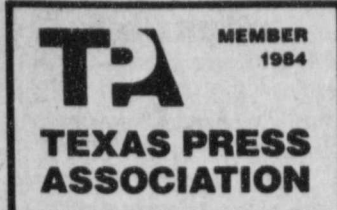
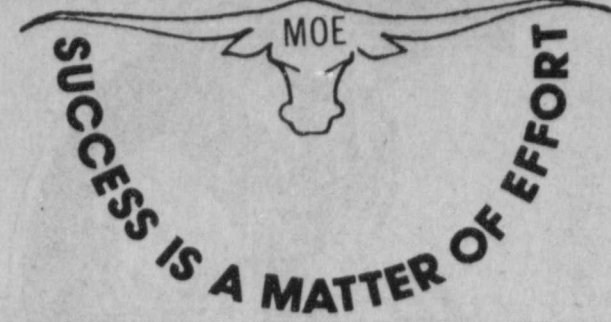

Lockney Gin Company purchased by Mullins

About two weeks ago Lester Carter sold the Lockney Gin Company to Bobby Mullins of Sinton, Texas.

Mullins and son Larry have 13 years of ginning experience, having owned and operated a gin in Taft, Texas. Bobby will continue to run the Taft Gin while Larry supervises business at the Lockney Gin.

Larry says they "bought the gin because it came up for sale and is a good facility with a nice plant and good equipment." Thus far they have ginned 127 bales at the gin this year.

Of the customers and the people of Lockney he has met, Larry said, "I really like them. There are some really good people here, and I am really enjoying getting to know them. Lester's past customers seem to be very receptive, and we are getting along fine." Larry also said one of the main reasons they decided to purchase the gin came after meeting and getting to know Carter and his wife. "They are good people."

Larry stated, "Carter will continue to work at the gin as an overseer, and the gin will continue to be run the same way Lester has done in the past."

Larry is presently living in Plainview but will move to Lockney as soon as he can find a house. He joined the Lockney First Baptist Church this past weekend.

The Lockney Gin is one of the oldest operating businesses in Lockney, having opened in 1924. J.W. Baggett (Carter's grandfather), George Meriwether, and a Mr. Moody built the gin. In 1925 Moody was bought out by Ed Whitfill, who in turn sold out to Baggett in 1942. In 1945 when the gin was passed to Carter's mother, he began managing the gin and has continued to do so up until the sale.

Carter was working on his 45th year to operate the gin, but he chose to sell and continue to work for the gin.

In the history of the Lockney Gin there has only been one major fire, which occurred either the first or second year of the gin's operation. Since that time there has been no major fire, according to Carter, due mostly to Carter's policy of keeping the gin clean.

Carter said, "I would like to thank everyone for their support these past 44 years, and I encourage everyone to continue to support the new owners with your business."

4-H annual banquet date set

At 1:30 a program presented by Denise Blanchard and Cindy Ford will address holiday creations from the kitchen.

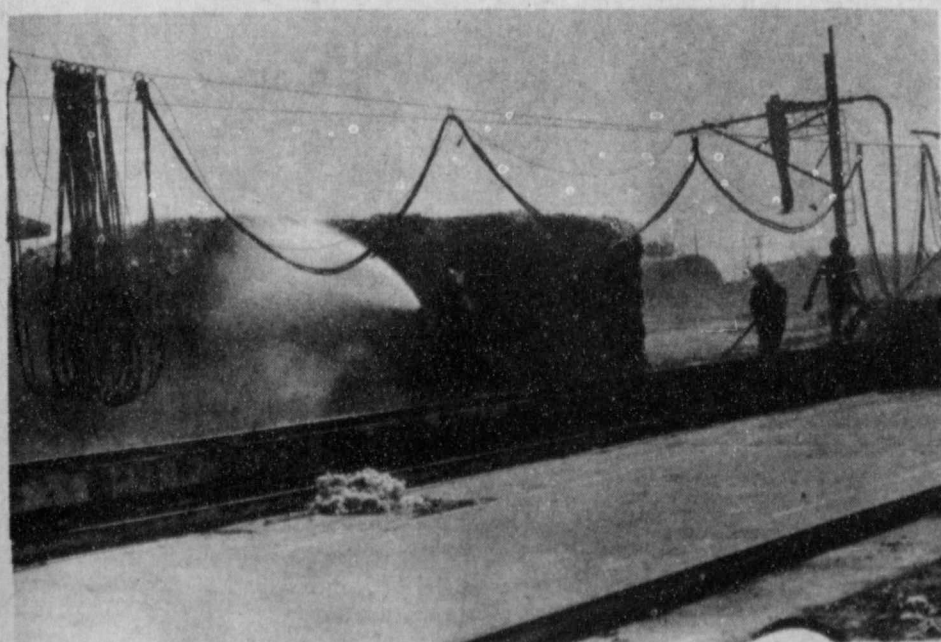
The final program at 3:00 p.m. will be a fashion show brought by Kristi's in Plainview, featuring holiday fashions. Local residents will model.

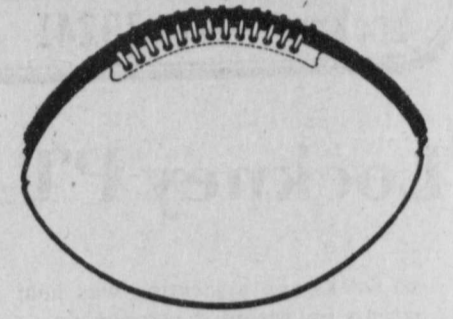

Race is recipient

The Texas Tech University Department of Music's 1984-85 scholarship recipient list again includes Billy Race of Lockney. The sophomore piano major is recipient of an award from the Piano Scholarship Fund.

Supported by interest on money left to the university by the estate of Lubbock piano teacher, Eva Browning, the piano scholarships are awarded only to piano majors in good academic standing.

The Texas Tech Music Department awarded \$66,640 in 175 scholarship awards to undergraduate and graduate students for this year. These awards range per year from \$100 for band scholarships to \$1250 for the first place Browning freshman piano winner.

General scholarships are available in the area of woodwinds, brass, percussion, strings, guitar, harp, piano, organ, voice and music theatre. Although many music scholarships are designated for music majors only, a limited number of scholarships are available to the non-music major.

For 1985-86 scholarships, competitive auditions will be held on the Tech campus on Friday and Saturday, February 22-23 (University Day), and on two more Saturdays: March 30 and April 13.

Horns breathe fire on Dragons

Last Friday evening the Lockney Longhorns hosted the Paducah Dragons and came away with their second district win. Final score of the game was Horns 54, Paducah 7. Lockney's record for the year is now five wins, one loss, and one tie.

Lockney began its journey to a victory in the first quarter of the game. With 7:30 left in the first quarter and on a 4th and 2 play, quarterback Brent Hallmark hauled off to Buffo Rodriguez who carried the ball 31 yards to score. Danny Peralez made the extra point and Lockney had a lead they would not lose.

Lockney's next two TD's came in the second quarter. The first came with 7:45 left in the quarter when on a first and ten play on the Paducah 12, quarterback Hallmark again to Buffo Rodriguez, who scored six points on the 12 yard run. The extra point failed. The second touchdown came with 3:25 left in the half. On a second and 24 yard play Hallmark went into the passing formation and hit Gary Kent who scored. A two point conversion came as Hallmark took the option and ran the ball for two points.

The Horns came back after the half and continued to run up the score. With 5:21 left in the third quarter, Hallmark handed off to Jerry Mathis who ran 23 yards for Lockney's fourth touchdown of the night. Tony Banda, replacing Danny Peralez, who had a twisted ankle in the second quarter, booted the extra point. Lockney scored again with 3:03 left in third period of play. Leading up to this TD, Lockney had the ball on the Paducah 33 yard line on a third and fifteen play after receiving a penalty. Hallmark took the snap reared back and hit Terry Mathis for a 43 yard pass. Three plays later Lockney was on the one yard line and Hallmark handed off to Dickie Hernandez who scored the touchdown. Tony Banda made the extra point.

In the fourth quarter Lockney scored three more times. With 10:43 left in the final period of play Dickie Hernandez rushed 10 yards for a touchdown. Tony

Banda made another 6 points on a two yard run with 7:41 left in the game and with 2:40 left. Steven Cates at quarterback hit Ritchie Thornton on a 34 yard pass that netted Lockney another six points. Tony Banda made two of the three extra points.

Paducah's only score came wit 6:48 left in the first half of the game.

Coach Bob Purser said "The boys played a hard game." Of Paducah coach Purser commented "They play better than they had been. We just wore them down."

On the Crosbyton game this week Purser said "They have an outstanding

offensive team with a good quarterback and tailback. We will try to play a physical game and take care of business."

The Horns of the Week for the Paducah game include offensive lineman, Paul Moats; offensive backs, Dickie Hernandez and Buffo Rodriguez. The forcing unit player of the week was David DeLeon and the secondary player was Johnny Torrez. The big hits came from Terry Mathis and Dickie Hernandez and the special team's player was Ritchie Thornton. Dickie Hernandez was also the MOE of the week.

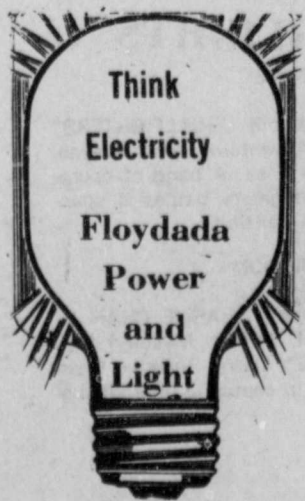
