District Governor to address club



During the regular monthly meeting of the Lockney City Council police chief Tim Thompson came before the group to discuss several different subjects. The focal point of the discussion was the dog ordinance and the enforcing of this ordinance.

Thompson said recently he has received many complaints of loose dogs in town. "Many of these dogs are running in packs, and several have been seen chasing and terrorizing young school children; even people who walk and run for exercise," Thompson reported. "All of these dogs are mixed breed animals. "I have received reports and have seen dobermans, pit bull dogs, chows, and German shepards

running loose and causing problems. Due to the number of complaints and problems encountered with children, Thompson will enforce the dog ordinance. When owners are found, they could be fined for letting their dogs run

Henceforth, from this date forward any dogs running loose will be picked up and impounded. Any owner coming to claim the dog must provide proof of a rabies shot and proof that the owner has a city license for the dog. If they do not present licenses for both, the rabies shot and the city license must be purchased before the dog will be

Thompson will also be enforcing the fine law which states that any owner allowing his or her dog to run loose in the city limits may be fined \$100.00 per day during such time the dog is

Any dog picked up and turned into the city pound will be destroyed if it has not been claimed within 3 days. The city council would also like to remind citizens that the \$5.00 bounty on dogs is still in effect. Anyone found to be stealing dogs and turning them in for the bounty will be prosecuted to the full



Pandas are not the only endangered species. Worldwide trade in wild animals, rare birds and plants, much of it illegal, also threatens to wipe out thousands of others. Conservationists estimate that legal wildlife trade in everything from parrots to furs has an annual turnover of at least 3 billion dollars. It involves about 2,400 species

of birds and animals and 30,000 plants. Much of the legal trade is done under license, but there are no controls over the illicit market for products such as rhinoceros horns, elephant tusks, tropical birds and reptile skins. Experts cite a sharp decline in elephant herds of of the continent's elephant population.

Like These...

Most died to satisfy the demand for

ivory tusks by artisans in Japan. Another African tragedy is the black rhinoceros. Since 1970 its number has fallen from 65,000 to 13,500. One rhino horn used in Asia as an aphradistac and in Saudi Arabia for the carved hilts of daggers, is worth more than many Africans earn in a year.

Some South American parrots go for up to \$5,000. Leopards and panthers end up as fur coats. A panda-skin rug is





Social Security

The basic idea of Supplemental Security Income (SSI) is pretty simple. First, a person must be age 65 or older, blind or disabled. Also, limited income and resources are required. Income is "something you get", like a Social Security, Veterans or retirement check. Resources are "something you've got", like a bank account, real estate, or cash

value of life insurance. After determining income and resources, they are compared against a level provided by law to determine eligibility. The amounts are \$314.00 (\$472.00 for a couple) monthly for income. The resource level is \$1,500 (2,250 for a couple).

However, SSI provisions consider certain things as income or resources that many of us do not. Here are some

An SSI recipient transfers the title of a home to a daughter or son. A person's SSI check is lowered if he or she does not rent or own their home, or share equally with others in meeting the living costs. A recipient who gives a home away will probably receive a lower check. This is because the person is receiving income "in kind" according to SSI provisions. No money has changed hands. Still, "free" shelter or other room and board furnished, generally counts as income.

Money in a joint bank account where

the recipient is a party is considered to belong to the recipient. The entire bank balance counts even if part of the money belongs to someone else. This is because the money is legally available to the recipient.

Property that is given away or sold for less than the market value may prevent someone from being eligible for SSI for

Payments of a recipient's rent, utilities, food bill and even gifts may cause the person to receive a lower payment or no payment.

Recipients, at times, are overpaid Social Security or Veterans benefits and the checks are reduced or suspended. SSI provisions require that the full amount of the check is still considered when determining the SSI payment.

Persons receiving SSI should be aware that SSI provisions may treat events differently than the persons involved and SSI payment could be affected. Report any changes relating to property, income, address, living arrangement or related changes to the

Social Security Administration. The Social Security office has a free pamphlet that can provide additional information about SSI entitlement or

The amendment also provides additional grounds for removal from office of judges or justices of Texas courts, and provides additional disciplinary actions that could be taken in lieu of removal or censure. The amendment would extend the Commission's disciplinary authority to masters, magistrates, and retired or former judges who hear cases by designation. The amendment creates a tribunal to review recommendations of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct for removal or retirement of a judge or justice. The amendment also provides for appeal of the review tribunal's decision to the Supreme Court of Texas and grants an accused judge the right to discovery of evidence.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment relating to the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and the authority and procedure to discipline active judges, certain retired and former judges, and certain masters and magistrates of the courts."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 22 proposes a constitutional amendment which increases the per diem of members of the Legislature. The amount of per diem allowed during a calendar year would be equal to the maximum amount set in federal income tax statutes as of January 1 of that same year as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator. Current per diem is \$30; the maximum deduction is now \$75.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide a per diem for members of the legislature equal to the maximum daily amount allowed by federal law as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator."

Child Abuse series to be shown week of September 17 on KTXT

No one involved in the sexual abuse of children is going to get help until the secret is no longer a secret.

However, child sexual abuse is a topic so disturbing that many people find it difficult to discuss.

The problem will be examined in a WTTW/Chicago-produced series to be aired September 17-20 on KTXT TV. This special series, titled "Child Sexual Abuse," is designed to reach all ages with its information and prevention

Opening the series will be a 90-minute program for parents to be aired at 7 host Mike Farrell, best known for his portraval of B.J. Hunnicutt on M*A*S*H. will discuss the sexual abuse problem with a panel of experts.

Two separate programs designed for young children and their parents to watch together will be aired Tuesday, September 18. The first, aimed at youngsters in kindergarten through third grade, begins at 7 p.m. and will be followed immediately by the program for grades four through seven starting at 7:30 p.m.

The program for junior and senior high school students will be aired at 7

Burn victims to profit from medical breakthrough

Professor Nahum Ben-Hur, a world authority on burns and Head of the Department of Plastic and Maxillofacial Surgery at Shaare Zedek Medical Center has announced a dramatic development in the hospital's laboratories. "We have succeeded in growing quantities of human skin by means of tissue cultures, which is a dramatic breakthrough for patients suffering from extensive burns." According to Professor Ben-Hur, Shaare Zedek will be the first hospital in the world to use this method.

The idea originated several decades ago in America with a Dr. Green, but he was not successful in creating sheets of skin large enough to be of real help to burns sufferers. The idea was discarded until it was successfully revived by Dr. Nathan Sternberg, Dr. Jacob Golan, and the Staff of Shaare Zedek's Plastic Surgery Department with Professor Yechiel Becker of the Department of Molecular Virology of Hebrew University Hadassah Medical School. A small biopsy is taken, and a skin culture created. In two weeks, the culture grows to 10 cms. x 20 cms. and can be grafted onto the donor patient with no fear that his body will reject it. Until now, it has been successfully used on animals, but Shaare Zedek is on the

society. This new discovery will aid the miracle of survival, restoration of function, reconstruction, and psycho-

logical rehabilitation. Shaare Zedek's Department of Plastic Surgery is already recognised as a leader in treating civilians and soldiers who have suffered disfiguring wounds. Coverage of the victim has always been a problem, for the burn must be covered to prevent infection entering the body and to prevent leakage of fluids. One solution is to create skin banks from cadavers, but this presents many problems for religious, philosophical, legal and ethical reasons, as well as being very costly and not practical for mass casualties. Shaare Zedek uses placenta membranes--an ancient idea--and this has proved also the be successful.

Another innovation at Shaare Zedek has been an imitation skin made from plastic material, which was invented by Dr. David Behar of Soreq Nuclear Research Facility in Yavne in collaboration with Profossor Ben-Hur. The character of plastic has been enhanced to make it bio-compatible, a project being funded by OMIKRON Scientific Ltd. at the Weizmann Institute, Rehovot. Unlike the new skin method, it can be used immediately and yields wonderful results in stopping infection temporarily. Being transparent, doctors can see what is happening to the wound, normous implications. 
