggest for deposits due to the harvest of the corn and cotton crops and farmers depositing the money for those crop sales. The second and third quarters, farmers are spending the money from the previous crop sales to grow crops for the next harvest." Anderson also commented "We expect deposits to be up from October through March and then to drop with the lowest periods being in June, July and August.'

When asked if he felt there would be any problems or differences in coaching girls Redden commented "I think it will be a bigger adjustment for the girls to get used to a man for a coach than for me to coach the girls."

Redden says he stresses the fast break offense in which the teams rebound quickly and get the ball to their end of the court to score. Redden says he will also be using layups more than past coaches have. 
and many of the teams on our schedule use the fast break offense. To be competitive we will play the same ways where possible."

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

In Times Like These...

Indira Gandhi became in 1960 the second woman Prime Minister the world had seen. She carries the name Gandhi but is no relation to the gentle person of nonviolence and Indian independence, Mohandas Gandhi. She has never shrunk from the hard decisions, being quick to call out the Army and quell with force what reason fail to

For the 37 years since independence, India's fate has rested on the shoulders of one family, father and daughter. The Prime Minister, 66, is the Western-edu cated daughter of Jawaharlal Nehru who led India out of colonialism and ruled it for 17 years. Gandhi has done so for 15 of the last 18 years. The people who thought that Indira in her bright saris would be charming and easily

manipulated have been badly fooled. Although she often preaches nonviolence to the rest of the world, she oversaw India's uninvited annexation of the Himalayan kingdom of Sihkim. She embraces nonalignment yet leans toward Moscow in order to build a powerful, well-equipped Army, 1.2 million strong.

Gandhi had intended to pass power to her younger son, Sanjay but he was killed in an air crash in 1980. She will soon vacate the Prime minister position to her only surviving son, Rajiv. It then would be up to Rajiv, a 39-year-old former airline pilot to carry the Nehru dynasty into the next century.

In her private life, Gandhi reads, listens to music, tends to her flowers, and plays with her pet dogs.

New "Premises Work Charges"

There has been an important change recently regarding telephone wiring. The change involves the installation and repair of

acks and "inside wiring. Inside wiring is required from the point where our lines end in a 'network interface." On most new homes, this interface — a large plastic box — is usually installed near the power meter. (In new apartments, it's usually located near the circuit breaker box.)

If you don't have a new home, you probably don't have a network interface (we just started installing them in 1982). Instead, you have a similar device called a "protector."

Like a network interface, the protector is the point where our line ends and your inside wiring begins.

Until recently, we did all the installation and repair of wiring inside our customers' homes. We will still perform that work if you ask us — but the way the work is charged has now changed.

If we do the wiring, we'll now bill you "Premises Work Charges." These charges are billed for each 15-minute period required on the job. Charges cover all costs associated with the work, including materials, but costs differ for installation and repair.

Here's how the charges break down if we do the work for you:


