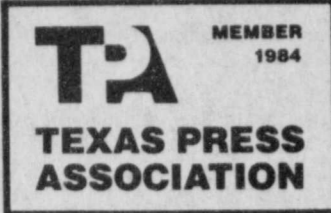
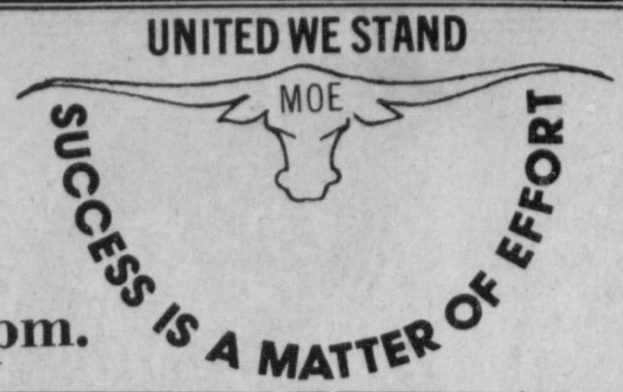

He recently served as interim pastor at Whitharral. From 1981-1984 he did supply preaching at various congregations.

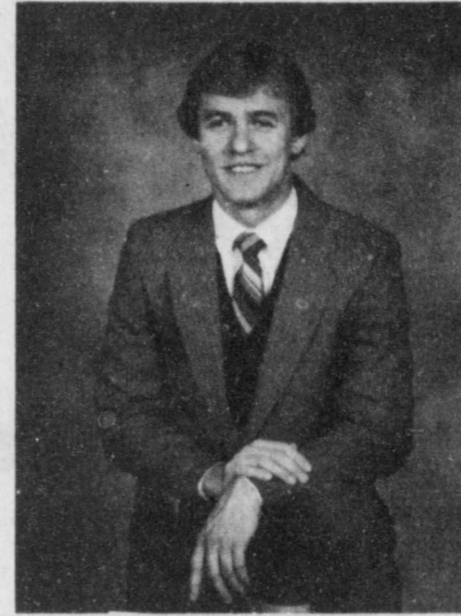
Following his high school graduation, he enrolled in general studies in Midland Junior College.

## Six attend goat cookoff in Brady

The Lockney team of Donnie Bybee, Billy Joe Turner, Eddie Joe Fortenberry, Robert Thomas, W.L. Thomas, and Helmuth Quebe left Thursday afternoon with their chuck wagon in tow for Brady, Texas, where they entered the World's Championship Goat Cookoff.

The team was chosen the first place winners in showmanship from among

104 entries during the cookoff. They proudly brought home the first place plaque, proclaiming them the showmanship champions.

There were 30 judges lined up for the contest including actor Tommy Lee Jones, congressman Tom Loeffler, and Lockney's own Kim King, who halls originally from Brady.

## Horns to host Tulia

Lockney will meet the Tulia Hornets for its first varsity football game tomorrow night, September 7 at 8:00 p.m. at the football field here.

In regard to this first game of the season, Coach Bob Purser said, "Tulia has lots of talent and skill, though they are not as big in size as we are. The key to the game is going to be to stop them defensively. If they can move the ball

against us, it is going to be a tough game.

## Cooper to study in Poland

Dr. M. Wayne Cooper, son of Melvin and Edith Cooper of Lockney, has been awarded a National Academy of Science scholarship for six months of study in Poland.

Dr. Cooper, a 1961 graduate of Lockney High School, is chief of the section of cardiology of the Texas Tech University School of Medicine in Lubbock.

In Poland he will be studying fast-phase force frequency response of the mammalian heart with Professor Brodhan Lewartowski of the Institute of Post-Graduate Medical Education in Warsaw. Professor Lewartowski is one

of the world's major investigative scientists in the field. The research is designed to ultimately aid in diagnosis and treatment of heart failure, a major world health problem.

While in Warsaw, the Cooper children, Tony, Chad and Claire, will attend Polish schools. In addition, their mother, Cheryl, will direct the children's school courses from correspondence work sent from All Saints School in Lubbock.

The Cooper family has been touring Europe the past three weeks, and were scheduled to enter Poland yesterday (Wednesday).

## Mangold brothers run in race

Dr. Gary Mangold, of Lockney, and Dr. Bill Mangold, brother of Dr. Gary Mangold, and his wife, Carol of Tucson, Arizona, all ran in "America's Ultimate Challenge," the Pike's Peak Marathon on August 18 and 19.

The ascent only race on Saturday, said to be equal in difficulty to a regular 26 mile marathon, was completed by Dr. Gary and Carol, along with over 1,000 other participants from all over the country. After being postponed for two hours because of rain storms the night before which had washed out the

road to the summit, the race started at 9:00 a.m. in downtown Manitou Springs at an altitude of 6,336 ft. above sea level. The race course, a narrow rocky mountain trail, stretches 14.3 miles and ascends 7,774 ft. to the summit of Pike's Peak at an altitude of 14,110 ft.

Bill Mangold completed the round trip race on Sunday. Runners in this race use the same trail, but make the return trek down the mountain as well, for a total of 28.2 miles, described by the officials as a "excruciating ultra-marathon" or 50 mile run equivalent.

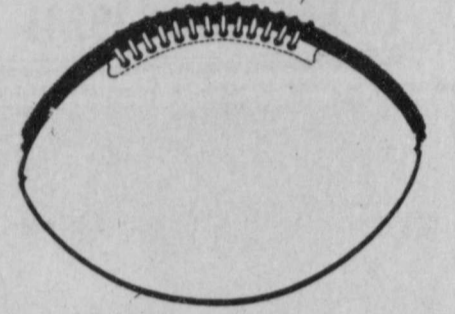

## Cash premiums will be paid in livestock show again

The livestock shows held in conjunction with the Floyd and Surrounding Counties Fair this year will be held on Saturday, September 15.

Entry fees are \$15.00 for steers and lambs and \$3.00 for the breeding sheep. This year cash premiums have been added back in the fair; and \$13.50 of each entry fee will be paid back as premiums in both the steer and lamb shows. The \$15.00 entry fee will be collected as the animals are weighed in and classed.

All animals must be in the barn before 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, and the animals will be weighed, sifted, and classed from 7 a.m. to 9:00 a.m. that day. The junior showmanship will be held at 10:30 a.m. followed by the steer and lambs in that order.

4-H members or FFA students nine-years-old up to seniors in high school may exhibit. There is no limit as to how many animals may be entered by each person.

### Lambs

There will be no less than six animals classified into a breed to establish a class for that breed. If there are less than six they will be classified under other breeds and crosses.

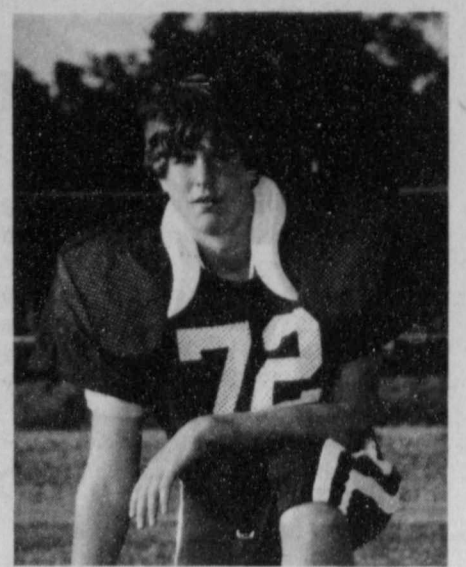
Classes will be broken down by weight at the discretion of the lamb superintendent, Tommy Hancock.

All lambs will be slick shown with a wool length of no more than 1/4 inch.

Wethers and ewes may be shown. Rams, stags, and ewes showing any signs of pregnancy will not be allowed. Awards in the lamb division will

Awards for the steer show include a large buckle for the grand champion, a premium steer show halter for the reserve champion, and ribbons will be given to first through tenth places.

Superintendent of the steer show is Mike Mowrey. Overall superintendent of the livestock show is Richie Crow with Kim King assisting him.

The stock show is open to entrants



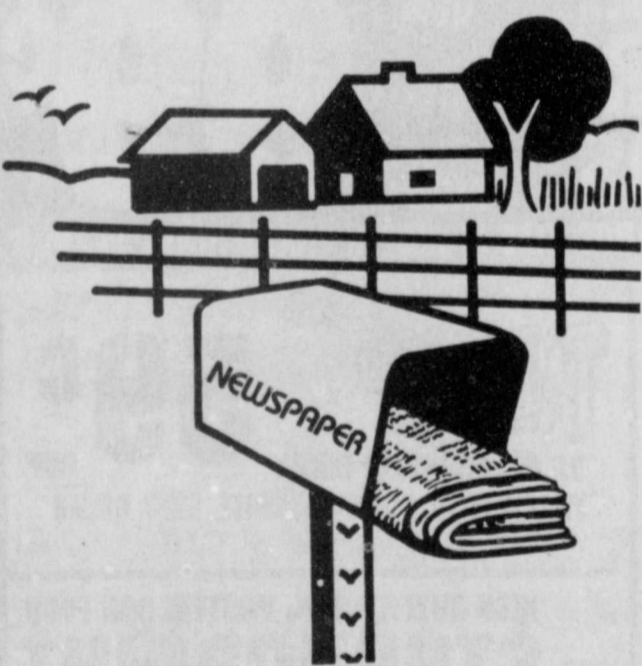

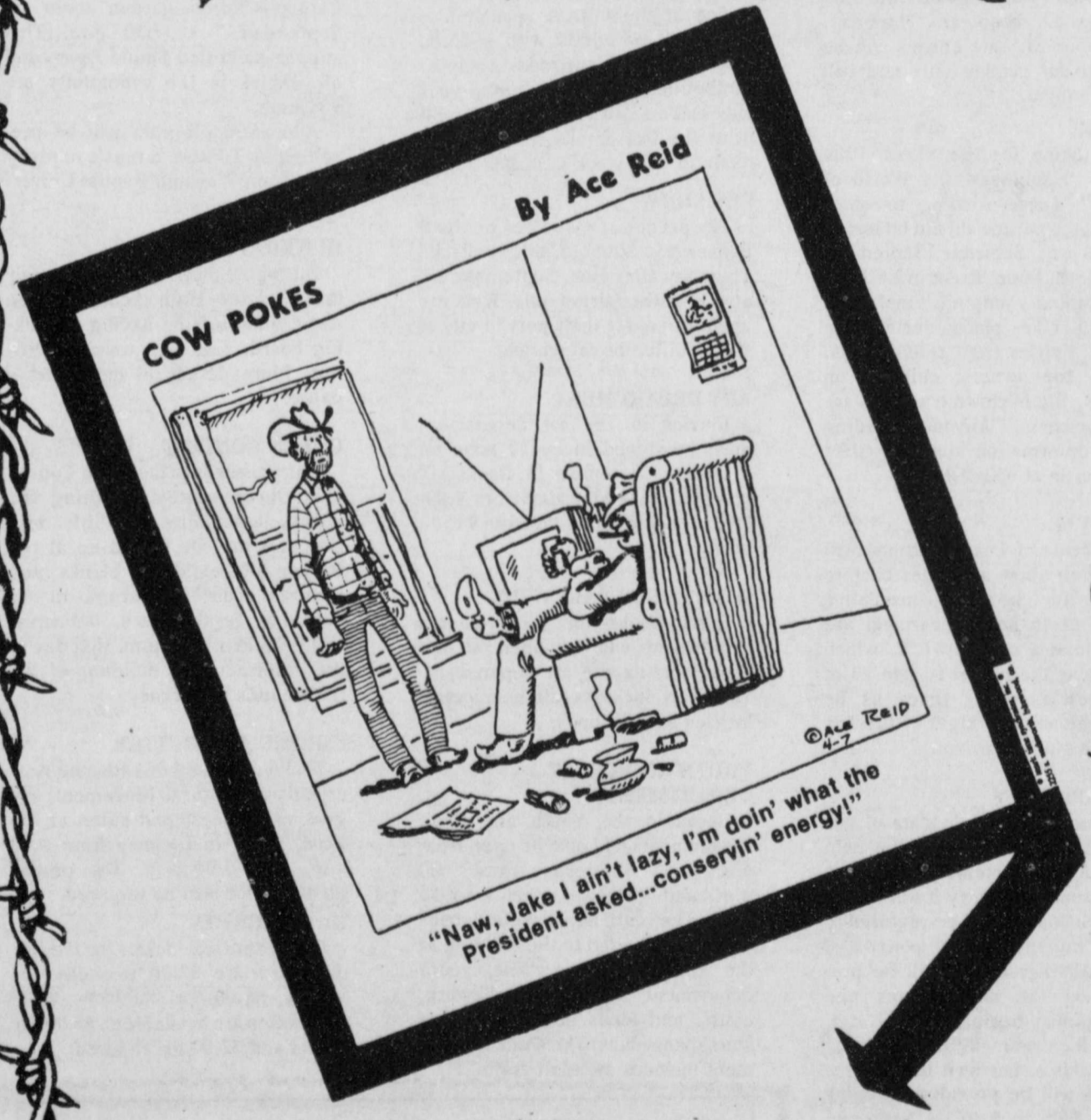

# Smith and Harvey teach at High School

Joining the faculty of the Lockney High School this year are Cindy Smith and Lynn Harvey.

Cindy Smith is returning to teach in the school she had graduated from in 1969. She also did her student teaching in Lockney in 1983, working with Kay Williams and Carolyn Whittington.

Having received her bachelor's degree in history and English from Wayland last year, Smith teaches English and reading.

She began college immediately after her graduation from Lockney at Texas Tech. She had originally planned art as her major and took some commercial art classes. But while at Tech she took some history classes (history had been her "worst" subject in high school) under a professor who made her interest in history to come alive. Wanting to learn more, she decided that if she could teach kids and help them enjoy what they were learning, that was what she wanted to do. In addition to attending Tech, she also attended Tarrant County Junior College, North Texas State University, and finally Wayland.

Smith commented, "I have always enjoyed being around kids and am excited about teaching the kids here. Lockney has a very good bunch of kids

and all are willing to learn. They are fun to work with."

When asked what it was like to teach kids in her hometown and school, Smith said "I think I know what most of them are thinking as they sit in the familiar classrooms and seats. It has not been that long since I was there, and I think they probably think about the same things we did when I was in school."

As to the changes in the laws regulating teaching, Smith said the changes are good for the kids in that all the kids must now master the essential elements in each subject. She also said this has not changed much for the teachers as they have always taught the essential elements, but now they have to document all of their teaching techniques. She also said, "Most everyone is optimistic about this year, including the kids."

Before going to work for the school system this year, Cindy was employed with the Beacon and Hesperian since April of this year. Our loss is Lockney's gain, and we mean that sincerely. She was a good reporter and will be an even better teacher.

Cindy is serving as a junior class sponsor this year and is looking forward to helping plan the junior/senior banquet.

Another teacher joining the teaching staff of the high school is Lynn Harvey. This is also Lynn's first teaching position.

She is a native of Florence, Alabama, and completed her bachelor of science degree at Stamford University in Birmingham, Alabama, in 1982. She has a major in Spanish and a minor in history.

Harvey had interesting reasons for going for a Spanish major. Having always done well in school and had enjoyed Spanish. She had planned a double major but was undecided as to what other subject to choose. In college she became an assistant to a Spanish professor and tutored students. She worked one summer as a missionary in Mexico. Then, in her senior year, she was offered a scholarship to study in Spain for a year. In Spain, there was not time to study another major, and Spanish became her main subject.

When asked what major differences stuck in her mind between Spain and the United States, she said, "All of the people over there were extremely helpful, gracious, high spirited, and fun loving 'all the time.' You could walk up to a perfect stranger and ask them how to get somewhere and, not only did they tell you how to get there, but most of the time they would take you where you

wanted to go."

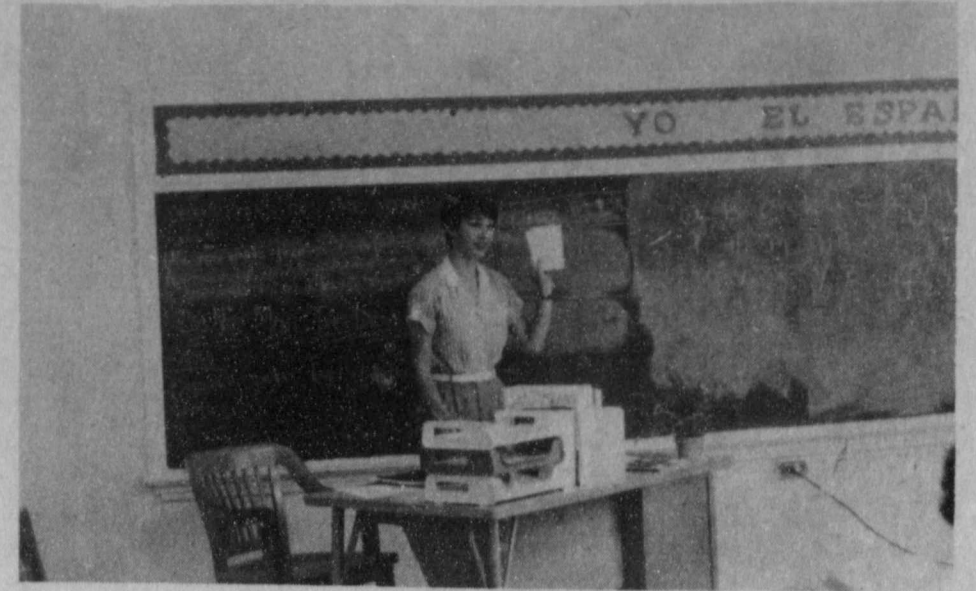
A difference she could not adjust to was the attitude of men towards women. "They don't treat women as equals. If I had lived in that country for a long period of time, I would have had to completely change my attitude, and I don't think I could do that."

Harvey has found the students in Lockney to be "eager and very easy to teach. They want to learn, and all of my students are quick learners. They are all staying caught up with the work. They have a very high level of interest, are sharp, and have good pronunciation, which is important in Spanish," said Harvey.

Lynn and husband, Ray, are presently living in Plainview. Ray is a psychology major at Wayland.

Of both of these teachers principal James Poole said, "We have added two more teachers to an excellent teaching staff in the high school. We are very glad to have them with us."

**In Times Like These...**

 For all the fresh focus on diplomacy, Cuba still presents a paradox to a visitor from abroad. The land seems peaceful, it is true. Havana is crowded with



tourists from Spain, Canada, Mexico, and West Germany as well as from the Communist-bloc nations.

Largely unheard is last year's defiant public rhetoric in support of Marxist movements in the Americas. Controlled television news programs limit the once wide-spread denunciations of capitalism. On the other hand, fear of the U.S. is equally apparent. Cuban military leaders discount an invasion of the island in the belief that the cost in American lives would be too great. However, there is widespread concern about a tougher U.S. economic embargo or even a bombing strike.

As evidence of that, the drive to improve defense preparedness has not slackened. More than 500,000 members of the territorial militia now participate in volunteer "defense days," building bomb shelters, staging fire drills, and practicing evacuation procedures.

Democratizing is the rift with the Soviet Union. Relations between Cuba and the Soviet Union have become very strained, since the Grenada crisis. There haven't been any Soviet pledges to come to the aid of its ally in the event of future show downs with the United States.

Castro's refusal to attend last June's summit of Communist chiefs in Moscow, the first such meeting in 15 years, underscored the feeling of coolness.

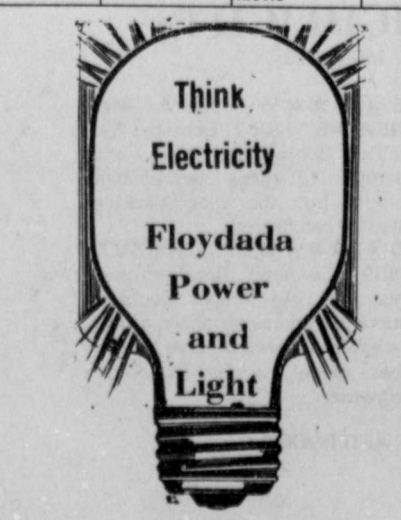
