

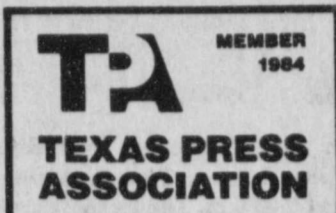

Lockney Junior High has three new faces this year

This year the Lockney Junior High School has added two new teachers to its staff. Karla Josey is teaching science and Charlotte Mitchell is teaching math.

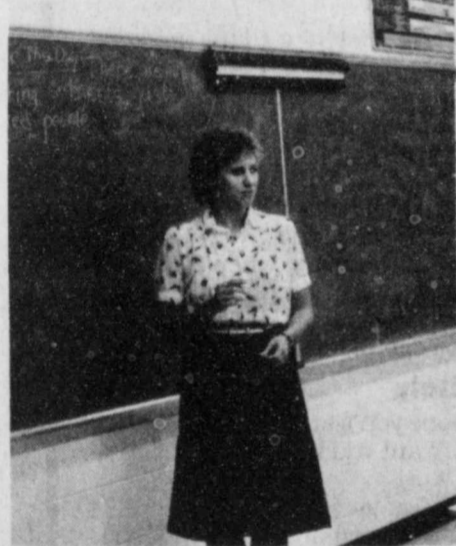
This is Karla's first year to have taught after having received her bachelor of science degree in April of this year from Wayland Baptist University in Plainview. Karla has a major in physical education and a minor in biology. She did her student teaching in Lockney last year.

Karla is originally from Post where she gained her interest in both P.E. and science. She said she felt her interest in science stemmed "from being raised on a farm and being around all kinds of animals and plants. I found I want more knowledge about things which surrounded me during my years of growing up."

Her interest in sports came from being very involved in athletics in school. Karla stated that "there are more values in athletics than most people realize. They teach competitiveness and also interacting with others, as well as physical health."

Of Lockney's preparedness in teaching science Karla says, "Lockney has one of the best facilities for teaching that I have seen. I have excellent equipment to work with."

Of the kids, she said that all seem to be very excited about learning more about science. "They are especially excited to learn about animals and dissecting the various animals they will be working with." Karla is excited to be teaching kids who are interested in one of her favorite subjects.

Charlotte Mitchell returns to teaching after a six year absence. One of the first things she commented on is that

"teaching was much simpler when I taught before. Now teachers are required to do more record keeping, but I am enjoying my return."

Charlotte said "I have good kids to work with. Also I have a good principal and fellow teachers to work with in junior high."

Concerning the new laws regarding teaching, she said, "It is going to take parents, kids and teachers working together to make these new regulations work. Parents need to support the teachers and the school, because these are not school oriented policies, they are the law."

Also returning to the Lockney school system this year is Emma Collins, who will be serving as the Junior High librarian.

She served as librarian in high school until 1982. She expressed that she was "enjoying being back and especially glad to have the opportunity to work with the junior high students. They keep you young. It is great to be back working with them."

School policies change due to new state regulations

Due to the new laws regulating school curriculum and policies the Lockney school system has released these as some of the policies the school will use this school year.

1. All teachers will be following teaching guidelines set by the State which will include teaching the essential elements in each subject and they will keep records on how each element was taught, when, and also how the students master each element.

2. Pre and post standardized tests will be given, i.e. Achievement test every year and TABS tests every other year. These will be given to determine the effectiveness of the instructional programs. Gains and losses of each student will be charted.

3. There will be no loss of classtime for activities of any kind. Exceptions will be class pictures, the homecoming pep rally, and mandated fire and tornado drills.

4. A student may not be given credit for a class if the student has more than five days of unexcused absences during the semester.

5. Students may be excused for temporary absence resulting from personal sickness, sickness or death in the family, weather or road conditions which make traveling to school hazardous, or any other unusual cause acceptable to the principal.

6. Reasons for excused absences must be written out and signed by the parent or guardian of the child.

7. Following an excused absence the student will have five school days to complete make-up work.

8. Zeros will be given for all unexcused absences.

9. Absences for extracurricular activities will be limited to 10 days per year. Make-up work will be done in advance of the absence.

10. Students must maintain a 70 average in all subjects to pass. The above are just a few of the school policies for Lockney. For parents interested in learning what effect the new laws have on Lockney students the school principals will hold a meeting for parents September 10. The time and place will be announced in the next edition of the Beacon.

Wilson Photography held an Open House Sunday, August 26, in their new 2100 square foot "Studio in the Country". Guests registered from Lockney, Midland, Lubbock, Petersburg, Plainview, Houston, Floydada, and Amarillo.

The A-frame construction features a reception area with vaulted ceiling, a two level sales counter, a frame display, and a cradanza with a bridal album display. The camera room features track-lighting, specially-designed areas for photographing, and two spacious dressing rooms. The office and finishing room features ten-foot ceilings with skylighting, rolling work islands, and extensive wall cabinets. Chuck Wilson has an office in the loft of the A frame which will also serve as a small classroom for seminars.

McDonald Construction did the exterior work. Wilson and his wife Joyce designed and completed the interior. Ash paneling is used throughout with ash, obechi and bass woods for the cabinets and furniture. Entrances and

doorways were designed to accommodate wheelchairs.

Wilson received his master of photography degree in 1977, and the photographic craftsman degree in 1981. He was one of the first Texas photographers to become a certified professional photographer. He is a well known platform speaker at professional photographic conventions, having spoken at several state conventions. This year he served as a member of the International Portrait Jury for the 93rd Annual Exhibition of Professional Photography. He is past president of the South Plains Professional Photographers Association and served on the executive board of the Texas Professional Photographers Association.

Both Wilson and his wife have photographs in the National Traveling Loan Collection of the Professional Photographers of America.

Flower show added to slate of fair events

Added to the slate of fair events this year is a flower and plant show, which is being sponsored by the Floyd County Arts Association.

There are several different divisions and classes for the show and there should be at least one category for everyone interested. The divisions include horticulture which includes sections for all kinds of flowers including: roses, dahlias, cannas, other annuals, and even potted plants. That category will include flowering plants, foliage plants, cactus, blooming vines and many others. These are all included in Division A.

Division B of the flower show will be arrangements. These arrangements will include vegetable and fruit arrangements, foliage arrangements that in-

clude berries, basket settings, those using bright colors, those using dried plant materials, and many other sections. And the third division of the flower show is the junior division for children 12 years and under.

The flower show is a new and welcome addition and for further information on the different divisions and sections and rules of the show consult the new fair catalogs which are in and have been distributed in various businesses in both Lockney and Floydada.

This is one of the few of the attractions planned for the 31st annual Floyd and Surrounding Counties Fair to be held September 13, 14, and 15, 1984. We will be having more information on the fair in upcoming editions of both the Beacon and the Hesperian.

Parade plans announced

This year's Floyd County fair parade will be held on Saturday, September 15, and will begin at 10:30 a.m. As in past years the parade will begin on north Main and will continue south on Main Street past the Main Street Church of Christ.

Floats entered in the parade are asked to be in line at 10:00 a.m. on that Saturday for preliminary judging and the final judging will be held during the parade itself. Floats will be judged on following the fair theme which is "Happiness is a World of Colors," attractiveness of the float, and originality of design.

Cash prizes will be awarded this year on the best community club, commer-

cial, school and youth group floats. Prizes are \$35 for first, \$25 for second, and \$15 for third places. The best high school band will receive \$25 and the best junior high band will receive \$15.

Ribbons will be awarded for first through third places for the best decorated bicycle and the best clown costume entries in the parade.

Trophies will be awarded to first through third place winners for riding clubs and for the antique cars in the parade.

Delton Stone assumes management of Coop

Delton Stone, the new manager of the Lockney Cooperatives began work on August 20.

Stone and wife LaNell came to Lockney after having lived in Wolfforth for 7½ years where he was manager of the Frenship Coop.

Stone began his work for cooperatives in 1952 when he graduated from high school in Abernathy and went to work as a presshand for the Abernathy Coop. "I worked my way up," Stone said. In addition to working for the Abernathy Coop he also worked at the County Line Coop before going to Wolfforth.

Stone farmed for 17 years from 1957 to 1974. In commenting about this year's crops, Stone said, "They look excellent and many farmers have reported what they hope will be very good corn, soybean, milo, and cotton crops this year. I hope the crops are good for all farmers; not just Floyd County, but all over the Panhandle and rolling plains. Many of the farmers need this

year to continue to farm."

Stone also made some comparisons to the time when his father farmed. "He farmed a section of land, made a good living and put his kids through school. (Many small farmers at that time did it on even a quarter section.) Now farmers can't do that, because it takes so much more money to operate and even more money to put your children through school."

Stone said, "I am happy to be in Lockney, and I like all of the people I have met."

He also said of the board of the Coop, "We have a good board, and they are helpful and easy to work with. I like the people I work with and am looking forward to meeting those I have not yet met."

Delton and LaNell both said, "The people we have met in Lockney are very friendly and nice."

The Stones have two children, Gary of Lubbock and Sherri of Abernathy.

There are several activities for kids planned for this year's Floyd County Fair.

Carnival

The Pride of Texas carnival will again for the fifth year be brought to Lockney by owners, Mr. and Mrs. Ex Burlingame. This carnival has proved to be the cleanest and most enjoyable carnival to come to Lockney. There will be carnival rides for all ages, all kinds of games and fun for the entire family.

This year's tickets for the carnival are \$7.00 and will enable the bearer to ride as many of the rides as many times as you wish for one night and will also allow free admission to the gate. These tickets may be purchased at the First National Banks in Lockney and Floydada and also at the Beacon and Hesperian offices.

Pet Show

This year's pet show, as in past years, is being sponsored by the II Penseroso Study Club. The pet show will be held on Thursday, September 13 at 4:30 p.m.

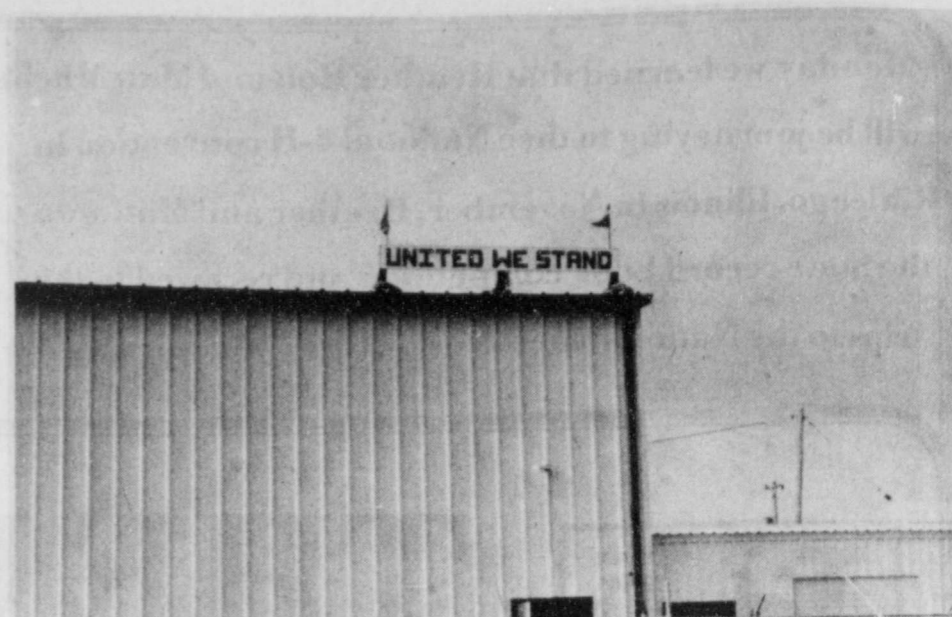
this project was discovering what would take wood stain off your hands. After experimenting, we found that turpentine and a little work will get just about all of it off.

In Times

Like These...

In the mist shrouded mountains and unspoiled magnificence of South China's largest wilderness area there is man's battle to save the rare giant panda from extinction. (This wilderness is known as the Wolong Panda Preserve). As few as 100 of the lumbering, black and white animals remain here, pushed deeply into the most remote reaches of rugged peaks and scenic valleys.

The threat to pandas is not of man's making, but of nature's. The panda's favorite food is withering in some areas. In 1975, 96 during another bamboo famine 138 pandas, 10 percent of the world population at that time -- starved to death. Many of those that survived have been driven from their normal territories to forage for food. Some have begun eating twigs, tree leaves, and grass. Such a diet lacks adequate nutrition, and leaves pandas weak, vulnerable to illness, and prone to falls from trees and cliffs.

A clear disappointment is the failure to breed pandas in captivity, vital if their dwindling number is to be replenished. Natural and artificial techniques have been tried unsuccessfully at the modern research facilities run by Sichuan Ministry of Forestry and the WWF (World Wildlife Fund based in Switzerland.)

Another failure has been the inability to find a natural, readily available substitute food for the pandas, one less subject to whims of nature.

In the Wolong Panda Reserve researchers estimate that at least 60 of the estimated 100 pandas in the wilderness have, in the words of director Lai Benghai, "suffered seriously" from the famine. Yet only one is known to have died. Others have been kept alive by salting the rugged mountains with tons of cooked meat, which pandas will eat as a substitute for bamboo, and by the planting of new bamboo in isolated areas.

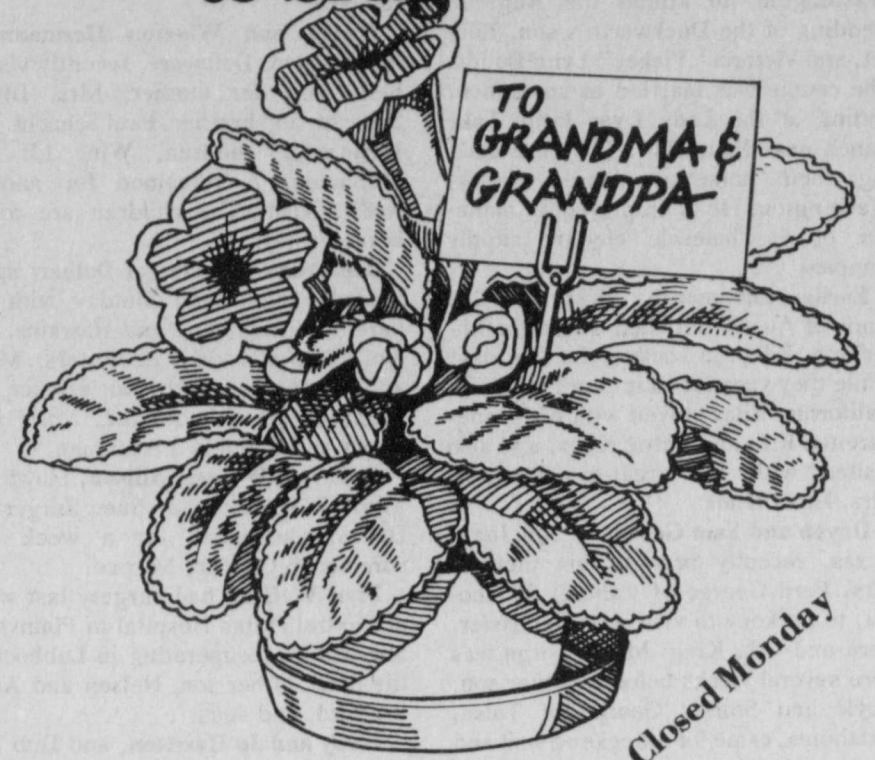

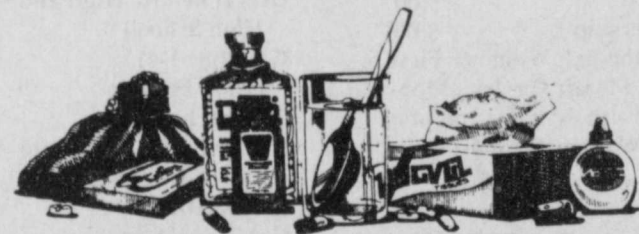

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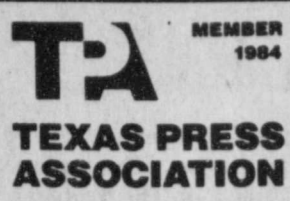

This year the Lockney Junior High School has added two new teachers to its staff. Karla Josey is teaching science and Charlotte Mitchell is teaching math.

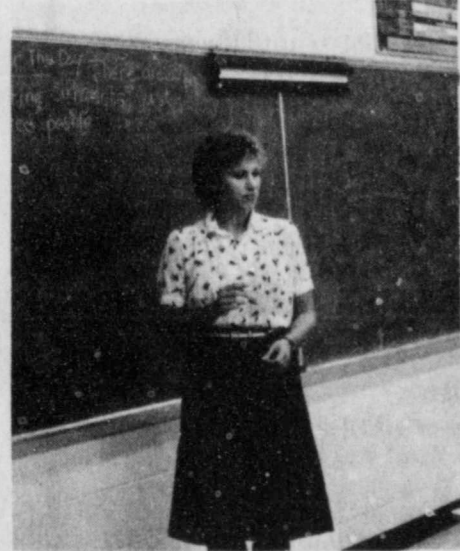

School policies change due to new state regulations

Due to the new laws regulating school curriculum and policies the Lockney school system has released these as some of the policies the school will use this school year.

1. All teachers will be following teaching guidelines set by the State which will include teaching the essential elements in each subject and they will keep records on how each element was taught, when, and also how the students master each element.

2. Pre and post standardized tests will be given, i.e. Achievement test every year and TABS tests every other year. These will be given to determine the effectiveness of the instructional programs. Gains and losses of each student will be charted.

3. There will be no loss of classtime for activities of any kind. Exceptions will be class pictures, the homecoming pep rally, and mandated fire and tornado drills.

4. A student may not be given credit for a class if the student has more than five days of unexcused absences during the semester.

5. Students may be excused for temporary absence resulting from personal sickness, sickness or death in the family, weather or road conditions which make traveling to school hazardous, or any other unusual cause acceptable to the principal.

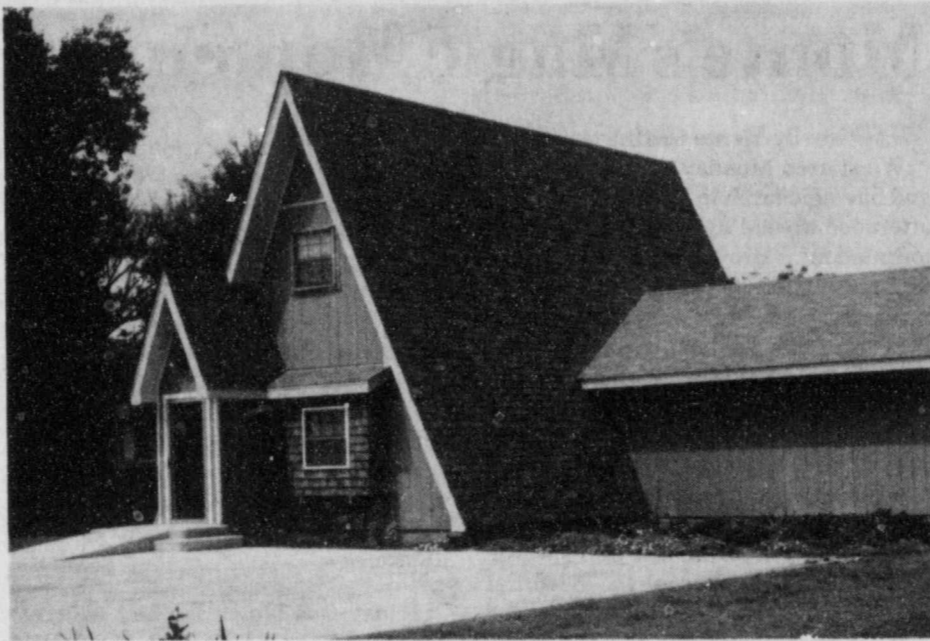
6. Reasons for excused absences must be written out and signed by the parent or guardian of the child.

7. Following an excused absence the student will have five school days to complete make-up work.

8. Zeros will be given for all unexcused absences.

9. Absences for extracurricular activities will be limited to 10 days per year. Make-up work will be done in advance of the absence.

10. Students must maintain a 70 average in all subjects to pass. The above are just a few of the school policies for Lockney. For parents interested in learning what effect the new laws have on Lockney students the school principals will hold a meeting for parents September 10. The time and place will be announced in the next edition of the Beacon.

He also said of the board of the Coop, "We have a good board, and they are helpful and easy to work with. I like the people I work with and am looking forward to meeting those I have not yet met."

Delton and LaNell both said, "The people we have met in Lockney are very friendly and nice."

In Times

Like These...

In the mist shrouded mountains and unspoiled magnificence of South China's largest wilderness area there is man's battle to save the rare giant panda from extinction. (This wilderness is known as the Wolong Panda Preserve). As few as 100 of the lumbering, black and white animals remain here, pushed deeply into the most remote reaches of rugged peaks and scenic valleys.

The threat to pandas is not of man's making, but of nature's. The panda's favorite food is withering in some areas. In 1975, 96 during another bamboo famine 138 pandas, 10 percent of the world population at that time -- starved to death. Many of those that survived have been driven from their normal territories to forage for food. Some have begun eating twigs, tree leaves, and grass. Such a diet lacks adequate nutrition, and leaves pandas weak, vulnerable to illness, and prone to falls from trees and cliffs.

A clear disappointment is the failure to breed pandas in captivity, vital if their dwindling number is to be replenished. Natural and artificial techniques have been tried unsuccessfully at the modern research facilities run by Sichuan Ministry of Forestry and the WWF (World Wildlife Fund based in Switzerland.)

Another failure has been the inability to find a natural, readily available substitute food for the pandas, one less subject to whims of nature.

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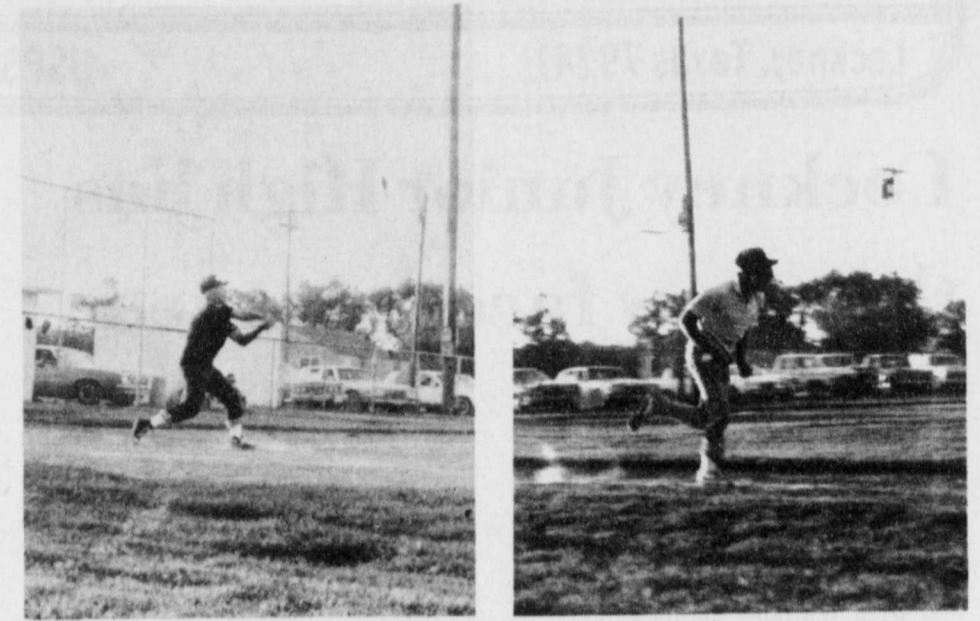
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In the Wolong Panda Reserve researchers estimate that at least 60 of the estimated 100 pandas in the wilderness have, in the words of director Lai Benghai, "suffered seriously" from the famine. Yet only one is known to have died. Others have been kept alive by salting the rugged mountains with tons of cooked meat, which pandas will eat as a substitute for bamboo, and by the planting of new bamboo in isolated areas.

they turn off the flashing red lights, or the bus itself goes into motion. This law applies whether you are meeting the bus or whether you are going in the same direction as the bus. It also applies inside the city limit as well as outside the city limit. The only exception to the law is that drivers on the other side of a divided highway (roadways separated by a physical median) are not required to stop. Motorist who fail to stop for a school bus could be fined up to \$200.00.

"We, as drivers, should realize the dangers involved and do everything possible to prevent these needless deaths and injuries involving our school children," Major Cawthon stated.



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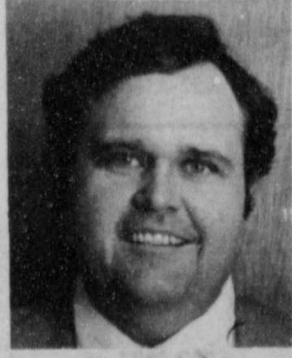


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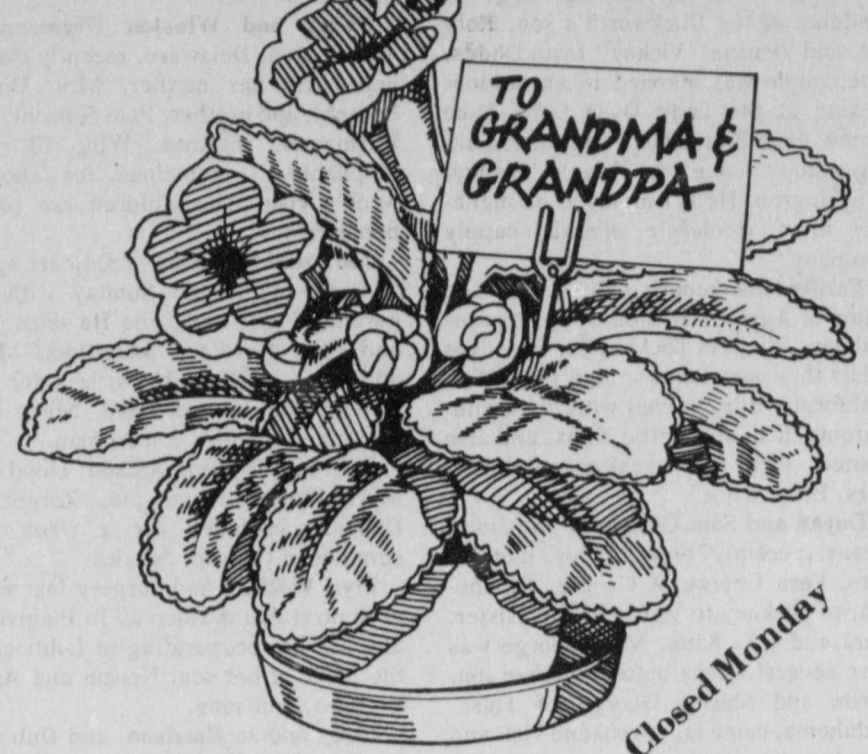

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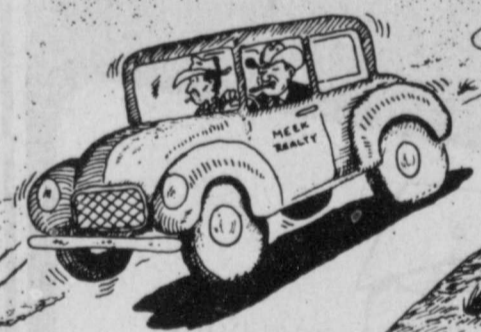
