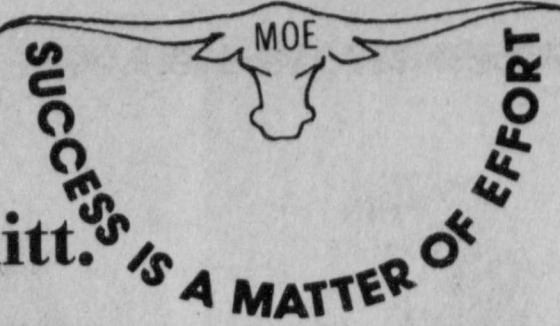

Single by a female performer in the prestigious Grammy Awards.

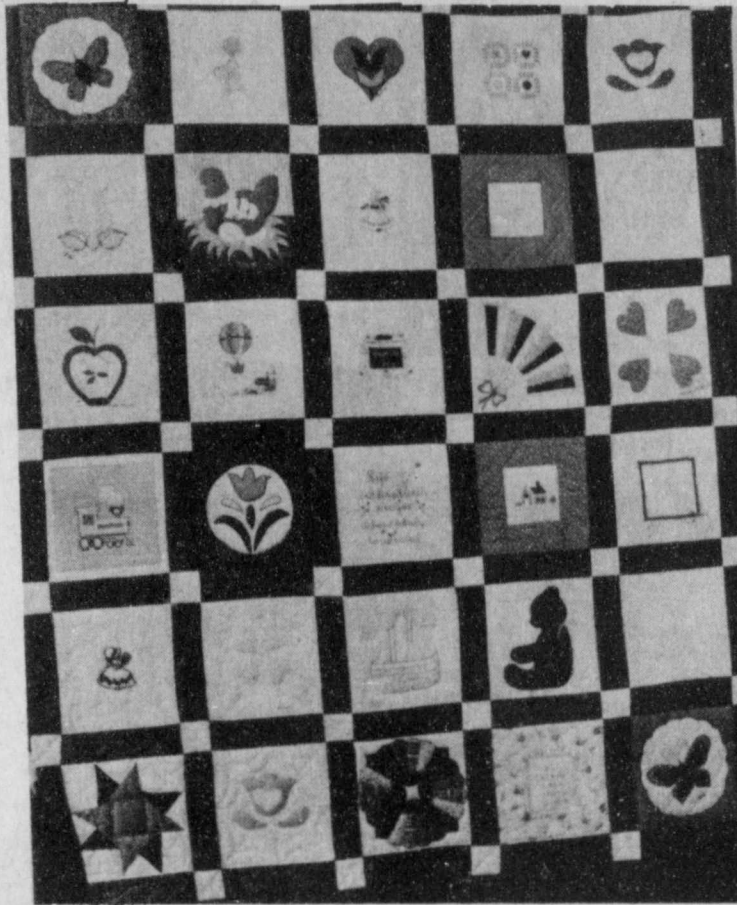
She is a housewife and mother of two daughters, Daphne 10, and Larissa, 8.

## Ladies Day to feature speakers and wide range of subjects

One of the featured speakers scheduled for the Ladies Day activities is Christa Smith of Plainview.

Smith is presently a professor of modern languages at Wayland Baptist University, teaching English, French, and German. She has a total of 21 years teaching experience having taught at Texas Tech and in the Cotton Center school system prior to coming to Wayland. She has been with Wayland since 1969.

Smith came to the United States from Germany in 1958, becoming a citizen in 1962. She has spoken for numerous clubs and youth groups about her experiences in Germany during World War II and its aftermath as well as about the experience of becoming a citizen of another country. Smith says "taking time for these speeches is part of my responsibility as a citizen, I believe. Although I miss Germany, I have come to feel very much at home in the stark beauty of the Plains with its open spaces and its open people."

Smith's program will be the third of

the day starting at 1:00 p.m. and promises to be very interesting as she speaks on the importance of being an American.

The last program of the day will be from 2:00 to 3:00 and will be presented by Lanny Voss of Day, Owen, Lyle, Voss, and Owen, attorneys at law of Plainview. Voss will be discussing laws effecting women of all ages whether married, widowed, or single. His program, aimed at the female segment, should be interesting and also informative.

The opening program of the day will be presented by Ruth Draper who will be sharing her travel experiences, beginning at 9:00 a.m.

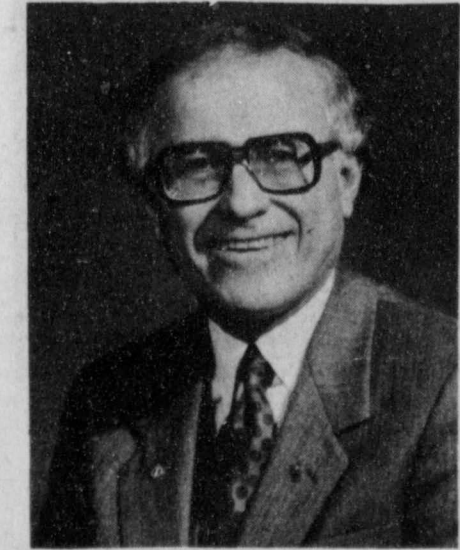

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

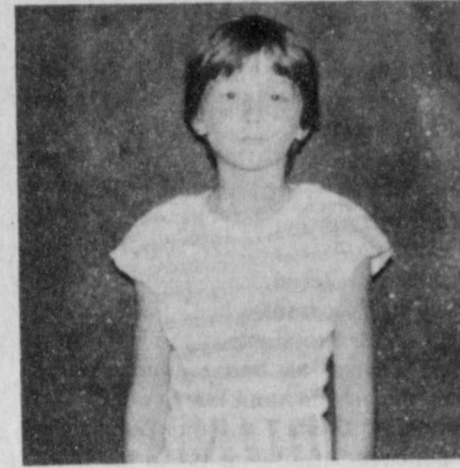

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## Dog ordinance to be enforced

During the regular monthly meeting of the Lockney City Council police chief Tim Thompson came before the group to discuss several different subjects. The focal point of the discussion was the dog ordinance and the enforcing of this ordinance.

Thompson said recently he has received many complaints of loose dogs in town. "Many of these dogs are running in packs, and several have been seen chasing and terrorizing young school children; even people who walk and run for exercise," Thompson reported. "All of these dogs are mixed breed animals. I have received reports and have seen dobermans, pit bull dogs, chows, and German shepherds running loose and causing problems."

Due to the number of complaints and problems encountered with children, Thompson will enforce the dog ordinance. When owners are found, they could be fined for letting their dogs run loose.

Henceforth, from this date forward any dogs running loose will be picked up and impounded. Any owner coming to claim the dog must provide proof of a rabies shot and proof that the owner has a city license for the dog. If they do not present licenses for both, the rabies shot and the city license must be purchased before the dog will be released.

Thompson will also be enforcing the fine law which states that any owner allowing his or her dog to run loose in the city limits may be fined \$100.00 per day during such time the dog is unrestrained.

Any dog picked up and turned into the city pound will be destroyed if it has not been claimed within 3 days. The city council would also like to remind citizens that the \$5.00 bounty on dogs is still in effect. Anyone found to be stealing dogs and turning them in for the bounty will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law.

Thompson has asked for the help of

citizens reporting problems with dogs. "If you know who the dog belongs to, please report this. Owners will be notified that letting the dogs run loose causes them to be in violation of the laws."

## In Times Like These...

Pandas are not the only endangered species. Worldwide trade in wild animals, rare birds and plants, much of it illegal, also threatens to wipe out thousands of others. Conservationists estimate that legal wildlife trade in everything from parrots to furs has an annual turnover of at least 3 billion dollars. It involves about 2,400 species of birds and animals and 30,000 plants.  
 Much of the legal trade is done under license, but there are no controls over the illicit market for products such as rhinoceros horns, elephant tusks, tropical birds and reptile skins. Experts cite a sharp decline in elephant herds of Africa. In 1983 alone, more than 80,000 elephants were killed, about 8 percent of the continent's elephant population.

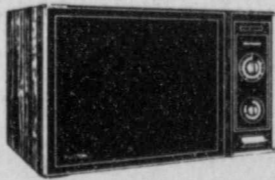
Most died to satisfy the demand for ivory tusks by artisans in Japan.  
 Another African tragedy is the black rhinoceros. Since 1970 its number has fallen from 65,000 to 13,500. One rhino horn used in Asia as an aphrodisiac and in Saudi Arabia for the carved hilts of daggers, is worth more than many Africans earn in a year.  
 Some South American parrots go for up to \$5,000. Leopards and panthers end up as fur coats. A panda-skin rug is worth \$25,000.  
 Efforts are being made to end such illegal trade, but it is likely to endure as long as the zeal for exotic pets, ivory, fur coats and other wildlife products is unchecked.

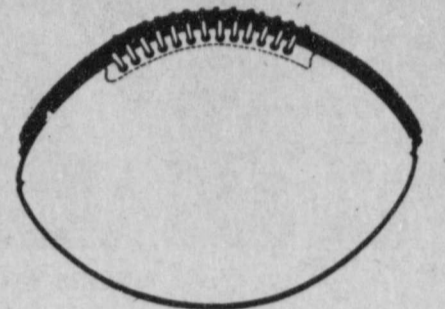

Child Abuse series to be shown week of September 17 on KTVT

No one involved in the sexual abuse of children is going to get help until the secret is no longer a secret.

However, child sexual abuse is a topic so disturbing that many people find it difficult to discuss.

The problem will be examined in a WTTW/Chicago-produced series to be aired September 17-20 on KTVT TV. This special series, titled "Child Sexual Abuse," is designed to reach all ages with its information and prevention message.

Opening the series will be a 90-minute program for parents to be aired at 7

p.m. Monday, September 17. Series host Mike Farrell, best known for his portrayal of B.J. Hunnicutt on M\*A\*S\*H, will discuss the sexual abuse problem with a panel of experts.

Two separate programs designed for young children and their parents to watch together will be aired Tuesday, September 18. The first, aimed at youngsters in kindergarten through third grade, begins at 7 p.m. and will be followed immediately by the program for grades four through seven starting at 7:30 p.m.

The program for junior and senior high school students will be aired at 7

Burn victims to profit from medical breakthrough

Professor Nahum Ben-Hur, a world authority on burns and Head of the Department of Plastic and Maxillofacial Surgery at Shaare Zedek Medical Center has announced a dramatic development in the hospital's laboratories. "We have succeeded in growing quantities of human skin by means of tissue cultures, which is a dramatic breakthrough for patients suffering from extensive burns." According to Professor Ben-Hur, Shaare Zedek will be the first hospital in the world to use this method.

The idea originated several decades ago in America with Dr. Green, but he was not successful in creating sheets of skin large enough to be of real help to burn sufferers. The idea was discarded until it was successfully revived by Dr. Nathan Sternberg, Dr. Jacob Golan, and the Staff of Shaare Zedek's Plastic Surgery Department with Professor Yechiel Becker of the Department of Molecular Virology of Hebrew University Hadassah Medical School. A small biopsy is taken, and a skin culture created. In two weeks, the culture grows to 10 cms. x 20 cms. and can be grafted onto the donor patient with no fear that his body will reject it. Until now, it has been successfully used on animals, but Shaare Zedek is on the verge of using this method on patients.

This dramatic breakthrough has enormous implications. A battlefield burn, a road accident deformity, or a congenital anomaly may kill, scar, cripple, or isolate its victim from

society. This new discovery will aid the miracle of survival, restoration of function, reconstruction, and psychological rehabilitation.

Shaare Zedek's Department of Plastic Surgery is already recognized as a leader in treating civilians and soldiers who have suffered disfiguring wounds. Coverage of the victim has always been a problem, for the burn must be covered to prevent infection entering the body and to prevent leakage of fluids. One solution is to create skin banks from cadavers, but this presents many problems for religious, philosophical, legal and ethical reasons, as well as being very costly and not practical for mass casualties. Shaare Zedek uses placenta membranes—an ancient idea—and this has proved also to be successful.

Another innovation at Shaare Zedek has been an imitation skin made from plastic material, which was invented by Dr. David Behar of Soreq Nuclear Research Facility in Yavne in collaboration with Professor Ben-Hur. The character of plastic has been enhanced to make it bio-compatible, a project being funded by OMIKRON Scientific Ltd. at the Weizmann Institute, Rehovot. Unlike the new skin method, it can be used immediately and yields wonderful results in stopping infection temporarily. Being transparent, doctors can see what is happening to the wound, and instead of having to change dressings every few hours, the plastic skin lasts for two weeks. If there are epidermal elements left, new skin will

grow underneath and it will peel off by itself.

However, as this is frequently not the case, the breakthrough is growing sheets of human skin represents new hope for victims of severe and extensive burns.
