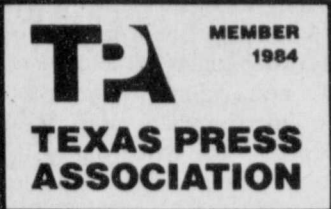

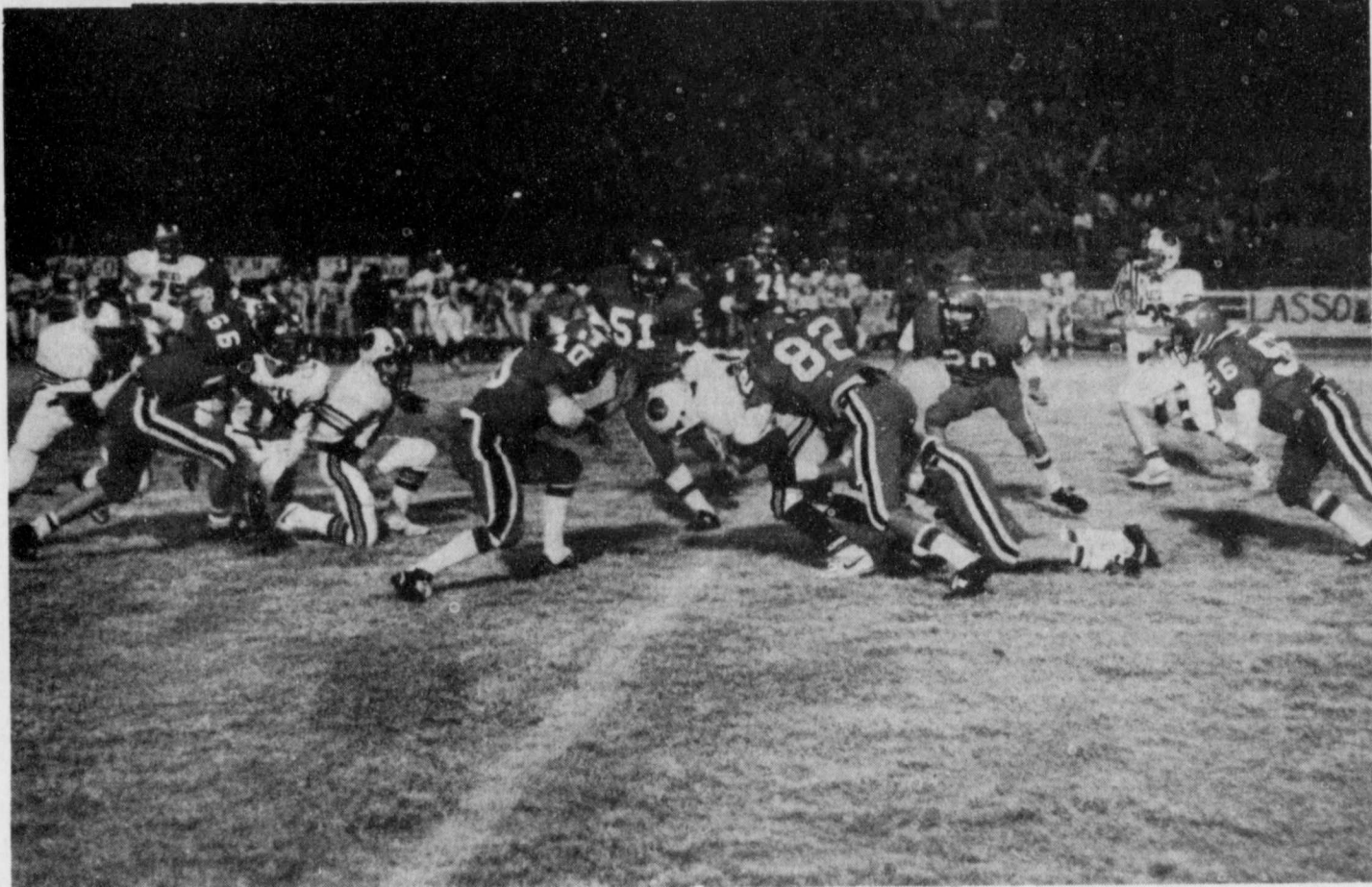

## Lockney Longhorns fall short of an area win

"That was about as close as two teams can play."

That observation by a game official came minutes after the Hustling Horns had run out of time Friday night while trailing White Deer 7-6 in their Class AA area playoff contest.

The '84 Hustling Horns had inscribed their names into the Lockney High School athletic roll of honor by advancing as far into the football playoffs as any squad in the school's history.

After having come from behind to climb within one point of the razzle-dazzle Bucks, the Longhorns were again on the prowl when time expired. They had taken a punt inside their 1 and advanced for two first downs to their 32 before the clock at Bulldog Stadium in Plainview showed 0:00.

The bi-district champion Hustling Horns amassed a 9-2-1 record while sweeping through District 4-AA rivals with a 5-0 record and ousting Hale Center on penetrations last week in the bi-district skirmish. Prior to the Friday contest, Coach Bob Purser's crew had only a tie with Abernathy marring their 10 outings following a season-opening setback at the hands of AAA Tulia.

### COME FROM BEHIND

Coming from behind as they had seven days earlier against Hale Center, the red clad warriors capitalized on a turnover to climb within one point and have an opportunity to go for the win on a two-point conversion in the final three minutes.

Glen Wise went back to punt from his 27 but couldn't handle the high snap and senior linebacker Terry Mathis -- who was all over the field on defense -- covered at the 13 to hand Lockney its golden opportunity.

Quarterback Brent Hallmark kept for 3 before Jerry Mathis pounced on a fumble at the 15. Now facing third-and-12, Hallmark faded to pass and found glue-fingered Gary Kent behind all white shirted defenders near the edge of the end zone on a 15-yard scoring strike.

With 1:44 remaining, Lockney fans' hearts throbbed as their guys had narrowed the gap to 7-6 with the all-important two-point attempt to come. An illegal motion penalty pushed the pighide back to the 8. Hallmark pitched to Jerry Mathis and the junior halfback passed toward Kent, who was covered by three defenders and saw the aerial sail over his head.

The Hustling Horns still trailed by one, 7-6, but with 104 seconds remaining a miracle could yet happen.

A white shirt was the last off the heap following an on-side kick.

Attempting to run down the clock, the Bucks netted 6 steps on three plays. Will Brown rolled a perfect punt inside the LL one yard line.

Three aerials fell awry before a Hallmark-to-Kent combination clicked for 20 yards and a crucial first down. After an incompletion, Hallmark kept for 11 steps and another first at the 32.

But both White Deer and the clock were against the Horns with only three seconds remaining. A desperation pass fell to the ground as time expired in the defensive struggle.

### DEFENSE SHINES

The Big Red defense shined and three times put up phenomenal stands to keep its goaline undaunted. White Deer's points came as a result of the Horns' lone fumble loss of the night and were not surrendered by the stingy defense which included starters Scott Poole (three tackles for losses), Monty Teeter (playing despite an injury), Danny Perez and David DeLeon up front; linebackers Terry Mathis, Paul Moats and George Basaldua; corners Johnny Torrez and Gary Kent; and safeties Ritchie Thornton and Adam Rodriguez.

Their most gallant stand came in the fourth quarter after the Bucks had gained a first down at the 4 following a 14 yard Brown-to-Ron McIntosh aerial. Brown, operating behind a husky line, lost a half yard and gained 3 1/2 to the 1. McIntosh was smothered for no gain. On a fourth down keeper Brown was halted a couple of inches shy of the double stripe.

Lockney took over on downs, but the jubilation was short-lived.

Dame Fortune dealt the Hustling Horns a crippling blow as a fumble squarely on the goaline line, was gobbled up by 220 pound tackle Tracy Kotara for six points. It was indeed a strange twist of fate that a defensive tackle scored the lone Buck touchdown! With 6:01 remaining, Wise drilled through the PAT which was the eventual difference.

Twice in the second quarter the LL defense had bent but no broken.

With Brown connecting with three different receivers for pass completions the Bucks advanced to the Lockney 16 and gained 5 more as the Horns were offside. Todd Lafferty was dropped for a 3 yard loss before Terry Mathis intercepted at the 3 and returned to the 18.

The Hustling Horns defense again sidestepped danger as White Deer mounted another offensive on its next series. With most of the yardage produced through the airlines, the Bucks advanced from their 41 to the LL 12.

Following an incompletion, Brown found McIntosh at the 4. Torrez rocked John Shackleford for a 2 yard loss at the 6.

Wise's field attempt from the 11 -- at a sharp angle -- was wide right. But the Bucks were given another opportunity

as Lockney was charged with offside. On fourth-and-one, Thornton successfully defended against a Brown pass and the red shirts took over at their 3.

### EARLY OPPORTUNITY

Kent, who intercepted Brown's first two passes, gave the Hustling Horns an early opportunity as he returned the second swipe to the Buck 34.

Operating behind an offensive line which included Poole at center, Moats and Perez at guards, Randy Race and Jerald Johnson at tackles and Teeter at right end, Hallmark sent Rodolfo Rodriguez into the line for 4 and fullback Dickie Hernandez ground out 2 tough yards. A third down Hallmark pass was dropped near the 5. On fourth-and-four, Jerry Mathis muscled his way for an apparent first at the 24, but the ball was spotted down just shy of the necessary yardage.

Several times lacking no more than 2 steps for a first, the Horns were forced to punt away. Adam Rodriguez, who averaged almost 40 yards on nine punts, boomed a 71 yarder just before intermission.

### THIRD QUARTER THREAT

Late in the third period the Lockney offensive machine began to fire on all cylinders. Rodolfo Rodriguez ripped off a 17 yard gainer to the LL 42 with a strong second effort on the next play. Kent made a shoestring catch for 14 more steps. The threat ended when Jamie Pohner came up with the Bucks' lone interception.

After holding White Deer, the red shirts again came close to getting something rolling as Hernandez went for 5 and 2 and Terry Mathis made almost 3. Inches shy at their 32, the Horns were forced to punt away on the initial play of quarter number four.

White Deer then started its own offensive fireworks which consumed almost half the quarter before the Bucks finally broke the scoreless deadlock.

### TEAM WITH MISSION

From the outset, it was evident that the Bucks -- who break quickly from the huddle and immediately put the ball into play -- were a team with a mission.

That mission, unknown to most fans outside of White Deer, was that a father of two Buck players, suffered a fatal heart seizure a week earlier during the team's bi-district victory over Spearman. The players apparently had dedicated the remainder of their playoff slate to his memory.

Rodolfo Rodriguez was the top Horn rusher Friday night with 38 yards on eight attempts. Season leader Dickie Hernandez advanced for 33 steps on 11 carries, Brent Hallmark added 18 on 5 rushes, Jerry Mathis went for 15 on 11 attempts and Terry Mathis carried three

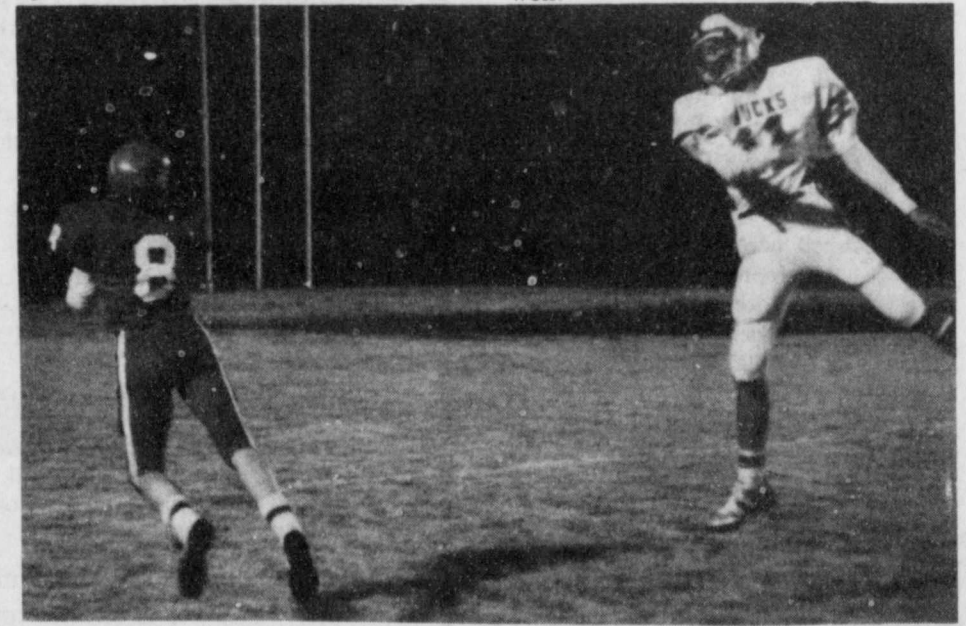
## Blackout hits

Monday night Lockney experienced a total power failure and blackout as a regulator in the West Lockney substation went out.

Lockney SPS manager Kenneth Tate said that "when we first examined the regulator it showed no signs of being out. It had not blown up and had not leaked oil so the fact that it had no visible signs of a problem made it hard to find."

Tate said Tuesday morning at 8:15 a.m. that Lockney was operating on short regulation but that full power would be restored within the day.

It took the Lockney crew and two crews from Plainview two hours to find and fix the problem to restore the power back to the city. The power had gone off about 7:45 and was restored about 9:45 p.m.

## In times like these...

President Reagan has promised to give high priority to easing U.S.-Soviet strains and pressing ahead an arms control. At the same time the White House declared that the United States was prepared for confrontation if the Kremlin tried to establish a strategic presence in Central America.  
The warning was provoked by signs that the Soviets may have sent advanced MiG-21 fighters to Nicaragua in a ship that docked there early this month. Crates suspected of containing the jets were spotted by U.S. spy satellites in a Black Sea port about a month earlier.  
Senator Daniel Moynihan of New York, a key Democrat on the Senate Intelligence Committee, gave the U.S. stance a bipartisan flavor by declaring that, if Washington's warnings were

ignored and MiG's were delivered to Nicaragua now or later, the U.S. could not rule out the use of force.

Nicaraguan authorities denied that "any type of airplane or helicopter is being or has been unloaded" and Secretary of State George Shultz indicated he had received a similar assurance from the Soviets. U.S. officials believe that, if there were planes on the Soviet vessel, they were either kept aboard or unloaded, but left dismantled in their crates. A showdown would come only if they were assembled.

Both President Reagan and Shultz emphasized that arms talks with Moscow were high on Washington's agenda. In fact, there is an agreement by the United States and the Soviet Union to convene talks in Moscow the last of this month.

During the meeting the council accepted the resignation of police deputy Charles Higgs. Higgs has been with the department for the past 6½ years and came to Lockney from Plainview.

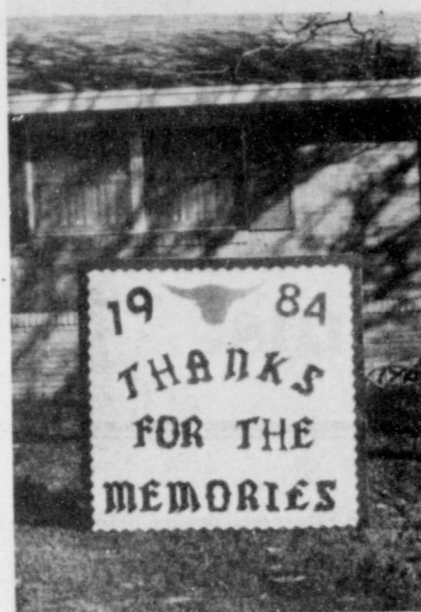
