## Tye elected to FEMA board of directors

John Tye, president of the Lockney based Tye Company was elected to the board of directors of the Farm Equipment Manufacturers Association during the annual fall convention held November 25-28 in Chicago, Illinois.

Tye, who replaces Martin Ford, was elected to a two year term on the Association's board.

The Farm Equipment Manufacturers Association is composed of 400 manufacturers of specialized farm equipment and is an international not-for-profit trade organization. There were more than 775 members and their spouses attending the convention representing 333 companies.

The theme for the convention was

"Agriculture's Future-Let's Help It Grow." Those attending heard a wide variety of speakers including Dr. Merle Jensen, developer of the "Land Pavilion" at Epcot Center, Dr. Sung won Sohn, senior vice president and chief economist of Norwest Corporation, and an agribusiness trio named "Agcon" which is comprised of Orin Samuelson, Stan Lancaster, and Paul Wellem.

The convention also featured a panel discussion on "Solutions for Ag's Future - An International Overview." The moderator of the panel, composed of 14 representatives of various segments of the international agriculture industry, was Arthur Miller of the Harvard Law School.

## Child abuse program presented at Rotary

Gail Cunningham, chairman of the Family Outreach Center of Lubbock, was the guest speaker for the Lockney Rotary Club last Friday at noon.

Cunningham explained the Center to the gathered Rotarians. She stated that the Center is funded by the Texas Department of Human Resources, the YWCA, Westminster Presbyterian Church and the Junior League of Lubbock. The agency is staffed by volunteer workers and a full time professional case work manager from the Department of Human Resources. All of the volunteers are trained in areas of family stress and crisis intervention.

Under the Center's supervision, a volunteer is matched with each family to provide a wide range of help and advice including parenting skills for young parents, hygiene, financial budgeting where necessary, weekly home visits, and many other services.

The Center is a community agency dedicated to the prevention of child abuse and neglect by helping families under stress.

The State of Texas has three categories of child abuse: the death or impending death of a child, confirmed cases of abuse and neglect, and the possible but unconfirmed abuse of children.

In 1972, the state, gave the top two categories priority for their state funded agencies to handle because there was not enough time or case workers to handle possible abuses reported. The Outreach Center handles those unconfirmed reports.

Many of the cases reported to the Center come from Lubbock General Hospital reported from children not receiving proper medical care. They also assist families who have financial problems and furnish with agencies referrals that can be of assistance to them.

Cunningham discussed some of the cases that the Center had handled. One of those she cited was an 11 month old boy who was brought into Lubbock

General Hospital with every major bone in his body showing signs of having been broken at one time or another; he had not been taken to the doctor with any of the breaks which were ultimately healing crooked. When brought in, he had had a table fork pushed through the roof of his mouth in addition to his other previous injuries. He was afraid of the doctors and nurses and was difficult to treat. Volunteers from the Center were called in and took turns going to the hospital to see and hold the child and win his trust. Cunningham said the difference in the child after two weeks was amazing. "He laughed and played with us and was not afraid of the doctors and others who were trying to care for him." Cunningham said the boy is now institutionalized because of brain damage suffered. The parents of the boy were 15 and 17 years of age. The mother turned state's evidence and no charges were filed against her. Her husband received a one year probated sentence in the case.

One of the Rotarians commented, "That just left the parents to do the same thing again." Cunningham agreed. "The penalties for those convicted of child abuse are a joke and that's why we are working to change them."

She also said that the Outreach Center tries to stop the abuse before it gets bad. "A parent may have had a bad week, and it all comes to a head when the child or children do something that acts as a catalyst to bring the parent to an abusive point." The Center provides a variety of services that help the parents to cope with many of the stressful situations that arise. They also help young parents with skills in bringing up a baby, provide a listening ear for those who need someone to talk to, help with nutritional education, and provide a referral service to other helpful agencies.

"We are dedicated, caring people at Family Outreach, and we invite referrals from anyone concerned about a family in need of help."

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## Heart Answers



WHAT IS A HEART ATTACK?

A heart attack is the death of a portion of heart muscle that may result in disability or death, depending on how much of the heart is damaged. It occurs when an obstruction in one of the coronary arteries prevents the blood from supplying oxygen to the heart muscle. Heart attack symptoms may include chest pain, nausea and shortness of breath. The risk of heart attack can be reduced by treating high blood pressure, avoiding cigarette smoking, observing a low cholesterol diet and maintaining normal body weight.

## Organ donor bills filed

Senator Ray Farabee, citing the shortage of organs for transplant, today prefilled two bills relating to organ transplantation. One bill allows a justice of the peace or medical examiner to make a donation of a decedent's transplantable organs if the family does not object. The other bill makes it illegal to buy or sell human organs for profit.

"An infant who lived on the border of the 30th District recently died because his doctors could not find a liver for him. This case, along with many national pleas for help, have heightened my awareness of the need for organ donations," Farabee said.

"Organ transplantation has become an accepted and highly successful treatment for many diseases which affect vital organs. This has resulted in a huge demand for transplantable organs. Unfortunately, the supply of organs has not kept up with the increased demand. There are thousands of people whose only chance for a healthy and happy life depends on an organ transplant which they can't get."

Farabee noted that there are 6,700 patients currently awaiting kidney transplants nationwide. Every year approximately 20,000 people in the United States die under circumstances that make organ donation possible, but only 10% to 15% (2000 to 2500) of these

potential donors actually make organ donations.

"A single organ donor can save the lives of many," Farabee added. "If the number of donors can be increased even slightly, without interfering with the family's rights, it will result in a significantly greater increase in the number of organs available for transplant. The gift of life can be given to more people than ever before."

Farabee said he would welcome comments on the proposed legislation from any interested persons. The bills will be considered during the 1985 legislative session, which begins on January 8.

## Lockney's annual rebate increased

Friday, December 6, the State Comptroller sent out sales tax rebate checks to Lockney and 996 other Texas cities that levy a one percent local sales tax.

The check sent to Lockney, which reflects taxes collected on sales made in October, totaled \$2726.37. In the same sales period last year Lockney received a check for \$3800.90. Even with the drop this year, Lockney still shows an overall annual increase over last year. The total sent to Lockney in 1984 is \$40,389.26 whereas last year to date Lockney had received a total of \$38,129.02. Lockney has a 5.93% increase for the year.

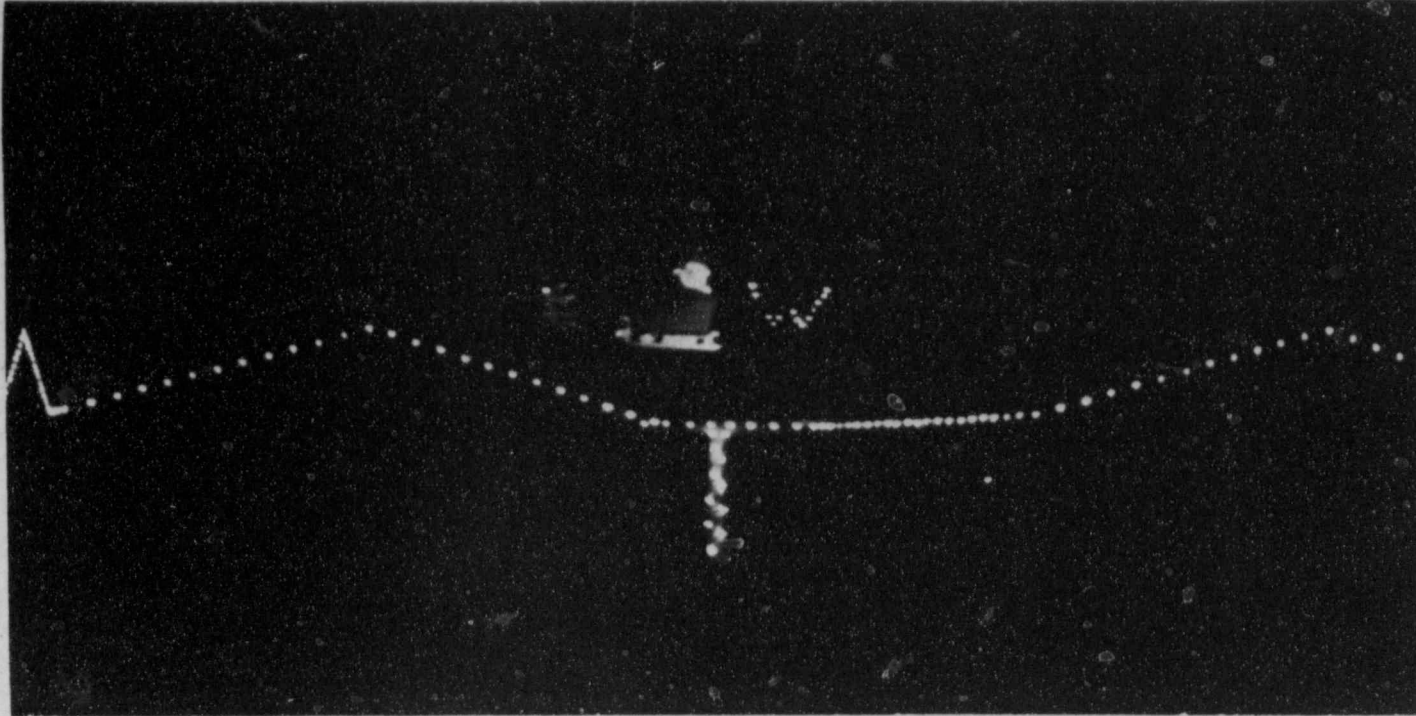
## Athenas celebrate at Heritage Center

## Yummy Buttermilk Pecan Pralines

First of all, using a small amount of butter or margarine, grease a large square of foil or waxed paper so you won't have to scramble around doing this when you are ready to place the candy on it.

Because the candy mixture bubbles quite a bit during the cooking process, use a large heavy pot to prevent boilovers. Pour one cup buttermilk, 2 cups sugar and 1 teaspoon baking soda into the pot.

Stir until sugar is completely dissolved before placing the pot on the burner. Set burner on medium and cook mixture to soft-ball stage, stirring constantly. If mixture begins to stick, reduce heat.

The mixture will turn a brownish color during cooking but this is normal. To check for soft ball stage drop about 1/2 teaspoon into a cup of cold water. If you can form a soft ball easily with your fingers the candy is ready for the next step so remove from burner.

Next add 2 cups pecan halves, one teaspoon vanilla and one tablespoon butter. Beat by hand till glossy and very thick. Quickly spoon onto buttered paper, making little patties. If mixture gets too hard before you have time to spoon it all out, return to heat for a few seconds to soften. Cool, then store between sheets of plastic wrap or foil in tightly covered container. Place in the refrigerator if you plan to keep more than a week or two.

# Social Security News

Many people equate Social Security with the elderly and retirement, but the program actually provides benefits for people of all ages. Retirement may seem a long way off in the eyes of young people, but monthly retirement checks are only one of a package of benefits available to anyone who works long enough in Social Security-covered employment.

Disability insurance, for example, is an important feature of the Social Security program for young workers. It provides benefits to workers who are so severely disabled that there is reason to believe they will be unable to return to work for at least a year. In such cases, a worker can start receiving monthly payments after an initial 5-month waiting period. And the benefits are payable at any time before age 65.

These benefits will continue for as long as the person remains disabled. Moreover, a person who receives disability benefits for 24 months becomes eligible for Medicare, which can help meet the costs of health care.

If a married worker becomes disabled, monthly payments can also be made to the spouse and children. And if the person should die, survivors insurance will help protect the family through the payment of monthly benefits to the children and surviving spouse, if he or she is caring for an eligible child. If there are no children,

the surviving spouse can receive payments at age 65 (50 if disabled).

These features are all in addition to the retirement benefits that many people think of as comprising the entire Social Security package. But Social Security is more—much more.

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### SUGAR COOKIES

- 3/4 cup butter or margarine, softened
- 1 cup confectioners' sugar
- 1 egg
- 2 tablespoons milk
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/2 teaspoon almond extract
- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- Sugar

In large bowl with mixer at medium speed, cream butter and confectioners' sugar. Beat in egg, milk, vanilla and almond extract until well mixed, occasionally scraping bowl. Stir in flour, baking powder and salt until well mixed. Cover with plastic wrap; chill several hours or overnight.

Preheat oven to 375°F. On lightly floured surface, with floured rolling pin, roll chilled dough 1/8 inch to 1/4 inch thick. Cut with floured 2 1/2-inch cookie cutters, cut dough into desired shapes. Sprinkle with sugar. Roll trimmings and cut more cookies. Place cookies 1 inch apart on cookie sheets.

Bake 8 to 10 minutes until cookies are lightly browned. Immediately remove cookies to wire racks; cool.

Tip: Shape dough into 1 1/2-inch balls instead of rolling it out. Using a flat-bottomed glass dipped in sugar, flatten balls on cookie sheets.
